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Oak Tree Trimming Season is Now

As many of you will recall from the frequent yard signs around NW Austin earlier this year, the season not to trim oak trees is from February through June as this is when the oak wilt carrier beetle is most active. Consequently, the season to trim oak trees is from July through January, and many oaks in our neighborhood need it. If your oak trees don't get trimmed between now and the end of January, they should not be trimmed until July, 2011.

We are reminded that our Declaration requires that no tree, shrub or planting of any kind be allowed to overhang or otherwise encroach upon any sidewalk or other pedestrian way from ground level to a height of seven (7) feet. The City of Austin as well has a requirement that all trees overhanging streets have a minimum clearance of fourteen (14) feet above street level.

Oak Wilt is a serious threat to the oak trees in central Texas. Below are some tips for proper pruning of oak trees:

Proper Pruning

- Avoid pruning oaks from February through June, as this is peak carrier beetle activity season
- Sterilize tools with bleach or alcohol (Lysol is also a solution) before pruning
- Employ certified arborists and their firms (avoid scam artists)

Proper Wound <u>Treatment</u>

 Immediately paint wounds with pruning paint or latex paint within 15 minutes as carrier beetles may be attracted to untreated cuts or wounds

Proper Firewood Usage

- Select well-seasoned firewood as unseasoned wood might be contaminated
- Select Oak Wilt free firewood that has no fungal mat contamination

Make a Birdseed Wreath

Wild birds add joy and beauty to your backyard, but our feathered friends can use a little extra help in the winter months when the temperature drops and natural food sources become scarce. Why not feed them (and add a little more beauty to your yard) with a decorative birdseed wreath?

You must admit, a birdseed wreath adorned with ribbons or pine cones is a charming holiday decoration for your front door, garage, or barn. Kids like greasing up the wreath mold and scooping the goopy birdseed – and as an added bonus, watching the birds enjoy their hard work helps teach them to love and respect nature. You can use any type of seed in this recipe, although smaller seeds tend to hold the shape of the wreath better. Sunflower seeds and shelled peanuts are popular with a wide variety of birds, including jays, woodpeckers, and chickadees. Sparrows and finches like thistle and millet. You can also add dried fruit such as raisins, cranberries or currants to the birdseed mixture. Here's what you'll need: 8 cups (1.9 L) birdseed; 1 oz. (30 ml) unflavored gelatin (4 ¼ oz. packages); 2 cups (473 ml) water, divided; oil, shortening, or lard; ribbon, and some pine cones or other decorations.

To make the wreath mold, first grease up a bundt cake pan with a generous amount of oil, shortening, or lard and set it aside. Combine the gelatin with $\frac{1}{2}$ cup (119 ml) cold water in a large bowl. Let sit. Meanwhile, bring the other 1- $\frac{1}{2}$ cups (355 (ml) water to a boil in a small pot. Add the boiling water to the gelatin mixture and stir 2 to 3 minutes, until gelatin is completely dissolved. Add the birdseed to the gelatin mix and stir well. Allow to sit for one minute, then stir again to make sure that the liquid is well absorbed by the seeds. You may have to repeat this step a few times, until there is no visible water on the birdseed clumps together. Then spoon birdseed and gelatin mix into the greased bundt cake pan and refrigerate for at least 3 hours.

When the gelatin is set, invert the bundt pan to remove the birdseed wreath. Do not force it out; if it seems to be stuck, allow the wreath to come to room temperature first.

Once it's out of the pan, dry the wreath overnight on a cooling rack. Loop a pretty ribbon around the wreath to hang it up. You can also decorate it with pine cones, dried

can also decorate it leaves, berries, or baubles you might have around the house. However, avoid using bells or anything else that might flap around in the wind, since the noise and movement will likely scare the birds away, thereby defeating your purpose!

consider? You will want to talk to your

financial advisor and tax and legal professionals first, but here are a few ideas to get you started:

- Boost your IRA contributions. You have until April 15, 2011, to fully fund your IRA for the 2010 tax year, but the sooner you finish with your 2010 contribution, the quicker you can get started on your 2011 contribution — and the earlier in the year you fund your IRA, the more time you give your account the opportunity to grow.
- Put more money into college savings plans. If you have a 529 college savings plan for yourself or someone else, consider putting more money in before year-end. You can gift up to \$13,000 (\$26,000 per married couple) per person per year without gift tax consequences. However, this must be accomplished by year-end.

If you've been thinking of making charitable gifts, don't put them off any longer. As long as you make a donation to a qualified charity before the year ends, you can claim a deduction on your 2010 tax return. For example, if you donate \$100 to a charitable group [either a religious organization or one that has received 501(c)(3) status from the Internal Revenue Service], and you're in the 25% tax bracket, you can deduct \$100 (with a tax benefit of \$25) when you file your taxes for 2010, providing, of course, that you itemize. If you donate stocks or other types of assets, you may also be able to save on capital gains taxes, because it will be the charity, not you, that eventually sells those assets.
 - Sell your "losers." If you own investments that have lost value since you purchased them, you can sell them before 2010 ends and then use the tax loss to offset capital gains you may have earned in other investments. If you don't have any capital gains, you can use up to \$3,000 of your tax losses to offset other ordinary income. If your loss is greater than \$3,000, you can "carry over" the excess and deduct it from your taxes in future years. However, if you then want to repurchase the investment you sold, you'll need to wait at least 31 days to avoid violating the IRS' "wash sale" rules.
 - Take capital gains. In 2011, the tax rate on long-term capital gains is scheduled to increase to 20% for most investors, up from the 15% rate it's been the last several years. If you have stocks or other appreciated assets that you were thinking of selling in the near future, you might want to do so before the year comes to a close. However, it's generally not a good idea to make investment decisions strictly because of tax consequences. If your appreciated assets are still a part of your overall financial strategy, you may be better off holding them for the long term, even with a higher capital gains rate.

Considering these moves before the year ends may help you better prepare to address you financial picture in 2011.
