Money Saving "Green" Spring Cleaning

Springtime is when we open the windows and let the fresh air in. Spring cleaning is also the perfect time to reduce clutter, reevaluate household needs, remodel areas for efficiency and find ways to cut energy costs in the heat of the summer months.

Project #1 - Windows and Doors

The number one money waster is leaky door jambs and windowsills. A quick test of running your hand around windows and doors will tell you if there's a leak. Also, check the outside of your home for leaks. Old, cracked or missing caulking is easily replaced and will save you money in the summer.

Project #2 - AC unit

Clean out the spaces around your outside unit and replace your filters inside. Check internal and roof mounted vents for blockages and debris. It's a good idea to

contact a professional to do an operational check of your entire system. You don't want to be caught in 100 degree days with no air conditioning!

Project #3 – Attic Insulation

Checking your attic insulation is a perfect project for spring. You can save a lot of money on your electric bills simply by adding quality insulation and making sure that your attic is properly ventilated

Project #4 - Outside Decks

The winter months are not kind to wood decks and they are dangerous if broken and splintered. Checking for damage and insects can save you money. You can find many choices of eco-friendly oils, paints and finishes that beautify and protect your outside woods. And, if there are any signs of insect damage, it's better to call a licensed professional early to minimize the damage and cost of termites and other critters.

Project #5 - Outside Pipes and Sprinkler System

If you have exposed outside pipes that were wrapped during the winter, now is the time to unwrap them and check for damage and/ or leaks. The earlier you find the problem, the easier to fix it. (Even a very small leak

can be expensive.) Also, test your sprinkler system for any damage.

Now, just make a plan and be thorough. These are just a few things you can do to minimize your carbon footprint, but they all count, no matter how small. And remember, the goal of being eco friendly is keeping your family safe and healthy.

FOREST AREA SWIM TEAM (FAST) Austin Aquatic League CHAMPIONS!!!



Our last season was fabulous and our FAST Frogs swam away with the 2010 Austin Aquatic League Championship Trophy. We hope you will join us for our 2011 season.

FAST is a competitive summer league swim team that focuses on swimmers who desire to improve swimming skills and stroke technique in order to successfully and confidently participate in a summer swim league. Registration for returning members and their siblings is from **February 28 – March 14**, with both online and drop off registration. Registration for residents of Forest Creek, Lake Forest, or Forest Creek III who are interested in joining FAST will be held **Saturday, March 26 from 1 -3 PM at the Lake Forest Clubhouse**.

In addition, the FAST Frogs have a Tadpole program which targets beginning swimmers who are unable to swim the length of the pool but have no fear of water or separation anxiety, and are interested in improving their swimming skills. The focus of the program is to work with the swimmers so they can comfortably and confidently swim the length of the pool in freestyle and backstroke. This program is the building block of our swim team. Upon graduation from the Tadpole program, swimmers are eligible to participate in swim meets as part of the team. Our Tadpole program continues to be a raving success with nearly 80% of previous Tadpoles now participating on the swim team.

The cost is \$140 per swimmer and \$150 per Tadpole. Practices are held at the Lake Forest, Forest Creek, and Forest Creek III neighborhood pools beginning the end of April and running through the end of June. Meets are hosted at various neighborhood pools in the north Austin area. The Championship Meet is on Sunday, June 26 at the University of Texas Swim Center. Cardiovascular Disease and Women Think Red Heart

Do you know the number one killer of women in the United States? It's not breast cancer. Try again. It's heart disease. 489,000 women die from heart disease annually, not breast cancer, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. - Eat high fat foods sparingly.
- Reduce the amount of sodium, sugar, and alcohol.
- Maintain a health body weight.
- Cook meals more frequently.
- Limit pre-packaged foods.

The Caddie Tips for Mastering the Farmers' Market By Melanie Dragger, M.Com.

Many people are taking steps to improve their health and the environment by eating organically grown and raised foods. While some people are selecting organic items at their local grocery store, farmers' markets are becoming increasingly popular. Over the past year, according to the Department of Agriculture, the number of farmers' markets in the U.S. increased by 858, or 16 percent, from 5,274 in 2009 to 6,132 in 2010. When the USDA first began tracking farmers' markets in 1994, there were only 1,755 markets.

Outside of growing your own produce and raising your own livestock, shopping at a farmers' market is the best way to obtain fresh, local, and seasonal fruits, vegetables, and herbs, as well as farm-fresh eggs, meat, poultry, and dairy products. Many farmers' markets also offer artisan breads, honey, and seasonal jams, jellies, and preserves.

Below are tips to help you master your local farmers' market:

1. Do Your Research - Before heading to the market, research what produce is in season in your area. Since all products sold at a farmer's market may not be organic, and some organic products sold may not be certified, familiarize yourself with the organic certification process and product labeling. Information on the USDA's National Organic Program can be found at http://www.ams.usda.gov/nop.

2. Bring Your Own Containers - While some

vendors have bags and boxes available for customers, bringing your own containers is the best way to ensure you will be able to transport and protect your purchases properly. Additionally, recycling containers helps the environment by reducing the number of natural resources used to produce new ones.

- 3. Bring Cash Swing by your bank or ATM before hitting the farmers' market. Most vendors do not accept checks or credit cards. Bring small bills, since it may be difficult for some vendors to make change.
- 4. Go Early or Go Late The best items usually go first, so try to get to the market early. However, before making a purchase, take a quick trip down the aisles, since prices can vary greatly among vendors. If you can't make it to the market when it first opens, go at the end of the market day to catch deals from vendors trying to unload their remaining products.
- 5. Speak with Vendors Shopping at a farmers' market allows you an opportunity to speak directly with growers and farmers. Not familiar with Swiss chard? Looking for a new way to prepare eggplant? Most vendors love to share their knowledge, including discussing their production methods, providing storage and transportation advice, and sharing recipes and cooking tips.


Buying organic products at your local farmers' market offers numerous benefits, including boosting the local economy, reducing the amount of toxic chemicals that enter your body and the environment, and decreasing the amount of fossil fuels used to transport products to consumers. However, organic products can be more expensive than conventionally grown and raised products, and some organic products may be difficult to find in some areas. If going 100% organic is not feasible, use the following list as a guide. According to the 2010 report of the Environmental Working Group, a non-profit organization specializing in research and advocacy related to public health and the environment, these 12 fruits and vegetables consistently contained the highest amount of pesticides when conventionally grown, and should be consumed in organic form when possible:

1. Celery

- 2. Peaches
- 3. Strawberries
- 4. Apples
- 5. Blueberries (domestic)
- 6. Nectarines
- 7. Sweet Bell Peppers
- 8. Spinach
- 9. Cherries
- 10. Kale/Collard Greens
- 11. Potatoes
- 12. Grapes (imported)

The EWG's annual ranking of produce pesticide contamination is based on its analysis of tests conducted by the USDA and the federal Food and Drug Administration. More information on the EWG, as well as the full list of fruits and vegetables ranked, can be found at http://www.ewg.org.


