

HAVEYOU RECEIVED A DEED RESTRICTION NOTICE?

As reported in each month's newsletter, the HOA staff drives at least two sections of the neighborhood per month to note violations of the Declaration of Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions. These commonly include: front yard landscape maintenance (mowing, edging, free of weeds), home maintenance (paint, screens, siding) and recreational vehicles (boats, RV's, trailers) parked in the driveway. The HOA is required by state law to notify owners in writing via certified mail and allow for the homeowner to request a hearing before the board of directors. If you receive a letter, please contact us at the HOA office and let us know your individual situation. We would like to work with you to bring your home into compliance. TRASH & RECYCLING **CARTS - PLEASE STORE** THEM FROM VIEW

The City of Austin requires that carts be placed at the curb no earlier than 6:30am the morning of your pick up date (Monday's for all of Circle C) and put away no later than 10pm the evening of pick-up. 
Question About AT&T Call Waiting/ Caller ID Feature

I was wondering if anyone else in this area has the same problem/issue, and how to resolve it.

My home phone is through AT&T. They offer (and I pay for) the service called "call waiting/caller ID", where the caller's ID comes up on your home phone while you are on another phone call. However, I have never been able to use this feature. After talking at length with an AT&T representative, he researched and found that this feature is NOT available in Circle C. He said that this is very rare in that this feature is quite common elsewhere. He said it boiled down to the wiring system needing to be upgraded. He did not know who specifically to contact, but that there should be a "Central Office" for our neighborhood, and if not, we may have to petition City Hall to allocate funds for laying the appropriate wiring to do this.

After talking to Denise Nordstrom in the HOA office, she said this was probably because when Circle C was originally built, it was not part of the City of Austin, and was probably not wired for this service (pre-digital era). Time Warner customers do have it since they have more recently laid the appropriate wiring for this service.

SELECT SWIMTEAM LONG-COURSE

The Circle C Select Swim Team is currently accepting applications for the long-course season. Please feel free to check out the team's website, select.ccswim.net, to learn more. You are also more than welcome to stop by and meet Coach Hayley and check out a practice anytime. Tryouts are Saturdays at 11am. The team will begin the long-course season on April 1, 2011 and will run through the end of July. 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

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Circle C Landscape - April 2011

I recently attended and gave a presentation at the City of Austin and LCRA sponsored Water Wise Seminar for licensed irrigators and landscape architects. This is an annual conference held to update irrigation professionals on various topics regarding landscape, irrigation systems, and our constant need to improve our practices to further save water. One of the most interesting presentations was from Mark Rose of the LCRA giving his long term forecast. Looks like for most of the Spring and early Summer we will be in a La Nina pattern. Cold Pacific waters generate this pattern, and this year, the temperatures are way down, so it will take longer for them to warm. This moves the jet stream to the north of Texas and creates dryer than normal conditions (drought), which we have already entered. He did indicate that there could be some weakening of La Nina in late August to early Fall. So, be prepared for another dryer, warmer year in Central Texas.

I gave a presentation on the benefits of long term planning and a case study of Circle C commons areas over the past six years. Our enlightened CCHOA Boards of Directors worked with me on developing a landscape model and long term plan that was intended to get the commons area landscaping up to date in terms of water conservation, improved irrigation techniques to save water, using drought tolerant plants and turf for renovations,

improving irrigation control, and reducing our use of herbicides and pesticides. The plan has worked very well for us and the methodical approach to improvements is showing results both in the look of the neighborhood and with cost efficiency regarding our water use.

We have adopted several techniques that we are using throughout to improve water conservation. The first is to limit turf areas when possible. We started out with acres of water thirsty turf that takes a lot of care. We changed the specification for turf to Pallisades Zoysia, a drought tolerant variety of turf. In the places where we have replaced turf, we have used this near sidewalks and other walking areas, and then installed some taller native grasses to provide a barrier between manicured turf areas and more naturalized areas behind the grasses. A good example of this is at Lacrosse and Escarpment. The large naturalized areas take much less water and less overall care to save on maintenance costs.

Another technique has been to move the irrigation heads away from the curb to the interior to prevent water waste over the curb and into the street. This has been done on all of Slaughter Lane and Escarpment and has been very helpful. To assist with overspray on the median tips, many of these areas have had the irrigation cut off and the vegetation taken out and replaced with natural rock. Again,

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

this helps us meet all of the City of Austin regulations and save water. We have added bubblers to areas with a lot of trees. This is an efficient way to keep trees in good shape during extended periods of drought.

In preparing for the presentation mentioned above, I did a complete analysis of our water use over the past three years. Two of those years represented drought years, but we were able to conserve water despite extreme conditions. A copy of the graph is below:

The water budget for over 105 acres of land is \$185,000 per year. Even though we have added area over the past two years and encountered extreme weather conditions in terms of drought in 2008 and 2009, our overall water use pattern is still showing a decline.

So, as the Board moves forward with the long term landscape plan, we hope to implement additional savings by using a strict set of standards for each improvement.





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


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Park West HOA News

MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD OF **DIRECTORS**

The election of Board members was done by voice vote at the annual meeting on February 8 and term limits were not determined at that time; therefore, the Board convened a special meeting on February 24 to decide the term limits. The terms of the four elected directors were decided by draw and are: three years, Michael Harris; two years, John Lowe; two years, Bernadette Tasher; one year, Jack Robinson. Linda Prieto is in the second and final year of her term. Officers were then elected as follows: President, John Lowe; Vice-President, Bernadette Tasher; Secretary, Michael Harris; Treasurer, Linda Prieto; and Director, Jack Robinson.

Several requests for architectural and landscaping approvals have recently been submitted to the Board. As a reminder, Park West residents are required to submit plans for all improvements, such as decks, patio covers, pools and changes in fencing or any other permanent structure, to the Circle C Architectural Control Committee. A courtesy copy should also be provided to the Park West Board. Park West does its own front yard landscaping reviews and approvals but must adhere to Circle C's governing documents as well. A simplified way of looking at the process is that both Circle C and Park West are responsible for maintaining the existing look and feel of our community. This should come as no surprise as an acknowledgement of receipt of the CC&Rs for both communities was required at home closings.

Board meetings are scheduled for the third Monday of each month at 7:00 p.m. on the second floor of the Child Development Center (CDC), next door to the Swim Center on LaCrosse. Check a mail center bulletin board regularly for possible changes to this schedule. The homeowners' forum at the beginning of each meeting allows residents to address the Board, with a three-minute time limit, please. If you are interested in speaking, contact a Board member prior to the meeting to schedule your participation. Please bring a copy of your statement to give to the Board Secretary. The Board of Directors looks forward to your attendance and thanks you in advance for your interest.

LANDSCAPER NEWS

Since notices were posted on the mail center bulletin boards and community website by the landscape liaison, sprinkler checks are being requested fast and furiously, which is very good news. Earlier sprinkler checks lessen the possibility of problems with the irrigation system later on in warmer weather. Schedule yours now (they are done on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays)

by e-mailing scott@pearsonlandscape.com or calling Jackie Rollins, landscape liaison, at 940-5745. The seasonal color at each mail center has been switched to petunias. Any perennial plants at the mail centers that didn't come back from the hard freezes in February will be replaced in preparation for spring. All front yards were aerated for the fourth year in a row, an additional service not part of the landscape contract but done for free by the landscaper. This equates to a \$3,000 per annum value based on an \$18 per yard estimate. Thank you, Pearson Landscape!

IT'S IN THE MAIL - A REMINDER

Please do not drop outgoing mail in the black metal lockboxes located on the back wall of each mail center. They are intended only for resident-to -Board communications. Occasionally, when checked, personal outgoing mail is found in one and there's no way to know how long it's been there, not good for a payment that has become long overdue. There are slots for outgoing U.S. mail on the same mail center wall as your personal mailbox and the postal carrier empties them daily.

March was a big month for new residents moving into the neighborhood. A big howdy to all of you who hopefully are comfortably settled in by now and enjoying all the perks of living in our beautiful and friendly neighborhood. We hope you'll take the time to look over the documents you received at closing concerning rules and covenants for Circle C and especially for Park West, as well as the items in the information packet you received from an official Park West greeter after you arrived in the neighborhood. A few things that stand out and bear repeating in this column:

- 1. If you have young children, please ensure that they do not play or run in the street. Park West streets are narrow, and with vehicles sometimes parked at the curb, there isn't much leeway between an automobile rounding a curve and a child chasing a ball or learning to skateboard.
- 2. The speed limit on Park West streets is 20 miles an hour. Signs are posted at the gate entrances. Please obey the speed limit.
- 3. Dogs may not be walked off leash in Park West (or anywhere in Circle C including the park). Carry a plastic bag to "scoop the poop." Pick up and properly dispose of pet waste on private and public property. (City of Austin)
- 4. Sign on to the Park West HOA website for up-to-date news and neighborhood highlights. Instructions for logging in are on the Contact and General Information sheet that came in the packet you received from the greeter. All About Charlie

A few weeks ago, family and friends attended the "Celebration of Life" Service for long-time Park West and Circle C resident Earl Charles "Charlie" Rodenberg who passed away after a long and valiant struggle with cancer.

Our dear neighbor's final battle was as courageous as was his long service to Country and to the Marine Corps.

Marine Lieutenant Colonel Rodenberg served his country with distinction for 24 years as a combat Naval Aviator including in Vietnam and during Operation Desert Storm.

Thus it wasn't surprising to hear these aspects of Charlie's career fittingly highlighted during the Service at the Bannockburn Baptist Church in Austin, Texas, a few days later.

As part of the Eulogy, another retired Marine Corps officer spoke.

Michael Beggs, who had been friends with Charlie during their young cadet days at Texas A&M, told the celebrants how, after their graduation and commissioning in the Marine Corps in 1968, they went their separate ways-Charlie went into Marine Aviation and Beggs became a Marine infantry officer.

Beggs also told the congregation about his own service in Vietnam and about one unforgettable and particularly dangerous combat mission 40 years ago.

Some of us were puzzled.

Interested as we were in Beggs' Vietnam service, this Celebration was about Charlie- about who Charlie was

Little did we know that what Beggs was telling us was all about Charlie.

During a firefight in Vietnam in 1971, Beggs and his Marines had been taking sniper fire from a small hill when suddenly one of Beggs' Marines found himself in the middle of a minefield. Beggs tried to "talk" his man to safety, but the Marine couldn't move.

Instinctively, Beggs ran up the hill to rescue his man. Then he stepped on "it"

In Beggs' own words:

"It" was a landmine. When it exploded, I was not only full of holes, but also had a leg almost torn off and was blown into the air. When I came back down to earth, I landed on my head, which apparently ended up pinching some nerves in my spine. So there I was, with the memory of my wife's last kiss fresh in my mind, lying in the red dirt of Vietnam, rapidly losing blood. In addition, I was blinded and paralyzed from the waist down, temporarily

as it turned out, thank God. But all I knew then and there was that I was badly hurt, and that I might never see my wife and children again.

One of Beggs' sergeants immediately called for a "MEDEVAC" flight and soon a heavily bleeding Beggs would hear his radio operator acknowledge the MEDEVAC's helicopter's pilot "inbound" call "Roger, Peachbush 1-7 inbound five mikes." That meant that in five minutes the helicopter would arrive and Beggs would be airlifted to the nearest medical facility and hopefully survive.

However, there was one "little problem." The area where Beggs lay critically wounded was beneath a dense jungle canopy with no suitable location for the helicopter to land and pick up Beggs. The only way to rescue Beggs was with the use of a "jungle penetrator," a piece of equipment designed for such circumstances, but also so perilous that its use had been temporarily suspended.

Fortunately for Beggs, the pilot of the CH-46 helicopter decided that a Marine's life was worth the risk and as he- with superb skill and nerves of steel- maintained the helicopter virtually motionless about 200 feet in the air, while braving sniper fire, his crew lowered the jungle penetrator. Minutes later, Beggs was winched up into the safety of Peachbush 1-7 on his way to life-saving medical treatment.

It took Beggs many years to recover from his serious injuries.

But it also would take Beggs many years - almost 40 years - to find out who Peachbush 1-7 was, to find out who had saved his life.

Although Beggs stayed in contact with his Texas A&M classmates, including Charlie, it was only recently that Beggs discovered who the pilot of Peachbush 1-7 flight was.

During an e-mail exchange on the subject, Beggs got a reply from Charlie with the following simple words: "Mike, Peachbush 1-7 was yours truly."

The author of these words would go on to earn the Air Medal with 25 "Strike/Flight" awards for heroism and meritorious service flying many more helicopter rescue and attack-bomber combat missions.

Thank you, Captain Beggs for your service, for your sacrifice, for telling us about Charlie's bravery, about what Semper Fi really means, for telling us what Charlie was all about.

And, did I say that Charlie was a very modest man?






Caption: "Volunteers at work in the Fig Leaf Store

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Michael's Musings

I am a Park West HOA Board member, but I write this piece as a neighbor. In today's world of instant communications on radio, TV, cable, Web and Smart Phones, I wonder about this process of writing and printing newsletters as we do today. Being of an older generation where information originally came in the form of magazines and newspapers and breaking news was on the radio, writing something almost a month before publication seems ... well just slow and taking a step backwards.

I still enjoy an occasional paper or good book while sitting out on the patio in the sun, but lately my preference has shifted. I find it is easier to grab a few stories from selected web pages or blogs about things that I am specifically interested in or read a few pages of a special e-book on my iPad. Yes, I have an iPhone, but at my age the screen is just a bit too small for serious reading. I also have a notebook computer but I feel just a bit too desk-bound while using it. Hey, I'm retired. What this really started me thinking about is ... how we can now customize what we read and how we choose to receive it. I no longer have to flip pages of magazines or newspapers skipping over the majority of the things that are too depressing to read to find the few nuggets of articles that are of interest to me at this stage of my life.

My son is a "technologist" who works at a big company in Redmond, Washington. He has been my coach on using the technology to help me do things the way I want, instead of fighting the information overload on the web. I don't claim to be an expert or super efficient, but "reader tools" on both my computer and iPad allow me to pull information or content from sites and blogs that I enjoy reading.

The software crawls the web content, and on my own time or schedule I can skim titles of articles or blogs quickly. With a flick of a finger I can discard what I don't want, read what I do and even save articles in a personal place on the "cloud." The process is like I did in my business life when I always had a folder in my briefcase labeled "read later." Friends, colleagues and assistants would put things in there that were important to read but not on a priority basis. When traveling or late at night I would pull the folder out and skim, read or toss the notes or articles. Some bright technologist must have watched his dad years ago and created an electronic representation of how he worked. The young folks first spotted it and began using the tool and passed it on to their dads. That's what happened to me!

So you see, I have come full circle here (pardon the pun)! Why then are we still communicating the old way in our homeowner association? Why can't we supplement the monthly "required" communications with blogs, links, tweets and Facebook postings? (My thanks to a young neighbor, Peter, for crystallizing my thinking.) It could get us information about both of our Associations with customized content and on a regular basis. Critical notifications could be broadcasted immediately. Routine information and links to articles of interest could be consumed at our leisure. In addition, we would save trees, postage and also money by using the new tools.



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Playgrounds



Do you have a favorite playground? Maybe it's a new wooden one that has lots of tall towers and passageways. Or maybe your favorite is an old-fashioned playground with swings and a seesaw. Playgrounds are fun places for kids because there's so much to do and other kids to have fun with.

But sometimes kids get hurt at playgrounds. That's no fun, so here are 10 ways to keep safe:

I. Take a grown-up. As kids get bigger, they like doing things on their own. Going to the playground

shouldn't be one of them, though. Grown-ups come in handy because they might spot problems at the playground, they can help you down if you get in a tight spot, and they can help if you happen to get hurt.

- **2. Take a good look around.** If the playground has lots of trash, such as broken glass, or the equipment looks broken, don't play there.
- 3. Keep your size in mind. Many playgrounds have some equipment that's for little kids (like 2- to 5-year-olds) and other equipment that's meant for older kids. Use the equipment that's right for your age. If you squeeze yourself onto a swing for toddlers, you might get stuck. Likewise, if your little brother or sister starts climbing something meant for older kids, guide him or her to the little kid stuff.
- **4. Don't go too high**. Many playgrounds have tall stuff to play on, such as towers or open passageways between equipment. Don't climb higher than you feel comfortable, and feel free to ask your grown-up if you need help getting down. Never climb up the outside of equipment, or hoist yourself up on the roof. The view might be cool, but it's a long way down.

- **5. Look out below.** The best playgrounds put down special surfacing material, such as mulch, wood chips, sand, gravel, or rubber matting. These surfaces can help soften a fall, but that doesn't mean you won't get hurt, especially if you tumble from a high spot.
- 6. Swing safely. Kids often get hurt at the playground because they get hit by someone on a swing. If you're swinging, watch out for people who might be getting too close. And if you're walking around the playground, don't get too close to the swingers.
- 7. Use your head. Sometimes you'll see kids going headfirst down the slide or maybe two or three kids will get on a piece of equipment that's only meant for one. Or some kids might start goofing around and trying to push each other off a swing or off of a high spot. If your grown-up sees you doing this, he or she will probably say, "Knock it off. Someone's going to get hurt." It's true, so try to use the playground equipment properly. And if you get stuck, or don't know how to get down from something, call your grown-up over so he or she can help you down.

- **8. Report problems.** If you see graffiti (when people write or paint on stuff), a broken swing, or find any other problems while you're playing, tell your grown-up. He or she can report the problem so it can be fixed.
- **9.** Clean up. If you bring a drink or snack to the playground, clean up your trash before you leave. When you do, the park will look nice when the next kid comes along to play and you will have shown that you're a good playground citizen.
- 10.Have a great time! How can you make a good time at the playground even better? Bring a friend and only complain a little when it's time to leave.



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Dear Circle C Community Members,

Every day hundreds of reports of abuse and neglect are made to Child Protective Services for children living in Central Texas. After being investigated, many of these reports are found to be true and children are immediately removed from their home to ensure their safety.

In 2010 there were 3,148 children in foster care in the Central Texas area.

Many studies have documented that the outlook for foster youth who age out of the foster care system, without loving families, is often grim:

- One in four will be incarcerated within the first two years after they leave the system.
- Over one-fifth will become homeless at some time after age 18.
- Approximately 58 percent had a high school degree at age 19, compared to 87

percent of a national comparison group of non-foster youth.

• Of youth who aged out of foster care and are over the age of 25, less than 3 percent earned their college degrees5, compared with 28 percent of the general population.

Recently, a six-month-old child came into foster care due to severe abuse from her parent. Her parent abused her so badly she had a skull fracture and three broken fingers. An amazing foster family was contacted and they quickly stepped up to the plate to care for this fragile child. Currently, the child is healing and the doctors expect a full recovery.

A 12 year old came into care after being sexually abused by her father, while her mother looked the other way. After years of being nurtured and loved by a single foster parent, she has now been accepted to college

and is eager to become a productive member of society. Meanwhile, she knows she has this foster parent in her court.

These are just two stories of children being given second chances by foster and adoptive parents, several of whom live in the Circle C Community. Each child has their own unique story and deserves a safe and loving home where they can begin to heal and be given the opportunity of childhoods free of abuse and neglect.

Here's how you can help.

- 1. BECOME A FOSTER PARENT! There is a huge need for safe and loving homes for the children of central Texas. Open your heart and home to a child who desperately needs you.
- 2. BECOME AN ADOPTIVE PARENT! There is a huge need for adoptive parents. Especially for sibling groups

Also, each child will be covered by Medicaid (covering medical and dental) until the age of 18, even if they are adopted.

It takes a community with loving, nurturing and healing arms to raise a child that has suffered abuse and/or neglect. Will you be part of that community?

Sandwich Generation Needs "Stress Busters"

You may be too busy to realize it, but April is Stress Awareness Month. Sponsored by the Health Resource Network, a non-profit health education group, Stress Awareness Month is designed to promote awareness about ways to reduce stress in our lives. And if you're a member of the so-called "Sandwich Generation," you may well have plenty of stress to deal with — especially financial stress. And that's why you may want to look at this month as an opportunity to explore ways of "de-stressing" yourself.

To understand the scope of the problem facing people in your situation, consider this: One out of every eight Americans aged 40 to 60 is both raising a child and caring for an aging parent, according to the Pew Research Center. The definition of "caring" for an elderly parent can range from actually having the parent living in one's home to helping



pay for the parent's stay in an assisted living or nursing home facility. When you consider the costs involved in this type of care, added to the expenses of raising your children, and possibly even providing some financial support to them as young adults, it's easy to see that you could potentially face enormous strains, both emotionally and financially.

- Save. As a Sandwich Generation member, you're probably within shouting distance of your own retirement - so you need to be saving for it. This may not be easy. You don't know how much financial support you may someday have to provide your elderly parents — and even after your children are grown, they may need some help from you. Unfortunately, in helping these "boomerang" children, many people have to disrupt their day-to-day cash flow and raid their savings. That's why it's important to try to "pay yourself first" by deferring part of each paycheck into your 401(k) and by automatically moving money, each month, from your checking or savings account into your IRA.
- Talk. Many people in the "Greatest Generation" (over age 80) have not even prepared a will, so, if your parents are in (Continued on Page 42)

that group, you may want to talk to them about taking action. Also, find out whom, if anyone, is handling their investments. And ask if your parents understand how Medicare works and if they need to add supplemental health insurance, such as Medigap. Plus, you need to find out if your parents have created a power of attorney or health care directive. It's best to have these conversations sooner, rather than later.

• Delegate. You eventually may have to take some responsibility for your parents' care — but you don't have to do it alone. You could, for example, work with a financial services provider that offers trust services, which can be invaluable if your parents are incapacitated, but which are useful even if they aren't. A professional trust officer can, among other duties, help manage your parents' investments, pay their bills, keep their records and supervise distribution of their assets to beneficiaries. In short, a qualified trust officer can make life a lot easier for you.

Stress Awareness Month only lasts 30 days, but by taking the right steps, you can de-stress yourself for many years to come. After all, just because you're in the Sandwich Generation, it doesn't mean you have to be "squished."

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
