

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



NATURE WATCH Fronds of Ferns

More often associated with mossy, moist, old-growth forests in the Northeast or Northwest, many are surprised to learn that ferns do exist in Texas. In fact, unlike other western states, Texas has a large and varied set of fern flora, although they are mostly concentrated in three regions: the Trans-Pecos of West Texas, the Edwards Plateau of Central Texas, and the Pineywoods of East Texas.

Ferns are a fascinating subject, due to their ancient lineage and distinct biology. The oldest fossil remains of ferns have been dated to 250 million years ago, and they were at their height, both literally and figuratively, during the Carboniferous period. Many species were tree-like, but the ferns of today are herbaceous and much smaller in stature. Fern structure includes the root, also known as rootstock or rhizome, the stalk or stem, and the fronds, also known as leaves or blades.

Differing from flowering plants as they reproduce not by seeds but through spores, fronds of ferns can be fertile or sterile. Only the fertile ones produce the spores, which are formed in groups of four and are most often found clustered on the back of the fronds. These clusters are called 'sporangia', and their patterned arrangement is usually associated with the veins in the frond. In return for their reproductive ability, the fern provides each group of sporangia or 'sorus', a distinct protective covering. The branching and shape of the fronds, the shape, size, and placement of the spores, as well as the shape of the protective covering are the features most used in fern identification.

One of the commonest ferns found on the Edwards Plateau is the Purple cliffbrake (Pellaea atropurpurea). Rather small and evergreen, its Greek name means 'dusky' and refers to the dark stems. This fern prefers rock ledges, cliffs, and canyon walls, often seemingly growing out of rock in partially shady areas. It is sporiferous from March to November. Often associated with the Purple cliffbrake is the Alabama lipfern (Cheilanthes alabamensis). Also common, this fern is found on shady, protected calcareous rock slopes, ledges, and cliffs. Small and evergreen, its Greek name refers to 'lip-like' shape of the spore covering. Alabama lipfern is sporiferous most of the year, but mainly from March to November.


Southern Maidenhair fern (Adiantum cappillus-veneris) is a delicate rock-inhabiting fern of shady stream banks and moist wooded slopes, usually growing in seepage along streams and in canyons. Its ancient Greek name means 'unwetted', relating to the foliage being repellent to raindrops. Sporiferous from May to January, it has fine, lacy foliage, giving it a

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

delicate, graceful character. Growing 6 inches to a foot in height, this fern goes dormant during droughts. Almost always associated with Southern Maidenhair fern, Wood fern (Thelypteris kunthii), is also known as River fern or Southern shield fern. The latter name comes from the shield-shaped membrane covering the spores. This fern is found on the shady edge of sandy creeks, low woods, deep canyons, and especially at the base of dripping limestone bluffs. Sporiferous from April to November, this semi-evergreen fern has gracefully arching fronds that grow up to three feet and take on a bronze color as winter approaches.

Ferns drop millions, if not billions of spores during their lifetime, and while many can be carried great distances through air currents, very few ever land in spots suitable for growth. While wellunderstood, the lifecycle of ferns is quite complicated. Even today, those who study ferns can agree on four main classes of ferns, but debate still exists on which are true ferns and which are fern allies. 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Five Reasons Not to Park on the Street

- 1. **Obstructs Visibility** children playing in their yards may dart out from between parked vehicles to retrieve a toy or a ball. If the street is clear of vehicles, drivers can see these potential hazards and avoid accidents.
- 2. *Impedes Emergency Vehicles* vehicles parked along the curb narrow the street and may slow or prevent a fire truck or ambulance from reaching their destination in time to save lives and/or property. Did you know emergency vehicles responding to a call can push an obstructing vehicle out of the way and are not responsible for any damage? In addition, damage can also occur to vehicles that obstruct city waste and recycling trucks.
- 3. *Invites Crime* vehicles parked in the street are easy targets for vandalism and theft of their contents. They also provide a potential hiding place for burglars.
- 4. *Makes Neighbors Unhappy* while most people don't like to complain to their neighbors, no one likes to have a neighbor's vehicle parked directly behind their own driveway as they back out, or in front of their house blocking repair and delivery vehicles. It's illegal to park on sidewalks in the City of Austin.
- 5. *May Lower Property Values* streets packed with vehicles make a neighborhood look less inviting to prospective buyers.

Here are a few tips to help you fit in fitness in the New Year.


- Remember that any movement is better than none. If you only have 15 minutes each day to go for a power walk, those 15 minutes will equal 105 minutes (almost two hours) by the end of the week, 420 minutes (seven hours) of exercise each month and 91 hours of exercise a year! Small things can add up to big victories over time.
- Find what works for you. For some people, a gym membership is very convenient. For others, it may not be convenient to their location, budget, job, or family. If that is the case, see if your neighborhood has any exercise groups, hire a personal trainer that will come to you, or start your own lunchtime workout group for added camaraderie and accountability.
- Schedule exercise into your week. Workouts are much more likely to happen if we put them in our calendars. Schedule workouts as you would important business meetings or doctor appointments.
- Remember that sometimes, the hardest thing to get is going. Many times, just getting our shoes on and getting out the



door is the hardest part of a workout. Once we are moving, endorphins kick in and we feel great for moving.

- Make use of the early hours. I used to dread getting up at 5:20 every morning. But now I love it, because after I get ready for work, it guarantees me a few minutes to myself before anyone else is awake. Similarly, getting workouts in before the busy day kicks off ensures that they happen, and the day will be better because of it.
- Take the kids along. My baby and I have logged countless hours with the jogging stroller. But I know that if I didn't take him with me, the majority of those workouts would have never happened. Pack up the kids and remember that pushing the kids will mean more calories burned.


