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

#### HAVE YOU RECEIVED A DEED **RESTRICTION NOTICE?**

As reported in each month's newsletter, the HOA staff drives at least two sections of the neighborhood per month to note violations of the Declaration of Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions. These commonly include: front yard landscape maintenance (mowing, edging, free of weeds), home maintenance (paint, screens, siding) and recreational vehicles (boats, RV's, trailers) parked in the driveway. The HOA is required by state law to notify owners in writing via certified mail and allow for the homeowner to request a hearing before the board of directors. If you receive a letter, please contact us at the HOA office and let us know your individual situation. We would like to work with you to bring your home into compliance. If you would like to report a violation, you can do so via our website at www.circlecranch.info

#### THE TIME TO RE-SOD IS NEAR!

If you received a notice last summer or fall in regards to your lawn OR you have selfevaluated your lawn in need of replacement, now is the time to start planning and prepping. Due to the above average cold temperatures, you will want to wait until mid to late March to install (until the last chance of a freeze is over). We will begin reviewing deed restrictions in the system by April 1, 2010. As always, if you would like to discuss your individual situation, please contact us.

## PLEASE STORE THEM FROM VIEW

Help us keep Circle C beautiful! Please store your garbage and recycling container hidden from view - this means either in your garage or backyard or screened by landscaping or fencing on the side of your home. The City of Austin requires that carts be placed at the curb no earlier than 6:30am the morning of your pick up date (Monday's for all of Circle C) and put away no later than 10pm the evening of pick-up. This may seem like a small issue for some.

#### PRINTED HOMEOWNER DIRECTORY DISCONTINUED

In an effort to conserve paper, the Association will no longer print a Homeowner Directory. We know many of you utilize the directory to communicate with your neighbors and friends; however we already have this resource available on our website under "Resident Directory". Residents MUST opt into the directory with information such as phone numbers, email address, etc. You can search by name or by address. If a resident is unable to access the website, they can call the HOA for assistance.


#### FENCE REPLACEMENT

The HOA has taken many calls lately on fence replacement, recently because of the weather. If you share a fence with a neighbor, the general rule of thumb is that the cost to replace or repair is split 50/50. You will need to speak with your neighbor and work out a plan. If you are proposing to change your existing fence, either materials or location, you must obtain approval from the Architectural Control Committee. The Architectural Control Committee has issued the guidelines below fence replacement:

#### Architectural Control Fence Guidelines:

- If you are replacing your fence with a fence that is like the one you have, no ACC review is required
- Fences that face a street or open space are required to have the smooth side out. Ownership of a fence is not a function who has the smooth side.
- The ACC recommends that you use the galvanized steel poles if you are concerned about the longevity of the fence. They are superior in this regard.
- Four inch or six inch pickets are acceptable and must be installed vertically.
- Preferred Material: Western Red Cedar. These fences will last much longer and are required for wooden fences that face common areas like Escarpment, Barstow, LaCrosse, South Bay, and Dahlgreen. If you do not face a common area and currently have a treated wood or pine fence, you may use this as a replacement, however, it may not last as long as a cedar fence. If you are uncertain about the material, ask your fence contractor. If you are unsure if you face a common area, please email Susan Hoover at shoover@

Generally, the Springtime is the best, however, homes sell in Circle C Ranch all year round. February is typically to slowest month and all real estate companies take their conventions then. March and April get busier with the early sellers/listings and then it explodes in May when the weather is warm, grass is green and flowers are out. The large families tend to buy then to have the kids in school by Fall. Now we are seeing a lot of young families with babies looking at homes and we have had as many as 20 couples in one Sunday afternoon through our open houses. We typically have 3-4 open houses every Sunday. There are a lot of buyers and not many sellers. If you can, in any way, get your home on the market before the end of February you will be way ahead of the game. Right now, as of 2/8/11 there are only 36 homes on the market in Circle C! That is really, really low. Yes, the market has stabilized in Circle C Ranch. You will have certain cases where homes are selling cheaply for one reason or another, but by-in-large no-one is giving their home away in Circle C Ranch anymore and buyers are taking note of it. There are 23 pending homes and 36 active. That means we have 1.5 month's inventory on the market. A great reason to list as soon as you possibly can. onr.com, and she will let you know of any special requirements for your area.

- Fence Height: The City of Austin regulates the fence height under the Land Development Code. The approved fence height for the City is six feet. If you back to a common area street with no driveway cuts, you may already have a higher fence up to eight feet. If it is already in place, you may replace with the same height. If you want to alter the height of a six foot fence, you must get a City of Austin permit and submit the project to the Architectural Control Committee.
- It is up to individual homeowners to determine if they would like to share the cost of fence replacement between properties.
- If you want any other alternate type of fencing such as wrought iron, you will need to submit it to the Architectural Control Committee.
- In most areas, gates from the rear fence into drainage or natural areas are prohibited unless you have written permission from the ACC and the landowner.
- If you are thinking of installing a trellis above the fence, you will need to submit the project to the Architectural Control Committee. The trellis must be free standing on its own posts, and be well designed with a frame.
- To make a submission to the Architectural Control Committee, please go to the Circle C website at www.circlecranch.info and

log in as a resident. You will find a link under Resident Services to the Committee.

## CIRCLE C COMMERCIAL DEVELOPMENT UPDATE

Stratus Properties has begun construction on the south side of Slaughter and MoPac of a new commercial center. The initial phase will include Alamo Drafthouse (approximately 38000 square feet), Austin Diagnostic Clinic (15,000 s.f.), and two retail buildings. The Austin Diagnostic Clinic will include an urgent care center, general practice, allergies, and pediatric divisions. Tenants for the retail buildings will include Coffee Bean and Tea Leaf, and ATX Bikes. Other tenants currently negotiating leases include a Mexican restaurant, a pizza restaurant, a yoga center, children's retail, a salon, dry cleaners and ice cream shop. Construction began in mid February and they are hoping to have Alamo open before Thanksgiving.

A buyer is purchasing land from Stratus at the corner of MoPac and LaCrosse. They are planning to build a post-graduate physical therapy college. No time line has been given for construction of the building.

Several cell service providers are working with Stratus on obtaining land for a 120 foot cell tower to be located on MoPac next to the LCRA Electrical Service Station. The purpose is to have a cell tower with multiple providers which would enhance cell phone service to Circle C.

## **Circle C Landscape Report**

As I am writing this, the temperature is 22 degrees and the wind is blowing 35 mph. We will probably have some sleet in the next half hour. It is hard to imagine that very soon, all will be sunny and warm!

Despite a very cold winter, by the time you get this newsletter, it will probably be warm and sunny. Hopefully, we will be heading for Spring rains as well.

This time of year we are very busy. You will notice on the commons areas that we have trimmed back all of the old and tired vegetation, and re-mulched the areas. We also have added a pre-emergent weed killer in the beds to cut down on the number of weeds that float in on the high winds from all of our native areas. We also used the dormancy of winter to do some selective weed spraying on some of the turf areas. Upcoming, and after the grass really begins to grow, we will be doing the Spring fertilization. By that time, I will also have had time to assess any damage that occurred during the extended freezing we had in February.

Over the winter, the CCHOA continued its annual winter pruning of live oaks and major trees on the commons areas. Each year a section for pruning is selected and professionally pruned by a certified arborist during the proper season for oak pruning. This year, the area along the north and south of Slaughter Lane was done, from Escarpment to Beckett.

By the time you get this newsletter, we will be well on our way on pruning the crape myrtles. Most of them get a light prune, however, you will notice on the Escarpment and Slaughter medians where they are under the trees, we will be pruning them back substantially. This is to keep them from hitting the shade trees. These were planted a long time ago when the standard practice was to prune drastically every year. New methods mandate a light pruning, which is what we do for all of the crape myrtles that are freestanding on the commons areas.

We have had quite a bit of vandalism to the landscape lighting. Unfortunately, someone has come along on a regular basis and kicked over a number of individual lights that are under the trees. This has happened in Wildflower Park, at Eclipse and along Escarpment from the bridge north to Slaughter. We are working on fixing everything. If you notice any vandalism going on, we encourage you to report it to the police right away, and thanks for the help.

Over the winter, we have run the irrigation system only as needed. We have several areas that have new trees and it is critical to keep them watered. As we get toward spring, we will be supplementing the natural rainfall with irrigation. Each of our irrigation controllers has a rain sensor on it, so it will turn off at one half an inch of rain.

As far as your own yards go, it is a great time for a big clean up and preparation for Spring. I would encourage you not to fertilize until the grass is actively mowing and you have mowed it once or twice. This is particularly important for St. Augustine, which will develop brown patch more easily if it has too much nitrogen. Bermuda and Zoysia grass begin to actively grow when the temperature is above 60 degrees at night on a regular basis. The fertilizer is much more efficient when the grass is growing. So, good luck and happy gardening for March!

CIRCLE C SWIM CENTER UPDATE

It's officially spring time here at the Circle C Swim Center, and we couldn't be more excited! It's the beginning of the busiest time of year for us, so we have a lot to talk about.

#### SPRING SWIM LESSONS

First and foremost, we will soon be starting up our group swim lessons again. Here at the Circle C Swim Center, we will offer swim lessons in the afternoon for all different age groups as well as all swimming levels. If you are interested, here is a closer look at the different classes:

 <u>Parent & Infant (6-18 months)</u>: Through songs and play, parent and infant will enjoy this water adjustment class designed to promote water safety and introduce babies to a positive water experience.
 <u>Parent & Toddler (18-36 months)</u>:

This slightly more structured program

introduces young children to very basic
 swimming skills while in the security

• of their parent's arms. Skills such as

bubbles, floating, safe water entry and exit will be introduced. Children up to 4 years who prefer to swim with a parent are encouraged to attend. This program is especially designed for the preschooler to transition to group lessons.

• Jellyfish (3 years old): For kids new to a pool experience and just getting water acclimated. Jelly fish will lean how to blow bubbles, submerge face, kick legs on front and back, and water safety.

• **Pollywog (4-5 years - Beginner):** For kids who are ready to tackle the deep end. Pollywog's focus on submerging their heads underwater, float on the front and backs, arm and leg movements on front and back, as well as water safety.

• <u>Minnow (4-5 years - Intermediate)</u>: For kids who are ready to move unsupported. Minnows will learn how to blow bubbles out of their nose, float unsupported on their back and stomach, front and back glides, the flutter kick, arm movement and water safety.

• <u>Stingray (4-5 years - Advanced)</u>: For kids who are ready to swim on their own.

Sting Rays will learn how to float on their own, bob in the water, glide with 15 yards of front crawl, breathing to the side, and water safety.

• Level 1 (Introduction to water skills): For kids who are motoring on their own. Level 1's will learn how to swim 15 yards of freestyle and backstroke, retrieve objects in 5 feet of water, change from a vertical to horizontal position, and water safety.

• Level 2 (Fundamental aquatic skills): For kids who know how to swim freestyle and backstroke. Level 2's will work on their technique for freestyle and backstroke, focus on learning the breaststroke, and swimming 25 yards of said strokes.

• Level 3 (Stroke development): For kids who know how to swim freestyle, backstroke, and breaststroke. Level 3's will work on their technique for freestyle, backstroke, and breaststroke, focus on leaning the butterfly, swimming 25 yards of all four strokes, and getting swim team ready!

• <u>Level 4 (Swim Team Preparation)</u>: Now that you've got the technique down, this class will help build your endurance and enhance your breathing.

It is required that all swimmers be evaluated prior to registering for classes. Swim evaluations are free, and no appoint is necessary. They are held by Swim Instructor, Amanda Hartman. The child will swim for less than five minutes, and Coach Amanda will advise you on which class is best suited for the child. A parent may also choose to enroll their child in a lower level class if they feel more practice is needed.

If any of these classes interest you, look online at www.circlecranch. info to learn more. Here, you will find times, dates, pricing, and instructors for your favorite classes.

#### TIPS ON PREPARING FOR SWIM LESSONS

For many of you, this may be your child's first swim lesson. Here are some tips for preparing your child for swim lessons.

1. Talk to your child. Find out what they are excited about and what they are scared about. Let them know it's okay for them to have these feelings. Help them understand what they will be doing and learning in the class. Set expectations and goals. Go over pool rules and water safety.

- 2. Make the most out of bathtub time. Play with toys and have them float on their back with your hands underneath them. This may be the first water experience many children have, so use this time to make them feel comfortable and safe in the water.
- 3. Take your child to the Circle C Swim Center. Get them comfortable with the pool, so that when they come to their first day of their lesson, the pool isn't alien and scary to them since they've already experienced it. While you're here, take advantage of the time to teach them aquatic and safety skills. Show them how to float and blow bubbles. Also, remind them to always walk slowly on the pool deck, always wear sun screen, and show them where the lifeguard stands are located.
- 4. Feel free to watch a swim class with your child at the Circle C Swim Center. While watching, let your child see what they will be learning in the class. Emphasize how much fun they will have and how many friends they will make. It's also a good idea to have them meet their swim instructor before the class meets, so they feel more comfortable with them on their first day.

#### PRIVATE & SEMI-PRIVATE LESSONS

If for some reason group lessons aren't going to work out for you, private lessons are a great alternative to group lessons. 



#### A RETIRED PERSON'S VIEW OF PERSONAL COMPUTERS AND **TECHNOLOGY** - By Michael Harris

I write this as a point of information to anyone else who is experiencing technology overload and in no way as an endorsement to purchase anything. I was educated as an Electrical Engineer, BSEE University of Illinois, 1964; and for anyone out there who remembers, that was still in the age of vacuum tube electronics and building-sized analog computers. While I was in school, Dr. John Bardeen invented the transistor while working at Bell Labs. He went on to win two Nobel prizes in Physics and clearly, his invention changed the lives of everyone in the modern world.

As a student, and then during my 45-year working career, technology and computers were a constant in my life. They were also continuously evolving into smaller, more powerful, faster and more complex devices that seemingly appeared everywhere. Being self-employed for the last 20 years of that

career, my office was a cell phone and a computer that evolved from "lug-able" to "laptop" to "notebook." The only constant was the presence of Microsoft software from MS-DOS to Windows 7. I spent a great deal of my career "touching" graphics so I was very much aware of Apple and its outstanding capability for handling graphic design and printing pre-press activities. I never viewed their products as main stream and never used one personally, although I purchased many of their graphic systems for the businesses I was involved with.

Over the years I watched Apple as a potential investment and in dismay as John Sculley (Pepsi) and then Gil Amelio (TI) almost destroyed Apple as a company. Steve Jobs returned when Apple purchased NEXT Computer, a software company that was graphics driven, and became the core of both Pixar (his animation company sold to Disney for billions) and the current Mac operating system. When Apple switched to an Intel "chip" instead of their proprietary one to make it potentially compatible with Windows applications as well as run the Mac operating system, I began investing in Apple. My interest was more from the viewpoint of making money than one of simplifying my computing life. Over the years I won and lost, but watched as Apple's computer base slowly grew.

Part of the genius of Steve Jobs is in solving a problem before any of us realize we have one. He did it with music, the iPod and iTunes store which in 10 years became the largest retailer of music in the world. He did it again four years ago with the iPhone and the "app" store which transformed the way we think of a mobile phone Then last April he created the iPad ... "Oh, it makes calls too!" which finally made me put my toe in the Apple water as a consumer. My iPad quickly became my device for 90% of the things I used my computer for in my retirement years. Pictures, music, e-mail, web surfing, reservation making and book reading all worked at home, in a WiFi cafe and on the road with the "3G - mobile" capability. It even opened all of the Word and Excel files sent as attachments in e-mails from family and colleagues. I felt like a tech savvy kid again when driving from Hilton Head Island to Austin and making hotel reservations from the car as we headed West on I-20. We could track ourselves on Google Earth, find places to eat, find where the cheapest gas stations were and check the conditions and the weather on the road ahead all while one of us drove.

Based on the outstanding training and customer support I received in setting up the iPad and the intuitive way all Apple applications worked, I was hooked. I took the next plunge and purchased a 15-

inch MacBook Pro to replace my Windows computer the Friday after Thanksgiving. One of the brilliant marketing ideas Steve Jobs had was to open Apple stores and staff them with bright, upbeat and happy workers to let you "test drive" the hardware and software features. With knowledgeable staff to explain how things work as opposed to all of the techie talk one gets at other retailers, I could see first hand how an Apple computer would make my life less about being technical and more about using the computer as an extension of how I wanted to live.

For a single \$100 payment at the time of purchase, I was able to buy "one 2 one" service. This nominal fee includes the transfer of all my old files from my Windows computer, about 300 GB of historic files, photos and music in my case, and putting these files in the places on the MacBook so that they would reside in an Apple environment. It also includes as many one-hour personal training classes as I can schedule in a year with the only "rule" being you can not sign up for a new one until after you finish the last one. These classes are on the hardware, software and anything else that will make your user experience outstanding. In addition to the major file transfer, I have averaged one class each week except for the two weeks over the holidays. I feel that I have all ready received my "money's worth" and I have many months to go. Before the purchase, I also took group classes of five or six to test drive a Mac and learn about the differences - both positive and negative - between the Windows world and the Mac one. Based on those classes, I purchased a third-party software package that permits me to run Windows 7 from "inside the Apple operating system" just like any other software application. This allows me to continue to use Quicken, which because of a Quicken Company decision, does not transfer well to the product designed to run on the Apple Operating System. The bottom line is everything but Quicken works in the Mac world exactly as it did before and the Quicken solution only cost about \$100 for the third-party software solution.

In the two plus months I have had my Mac, I have completely reorganized over 16,000 photographs, streamlined my old file system and designed and built a personal web site. The web site sounds like a "big deal," but other than struggling with creativity, it was a very easy task. No programming was required, just point and click and everything I wanted to do happened. I still use the iPad for most casual things but use the Mac for things that having a key board and a bigger screen simplify the chores. As I look back at how long it took me to make the switch, I wonder why I didn't put personal productivity at the same level as personal investing.

#### FROM THE LANDSCAPER

It's time to get your beds ready for a new year. Adding compost (top dressing) around the base of your plants and shrub helps loosen clay soil and provides depleted nutrients like phosphorus, nitrogen, potassium, iron, zinc, etc. Compost at the base of your shrubs, and especially flowering plants, such as daisy, coneflower, salvia, dianthus, lilies, iris, etc. Composting also provides the nutrients in a readily available form, where inorganic molecules have to be converted by bacteria prior to being taken up by the plant. I don't know about you but composting makes me fell good like I'm returning what's natural to the ground. My mom, who lives out towards Dripping Springs, has found that cow manure works the best compared to horse, chicken or bat guano. She has an amazing garden each year. Now is also a good time to think about a trip to Home Depot to buy some bulbs and/or seeds. Good choices are agapanthus (one of my favorites), liriope, society garlic, dahlia, day lily, monkey grass and on and on... This is also a great time to take down any unwanted limbs or non scaffold limbs to shape the internal structure of your tree or bush. Try to think of the limbs as ladder rungs; circle up and around the tree and radiating out and up at a 45-degree angle. You don't want limbs pointing inward and you don't want them rubbing against each other. Buena suerte, Scott Smith/Pearson Landscape.



## **Clubs & Announcements** "Got the Time?" Kiker Elementary unveils Human Sundial


The Kiker Campus Advisory Council invites the Circle C community to explore the "human" sundial which has been constructed at the front of Kiker Elementary School on the corner of LaCrosse and Dahlgreen. The analemmatic sundial or sunclock uses a person's own shadow to indicate clock time. The construction is the result of a project team led by Kiker parent, Margit Szabo-Higgins. Kiker teacher Sharon Peltzman was awarded a grant from A+ Federal Credit Union, the Kiker PTA provided support, and Kiker Art teachers Danielle Swint and Jennifer Duncan assisted students in creating decorative hand-painted tiles, which also funded the project. Alexis Bearer, landscape designer and owner of Landscapewitch, Inc., supplied materials, labor, plants, and expertise. Kiker parents Jennifer Smiley, Christine Oelkers and former Kiker parent Nancy Hicks rounded out the work crew by helping to create the finished product including a beautiful mosaic pattern for the scale of dates.

Szabo-Higgins, who has designed an implemented a succession of interactive science projects on the Kiker campus including a native habitat with a disappearing stream and a WeatherHawk 916 weather station said, "This sundial will directly show students how the relationship between the Earth and the sun can be used as a tool for measuring time. It was created to support academic learning by giving students the opportunity to explore, discover, and experiment; thereby developing a greater understanding of themselves and their place in our solar system." The sundial will be an integral part of Kiker's outdoor learning lab.

The sundial is the oldest known device for the measurement of time and the most ancient of scientific instruments. It is based on the fact that the shadow of an object will move from one side of the object to the other as the sun "moves" from east to west during the day. Every sundial is unique and carefully planned based on the specific latitude and longitude coordinates of the location. Here are quick instructions on how to use the sundial; please follow the rules and enjoy:

#### **RULES:**

- Always enter the sundial at the so opening. Never walk on the 🥏 🥳 plants or the painted tiles. O
- You, the individual, are the gnomon (perpendicular rod;





pronounced no-men).

- The hour markers, or numbers, are located on the arc. BLACK numbers represent Standard Time and the BLUE numbers represent Daylight Savings Time.
- While facing north, stand on the appropriate month of the year on the Scale of Dates (rectangular mosaic). Make sure you are standing up straight AND in the correct location within the month, i.e., near the front if it is the beginning of the month, middle if it is mid-month, or back if it is the end of the month.
- Observe your shadow. Your cast shadow will tell the time (see Figure). You can raise your arm to cast a longer shadow. The sundial will indicate the 'clock' time all year round to better than the nearest 15 minutes. Its accuracy is limited by the width of your body's shadow.

The Sundial was dedicated on November 29, 2010 to Ms. Peggy Chesson, a pre-K teacher at Kiker who lost a brave battle with breast cancer in 2009. Ms. Chesson had a gift for teaching children, knew the importance of hands-on learning, and loved science, gardening, and the outdoors.





# HOPE4JD





In October 2008 (his 5th grade year), JD was in a near drowning accident in his family's backyard hot tub. He jumped into the hot tub, where his 2 year old sister was playing, and knocked himself out. His dad, John, started CPR and EMS was able to get a heartbeat in route to Dell Children's Hospital. He spent 4 weeks in the PICU and IMCU, 14 weeks in Dallas at Our Children's House at Baylor and returned to Austin in March of 2009.

JD is suffering from an anoxic brain injury. Anoxia is loss of oxygen to the brain and is different from Traumatic Brain injury, which is usually due to trauma to a portion of the brain. Anoxia is more like a blanket injury, most all outer portions of the brain, not just a single area. We know that JD is out of a coma now, but is still non-verbal. He is what his doctors have termed "locked in". This is a condition where the patient can hear and understand everything that is going on around him, but cannot speak. They have discovered in the last year that JD can read, has short and long term memory, and can understand his visual surroundings. He has a very good sense of humor, as well. His injury has also left him with severe muscle tone/spasticity (cerebral palsy).

Although he is making great progress in his recovery, he is still unable to stand, verbalize his thoughts, or walk on his own. There are many promising treatments, which are not covered by insurance, available to JD but they are very expensive.



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

## Tips to Turn Your Walk Into a Workout By Sarah S. Jordan, MS

Walking is a great mode of exercise because it requires no equipment, it is low-impact, and something that many people can do regardless of their fitness level or experience.

#### **BENEFITS OF WALKING**

Any movement is good movement and the same is true for walking. Like other forms of exercise, walking can help you improve cholesterol levels, lower blood pressure, control weight, improve mood, decrease stress, and it also provides numerous other health benefits. Here are some tips to turning your walk into a workout.

#### **GET THE GOODS**

Proper footwear is essential for any kind of exercise. It is important to select shoes with good arch support and soles that absorb shock and provide cushioning. If you are unsure about fit, Austin has several local shoe stores that will personally fit you to a new pair of sneakers.

Choose clothing that is comfortable to move in and that you feel good wearing. Dress in layers if the weather is cool so that you can adjust as needed during your workout. And take a bottle of water along so that you can hydrate along the way. You may find that taking an IPod along will help keep you motivated.

#### WALKING FOR FITNESS: PROPER SPEED & TECHNIQUE

Although the act of walking is simple, walking for fitness takes more effort, attention to speed, and technique. In order to get the



most out of your walking workout, the speed should be brisk and above your "stroll in the park" comfort level. Also, your heart rate should be elevated. A good estimate: 10 - 15 heartbeats in a 6-second pulse count. (Multiply that number by 10 to get heartbeats per minute.) Strike the ground with the heel and drive off from heel-to-toe in order to effectively engage the muscles of your lower-body.

A few minutes after starting your walking workout, take a moment to stretch the calves, quadriceps, and hamstrings. Hold stretches for several seconds (with no bouncing) on each side. After your workout, reward your muscles and improve flexibility by taking a few minutes to stretch. Hold stretches longer here because muscles are warm and can make gains in flexibility at this point.

#### JUST GETTING STARTED?

If you are new to exercise, it is important to check with your doctor before starting an exercise program. Start slowly and gain confidence before adding distance. For example, you might try walking 10 minutes in one direction and 10 minutes back. Slowly build up to 15 minutes in one direction and 15 minutes back. Over time, build up to 2-3 miles or 40-60 minutes of walking at a brisk pace most days of the week.

#### A SEASONED WALKER?

If you have been walking for quite some time, you may be looking for something new to add to your walking workout. With a few quick additions, you can further challenge and tone muscles and increase the intensity of your workouts.

Add speed. Turn your walk into a speed walk. Engage the arms and the core muscles. Incorporate intervals. Walk for five minutes. Do an interval for two minutes. Repeat. Intervals can include things like walking lunges, moving side squats, push-ups, and jogging.

Hit the hills. Adding an incline will increase intensity in a hurry!

Add resistance. Use a weighted backpack or vest. Or push your child in the stroller. I did not realize just how much weight I was pushing when I exercise with my son until I did the math recently. He is 25 pounds, and the stroller is 15. That extra 40 pounds adds great intensity (and a whole lot of cuteness) to my workouts!

If this is the year that you have devoted to improving health, walking is a great way to start! Remember... "The journey of a thousand miles begins with a single step."



### Cardiovascular Disease and Women Think Red Heart

Do you know the number one killer of women in the United States? It's not breast cancer. Try again. It's heart disease. 489,000 women die from heart disease annually, not breast cancer, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. In a research study, the American Heart Association reported only 13 percent of all women in the United States are aware that heart disease can kill them or play a major threat in their lives. Women are bombarded with advertisements, news media, and commercials about how breast cancer can kill them. Yet, cardiovascular disease is playing a lethal role in women's health today, more so than cancer.

Cancer is the second killer of women. Though it's not breast cancer, but rather lung cancer. 73,000 women die annually of cigarette related lung cancer. In the United States 202,964 women were diagnosed with breast cancer in 2007, and 40,598 women died from this disease. Receiving regular mammograms and doing daily breast self-checking examinations are crucial for survival. Along with great surveillance, research, and early detection fewer women are succumbing to this disease. Colorectal cancer is the third leading cancer killer in women. The fact is heart disease is the number one killer in women. Women need to think more Red, along with Pink. Heart disease is a preventable disease and can be controlled. Yes, many contributing factors, such as genetics, gender, and ethnicity, do play a role. However, lifestyle is a major culprit in heart disease. Adopting a healthy lifestyle, which includes the following factors, can reduce the risk of contracting heart disease:

- Exercise regularly.
- Control other contributing factors such as blood pressure, diabetes, hypertension, and cholesterol.
- Maintain a well-balanced nutritional menu that is rich in fruits and vegetables, whole grains, and lean meats.
- Eat high fat foods sparingly.
- Reduce the amount of sodium, sugar, and alcohol.
- Maintain a health body weight.
- Cook meals more frequently.
- Limit pre-packaged foods.



## BAT C NSERVATION

Dear Members,

I'm sad to report that White-nose Syndrome has been confirmed in two additional states: Indiana and North Carolina.

Last week, I wrote to tell you the Geomyces destructans fungus that's linked to WNS was found in Indiana. Since then, lab tests have confirmed the WNS disease, not just the fungus, has reached Indiana.

The North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission announced yesterday that the disease has spread to their state as well. Bats found in an abandoned mine in Avery County and a cave in Grandfather Mountain State Park, both in western North Carolina, tested positive for White-nose Syndrome disease.

WNS or its associated fungus is now documented in 16 U.S. states and 2 Canadian provinces. You can view a map showing all confirmed WNS locations here. Mortality rates approaching 100 percent are reported at some of these sites.

I hate to be the bearer of bad news, but we suspect Indiana and North Carolina are only the beginning of this year's emails reporting new states that face White-nose Syndrome. Over the next few months I'll be sending updates to BCI supporters as they come in — and hopefully a little good news, as well. Bat Conservation International and its partners, with help from friends like you, are searching tirelessly for solutions to this devastating disease.

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

#### Facility Projects

- *Chlorine System* -The MIOX chlorine generation system was installed November 12th and is creating a chlorine solution for the pool. Construction of the chemical storage building was completed and passed inspection several months before the chlorine generation system was installed. Additionally, pool staff converted to CO2 vs Sulfuric Acid as the Ph balancer for both pools as part of this project, however the added expense of continually using this product proved to be excessive, therefore pool staff switched the system back to acid.
- *Office Computers-* Four office computers (2 lap top and 2 desk top) have been installed and all operational software installed.
- **Pool Pump** The New Competition Pool Pump was installed on Saturday December 4th. The new pumps approximate increase in water flow is 10%, which equates to 144,000 gallons more circulation/filtration per day.
- *Hand Dryer* Two hand dryers have been installed in the men's and women's restroom.
- *Shade Café-* The Café awning has been installed and 24 small café style tables have been placed around the facility near the lounge chairs .
- *Upstairs Work Space* The upstairs work space was completed during the first part of 2010 adding two 10x7 offices and a 20x8 break area/ class room. Part of this project included reconfiguring the bathroom entrances, so a permanent stair case leading to the upstairs area could be installed. In addition, two walls were moved downstairs to create additional space for a first aid station and work/ office storage area.
- *Lounge* Ten additional lounge chairs were purchased for the swim center.
- *Pavers* The area between the café and swim center office now has artificial turf and misters.
- *The recycling program* was successful collecting large amounts of plastic water bottles, paper and aluminum cans.
- *The Large Umbrellas* have been power washed and repairs have been made with rip stop
- Four new lifeguard umbrellas have been purchased and installed.

These forms are kept in a binder behind the front desk and each time the guest attends the Swim Center, there is a space where a staff member can record the guest's admittance. To ensure information is up-to-date, these forms will expire at the end of each calendar year.
- *Lane Usage:* The Swim Center has set forth a lane usage chart, being used by all staff members, and are currently planning for summer lanes, when programming will increase.

#### Landscape Report

Circle C Landscape LLC continued as the landscape maintenance provider for the extensive commons areas owned or maintained by the Circle C Homeowners Association. The standard maintenance contract includes all of the routine landscape tasks of mowing, bed care, treatments, trimming and pruning, trash pick-up, irrigation monitoring and water scheduling, landscape light monitoring and daily supervision.

This year, under the supervision of Circle C Landscape, Bartlett Tree Services provided arborist services for tree pruning and specialized care. Circle C Landscape works on the property year round on a daily basis excluding Sundays. The details of their work are presented to the CCHOA Manager and Board of Directors through monthly reports and in the 2010 "Annual Review of Landscape Services". #### New Community Center and Pool Report, Jason Bram

(President and Development Officer)

The HOA was very busy in 2010 working on the development of the new community center and pool. Project manager (Square One) was hired at the first of the year to oversee the design and construction of the new community center and pool. Their first order of business was developing and issuing an RFP for the design team, which included a construction manager at risk. Ultimately, the board voted to contract with Land Strategies to lead the design of the project and Chasco Contractors to perform as the construction manager at risk. The HOA used all the input gathered in previous years, including the research and recommendations of the former West Pool Committee to assist the design team in designing a community center building and pool. A Town Hall meeting was held in September 2010 to present those plans to the community. Currently, the design team is obtaining the necessary permits from the City of Austin and anticipates a first quarter start date. The HOA will be working with area residents and Clayton Elementary during the construction process to help facilitate the lowest impact possible to the site's neighbors. #### Commercial Development Report Stratus Properties

#### 2010 Development Review

#### **Residential Property:**

Two new subdivisions are in the process of being added to the Circle C Homeowners Association through the provisions provided by the Conditions, Covenants, and Restrictions of Circle C Ranch. These are areas that were added in 2000 with the Bradley Parties Settlement Agreement under the 42nd or 43rd amendment to the CCRs. As they are now being construction, they are activated in the CCHOA by the filing of a supplemental amendment which details specifics of the subdivision.

The first area is the two parcels of land at the front of Circle C North. The east side parcel, Barstow Village will have six homes and the west side parcel, Barstow Court will have 22 homes. All homes will be 100% masonry and homes on the west side will range from 1750 to 3200 square feet depending on lot size. Landscape and wall improvements will be required and approved by the Architectural Control Committee.

The other area is located south of Escarpment across SH 45. It is a subdivision of 163 lots located on the northern portion of what is known as Avana. The homes will be 100% masonry and range in square footage from 1800 to 3400 square feet. The owner is Standard Pacific and it will be the builder as well. All common improvements such as walls, fences, landscaping will be approved by the Architectural Control Committee.

## Financial Report (2010)

The CCHOA Treasurer has very specific responsibilities, which are detailed in our By-Laws (Article VIII, section 8, (d)). Those duties include ensuring that our funds are collected and accounted for in the bank accounts and books, securing the annual audit, and reporting our financial condition at the annual members meeting.

The CCHOA completed 2010 under budget and received a clean opinion from the auditors.

- Income was \$2,689,592
- Expenses were \$2,372,782
- Retained Earnings \$316,810

Of the income, \$2,192,968 was directly from dues (82%) and \$496,623 (18%) from other sources (fees, reimbursements and recreation programs). CCHOA continues to maintain a very high collection rate: 1.1% was uncollected in 2010, as opposed to 0.9% last year.

Expenses were similar to previous years with \$966,915 (41%) for Landscaping, \$549,973 (23%) for the Swim Center and \$332,986 (14%) for Capital Improvements. The remaining \$522,907 (22%) was for staffing, services, and operations.

The developer's Amenity Fund contribution has been put into an FDIC insured portfolio of CDs. It is now tracked and reported separately on our income reports, which are included with the annual audits. The developer continues to collect \$1,000 for every home sold in Circle C Ranch and will continue to add to this fund.

CCHOA has applied for a Construction loan for our new Circle C Community Center and swimming pool (the "CCCC" project). The board worked with dozens of banks over a 4 year period, choosing Austin Telco Credit Union in 2010, which will finance half of the project with a 10 year mortgage. All of the Reserve funds are currently kept in interest bearing, liquid accounts. We will be using all of these Reserve funds to meet our funding obligations on the new CCCC project.

- The General Reserve Fund is \$211,655
- The Swim Center Reserve Fund is \$93,120
- The West Pool Reserve Fund is \$315,427

#### Tilson-Lynch prepared our state and federal tax returns.

- Federal Income tax **\$0** (vs \$2,564 in 2009)
- The Texas Franchise Tax was \$13,963 (vs \$13,341 in 2009).

The required annual audit was completed by Tilson-Lynch. The inspections took place during the summer of 2010, for the budget year that ended on December 31st, 2009. The CCHOA budgets and audits are always available for inspection, by any HOA member at the HOA office, during the usual office hours. All of the board members participated in preparing the 2011 budget this year. As always, we will answer your questions at the annual meeting on Tue, March 8th. *Russ Hodes, CCHOA Treasurer*
