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

CCHOA News DEED RESTRICTION Tip of the Month

The CCHOA staff is currently reviewing about three sections of the neighborhood per month (there are a total of 18 sections) in an effort to remind owners of the Declaration of Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions (the "deed restrictions") that each owner agreed to when purchasing their home in Circle C. If you would like to report a deed restriction violation, you can do so via the website under the "Resident Services" tab – under Management Office and Forms.

This month we would like to ask that everyone take a close look at your outdoor screens. If they are frayed, bent, or mottled, it may be time to change them out. This is an easy do-it-yourself maintenance item that can make a dramatic difference in the appearance of your home.

It is also the time of year that many homeowners put up holiday decorations and lights. Please remember that decorations must be removed no later than January 15th. A good rule of thumb is to not turn on any lights until Thanksgiving.


NEIGHBORHOOD SAFETY Get Connected!

Many of you might have received some of our recent safety alerts via email (if you haven't, you can sign up for Circle C Email Announcements by logging onto www.circlecranch.info) and we wanted to bring you more ways to effectively communicate and stay in touch with safety topics in our neighborhood.

- The City of Austin conducts monthly meetings the 2nd Tuesday of each month called "Train the Trainer" where residents can learn more about how to set up a Neighborhood Watch Program in their section of the neighborhood. There will be no meetings November, December and January, but we'll have detailed meeting information in the February 2011 newsletter.
- The City also recommends that residents sign up for Citizen Observer (log onto: www.citizenobserver.com) which allows the Austin Police Department to instantly update you about crimes, emergencies and other important information.

Click on Geographic Location Search and then choose your neighborhood (Circle C Homeowners Association is the official listing). Please - No Dumping!

One of the many beautiful aspects of living in Circle C is all the green space that surrounds our neighborhood. Many of you are fortunate to back up to green space that may be water quality land or detention area or open lot. We need your help in keeping these areas clean and free of debris. Under no circumstances should anyone dump or store debris or items in any of these areas. It may seem harmless to dump your clippings or branches, but by doing so you are altering these naturalized areas and in some cases increasing the risk for fire. Lawn clippings and tree and shrub trimmings can be placed in brown refuse bags available at Home Depot or Lowes and placed at the curb on trash day. If you back up to a green space, this is not an extension of your backyard. Please do not store firewood, wheelbarrows, ladders, etc. We have walked many of these areas recently and many residents are storing personal items outside of their fence and lot. As we maintain or walk these areas, these items may be picked up and thrown out so now is the time to remove them.



Did you know that the tabs pulled from aluminum cans can bring in anywhere from \$.50 to \$1.00 per pound! The HOA is continuing to collect aluminum soda can tabs in the management office so please DO NOT throw your cans away without taking off the tabs. The tabs will be donated to the Ronald McDonald House Charities of Austin and Central Texas. Circle C Landscape

It is mid-October and as I have told many people if the weather was like this all the time, taking care of all of the landscaping at Circle C would be great fun all year long. Those heavy September rains and cooler temperatures created idyllic conditions for lots of fall flowers this year. Some of our favorite plants that have bloomed this fall include Yellow Bells, Salvia Greggi, Mexican Bush Sage, Butterfly Bush, Knock out Roses, Russian Sage, New Gold



lantana, and Dallas red lantana. The grasses have also looked great, including gulf muhly (looks like purple/pink cotton candy), and the miscanthus, which blooms a very nice wheat bloom this time of year. We got extra blooms from the yucca this year, which are usually only a Spring bloomer.

This fall has been a great time for finishing up the capital landscape improvements approved by the Circle C HOA Board of Directors for 2010. The projects included a renovation at SH 45 and Spruce Canyon to solve some re-irrigation and drainage issues, installing grass at some of the corners along Spruce Canyon and LaCrosse to enhance visibility, installing rockwork at some remote locations to improve the look of natural non-irrigated areas that are visible in the neighborhoods, and general bed upgrades to some of the post office areas, Muirfield, and Circle C North. We are also looking forward to two locations being finished out by the landowners and turned over to the CCHOA for maintenance—one along Via Grande in Alta Mira and one along Spruce Canyon in front of Fairway Estates Two.

We also planted out the median north of LaCrosse on Escarpment, the previous home of the Bradford Pear

Trees that were removed last spring. As you may recall, they were at the end of their life and had begun losing numerous branches and uprooting in this high traffic area. In their place, we have installed a number of diversified shade trees including Monterrey Oak, Shumard Oak, Lacebark Elm and Live oak in the median and on the west side. These are complimented by red and white crepe myrtles at either end of the median, and some understory trees including possumhaw holly, Mexican plum, Texas redbud and tree yaupon holly. This should provide various pockets of year round color, with early spring blooming trees (Mexican Plum and Texas Redbud), summer staples (red and white crepe myrtles), fall color (Shumard Oaks), and red winter berries on the possumhaw and tree yaupon

hollies. All shade trees will be staked for one year, after which they will receive a one year prune to establish appropriate growing patterns. All trees are irrigated with bubblers and mulched around the tree wells.

For maintenance this time of year, we will be finishing up a turf and bed fertilization with a pre-emergent weed killer. We have cut back the irrigation to one time per week as the fall has been a little on the dry side. We will also be trimming, weeding and mulch turning throughout along with starting one of the bigger projects of the year—HOLIDAY LIGHTING!! Per the Circle C tradition, you can look for those lights to be on November 24, the day before Thanksgiving!



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

Town Hall – September 16, 2010 New Community Center and Pool Q&A

TOPIC: COMMUNITY CENTER BUILDING

- **Q:** Have you considered using the community center as a gym? Now that the design has been completed, we will focus on the programming for the community center building and what activities and programs will be planned. There are no current plans to purchase gym equipment, but there may be an opportunity for fitness type classes.
- Q: If there can be over 400 people at the facility, why are there only 80 parking spaces?
- **Q:** What is the city code requirement for parking spaces? See the website (www.circlecranch.info) for City of Austin Parking requirements.

Q: Will there be a charge for building use?

Yes, there will be a charge for building use, we are just beginning to focus on the programming for the building including what fees may be applicable. We will share this information once we have come up with a plan.

Q: Why do we need a community center when we lack the funds and have two schools, one right next door?

Q: Why do we need all the building space?

The HOA conducted several surveys over the past 5 years that indicated a resident need/want for indoor community gathering space. All HOA boards that were involved carefully weighed the pros and cons of developing a pool and a community center.

Including the building was determined to be in the best interest of the community overall especially given the outcome of the West Pool Committee's work as well as the surveys. The community center building will serve as a central identifiable location for the HOA offices, provide meeting rooms for the HOA board and committees and serve as a rentable space for residents for private functions. The HOA will also utilize this space for special events for the community.

Q: Is there enough restrooms to handle the capacity?

Restroom fixture quantities are determined by code requirements for City of Austin for this type of building occupancy, which is Assembly and this project meets those code requirements.

- Q: Will there be a cafeteria or concession area like in the current pool?
- Q: Why is there no café?
- Q: Why is there no kitchen or café?
- Q: Will there be a café/store for kids to buy a drink and snack?
- Q: Who will operate the concession window?
- Q: Will outside food and drink be permitted?

Q: Can you clarify whether food can be sold at the pool?

The HOA considered various options for food service when designing the Community Center and pool space. Cost was a major factor in deciding not to include a full commercial kitchen. In addition, the CCHOA decided that they would rather not be in the role of landlord over this space and instead allow more flexibility in the provision of food. Rather, there will be a catering kitchen available to residents who rent out the building space and concessions will be sold from this area for pool patrons. We are just beginning to focus on the programming for the project and will be determining the rules for the building and pool including whether outside food or drink will be allowed.

- Q: What activities are available for older children?
- Q: Where are the areas for the many pre-teens and teens around Circle C?
- Q: What space is available to serve young teens?
- **Q:** Are there any activities for children older than 10? Activities for older children will include a large slide, pool

volleyball and basketball, wi-fi, lay out areas on deck and lawn (Continued on Page 15)

and possibly future programming that has not yet been identified. In addition, the current pool facility programming will continue.

Q: What activities are planned for the months of October through April?

We are just beginning to plan the programming for the community center building and will consider various activities for different age groups.

Q: What is the deepest area of the pool?

5' in the adult area and 4 feet in the volleyball middle section

Q: Have you considered a diving board and deep area?

Yes, we did consider. However, space and additional insurance cost factored in to the decision to ultimately not include in the project.

- Q: Why is the pool size so small?
- Q: How did we determine that the size of the pool was sufficient for our needs?

The size was a function of tree preservation, pool construction costs, and an understanding that the size is larger than what people realize. It is approximately 100' in both directions of the longest axis. We have posted an image on the website that shows the new pool layout drawn over the existing pool layout in order to give everyone a sense of size. Q: Does the slide make the pool become a "waterpark" thus more insurance cost?

The slide and site in general will add to our current insurance costs.

Q: Why is there only one slide if capacity is 300 people?

Cost, space and tree preservation were all factors in deciding on the number and type of slide. Future boards may decide to add additional features as budget permits.

Q: Will the pool be open in summer 2011?

The goal is to complete construction in late summer/early fall of 2011.

Q: Are there trees located inside the pool fence? Yes, the goal was to preserve as many trees on the site as possible

and we believe we have achieved that goal.

- **Q: What is the ground color of deck?** *A muted earth tone.*
- Q: Will there need to be a lifeguard stationed at the base of the slide to prevent collisions, thus more cost? Yes.

Q: Where will the noisy pool pumps be located in relation to the building?

The pool equipment will be housed in the pool mechanical building (noted on the site plan as "MECH". The pump motors do make some noise, but they are not large, and are in a semi enclosure and should not even be heard in the pool area, much less the nearest home owner.

Q: Will the trash and mechanical be hidden since they face the trails and parkland?

Yes, City of Austin code requires these items to be screened.

- Q: Where will the retention ponds be located and will they be fenced off with ugly chain link fence?
- Q: Where will the run off sprinklers be located and can they be located farther away from the homes on Doswell Lane?

The ponds are in the far NE corner of the site, the sprinklers are positioned to spray and runoff (if any) back toward the pond and away from the neighbors. We have not yet identified the fencing for the pond, but it will have to meet City of Austin code.

Q: Are there contingency plans to help save the Live Oak trees? Our team committed a lot of time to reviewing the trees in detail. Much of the site planning and positioning of elements happened ON SITE so as to protect as many trees as was reasonably possible.

Q: Will there be more trees/shrubs planted to help hide the noise and sight of the parking lot from the homes on Doswell Lane?

Trees/shrubs will be planted to help provide adequate screening throughout the project. Consideration for homes will be made as needed during the project. The project is situated on the property so as to reduce the likelihood of any substantive impact on the homes on Doswell Lane.

Q: What kind of outdoor lighting will be used? How bright? Where will they be located?

Q: Will the lights be on all night?

We have not yet determined the location of all outdoor lighting, but will certainly take into account all surrounding neighbors as well as the need for property and personnel security.

Q: Has a traffic study been done?

Q: Has a vehicle trip analysis been done?

A TIA (traffic impact analysis) was done for all of the Circle C West area in 2000 with development agreement and zoning for the entire area west of La Crosse. This included the traffic impact for a planned elementary school site (now Clayton Elementary) and a planned community recreational site (Community Center and Pool Site) along with all of the residential off La Crosse West and

Spruce Canyon. This information was used by our designers in the development of the project.

Q: What is the parking capacity and how will it affect the already congested La Crosse/Clayton parking problem and traffic flow?

The parking was determined by both City of Austin code requirements and the direction of the CCHOA board.

- Q: What is the distance in feet from the curb of Spruce Canyon to the beginning of the parking lot? *About 60*'
- **Q:** Can cars turn around in drop off? *Yes*
- **Q:** Will the position of the parking lot create a cut-through for traffic in the morning and evening for Clayton traffic? The driveway as it has been designed does not allow for traffic to cut through.
- Q: What is the location of future construction such as bb court, playscape, etc.?
- Q: Will there be a playscape?

Q: Will there be a full bb court?

Future construction that future boards may consider include a connecting drive, basketball sport court, playscape and another building.

- **Q:** Are there several bike racks planned? 16 spaces; these are easily added if more are necessary.
- Q: What is the projected cost of the pool? Of the community center?

Total project is budgeted for approximately \$4 million. We are about to enter into a detailed cost estimating phase and more accurate numbers will be presented in the weeks to come.



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

FROM THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS


At the time this column was submitted for publication, six homeowners had volunteered to fill three open Board positions until the February annual meeting. Selections will be made after interviews are completed and announced before or during the regular Board meeting scheduled for October 19. By the time you read this issue of the newsletter, the names of the three directors will be posted on the Park West website and the mail center bulletin boards.

EMERGENCY VEHICLES ON PARK WEST STREETS...

(A reprint from August 2009...and still topical)

Thanks go to Fran Greve, a member of the PWHOA Bylaws and Rules Committee, who gathered the following information while doing research about parking on our neighborhood streets and put it in writing for this column:

The firefighters from Station 43, our local station on Escarpment, made a community service call to Park West on Monday, June 29, 2009, and drove through the neighborhood in one of the fire trucks used to respond to emergencies. The purpose of the visit was to assess maneuverability for fire trucks and EMS equipment on Park West streets in the event they have to make a first responders call in our neighborhood. Lt. Josh Anderson and his fellow firefighters drove the neighborhood and made some suggestions for maintaining our streets to ensure that the first responders (fire and EMS) have quick access in case of an emergency. They expressed concerns about negotiating the curve on Tasajillo Trail in the approximate area of houses numbered 6408 - 6425 and 6501 - 6526 if there were cars parked on the street. This area would be impassable if both sides were blocked. They also doubted they could make the turns directly out of our three cul-de-sacs if there were cars parked close to the intersection or directly across from the cul-de-sac street. (Note: A City of Austin ordinance mandates parking no closer than 20 feet from an intersection.) It may require several attempts at backing/ going forward/backing again to turn. The roundabout, at the bottom of the east side of Park West, is a similar situation; however, it is illegal to park in a roundabout. The fire trucks stationed on Escarpment are pump trucks. Pump trucks can range from 24 - 28 feet long, while ladder trucks can be between 35 - 50 feet in length. This makes it very difficult to maneuver in a small area. Equipment ranges from 7 feet to 10.5 feet wide. Since our streets are approximately 25 feet (Continued on Page 21)

wide, if cars are parked on both sides of the street, the fire trucks and EMS equipment may not be able to pass. The following are a few suggestions for keeping our neighborhood streets safe:

• Park your car on the driveway or in the garage to lessen the obstructions emergency vehicles face in order to negotiate our streets.

• Whenever possible, don't park opposite another car on the street. Have guests space their parking so that there is adequate room for emergency vehicles to pass.

• Park at least 20 feet away from an intersection - it's the law.

• Allow 15 feet on each side of a fire hydrant, whether or not the curb is painted. (Park West does not have painted curbs alerting us to the location of a fire hydrant.)

• Remember that emergency vehicles require a much larger turning radius than any car we drive. Park cars to allow for easy and quick egress from the cul-de-sacs.

• Do not park in the roundabout.

• Be particularly aware if parking on the curve on west Tasajillo Trail since this presents a hazard for both visibility and maneuverability.

We are fortunate that we have a fire/EMS station in the Circle C Ranch community. By following some guidelines and a few laws regarding parking, we help the firefighters and EMS responders do their jobs in addition to making Park West safe for all our residents. Many thanks to the firefighters who made this community service call and to all emergency personnel for their dedication to our safety.





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<u>Clubs & Announcements</u> More Easy Non-toxic Homemade Cleaning Solutions

I hope that you liked the cleaning solutions I provided last month. This month I will focus on the kitchen and will start with the dishwasher. I have not found a satisfactory homemade solution for dishwasher detergent, but I have found a good recipe to prevent water spots. To prevent water spots in the dishwasher, make a batch of the following: combine 1 cup Borax and ½ cup baking soda. For each load, put 1 teaspoon of this mixture in the dishwasher along with your regular dishwasher detergent. Just a quick note here, most of us use too much detergent in our dishwashers. Check your manufacturers guide for the recommended amount. I found I was using way too much detergent. When I cut back to their recommendation, I find that my dishes still get just as clean, and I save money.

To clean a microwave, wet a dishcloth or sponge and place it in the center of your microwave. Heat the wet cloth or sponge for 30 - 40 seconds. The steam this creates will help loosen any hardened spills. Be sure to let the cloth or sponge cool before handling, and then use it to wipe down the inside of the microwave. This is also a good way to disinfect your sponge, but always make sure it is wet. Never put a dry cloth or sponge in the microwave. Please don't ask me how I know.

For a wonderful non-toxic drain opener, pour 1 cup salt and 1 cup baking soda down the drain and follow with several cups of boiling water. To freshen a disposal, put lemon or orange rind in the disposal and run.

I like to wash my vegetables with a vegetable wash that I make myself. In a very large pitcher, combine 1 cup water, 1 cup distilled white vinegar, and 20 drops of grapefruit seed extract. Slowly add 1 tablespoon of baking soda and stir

is

add 1 tablespoon of baking soda slowly. Once the mixture combined and has quit fizzing, pour into a 2 cup capacity spritz bottle. Spray your fruits and vegetables with this mixture and rinse. Note: I am usually able to find the grapefruit seed extract in health food stores/sections. The extract is a little pricey but the fact

that one bottle will make many batches; I like to share it with friends. The wash will keep a long time which is good because one batch goes a long way.

To disinfect kitchen counters there are many options. One of my favorite ways is to slice a lemon or grapefruit in half and rub the cut half over the surface and let dry. You can also combine one teaspoon of grapefruit seed extract to 2 cups of water in a spray bottle to spray on counters to disinfect them (make sure to avoid getting this in your eyes). There are many essential oils, such as lavender, clove, and tree tea oil that can also be used in place of the grapefruit seed extract as a disinfectant if you prefer their scents, but with any essential oil, be sure that all members of the household can tolerate their scent. Many people have a sensitivity to scents and cannot tolerate some of the stronger ones.

I hope you find these solutions helpful. Next time I will share bathroom cleaning solutions.

Happiness is in your choices. Dixie and Arlo Schurle have made some fortuitous choices to enjoy a life well-lived. Their name is well known in Park West HOA, but I would like to put a face to this couple by providing some background information of their previous life before their rather recent arrival in Park West.

Dixie began to make her plans early. She claims she was only six when she told her mother she would visit the Pyramids "some day". She was playing a piano piece named "Go to the Pyramids". Dixie wanted a pet monkey. Her dad said monkeys did not live in Kansas; Dixie knew she would "some day" travel to the monkey's country. Arlo was raised in a more traditional setting. His escape was knowledge. His home town, Clay Center, Kansas, still claims him as the smartest person it ever produced.

Their families' farms were about 10 miles

apart but they were in high school before they met. Arlo was the star in their Latin II class while Dixie was struggling. She was dating Arlo's best friend. That romance took another path just when Dixie wanted to attend a dance. An important choice was made. Dixie invited and Arlo agreed though dancing was not his forte'. Not one dance was attempted for this soon-to-be steady couple.

That fall, Arlo began his college studies at Kansas University and Dixie finished high school. After his freshman college year, Arlo spent the summer in Germany on an honors program. The next summer they were married. In August of this year they celebrated 47 years of a marriage which began when they were 18 and 19 years old.

The couple chose their next path carefully. They agreed that Arlo would never mention quitting his dream of a Ph.D. and Dixie would defer her education until after raising their children. Their adventure began. Arlo's first job took them to Indiana University where their first son was born. all there is to life?" They saw a good life in their future; but not one with the richness they had experienced living among the poor in Africa. The decision was made to pursue more adventure in their life.

The Kingdom of Saudi Arabia was building a show-place university. Dixie spent the year finishing her degree before they left for a new country. She took more than 60 hours while Arlo taught at the University and was cook, mom, dad, and housecleaner so that Dixie could achieve her goal. In Saudi Arabia, they lived happily among many cultures and languages for 6 years. However, thinking they needed to consider their sons learning their own heritage, they returned to the US. Arlo was quickly hired without an interview at a well-known school in Indiana.

One son was in college and the other son was away at boarding school. The Schurles' were again on their own. They left for the island of Guam where Arlo was on the faculty as a professor and was later promoted to department chairman. Dixie had earned a Master's degree and was teaching in public school. Arlo took up diving and Dixie had 3 to 4 nights a week of musical activity playing an oboe. Life was good. Yet again, Arlo was given the opportunity to return to Saudi, this time to Riyadh, a more conservative area. He wanted to go where his experience was truly needed. Dixie landed a position as the Middle East Consultant for Harcourt Textbook Publishers and traveled around the Middle East and Africa. Her job was fantastic for her and unheard of as a woman traveling alone and working. She reveled in meeting dynamic women who had a purpose in their developing country.

Another opportunity came when a new university offered Arlo a position as an experienced mathematics professor. They moved to Abu Dhabi, United Arab Emirates. Daily temperatures of 120 degrees did not deter them and they remained there for 4 years. A special reason would have to present itself for them to return to the United States ------the birth of grandchildren. They have 2 grandchildren here in Austin. Dixie is a granny/nanny 5 days a week. Another son is a successful lawyer in New York City and is the father of their third grandchild. After such an active life, Arlo obtained a teaching position in the mathematics department at UT where he is grateful to have no responsibilities other than teaching. As a civic minded woman, Dixie served some time on the Park West HOA board of directors. She is also a member of American *(Continued on Page 29)*


