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TIMELY TIPS FOR JUNE GARDENERS

From Calloway's Nursery

Planting a Butterfly garden is fun for all ages. First, choose a location with plenty of sun and protection from strong winds. Add a supply of dark rocks or mass of dark pebbles to collect the morning sun for the butterflies to rest and warm up. Sink a container full of sand or gravel into the ground and keep it moist. This will serve as a resting spot for some to drink and obtain minerals.

Attracting butterflies to your garden is easy. Select foliage plants as food for the larvae or caterpillar, and flowering plants to provide nectar for adults. Butterflies are attracted by fragrance, flower-shape and color. They are mostly active in mid and late summer, so you should make sure that you have lots of nectar-rich plants and flowers blooming by then. If you plant large sections of flowers of the same color, it will

make it easier for them to find your garden. You should plant flowers that will bloom at different times of the year and ones that bloom even at different times of the day and night, this way, you will always have something in bloom and they will always be attracting butterflies.

Our free clinic on June 12 at 10:15 am will go into more details about planting a Butterfly Garden! Calloway's Nursery is dedicated to educating young and old alike in being better stewards of our earth. Our weekly Saturday clinics are designed to provide gardening information for adults. Last summer we offered several children clinics during the week and had a great response! - MAY 23 The Handmaid's Tale by Margaret Atwood. In this Orwellian dramatization, religion becomes a tool of repression and social control to force women into the roles of stay-at-home wives, domestic staff, prostitutes, or surrogate mothers. They have no rights to their bodies or property and are completely dependent upon men. Those women who have had at least one child find themselves forced into the role of breeding machine, producing children for childless couples.
- JUNE 27 Cleopatra: a Life by Stacy Schiff. Famous long before she was notorious, Cleopatra has gone down in history for all the wrong reasons. Shakespeare and Shaw put words in

- her mouth. Michelangelo, Tiepolo, and Elizabeth Taylor put a face to her name. Along the way, Cleopatra's supple personality and the drama of her circumstances have been lost. In a masterly return to the classical sources, Stacy Schiff here boldly separates fact from fiction to rescue the magnetic queen whose death ushered in a new world order. Rich in detail, epic in scope, Schiff 's is a luminous, deeply original reconstruction of a dazzling life.

Intimate in feeling, astonishing in scope, and impossible to put down, The Immortal Life of Henrietta Lacks captures, the beauty and drama of scientific discovery, as well as its human consequences.

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NOTES FROM THE APRIL BOARD MEETING

DIRECTORS PRESENT

HOMEOWNER FORUM

Clay Jeansonne spoke as a representative of the group opposed to the T-Mobile cell tower that was installed during Spring Break at Kirk Elementary School adjacent to Lakes on Eldridge. He informed the Board that he has sent letters to Cypress Fairbanks Independent School District, has spoken directly to Superintendent Dr. Anthony and to the Principal of Kirk Elementary. Richard Lowstetter informed the group that the Lakes on Eldridge LTD referred to in the Deed of Trust to the school district was not the LOE HOA, that it was a separate corporation formed by the developer, Ryko Development and was still a corporation with good standing with the State of Texas. Mr. Lowstetter also told the group that he had been in contact with Ryko to see if the ARC had been kept by them, assigned to the HOA or assigned to the CFISD, and is awaiting an answer from them. Mr. Lowstetter also said that the HOA Attorneys had advised the Board that the HOA could not help with a law suit financially, and would support their efforts, but would not join in any law suits.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

• Architectural Control: Cory Hammond reported there has been one ARC application since the last meeting which was approved. He also stated that a letter has been sent to a homeowner who installed artificial grass, and that situation was being monitored.

- <u>Access Control</u>: David King reported that all the gates were working as of the date of the meeting.
- *Parks & Pools:* Bronson Clay reported that signs are on order for the tennis courts as there has been confusion over court numbering. Drapes for the clubhouse should be installed soon.
- *Landscape:* Carlon Thorpe advised that the mulching would be done in May, and all seasonal colors would be installed within the next few weeks.
- Lakes & Wildlife: The repair of the front irrigation pump is complete; it was just an electrical relay. The repair was originally thought to be much more extensive.
- *Communication:* Cory Hammond reported that Peel was forwarding all articles submitted directly to Peel through their website on to the communications committee. This does create some additional work in organizing articles, but also allows the committee to preview all articles and assign a priority since there is limited space.
- <u>Social/Events:</u> Bronson Clay reported there were about 150 kids at the Easter Egg Hunt and that there were over 1,000 eggs. He has also completed plans for all social events for 2011. The next event will be the 4th of July party, to be held the morning of Monday, July 4th. The next social committee meeting will be held on Saturday May 7th at the pool area.

FINANCIAL REPORT

• *Financial Statements:* The Board reviewed the financial statements for the month ending March 31, 2011. The Association had a balance of \$681,865.36 in the Operating Fund and \$422,767.95 in the Replacement Fund. The Fund Balance for the year showed that income had exceeded expenses by \$44,919.51. The financials were accepted.

• Accounts Receivable: The Board reviewed the Accounts Receivable report and instructed the managing agent to proceed with the collection of the outstanding monies in accordance with the established policy. The Accounts Receivable report was accepted. As of April 20, 2011 there were 43 homes that owed the association money. The Board instructed AMI to turn all delinquent accounts over to Optio Solutions on May 1, 2011 (with the exception of accounts already with our attorney), and then to Red Rock Financial if Optio fails to collect.

There was no other discussion.

PHYSICAL PROPERTY

- One Liner Report: The Board was given the one-liner report for April. The board asked the managing agent to continue to monitor the home with the artificial turf.
- Citations Report: The managing agent gave the Board a copy of the latest Citation Report for their review. The Board asked the Managing Agent to contact ISSC and make sure the patrol officers operate in accordance with the rules that have been established. All residents are to receive citations for traffic violations as outlined in the procedures document. The first citation received acts as a warning (no fine will be issued by AMI). Subsequent citations will receive a fine.



Know Your Investment Risks — and How to Respond

When you invest, you take some risks. While you can't totally avoid these risks, you can take steps to help reduce their impact and increase your comfort level. And the more comfortable you are with your investments, the easier it will be to follow a long-term strategy that can help you meet your goals.

Let's look at the most common types of risk related to investing, along with some suggestions on helping to reduce these risks:

Losing principal — This type of risk is most closely associated with investing. For example, when you purchase a stock, you know that its value could go up or down. If it drops below your purchase price, and you then sell your shares, you will lose some of your principal.

Your response — You can't eliminate the risk of losing principal, but by owning a mix of stocks, bonds, government securities and other types of investments, you can help reduce the impact of volatility on your portfolio. Keep in mind, though, that diversification, by itself, can't guarantee a profit or protect against loss.

Losing value when interest rates change — This type of risk primarily affects fixed-income investments, such as bonds. If you purchase a bond that pays, say, a 4% interest rate, and the market rate goes up to 5%, then the value of your bond will drop because

no one will be willing to pay you the full price for it when newer, higher-yielding bonds are available.

Your response — You can combat, or even ignore, interest rate risk by holding your bonds until they mature. By doing so, you'll get your full principal back, provided the issuer doesn't default, and you'll continue to receive regular interest payments unless the bonds are "called," or repurchased by the issuer. (You can help protect against this by purchasing bonds that have some degree of "call protection" and by owning bonds with different maturities.)

Losing purchasing power — This risk largely applies to fixed-rate investments such as certificates of deposit (CDs). To illustrate: If you purchase a CD that pays 2%, and the inflation rate is 3%, you are actually losing purchasing power.

Your response — Despite their vulnerability to inflation, CDs can offer you some valuable benefits, such as preservation of principal. Yet if you are concerned about fighting inflation, you may want to look for investments than have the potential to offer rising income, such as dividend-paying stocks. In fact, you can find stocks that have increased their dividends for many consecutive years. (Be aware,

though, that companies can reduce or eliminate dividends at any time. Also, an investment in stocks fluctuates, and you could lose your principal.)

Apart from these individual techniques to reduce investmentrelated risk, you should also save early and save often — because the more money you accumulate, the greater your ability to follow a longterm strategy that reflects your personal risk tolerance. That's why

it's a good idea to contribute as much as possible over the years to your IRA and 401(k) or other employer-sponsored retirement plan. By understanding the different

types of investment risk, and by acting to help lessen them, you can reduce much of the stress sometimes associated with investing while you increase your prospects for achieving your objectives.

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

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Do kids need sports drinks?

Although children may request sports drinks, they offer little advantage over cool water, say nutritionists at Baylor College of Medicine (BCM) in Houston and the USDA/ARS Children's Nutrition Research Center at Baylor and Texas Children's Hospital. Sports drinks are designed to benefit athletes engaged in continuous, high-intensity aerobic workouts that last for 90 minutes or more.


But, if the availability of sports drinks encourages your kids to drink, consider making your own. Combine caffeine-free herbal tea, a little sugar, a pinch of salt, a few ounces of orange juice, and chill in individual bottles. Active kids need to fill up on fluids to prevent dehydration. Children should be encouraged to drink before heading outside and every 15 to 30 minutes during playtime activities.

Combination of limes, sun can result in 'margarita dermatitus'

Adding a slice of lime to a favorite summer drink is nice to cool off with, but it could leave your skin burning, say dermatologists at Baylor College of Medicine.

The condition, called phytophotodermatitis, happens when a certain plant compound comes in contact with the skin, making that one area light sensitive. During the summer, lime juice is the common cause for this condition, which is why some doctors call it 'margarita dermatitis.' The reaction usually looks like a sunburn, or a poison ivy rash, with redness and sometimes swelling and blistering, says Dr. Rajani Katta, associate professor of dermatology at BCM. It can be itchy and painful, and leave behind skin discoloration.

Treatment is similar to treating a poison ivy rash. Cool compresses and hydrocortisone creams along with oral antihistamines are used. Severe cases could require steroid pills. Preventative action is best. Be aware of what plant products you come in contact with and wash the area thoroughly before going out in the sun. As always, make sure to apply sunscreen and stay in shaded areas to maintain good skin health. (Continued on Page 19)

Physical activity keeps Parkinson's at bay

The management of Parkinson's disease is much more effective when regular exercise is included, say experts at Baylor College of Medicine (BCM) in Houston. "There's no doubt that people who have a positive attitude and exercise generally cope with the disease much better than those who don't," said Dr. Joseph Jankovic, professor of neurology and director of BCM's Parkinson's Disease Center and Movement Disorders Clinic.

"Exercise is clearly a positive force in dealing with Parkinson's."

Jankovic said that a regular exercise program, tailored to the needs of the individual patient, is critical for continued well being. Exercises for Parkinson's patients should be designed to improve strength (through the use of free weights, weight machines, and elastic bands) and overall fitness (by walking and swimming). Swimming and water exercises have the additional advantage in that there is very little stress on the joints and the resistance improves muscle strength.

Traditional colonoscopy recommended over virtual method

The option for a "virtual" colonoscopy is now available but doctors at Baylor College of Medicine recommend sticking to traditional methods when screening for colon cancer.


A virtual colonoscopy is a CT scan image of the colon and does not require the use of an endoscope - a thin, flexible device that is inserted into the colon.

"While a virtual colonoscopy may sound less invasive than traditional methods, it isn't always as accurate," said Dr. Waqar Qureshi, associate professor of medicine and chief of endoscopy at BCM. "A scan is more likely to miss small precancerous growths, and catching those polyps early is the key to preventing progression to colon cancer."

Studies have shown that polyps smaller than 6 mm are frequently missed by CT scanning, Qureshi said. For someone who is at high risk for colon cancer, missing a polyp can be deadly. Almost all instances of colon cancer begin as polyps, which are easily detected and removed during a colonoscopy.

Many times a virtual colonoscopy must be followed by the traditional method, he added, and both procedures require the same preparation, which includes laxatives, diet restrictions and in some cases certain medications must be stopped.


Colon cancer screening should take place every 10 years starting at age 50. If colon cancer runs in a family, testing should begin earlier and be performed more often.





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
