

BALCONES COMMUNITY ORCHESTRA TO PERFORM IN LAKEWAY



On Sunday, April 17, from 4 to 5 p.m., the Balcones Community Orchestra will perform at the Lakeway Activity Center, 105 Cross Creek, in Lakeway.

This fine symphonic orchestra is in its thirteenth season of bringing high-quality music to the Austin region. The all-volunteer group draws its repertoire from the masterworks for small orchestra, and presents free concerts in venues that approximate the conditions under which these works were first performed and heard.

Dr. Robert Radner is the orchestra's director. He has served on the music faculties of Texas State University and the College of Saint Scholastica, Eastern New Mexico University. He currently is the Orchestra Director for St. Edwards University.

The guest soloist for this performance will be Pianist Michelle Schumann. She has built a reputation for evocative and moving performances that are infused with unique energy and zeal. Winner of the 2006 Janice K. Hodges Competition for Contemporary Music, Schumann's programs feature meticulously integrated selections of classic and contemporary repertoire producing performances that are "smart, irresistible, and utterly captivating." (Austin-American Statesman) Schumann is Artist-in-Residence and Associate Professor of Piano at the University of Mary Hardin-Baylor where she is the founder and Artistic Director of the Hillman Visiting Artists Series. Since 2006, Schumann has served as Artistic Director of the Austin Chamber Music Center.



LAKEWAY SING ALONGS TO PRESENT 'ROARING TWENTIES' SHOW





Good Friday Tenebrae Service

Continuing a tradition begun five years ago, the combined choirs of The Lakeway Church and the Lake Travis United Methodist Church will present a Good Friday Tenebrae Service on April 22, 2011, beginning at 7:30 pm. The churches alternate venues each year; the service this year will be held at the Lake Travis United Methodist Church, 1502 RR 620 North, at Debba Drive.

"O Sacred Head Now Wounded" is a Good Friday Tenebrae Service presented by the combined adult Choirs of The Lakeway Church and Lake Travis United Methodist Church, under the direction of Mark Savage-Rains and Patty Highland. The choirs will be accompanied by Elden Little and Paola Perin, at the piano, along with an orchestra of strings, woodwinds, handbells and percussion. The music chosen to relate to the Scripture was composed by a wide variety of composers from J.S. Bach to Karl Graun (a contemporary of Bach) to William Billings (one of America's colonial composers) to the nineteenth century composer Theodore Dubois, to Pablo Casals (the great cellist), to contemporary composers like John Carter, Lloyd Larson, Jane Marshall and Anna Laura Page. The beautiful chorale "O Sacred Head Now Wounded" will be used throughout the service to unify and give direction to our worship.

This moving service will trace the Passion of Christ through scripture readings and related musical selections telling the story of Jesus' final days following the Passover meal with His disciples. The story begins with Jesus' time of prayer in the garden of Gethsemane followed by Judas' betrayal, His arrest, His mock trials, His beating, His conviction, and finally to the cross where He was crucified. The service will be presented in the form of a "Tenebrae" Service – candles will be snuffed out following each passage of scripture that is read and the service will end in darkness as we remember the death of Christ, the "Light of the world." Come journey with us through Scripture and powerful music, as we remember Christ's passion and death to redeem the people of the world.

Lake Travis Library District Closes on Land Donated By Haythem Dawlett for Home of Future Community Library

The vision of a permanent home for the Lake Travis Community Library grew closer to reality this week when Lake Travis Community Library District President, Carol Black, signed a deed with developer Haythem Dawlett to begin work on a new 10,862 square-foot building.

The new library will be located at Tuscan Village, a 42-acre age qualified, resort-style community at 1930 Lohman's Crossing Road in Lakeway. Tuscan Village is being developed by Legend Communities, of which Dawlett is a principal.

Dawlett's donation of over \$1 million in land and improvements will allow the Lake Travis Community Library to build a facility that offers easier access by residents, as well as ample space for materials, computers, book clubs, book sales and summer programs for children. Since its founding in 1985, the library has shared space with Lake Travis High School for over 20 years and since 2006 has leased space in the Lohman's Crossing shopping center. It serves residents of Briarcliff, Hudson Bend, Lakeway, Spicewood and The Hills.

"It is a privilege to assist the Lake Travis Community Library District with this contribution of land for our newest community library," Dawlett said. "This organization and its volunteers have done so much for the residents of Lakeway over the years, and we are glad to offer them a site that will also be home to the community's first and only age qualified active living development. The new library will provide the perfect venue for family members of all ages throughout Lake Travis to read, learn and socialize for many years to come."

"Since the Lake Travis Community Library District's formation in May 2004, there have been committees and individuals seeking land on which to build the library to serve this large community," said Black. "Through Mr. Dawlett's generosity, it is possible to begin construction of this library. To honor this donation, the Children's Room in the new library will be named after Mr. Dawlett's children, Grant and Pierce. In addition to Mr. Dawlett's donation, the Friends of the Library have donated \$80,000 to build this library. The Friends, with their 140 library volunteers, and the library staff, led by Ms. Morgan McMillian, have wished for a larger place in which to work. With the deed now signed, this will soon become a reality. Dreams really can come true for the 6,300 families that currently use the library."





View Facing Entry





the years 1966-1967. When comparing the map of nearly 50-years ago to a map of today, it appears that it didn't take long for the secret to get out as thousands of people have chosen to make the 'visit' for a lifetime – at least in Lakeway.

When comparing the map of the mid-1960's to a map of today, it's clear that 'old' Lakeway (38) was initially developed west of what is now Lohman's Crossing Road at the intersection of Hurst Creek Road, and north of what is now Lakeway Boulevard (formerly named World of Tennis Boulevard when it was extended to RR 620 in the later phases of development of Lakeway).

As illustrated on the old map, the main paved roads were: Lohman's Ford Road, Hurst Creek, and Lakeway Boulevard (now Lakeway Drive). Lohman's Ford Road, shown extending to Lake Travis as an unpaved road, was the original road that led to Lohman's Ford (crossing the Colorado River), just north of the Lakeway Inn (this road was later named Challenger). When referencing a current map of Lakeway, it appears that the only other paved roads in Lakeway circa 1965 were: Porpoise, Sunfish, Bermuda, Sailfish, Dragon, Cutlass, and Highlander.

When the concept of Lakeway began in 1962, there were no telephone utilities in the immediate area. Those locations with telephones had numbers that were preceded with two-letters followed by five-numbers such as GR 2-9285 (see EMERGENCIES above). After the first pay-telephone was installed at what is now the southeast corner of Lakeway Boulevard and Lohman's Crossing Road in late 1962, subsequent residential telephone numbers were assigned as AN 3-XXXX. A historic marker has been embedded in a large boulder at the site to memorialize the first telephone in Lakeway.

According to the first 'official' telephone book of Lakeway dated August 1971, there were approximately 275 families living on 'new' streets named: Finn, Wee Scot, Mariner, Comet, Corinthian, Challenger, Electra, Eagle, Vanguard, Tartan, Gannet, Atlantic, Star, Capri, Seawind, Malabar, Snapper, Zephyr, Biscayne, and Teal. By that year, telephone numbers were assigned as 263-XXX. Although Lakeway was only known for the Lakeway Inn and a small residential and recreational/retirement community west of Lohman's Ford Road and north of Lakeway Boulevard, people were becoming attracted to the area.

Again referring to the map of the mid-1960's, although the roads were unpaved, an area known as Hidden Hills (36 and 37) in the Bee Creek area was attracting interest. What is now known as Clara Van Road leading to Hurst Harbor, was an unpaved road called Round Mountain Drive at an intersection called Scenic Loop or RR 620

directly adjacent to virtually the only true residential development along RR 620 at the time called Cardinal Hills Estates (41). By referring to the map it is clear that there was virtually no development south of the lake shore beyond Lakeway, with none between RR 620 and Lohman's Ford Road, and none north of SH71 nor in the Bee Cave area.

By this time (1965), the first nine-holes of golf opened at the Live Oak golf course, the Lakeway Inn was expanding due to its popularity, and in 1966 mail delivery began in Lakeway using rural route and box numbers (Rt. 7 Box XXX).

While much of the history of Lakeway has been documented in the late Byron Varner's book, Lakeway-The First 25 Years - first published in 1988 and reprinted in 2007 - a second book on Lakeway history is in the final stages for publishing to celebrate Lakeway's Golden Anniversary in 2013.





Dear Lakeway Community Members,

Every day hundreds of reports of abuse and neglect are made to Child Protective Services for children living in Central Texas. After being investigated, many of these reports are found to be true and children are immediately removed from their home to ensure their safety.

In 2010 there were 3,148 children in foster care in the Central Texas area.

Many studies have documented that the outlook for foster youth who age out of the foster care system, without loving families, is often grim:

- One in four will be incarcerated within the first two years after they leave the system.
- Over one-fifth will become homeless at some time after age 18.
- Approximately 58 percent had a high school degree at age 19, compared to 87 percent of a national comparison group of nonfoster youth.
- Of youth who aged out of foster care and are over the age of 25, less than 3 percent earned their college degrees5, compared with 28 percent of the general population.

Recently, a six-month-old child came into foster care due to severe abuse from her parent. Her parent abused her so badly she had a skull fracture and three broken fingers. An amazing foster family was

contacted and they quickly stepped up to the plate to care for this fragile child. Currently, the child is healing and the doctors expect a full recovery.

A 12 year old came into care after being sexually abused by her father, while her mother looked the other way. After years of being nurtured and loved by a single foster parent, she has now been accepted to college and is eager to become a productive member of society. Meanwhile, she knows she has this foster parent in her court.

These are just two stories of children being given second chances by foster and adoptive parents, several of whom live in the Lakeway Community. Each child has their own unique story and deserves a safe and loving home where they can begin to heal and be given the opportunity of childhoods free of abuse and neglect.
