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

DEED RESTRICTION REMINDERS

Please remember that you agreed to abide by the Declaration of Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions when you purchased your home - do your part in keeping Circle C a beautiful place to live!

REMEMBER: If you are planning an improvement to your home (i.e. patio cover, deck, change in paint color, fence material, removal of a tree, etc.), you MUST first obtain approval from the Architectural Control Committee. You can find guidelines and forms on our website at www.circlecranch.info under the Resource Tab.

If you receive a letter from the HOA regarding an alleged violation, please call us. The HOA is required by state law to notify owners in writing via certified mail and allow for the homeowner to request a hearing before the board of directors. STRATUS PROPERTIES

Stratus Properties, developer and owner of the commercial land in Circle C Ranch has made a donation of 71 acres of land to the Austin Independent School District. The land is located across from Bowie High School and will be used for the development of multi-use fields. They also provided about 15,000 square feet of impervious cover to be used for any related buildings or parking.

Stratus is also the developer of the site on the southeast corner of Slaughter Lane and MoPac. Alamo Drafthouse is the large building at the far south of the site, and Austin Diagnostic Clinic will be located along Slaughter Lane. There are accessory buildings for smaller retail and offices. The construction is on schedule at this point, and the goal is to have some facilities open by November or December of this year.

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Circle C Landscape

Hot, hot and more hot! Since the 2" rain in late June, which was a complete surprise and a welcome event, there has been nothing but record heat. Keeping everything in Circle C watered properly and somewhat alive has been a great challenge. We spend the majority of the time over the summer on water management and water conservation. Circle C Landscape manages over 40 irrigation controllers, about 2500 irrigation valves and approximately 10,000 irrigation heads on the overall property for the CCHOA. Needless to say, there is a lot of fixing and monitoring to do. We operate under the City of Austin commercial property water conservation ordinance and follow all of the rules and regulations of the City.

We currently are in Phase I of the Water Conservation ordinance, and are allowed to water two days per week. The vast majority of the Circle C watering occurs on Tuesday and Friday. We are prepared to go to Stage 2 water restrictions which may be in effect by the time you get this newsletter. This would limit water to one day per week.

The CCHOA has an approved large property watering variance that allows Circle C Landscape to adjust watering days so we have enough time and water pressure to get the watering done particularly on the large sections of Slaughter Lane and Escarpment. In order to get the variance, Circle C Landscape writes a proposal and conducts an on-site visit with City of Austin Water Conservation personnel. The City reviews the scope of the variance and also checks random sections of irrigation to ensure they are working properly.

We have irrigators who constantly check controllers, make repairs and respond to reports malfunctioning irrigation (missing nozzles and heads). If you see anything like this, please send an email to info@circlecranch.info or to me shoover@onr.com and we will check it out right away. We try to get all repairs done prior to the next watering cycle or we turn that section off pending a larger repair.

We have noticed that despite our best efforts various areas become stressed if a valve goes out, or on the major boulevards where the grass is thin at the curb edges. We are systematically adding a thin layer of soil to these areas and hand watering it in with a water hose. This is a good tip for those of you who are experiencing thin or dried out spots in your yard.

Our goal during extreme drought is to keep the ground soft enough so it will absorb water if and when we get a rain. The current grass types and drought tolerant plants will undergo periods of being stressed for water and in a slow growth cycle. The plants have a hard time flowering under relentless 100 degree plus temperatures and often look pale. However, when we get a rain, they perk back up. The current turf specification for Circle C is Pallisades Zoysia. It has been installed in all of the renovated areas. It has the characteristic of summer dormancy, which allows it to grow slowly and brown out (similar to winter dormancy) under extreme heat and low water conditions. It responds quite well when weather conditions improve. You will also notice that a lot of vegetative areas begin to look pale and/or yellow. This is a consequence of the high PH and chlorine in our water system. The plants and grass respond much better to rainfall. So, stay cool. The fall will be right around the corner, we hope!





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Frequently Asked Questions

What are the rules on trash containers and recycle cart storage?

Trash containers and recycle carts are permitted to be at the curb only on your scheduled collection day. Trash containers and recycle carts are to be stored where not visible from the street at all other times.

Are basketball goals allowed in Circle C?

Permanently installed goals are not permitted in Circle C. The deed restrictions state that basketball goals are to be stored out of the view of neighbors when not in use. City of Austin code states that only motorized vehicles are allowed to be parked on public streets and all sidewalks must remain clear and open for pedestrians.

Are cars allowed to be parked on the street?

The CCHOA does not have jurisdiction over the streets in Circle C; they are the responsibility of the City of Austin. Obviously inoperable vehicles may not be parked or left on public streets for more than 72 hours. Please call 974-8119 to report an abandoned or non-operating vehicle. Please call 311 to report illegally parked vehicles.

What should I do about barking dogs and stray animals?

Stray Animals may be picked up by animal control by calling 311. The City of Austin states it is unlawful for dogs to make frequent

noise disturbing to persons in the neighborhood and violations should be reported to the City. You may also call the CCHOA office at 288-8663 with specific date and time for excessive barking. The staff will send a cooperative letter to the homeowner.

How do I report a street light outage?

Every light pole has an assigned number mounted on the pole. Jot down that number and call the City of Austin 311 non-emergency number to make the report.

Are boats, trailers and recreational vehicles allowed in Circle C?

The Deed Restrictions require that any vehicle or trailer other than a conventional automobile be stored, placed or parked in an area concealed from view of other Homeowners.

What are the rules on maintenance?

Homes are to be kept in a well-maintained, safe, clean and attractive condition at all times. Lawns and garden areas should be kept alive, free of weeds and attractive. Lawn mowing is required on a regular basis. Trees and shrubs are to be pruned. Public right of way and sidewalks should be clear and unobstructed. Litter, trash, dead vegetation and debris should be promptly removed.

What are the rules in Circle C on walking with your dog off leash and what about picking up after your dog?

Both of these issues fall under the jurisdiction of the City of Austin. It is against CoA ordinance to have a dog off leash except on your private property. It is also a requirement by the City that dog owners pick up and properly dispose of their dog's feces. In this regard, we recommend dog walkers carry a plastic grocery bag or newspaper sleeve. Slide it on like a glove, pick up the offensive matter, pull the bag back over your hand, knot it and throw it in your trashcan when you return home. Please

Do I have to submit plans for improvements and/or additions to my home?

All improvements such as decks, patio covers, pools, change in fencing or any other permanent structure must be submitted to the Architectural Control Committee. You may download an application form as well as a fee schedule on our website at www. circlecranch.info under the "ACC" quick link section.

What do I need to visit the Swim Center?

All residents must possess and show their swim center ID card to enter the facility. ID cards are available at the aquatic office. Contact 288-6057 for information on what is required to obtain an ID. Guests of Circle C residents must pay a \$3 entrance fee and sign a liability waiver before entering the facility. Children under 3 are free.

Are door to door solicitors and door flyers allowed in Circle C?

Both of these issues are governed by the City of Austin. By City ordinance, solicitors must abide by "No Soliciting" signs on private property. Some neighbors have had success in placing a small "No Soliciting" sign near the doorbell and/or a small staked sign near the front porch.

What do new Texas residents need to know?

According to the Texas Department of Public Safety (www.txdps.state.tx.us) a new Texas resident is required by state law to obtain a Texas driver's license, get a Texas vehicle inspection and a vehicle title/registration within 30 days of moving to Texas to legally operate a vehicle.

Dorian deWind and Sue and Vince Totero. We offer a special remembrance to their former sidekick Charlie Rodenberg.


LANDSCAPER NEWS

The only way to sum up what occurred in Park West in the month of June is "heat." So much so that my dad and I agreed that we would no longer talk about it. This is the hottest heat spell since 1926....at least that's what a city inspector told me while we were looking at a commercial system in south Austin.

The biggest mistake I have found that homeowners make in reaction to the heat is to add more water. Too much water can cause "brown patch." Brown patch occurs when there is too much thatch or remnants of dead and decaying grass above the root zone. What happens is that the excess water gets absorbed by the thatch and causes moist warm conditions for fungus to grow. The fungus attacks the grass and roots and then the grass becomes prone to insects and you have a downward spiral into an abyss of brown patches of grass. This does not negate the length of watering times which are normal for this time of year: grass zones 25-30 minutes twice a week and bed zones 20-25 minutes twice a week. Follow these time frames as

BEEN THERE, DONE THAT

(Vacation and travel tales submitted by residents) *From Dorian deWind:*

The recent trip my son and I took to my native country of Ecuador was almost like traveling to three different countries. Traveling through Ecuador, the size of Colorado, means traversing three uniquely distinct and infinitely varied geographical and topographical regions. First, the warm and humid Pacific coast region, with some of the most gorgeous, unpopulated beaches; its lush banana, cacao and sugar cane plantations along with shrimp "farms" and

its beautiful regional capital of Guayaquil with 3.5 million inhabitants.

Next, the high Andes mountains with numerous active volcanoes topped by the majestic, 20,000+ feet Chimborazo; its amazingly fertile and productive breadbasket haciendas and colorful Indian markets; its mysterious, deep lakes and melted snow-and rain-flushed rivers and waterfalls crashing down thousands of feet towards the ocean on one side and towards the Amazon river on the other, all crowned by the Spanish-colonial capital of Quito, settled in a Cordilleras valley "merely" 9,000 feet high and at "la mitad del mundo," the center of the earth.



Finally, at the East side of the Andes, or "Oriente," we find the most amazing region in Ecuador --perhaps in the world--its Amazon rain forest. A region that has been referred to as the most bio-diverse place on earth, a "crucial part of the planet's lungs," and as the world's "richest biological incubator." One such place is the Yasuní National Park, deep in Ecuador's rainforest, a pristine 4,000-square-mile wilderness of incredible biodiversity and the ancestral land to two of the most isolated and "uncontacted" indigenous tribes. An area containing 150 amphibian species, 121 species of reptiles and 550 species of birds. A region where, in a two-square-mile area, one finds 655 species of trees---more than the United States and Canada combined---along with some of the most promising medicinal plants and animal toxins. Now, add to all this, the diversity in the cultures, traditions and ethnicities of Ecuador's people in the three regions of Ecuador and you have a glimpse of the (Continued on Page 17)

greatness of a small country---the size of Colorado.

Ecuador actually boasts a fourth region that is just as distinct and diverse as the other three: the amazing and historical Galápagos Islands, 525 miles off Ecuador's coast and smack on the equator--just think evolution, natural selection, Darwin, Galápagos tortoises and blue-footed boobies, and you'll get the idea.





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






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HOW'S YOUR "BRISKETIQUETTE?

With the summer vacation in full swing, the kids out of school, and noodles floating in the pool, it's no doubt the grill is staying fired up. But...before you kick off the flipflops, here are a few barbecue etiquette tips to ensure your grill fest goes down as the best on the block. Wait. Barbecue etiquette, you say? Yes, it exists.

- 1. If you're invited to a barbecue party thrown by an individual/family, avoid showing up empty-handed. A side of coleslaw, apple pie, or pitcher of lemonade will do the trick.
- 2. A barbecue is an informal affair no need to worry about which fork and knife to use. Go ahead and use your fingers in lieu of utensils. Larger pieces of food, however, should be cut with a knife and fork. No need to get medieval on us.
- 3. If you're like many people who wonder what is the proper way to squeeze a lemon slice and a lemon wedge? Well, here is the answer: if it is a slice, don't squeeze it-just drop it in the glass. If it is a wedge, cup your hand over it to prevent squirting, and squeeze it into the glass. Who likes lemon pulp in the eye? Not me.
- 4. Corn on the cob vs. man. For most people, eating corn on the cob is one of life's biggest challenges. Okay, well, maybe it's just a challenge. The best way to approach a hot cob: simply, butter a few rows of corn at a time, hold the corn firmly by the ends with two hands (or use corn

- skewers), and eat a few rows at a time from left to right. If you prefer to skip the bite-off-the-cob approach, you may also cut kernels off of the cob with a knife, cutting in a vertical, downward manner.
- 5. Similar to corn on the cob, ribs are meant to be eaten with your hands. Given their messy nature, however, it's important to have napkins on hand. For this barbecue favorite, bibs are not necessary.
- 6. Sauce is boss, unless it isn't offered. While Texans are usually proud of their barbecue sauce, some barbecue purists prefer no sauce to appreciate the natural, smoked flavor of the meat. Ask for sauce only when you know it's available, or if your child requests it.
- 7. Grilled shrimp can be easy to eat or take a little work, depending on how it is served. As a general rule of thumb, if the shrimp has the tail on, you can use your fingers. Tails off, use a fork!
- 8. When hosting a large group, be sure to have a wide variety of food options for vegetarians and children.
- 9. To pick or not to pick? Your teeth that is. Often times, meat can be tricky to eat and require some dental maintenance. At every expense, avoid removing food from your teeth in public. Toothpicks may be used, but only in private. So what should you do if you notice someone else in the same predicament? Be discreet, but do tell.
 - 10. Last and not least, respect the

griller's domain. If the host/griller has samples to offer, he/she will do so. Never assume you may help yourself to try what "smells good."

Now that the fundamentals are covered, what's for lunch?

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Head Lice

Often young children bring home unwanted visitors- lice. Head lice are small, tan to gray, wingless insects. Eggs, or nits, are glued to the hair shaft at the scalp. Nits are dark until after they have hatched when they turn white. It takes 7-11 days for eggs to hatch. Females lay 3-5 eggs each day and live from 7-10 days.

Head lice reside on the hairy part of the head. If they drop off, they only live for about 2 days. They are incapable of surviving on the family pet. Head lice are not known to transmit any diseases from person to person.


TO MANAGE LICE:

- 1. Use an effective treatment. Head louse shampoos contain insecticides so they must be used properly and with care. Wash the infested person's hair in a sink or basin so insecticide does not come into contact with other parts of the body. The person shampooing should wear rubber gloves. Do NOT use off label products such as flea & tick shampoo, other insecticides or gasoline.
- 2. Hair combing is an extremely important step in controlling head lice. Many shampoos will not kill all eggs, so combing can help to remove eggs from the hair shaft. Wet the hair and use a special metal louse comb to comb through small sections of hair. Remove debris from the comb with a tissue and place it in a plastic

bag that can be sealed and disposed of when you are finished combing through all hair.

- 3. Clothing and bedding of the infested person should be washed in hot, soapy water at the same time as the treatment. If items cannot be washed, try dry cleaning. For items that cannot be laundered, place them in a sealed plastic bag in the freezer for at least 24 hours.
- 4. It's important to contact anyone your child has had close contact with to let them know of the head louse infestation. This can help everyone manage the problem at the same time so there is less chance of reinfestation occurring. It's important to continue checking for head lice weekly so you can keep tabs on reinfestation. 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Going 100 Percent Organic Not Feasible?

The Environmental Working Group (EWG), a non-profit organization specializing in research and advocacy related to public health and the environment, has released its 2011 updated "Dirty Dozen" list of the 12 fruits and vegetables containing the most pesticides. Topping this year's list? Apples. This begs the question, "Can eating an apple a day really keep the doctor away?"

The answer may lie in where you get your apples. Although the EWG's ranking was cited as an overestimate of the risk by the Alliance for Food & Farming, a non-profit organization with the stated mission of providing a voice for farmers to communicate their commitment to food safety, consuming organically grown products can reduce the amount of pesticides that enter your body. According to the World Health Organization (WHO), long-term exposure to pesticides can lead to death or serious illness, including

developmental and reproductive disorders, impaired nervous system function, and certain cancers. Further, the WHO has found children to be at higher risk from exposure than adults.

However, organically grown products are typically more expensive than conventionally grown products, and some organic products may be difficult to find in some areas. If growing your own fruits and vegetables is not an option, and purchasing 100 percent of your produce in organic form is monetarily unfeasible, the EWG's list offers a good starting point for consumers.

According to the EWG's 2011 report, which is based on its analysis of tests conducted by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) and the federal Food and Drug Administration (FDA), the following 12 fruits and vegetables (the "Dirty Dozen") consistently contained the highest

amount of pesticides when conventionally grown, and should be consumed in organic form when possible:

1. Apples 7. Grapes (imported)2. Celery 8. Sweet bell peppers

3. Strawberries
4. Peaches
5. Spinach
6. Nectarines
9. Potatoes
10. Blueberries
(domestic)
11. Lettuce

(imported) 12. Kale/collard greens

Alternatively, according to the EWG, the following 15 fruits and vegetables (the "Clean 15") consistently contained the least amount of pesticides, and by adhering to this list, individuals can get their recommended daily allowance of fruits and vegetables without incurring the expense of buying organic products in order to limit their exposure to pesticides:

Underscoring the importance of the consumption of fruits and vegetables was the release of MyPlate, also in June, replacing the classic food pyramid. The USDA's new food icon is a simple, visual cue that advises individuals to "make half your plate fruits and vegetables," graphically shrinking the role of meats and dairy products in the national diet.

WILL MY CHILD BE READY FOR ELEMENTARY SCHOOL?

More and more parents are recognizing the importance of enrolling their children in preschool to help them develop the right foundation for success in elementary school and beyond. However, the best programs go beyond helping children master basic academic skills to supporting their development as happy, confident, well-rounded individuals.

Research shows that from birth to age five, development in all areas is rapid. Children form strong neural connections during this time as a result of experiences they have with everyone and everything they encounter. The quality of those early interactions determines how children continue to learn and form relationships, strongly influencing their future success and happiness.


"Parents should look for preschool, pre-K, kindergarten and first grade programs that take a balanced approach to developing motor, social-emotional, creative and academic skills," said Brandi Muse, of Primrose School at Summerwood. "It takes quality instruction, a well-rounded curriculum and a positive teacher relationship to prepare a child to succeed."

- Academics: Let's go beyond concentrating only on basic math and reading skills. Academic success is not just about memorization

 it requires learning how to think critically, use mathematical concepts, express curiosity and develop competence in language skills like listening, speaking and writing.
- Technology: In today's technology-rich world, children need to have a grasp of technology as a tool for creative expression and problem solving. Computers equipped with developmentallyappropriate educational software and online resources should be integrated into the classroom.
- Physical Development: Children who participate in daily physical activity develop basic motor skills like throwing, jumping and balance that help them become healthy adults. Physical activity also creates neural connections that support academic achievement.
- Music and Art: Young children naturally engage in "art," or spontaneous, creative play, but when educators involve children in music and art activities regularly from an early age, they encourage cognitive and emotional development.
- **Social-Emotional Development:** Preschool programs should focus on social and life skills to help your child establish positive relationships and transition easily to elementary school.

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

Keep toddlers close enough to touch in pools

Parents can help prevent potential accidents at the pool this summer by staying alert and attentive, said a pediatric emergency medicine physician at Baylor College of Medicine.

"A high percentage of summer drownings and accidents occur in community and residential swimming pools," said Dr. Rohit Shenoi, assistant professor of pediatrics - emergency medicine at BCM and Texas Children's Hospital. "By far, the most common cause of drowning is lack of supervision."

Parents need to keep a close watch, both physically - in proximity to the child - and mentally, with little distractions to prevent these accidents, Shenoi said. A good rule of thumb, he said, is to implement "touch supervision," which means keeping within arms-length of your toddler at all times.

Other Safety Tips Include:

- Don't rely on floating devices because children can easily slip out of them
- Make sure the pool has two unblockable drains to prevent the child or a body part from getting stuck in the drain
- Fence in your pool

Active summers can lead to healthy lifestyles

A balance of indoor and outdoor activities can help children maintain a healthy weight during the summer months. "Some research has shown that kids gain the most weight during summer vacation, so it's important that parents take an active role in providing opportunities for their children to be physically active," said Dr. Jason Mendoza, assistant professor of pediatrics at the USDA/ARS Children's Nutrition Research Center at Baylor College of Medicine. Children should have at least one hour of physical activity per day, the type of activities that raise their breathing and heart rate.

Outdoors activities can include swimming, biking and other outdoor play but remember to follow safety precautions, such as using sunscreen, drinking plenty of water and wearing proper safety gear. Television, computer and other media usage should be kept to no more than two hours a day for children ages 2 and up. Instead, parents can read to younger children, encourage them to use their imagination by playing around the house, or engage them in arts and crafts activities.

For older children, parents can arrange summer camps through the school or YMCA and plan simple family activities like preparing meals together or taking evening walks together. Getting children involved in chores is another way to keep them active, said Mendoza.

Exercise-induced asthma is manageable condition

Gasping for breath during a workout may be more than just a sign that you're out of shape. It could also indicate a condition called exercise-induced asthma, according to an expert at Baylor College of Medicine. It occurs when someone has shortness of breath, gets winded easily, has wheezing and sometimes even a cough shortly after exercise begins, explained Dr. John Rogers, professor of family and community medicine at BCM.

The condition is manageable and people are still able to perform at a very high level athletically with proper treatment, he said. Treatment usually includes using an inhaler 20 to 30 minutes before exercise. The inhaler helps relax the smooth muscle and can last for up to four hours. There is not one exercise routine that is better for the condition than another. Rogers recommends those with the condition do other things to manage it such as staying away from cigarette smoke, staying indoors when pollen or other allergen counts are high if you have allergies and avoiding exercise when you have cold symptoms. Getting the flu shot each year is also recommended to help maintain healthy lung function.

Food poisoning major concern during summer


If this summer weather has you feeling wilted, imagine what it does to your food. An expert at Baylor College of Medicine advises taking extra precautions with food during the summer heat.

Roberta Anding a registered dietitian at BCM, advises following the "golden hour" rule for foods such as meat, mayonnaise, eggs and cheese. These foods can only stay in an environment above 90 degrees for an hour before they need to be thrown out. This rule also applied to baby formula.

"Don't assume that you can leave something like a turkey sandwich in the car while you run to the mall for an hour. Don't run the risk of a food-borne illness," said Anding. In addition, be sure to wash all fruits and vegetables before cutting or eating. Use separate cutting boards for meats and veggies, and do not use a sponge to clean up drippings after working with raw meat - it only spreads the germs around.

Other Food Safety Tips Include:

- Be sure to have a refrigerator thermometer and a meat thermometer to ensure that food is always at the right temperature.
- When reheating food, make sure it's not just lukewarm. The center
 of a piece of meat should be hot, ensuring that any potential
 bacteria that has grown is killed.
- Be cautious when going organic make sure milk products are pasteurized to avoid food borne illnesses and bacteria.







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
