"As many of you have heard, the state is facing a \$27 billion dollar shortfall and they have proposed cutting \$10 billion from education programs. This would impact GCISD by requiring additional cuts of approximately \$13 million in addition to the \$4.7 million that is already projected. If you do not want to see cuts to education funding, we encourage you to contact our legislators and urge them to make education a priority in Texas. Your voice, combined with the voices of parents throughout GCISD, will send a strong message that education is a priority in our community! ## **Heatstroke in Dogs**

Your first question might be why am I writing about heatstroke in the March newsletter. Wouldn't this be more appropriate in July or August? Surprisingly, heatstroke is can be very common in the spring and early summer before our pets have been able to acclimate to the warmer temperatures. One of the worst cases of heatstroke I've seen as a veterinarian was during a 70 degree day in February.

#### **Avoiding Heatstroke in Dogs:**

The primary source of heat to dogs during episodes of heatstroke in healthy animals does not come from the sun but rather the pets own body. In other words - from over exertion. If we are running with our dog, throwing the ball for them, or even on an extended walk, many pets will continue to go and play as long as we ask them to and never ask for a break. Humans are more equipped to dissipate heat through sweating. Dogs cannot sweat and must rely on panting. Therefore they can become overheated much sooner that we can.

- Keep pets with predisposing conditions like heart disease, obesity, older age, or breathing problems cool and in the shade. Even normal activity for these pets can be harmful.
- Do not leave your pet in a hot parked car even if you're in the shade or will only be gone a short time. The temperature inside a parked car can quickly reach up to 140 degrees.
- Make sure outside dogs have access to shade and water at all times.
- On a hot day, restrict exercise and don't take your dog jogging with you. Too much exercise when the weather is very hot can be dangerous.
- Avoid places without shade and especially concrete or asphalt areas where heat is reflected.
- Wetting down your dog with cool water or allowing him to swim can help maintain a normal body temperature.
- Move your dog to a cool area of the house. Air conditioning is one of the



best ways to keep a dog cool, but is not always dependable. To provide a cooler environment, freeze water in soda bottles, or place ice and a small amount of water in several resealable food storage bags, and then wrap them in a towel or tube sock. Place them on the floor for the dog to lie on.

## Observing for the early signs of overheating or Heat Stress is important. Signs can include:

- Persistent Panting
- Bright Red Tongue
- Thick, sticky saliva

Stopping any activity and offering water at this time usually will allow most healthy dogs to become stable within a few minutes. If they don't return to a normal appearance quickly, they may be suffering from true heatstroke

True Heatstroke occurs when normal body mechanisms cannot keep the body's temperature in a safe range. A dog with moderate heatstroke (body temperature from 104° to 106°F) can recover within an hour if given prompt first aid and veterinary care (normal body temperature is 100-102.5°F). Severe heatstroke (body temperature over 106°F) can be deadly and immediate veterinary assistance is needed. A dog suffering from heatstroke will display several signs.

- Red or pale gums
- Depression
- Weakness
- Dizziness
- Vomiting sometimes with blood
- Diarrhea

- Shock
- Coma

What you should do: Remove the dog from the hot area immediately. Prior to taking him to your veterinarian, lower his temperature by wetting him thoroughly with cool water (for very small dogs, use lukewarm water), then increase air movement around him with a fan. CAUTION: Using very cold water can actually be counterproductive. Cooling too quickly and especially allowing his body temperature to become too low can cause other life-threatening medical conditions. The rectal temperature should be checked every 5 minutes. Once the body temperature is 103°F, the cooling measures should be stopped and the dog should be dried thoroughly and covered so he does not continue to lose heat. Even if the dog appears to be recovering, take him to your veterinarian as soon as possible. He should still be examined since he may be dehydrated or have other complications.

Allow free access to water or a children's rehydrating solution if the dog can drink on his own. Do not try to force-feed cold water; the dog may inhale it or choke.

What your veterinarian will do: Your veterinarian will lower your dog's body temperature to a safe range (if you have not already) and continually monitor his temperature. Your dog will be given fluids, and possibly oxygen. He will be monitored for shock, respiratory distress, kidney failure, heart abnormalities, and other complications, and treated accordingly. Blood samples may be taken before and during the treatment. The clotting time of the blood will be monitored, since clotting problems are a common complication.

Aftercare: Dogs with heat stress or moderate heatstroke often recover without complicating health problems. Severe heatstroke can cause organ damage that might need ongoing care such as a special diet prescribed by your veterinarian. Dogs who suffer from heatstroke once increase their risk for getting it again and steps must be taken to prevent it on hot, humid days.



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
