# Message From Your HOA Board President

We are finally moving out of the worst of summer's heat and into nicer weather; a time when we get relief from the heat and our electric bills! This is also the time of year to apply a pre-emergent to your yard to stop the growth of new weeds in the next spring. For those who plant bulb plants, this is also the time to prepare the beds and get the best quality bulbs you can find for planting in November-December.

To update you on what the board is working on, we have received a scope of work from an engineering service to use in a bid package for the erosion repair around Lake 4. Bid packages will be sent out and reviewed by the board, then a company will be selected to do the work, which will then begin as soon as possible. The goal of the repair is a long term fix, and the board believes that once the work is completed this problem should not have to be readdressed any time soon.

In the past couple of articles, we reported on the crime activity that LOR was experiencing in the summer. As a result of that, the board has been conducting meetings with the constables' office to work toward a more long term solution.

After talking with a representative from Harris County, the following information is an update on the status of some of our streets with Harris County.

#### **Section I:**

Was originally platted by the developer to be private and will most likely remain that way unless we can talk the developer into re-platting the roads and submitting them to be accepted by the county. That process would take a minimum of three years. This is not good from a law enforcement standpoint because officers will not be able to give tickets for moving violations.

#### Section 2:

This section begins at Huffmeister and continues on Skinner to a point just beyond Rosy Hill Court. This section has passed the first part of the two-part inspection process and should be completed next summer when the developer's office calls for a follow-up inspection. If it passes the second inspection, Harris County will accept that section of Skinner Road and maintain it,

and it will also allow law enforcement to issue tickets for moving violations for the entire stretch of Skinner.

#### **Section 3:**

This section picks up Skinner Rd. where Section 2 ends and continues east onto Rose Garden Trail and all of Rose Trail. This is the only section that has completely passed all phases of inspection and is now listed as accepted and maintained by the county.

#### **Section 4:**

This section picks up on Rose Garden Trail and heads west, including Briar Rose Trial. This section failed its first inspection in November of 2009. The developer was instructed as to what needed to be repaired. Drainage work has recently been done in Section 4 which took care of part of the punch list. The developer is now responsible for scheduling a request for a new inspection after this work is completed. Once it passes the first inspection, it will be another year before the second inspection can occur because the county wants to see that the repair work is holding up. Hopefully Section 4 will pass the second inspection so that the county will be responsible for future maintenance.

Please note that the cul-de-sacs do not qualify for county maintenance. The county is considering only Skinner Road, Rose Garden Trail, Rose Trail and Briar Rose Trail and will only include Lakes of Rosehill Drive if the developer resubmits the plats and begins the inspection process or we attempt that in the future.

In the September newsletter, I requested to be contacted by all of the block leaders within LOR. Sadly, I've only heard from two block captains so far. LOR is a place that we should all be proud to call home, but it takes a village to keep things in order. If anyone has a current list of the block captains and their contact information, I would greatly appreciate it. If you have been a block captain and no longer want to be in that role, please email with your information and street. 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
Some have asked, "When the stock market is in a downturn, would it not be a good practice to increase contributions to your investment accounts, thus buying more shares at a lower price? And when the market has provided a high return, would it not make sense to scale back contributions, buying fewer shares at the higher price?"

Yes, and of course this is the essence of what investors wish to do, namely buy low and sell high. But what is an actual practice which will force you to do it? After all, putting money into the market when the market is down can give a person a queasy feeling. Yet it is that very behavior which investors need to cultivate if they are ever to sell high. Enter value averaging (also known as dollar value averaging). VA refines the practice of dollar-cost averaging, which is more widely known. Either technique helps you reduce risk because you are buy shares at a variety of prices throughout the year instead of buying all the shares at a single price. When prices are dear, you buy fewer and when they go on sale you buy more.

VA is good because you start with a goal in mind of how much you can invest and an expected rate of return. Example: You wish to accumulate \$450,000 over the next 20 years. If you figure you can earn an annualized 8 percent, then you would need to put away about \$820

per month. You can then chart your progress month by month towards that goal. Now let's look at the "value" part of value averaging. Assume at the end of the first year, instead of having the \$9,840 you should have to be on track toward your goal, a downturn in the markets leaves you with just \$9,500.

That would mean that the next month, instead of investing your usual \$820, you would invest an additional \$340 to bring your portfolio's value to where it should have been to remain on track toward your goal. In fact, you would go through this process each month. In months where you fall behind, you would add to the amount you invest each month. And in months where your returns are higher than expected and your portfolio's value gets beyond where it needs to be, you would scale back your monthly investment, or even possibly end up selling some shares and removing money. The VA discipline forces you to buy when low and buy less (or sell) when high. While it's not perfect the approach makes sense for many families. The biggest benefit to VA is that it provides a reason and a discipline for saving. Most families are not saving enough to cover their future needs. 
