You probably noticed the sign on FM1960 that shows Caldwell purchased the land where the hospital was going. The construction on Wortham Blvd at Wortham Center will be for a Health South rehabilitation center. Our M.U.D. #222 announced last year they were putting in a new pump for our water and that pump has been successfully installed and working great. If there is a drought that weather folks say we're in we will be in good shape.

The lake has a pump in the middle that has not worked and a new pump is being planned to replace it with a new more efficient model.

Finally from what's going on, our M.U.D. has a new contract with Republic for our trash and recycling and the exciting news about this is they're adding glass which for years was not accepted. Let me say that again – GLASS will now be accepted for recycle! The other thing is that the only off days they have is Christmas, New Years Eve and New Years Day. The following regular pickup day AFTER those days will be when the next pick up is made.

Regarding trash – our covenants and deed restrictions state that trash should be placed no earlier than 6pm the evening before the regular pickup days so 6pm on Sunday evening and 6pm on Wednesday evening. The problems are:

- 1. Leave your trash outside your home at the earliest the evening before trash pick up day.
- 2. Pick up your trash bins on a timely basis

This includes bagged grass clippings

We are having a lot of complaints regarding folks having their grass cut on Friday and leave the bags outside all weekend. People have guests and no one likes to see our community with trash bags sitting outside all day, you wouldn't appreciate it.

- Define a safe zone for your children where they can always touch
 the bottom. One of the most common saves a lifeguard must
 make is when a swimmer strays to an area that is too deep for
 them to stand.
- Access rules to the facility will be strongly enforced and are the
 responsibility of each member to understand and follow. It is a
 very awkward and uncomfortable situation for everyone when
 a lifeguard must ask a member to go back home to get the
 appropriate access tag.
- The safety of a child in the baby pool is the responsibility of the parent or guardian. The lifeguards will always enforce the pool rules throughout the facility, but children who cannot swim must have an adult within arms reach at all times. The same rule applies even if the child is wearing a floatation device.
- Remember that there are several different types of people who like to use the pool throughout the summer. Both young and old, everyone wants to have a good time.
- Do not dive in areas marked "NO DIVING". Nearly 90 percent of all spinal injuries occur in the shallow end of the pool.
- Breath holding games can be very dangerous and may cause cardiac arrhythmia or seizures. Games like who can hold their breath the longest and swimming the longest distance underwater should be avoided at all times.

- Don't allow children to play with or around the main drain. The main drain suction can be very powerful and has been known to cause severe injuries and in some cases death.
- If you should ever have a question about the pool rules, ask a lifeguard or Manager. It is better to be safe then sorry!
- Help us educate your community members and their guests on water safety. A team approach towards safety will offer a safer swimming environment.

We look forward to successfully operating your swimming facility, while offering a safe, clean and relaxing environment.

VACATION:

If you go on vacation and would like to have the sheriff check on your house, call 281 290 2100. Be prepared to give the sheriff your name and address, contact phone numbers and dates when you are gone.

ALARM SYSTEMS:

The Sheriff's Dept. has asked that we send out something in our newsletter to remind everyone that alarm system permits are required for any residence or business in all of Harris County, not just the city. Fee is \$35 to be issued and \$10 annual renewal. Permit fees waived for 65 and older.

Under current guidelines, a permitted locations is allowed five (5) free false alarms annually. Any subsequent false alarms during your permitted year are subject to a \$75 fine that is billed to the permit holder's address. If a house has an active alarm system, yet does not have a permit to operate such alarm, a false alarm may result in a Class C citation which could range up to a \$500 fine. You can review the regulation and print a copy of the application form by visiting the Harris County Sheriff's Office website at www.hcso.hctx. net and search for alarm permit or call the Sheriff's Alarm Detail at 713-755-4600.



- Drain 2 gallons of water from your water heater to remove sediment from the bottom of tank.
- Test smoke alarms with a smoke source held 3 inches from unit.
- Inspect and clean fire extinguisher.
- During heating season, inspect the chimney for creosote buildup. Remove creosote with chimney brushes or scrapers.
- Clean forced hot-air heating and/or cooling system's air filters.

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GARBAGE COLLECTION INFORMATION HARRIS COUNTY MUD #222

Please note that your service days are MONDA YAND THURSDAY.

As a friendly reminder, your household garbage should be placed at the curbside within five (5) feet of the paved roadway, by 7:00 a.m., in a waste container (trash must be bagged in container) not exceeding 35 gallons or in a plastic trash bag. All branches and tree limbs must be cut to four (4') lengths and tied in small bundles that can be lifted and handled by a single person. Bundles should be no larger than eighteen inches (18') in diameter and weight no more than fifty (40') pounds, and are collected on the second collection day of each week (Thursday).

In the event that one of the collection days falls on a holiday, we will collect your waste on the next regularly scheduled collection day (excluding Sunday). Scheduled holidays will include: New Year's Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day, Labor Day, Memorial Day, and Independence Day. In the event of an "Act of God", we will collect your waste on the following scheduled collection day.

Republic Waste will collect and dispose of all your residential garbage unless restricted by law or if the item would cause damage to the collection equipment. listed are some items that are restricted: cross ties, tires, solvents, paint, petroleum products, pool chemicals, fertilizer, herbicides, pesticides, hazardous materials/chemicals, logs or stumps, car batteries, soil, rocks, concrete,

carpet, padding, construction material, medical waste, medical sharps and closed containers.

Refrigeration Units: Refrigerators, air conditioners, freezers or items that contain CFC's (Freon), by law, must have the gas removed by a licensed technician and be red tagged prior to collection.

Heavy Trash: Appliances, hot water heaters, mattresses, heavy or large volumes of yard waste and other white goods, appropriate for disposal shall be placed within five feet of the curbside by 7:00 a.m., and will be collected on the second collection day of each week (Thursday).

Harris County MUD #222 • Your weekly Recycle day is Monday. Please set bin out by 7AM.

<u>Recyclable Material</u>- Each of the following materials (Note: GLASS containers are NOT accepted):

- (a) Aluminum cans, trays and foil (clean)
- (b) Aseptic Packaging and Gable Top Containers (milk and juice cartons)
- (c) Steel cans and tin, Glass Bottles
- (d) PET soda, water and flavored beverage bottles
- (e) HDPE mi Ik, and juice jugs (#2 colored plastic resin)
- (f) PYC narrow neck containers only (#3 plastic resin) such as health and beauty aid products and household cleaners
- (g) LDPE grocery containers (#4 plastic resin) such as margarine tubs, frozen dessert cups, six and twelve pack rings
- (h) PP Grocery Containers (#5 plastic resin) such as yogurt cups and narrow neck syrup and ketchup bottles #7 plastic resin narrow neck containers only
- (i) Plastic buckets such as kitty litter containers (5-gallon maximum size)

- (j) Newspaper, including inserts (remove plastic sleeves)
- (k) Cardboard (no waxed cardboard)
- (I) Kraft (brown paper) bags
- (m) Magazines, catalogs and telephone books
- (n) Office, computer, notebook and gift-wrap paper, no metal clips, spirals or binders
- (o) Chipboard (cereal, cake and food mix boxes, gift boxes, etc)
- (p) Carrier stock (soda and beer can carrying cases)
- (q) Junk Mail and envelopes (no plastic cards. stick on labels or unused stamps)
- (r) Paper back books (no hard cover books)

Notes (for each of the above Residential Recyclable Material(s) (a) through (sj):

- (i) All containers must be emptied and rinsed clean.
- (ii) No motor oil, insecticide. herbicide or hazardous chemical containers.
- (iii) Plastic bags should be returned to the grocery or department store.
- (iv) No plastic film (plastic sheets, tarps or wrap).
- (v) No expanded foam or clear polystyrene.

"Munis" Can Still Work for You — Even in Tough Time

No matter where you live, the chances are good that a state or local government near you may be having some difficulty in balancing its budget. As a citizen, you're probably concerned about how this situation will affect your life and your community. But as an investor, you may also wonder how this might affect any municipal bonds you own. Fortunately, the outlook might be brighter than you think.



Of course, taken to the extreme, the financial challenges of some state and local governments could conceivably affect their ability to fulfill the payment obligations on their municipal bonds. But investment-grade quality municipal bond default rates historically have been very low, especially when compared to those of corporate bonds. And municipalities are cutting spending, eliminating nonessential programs and, in some cases, raising taxes or fees. In short, they are taking steps that, while potentially painful to residents, are likely to help them continue making timely payments of interest and principal on their municipal bond obligations. Furthermore,


municipalities must still fund various projects, and even one bond payment default could impact their future ability to borrow money in the form of new municipal bonds.

So are munis right for you? The answer depends on your situation — your goals, need for investment income, current investment mix, risk tolerance and so on. But if you want to receive interest payments that are exempt from federal taxes, you may well be interested

in exploring municipal bonds. Keep in mind, though, that municipal bonds may be subject to state and local taxes and the alternative minimum tax (AMT).

In addition, you'll want to be familiar with "taxable-equivalent yield." Typically, municipal bonds pay an interest rate that's lower than those paid by taxable bonds. Since this interest is free from federal taxes, however, the rate may not be as low as it appears. The taxable-equivalent yield measures the rate you'd have to earn on a taxable bond to match the income from a tax-exempt municipal

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bond. And the higher your tax bracket, the higher your taxable-equivalent yield.


Suppose that you're in the 35% marginal tax bracket, and you are considering a tax-exempt municipal bond with a 3.33% yield. You simply divide 3.33% (0.0333 in decimal form) by 1 minus 0.35 (your tax bracket), which would give you 0.0512, or 5.12%. In this tax bracket, a muni with a 3.33% yield is equivalent to a taxable bond with a 5.12% yield. (This example is for illustration purposes only.)

Keep in mind that, before investing in bonds, you should understand the risks involved, including interest rate risk, credit risk and market risk. Bond investments are subject to interest rate risk such that when interest rates rise, the prices of bonds can decrease, and you can lose principal value if the investment is sold prior to maturity. So it's best to discuss municipal bonds with your financial and tax advisors.

By adding quality municipal bonds to your portfolio, you can show faith in your municipality, your investment dollars can help support worthwhile projects in your area, and you receive a steady source of tax-exempt income.
