

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

Our next Lakeway Community Blood Drive will be held on Saturday, July 21st, at the Lakeway Activity Center, from 8:00 to 12:00. We have plenty of open appointments, so please consider donating if you have not already signed up.

To be eligible to donate blood, a person must be at least 17 years of age, weigh at least 123 lbs, and bring a photo ID when they donate. The process takes approximately 30 to 45 minutes. Walk-ins are welcomed, but appointments are honored, so please plan ahead and make an appointment.

PRUNING GUIDELINES FOR PREVENTION OF OAK WILT INTEXAS

Oak wilt, caused by the fungus Ceratocystis fagacearum, is the most destructive disease affecting live oaks and red oaks in Central Texas. Most of the tree mortality results from treeto-tree spread of the pathogen through interconnected or grafted root systems, once an oak wilt center becomes established. New infection centers begin when beetles carry oak wilt fungal spores from infected red oaks to fresh, open wounds on healthy oaks. Wounds include any damage caused by wind, hail, vehicles, construction, squirrels, birds or pruning. Research has shown that both oak wilt fungal mats on infected red oaks and insects that carry oak wilt spores are most prevalent in the spring. Below is a brief description of how you can reduce the risk of fungal spread when pruning.

- Always paint fresh wounds on oaks, including pruning cuts and stumps, with wound dressing or latex paint immediately after pruning or live tree removal at all times of the year.
- Clean all pruning tools with 10% bleach solution or Lysol™ between sites and/or trees
- If possible avoid pruning or wounding of oaks during the spring (currently defined as February1 through June 30). Reasons to prune in the spring include:
- To accommodate public safety concerns such as hazardous limbs, traffic visibility

or emergency utility line clearance.

- To repair damaged limbs (from storms or other anomalies)
- To remove limbs rubbing on a building or rubbing on other branches, and to raise low limbs over a street.
- On sites where construction schedules take precedence, pruning any live tissue should only be done to accommodate required clearance.
- Dead branch removal where live tissue is not exposed.


Pruning for other reasons (general tree health, non-safety related clearance or thinning, etc.) should be conducted before February 1 or after June 30.

Debris from diseased red oaks should be immediately chipped, burned or buried. Regardless of the reasons or time of year, proper pruning techniques should be used. These techniques include making proper pruning cuts and avoiding injurious practices such as topping or excessive crown thinning. If you are uncertain 3 about any of this information, you should consult with a Texas Oak Wilt Certified arborist, ISA Certified Arborist, or an oak wilt specialist from a city, county or state government agency such as the Texas Forest Service or Texas AgriLife Extension Service.

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
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Around Bee Cave


and closer into that dangerous realm where we abandon those principles that have made us a great, prosperous and free country.

When I arrived in Bee Cave in 1997, it was a young and virtually lawless City...a clean slate ripe for development; there was no stopping it and we all knew it. Many people worked many years within the laws granted cities by the State and Federal government to allow Bee Cave to construct legal parameters from which to govern ourselves and create a vision for this family-oriented, suburban bedroom community of the beautiful Austin we all love, patronize, and strive to Keep Weird.

I have traveled to 35 countries, lived in 3 continents including Asia and Europe and have lived in 6 cities in the greater United States. Like people....countries, states, cities and even streets have distinct personalities formed by laws based on their unique values and character. These are achieved by various

legal vehicles attorneys can tell us more about but they include zoning laws, special economic or other development districts, and more. It is also achieved by the effects of business concepts such as synergy, niche or target marketing, demographic targeting, image, merchandising, public relations and advertising, and so on. This is how distinct areas develop like Chinatown, Little Italy, Little India, Soho, South Congress, 6th Street, and even the red light district in a section of Amsterdam. It's not a free for all...regulations exist in our society and they must be followed, especially when it is the will of the community. This includes zoning laws first used in 1916 in New York City and upheld in 1926 by the US Supreme Court to segregate uses that were thought to be incompatible as well as to preserve the character of a community.

Bee Cave...what do we stand for? What was the meaning and purpose of Bee Cave's zoning laws within the confines of the laws of Texas and the United States of America? We stand for families, children, schools, places of worship, parks, libraries, amphitheaters, music, recreation, sports, and more. We had not considered Adult Novelty or Head Shops to date, and frankly don't find it compatible with our public values...but the City is offering to consider zoning it in certain locations, not ANY location. If that isn't suitable, the law provides businesses the freedom by virtual right to locate outside of city limits, in the counties, or even within the ETJ extra-territorial jurisdictions to construct virtually anything.

I have considered your arguments carefully Mr. Kleinman, including those of the famous freedom-fighter Larry Flynt. I empathize with your position and arguments. This is not about discrimination or hypocrisy...your business is not a target, but rather a symbol for those who don't represent our community's public values. This is about compatibility, and character, its economic consequences, and possibly health and safety consequences too. This is about following the zoning laws and will of a community to be who they want to be and publicly represent themselves as such.

From personal circumstances, I have experienced and studied the dangers of violating people's rights, freedoms and property. I fully support the right of your store and merchandise to exist in our society ...but not wherever YOU want...because that goes against MY rights, OUR rights to choose by right within the laws HOW we want to represent ourselves as a community. In other words, your rights END where MINE begin! I also support the right of others to enjoy incompatible freedoms in private if they choose.

It was YOUR choice to proceed to buy that very visible historic property at the cornerstone of our community in secret, whether or not your merchandise fit within our city's zoning laws...which it doesn't....there is nothing General Retail about your merchandise or the fact that you have to be 18 or older to buy there. You purchased and then began construction of your store, also in violation of our

building codes, in secret without any discussions or the required City approvals of any kind, with the intent of hiding behind the 1st Amendment and any other laws you can muster. Freedom is not Absolute. Building laws are in place for the safety of customers, employees and neighbors. Environmental laws are in place to protect our water and air quality, for example. Zoning Laws are in place for the protection of those whose property purchase becomes a consent to pay city property taxes and in return they agree to abide by the laws voted on by its citizens or their elected representatives to protect their property and personal interests.

We all know you proceeded in a manner that was not in good faith and far from the behaviors of being a welcome, agreeable, and lawabiding member in our community. This is not a civil rights issue... though that is your trump card. Your business would not encounter any major obstructions in the County, ETJ or communities that welcome you gladly as a partner who fits within the vision for themselves, including the Commercial districts of Bee Cave which this Council is so generously offering. Town Center never was and never will be the place we choose for an Adult Novelty Head Shop in the City of Bee Cave.




Lakeway/Lake Travis Rotary Club to Hold Another Adoption Awareness Event

Plan to attend the very exciting "Broadway & Beyond" concert on Wednesday, June 8 at 6:00 p.m. at the Lakeway Emmaus Catholic Church. The concert is presented by the Patriot Fund to benefit organization. Luke's Wings, a non-profit organization dedicated to the support of

the families of wounded veterans. The performance will showcase Broadway stars America's Tenor™ Steve Amerson and Broadway soprano Laurie Gayle Stephenson who will sing a collection of Broadway and patriotic songs from the American musical heritage.

WHAT DOES LUKE'S WINGS DO?

Although the United States military provides soldiers with care for their wounds, it does not give financial assistance for family members to travel to be with their loved ones during treatment. Enter Luke's Wings. Recognizing the immediate benefit for families to be together after a trauma, Luke's Wings provides travel agency planning services and pays for round trip travel for family members. Luke's Wings tries to partner with hotels or other non-profit organizations to provide free or discounted accommodations, meals, entertainment and other vouchers to augment the services provided to the visiting families.

Luke's Wings, founded in December 2007, was the brainchild of Fletcher Gill and Sarah Wingfield. Fletcher Gill is currently Vice President, Montview Realty Advisors, Luke's Wings Chairman of the Board, Chief Executive Officer and Co-Founder, Fletcher's' current efforts include trying to promote the mission of Luke's Wings around the country and even to open a branch of Luke's Wings in Austin.

Know Your Investment Risks — and How to Respond

When you invest, you take some risks. While you can't totally avoid these risks, you can take steps to help reduce their impact and increase your comfort level. And the more comfortable you are with your investments, the easier it will be to follow a long-term strategy that can help you meet your goals.

Let's look at the most common types of risk related to investing, along with some suggestions on helping to reduce these risks:

Losing principal — This type of risk is most closely associated with investing. For example, when you purchase a stock, you know that its value could go up or down. If it drops below your purchase price, and you then sell your shares, you will lose some of your principal.

Your response — You can't eliminate the risk of losing principal, but by owning a mix of stocks, bonds, government securities and other types of investments, you can help reduce the impact of volatility on your portfolio. Keep in mind, though, that diversification, by itself, can't guarantee a profit or protect against loss.

Losing value when interest rates change — This type of risk primarily affects fixed-income investments, such as bonds. If you purchase a bond that pays, say, a 4% interest rate, and the market rate goes up to 5%, then the value of your bond will drop because no one will be willing to pay you the full price for it when newer, higher-yielding bonds are available.

Your response — You can combat, or even ignore, interest rate risk by holding your bonds until they mature. By doing so, you'll get your full principal back, provided the issuer doesn't default, and you'll continue to receive regular interest payments unless the bonds are "called," or repurchased

by the issuer. (You can help protect against this by purchasing bonds that have some degree of "call protection" and by owning bonds with different maturities.)

Losing purchasing power — This risk largely applies to fixed-rate investments such as certificates of deposit (CDs). To illustrate: If you purchase a CD that pays 2%, and the inflation rate is 3%, you are actually losing purchasing power.

Your response — Despite their vulnerability to inflation, CDs can offer you some valuable benefits, such as preservation of principal. Yet if you are concerned about fighting inflation, you may want to look for investments than have the potential to offer rising income, such as dividend-paying stocks. In fact, you can find stocks that have increased their dividends for many consecutive years. (Be aware, though, that companies can reduce or eliminate dividends at any time. Also, an investment in stocks fluctuates, and you could lose your principal.)

Apart from these individual techniques to reduce investment-related risk, you should also save early and save often — because the more money you accumulate, the greater your ability to follow a

long-term strategy that reflects your personal risk tolerance. That's why it's a good idea to contribute as much as possible over the years to your IRA and 401(k) or other employer-sponsored retirement plan.

By understanding the different types of investment risk, and by acting to help lessen them, you can reduce much of the stress sometimes associated with investing — while you increase your prospects for achieving your objectives.
