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

August 22 - Sharp Objects, by Gillian Flynn. WICKED above her hipbone, GIRL across her heart. Words are like a road map to reporter Camille Preaker's troubled past. Fresh from a brief stay at a psych hospital, Camille's first assignment from the second-rate daily paper where she works brings her reluctantly back to her hometown to cover the murders of two preteen girls. NASTY on her kneecap, BABYDOLL on her leg. Since she left town eight years ago, Camille has hardly spoken to her neurotic, hypochondriac mother or to the half-sister she barely knows: a beautiful thirteen-year-old with an eerie grip on the town. Now, installed again in her family's Victorian mansion, Camille is haunted by the childhood tragedy she has spent her whole life trying to cut from her memory. 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Lawn, Shrub, and Tree Care

Besides making you feel proud, keeping your lawns and beds in good condition is also your responsibility as a Lakes on Eldridge homeowner, in accordance with our deed restrictions. So, keep your yards looking their best by following these suggestions!

ST.AUGUSTINE GRASS

- Weed Control: Use a fertilizer with preemergent control in the early fall around September to prevent clover from coming up. The window of opportunity is very small for this application. If you already have clover, use the post-emergent control 'Weed Stop for Lawns', available at your local garden center in a hose-end sprayer bottle. There are several good products available: just make sure it says "for lawns".
- <u>Fertilizer</u>: Fertilize in the fall and spring with a slow release fertilizer. Always read the warning label carefully and keep fertilizer away from any plants indicated in the label. Keep in mind that organic fertilizers do not contain any weed killers. Know your square footage to purchase the proper amount and distribute in accordance with the instructions.
- <u>Brown Patch</u> is a fungal disease in the soil. There is no way to eradicate it, but you can take measures to control it. In early spring when we have cooler nights and warm muggy days, it is important not to over-irrigate. Treat brown patch with a granular or liquid fungicide to prevent the spread. You may have to treat more than once as rain is always a factor to restart the spread.

SHRUBS AND BEDS

- <u>Weed Control:</u> The most effective approach to prevent seeds from germinating is to apply a pre-emergent control and a 2 to 3-inch layer of mulch (non-colored pine bark mulch is the approved mulch in LOE). Weeds grow year round, and pre-emergent control can be applied at any time. Once you have weeds, the most effective approach is to pull the weeds, being sure to remove the root. Of course there are multiple weed killing products available.
- Pruning: Indian Hawthorne and Dwarf Yaupon are examples of common shrubs with naturally rounded forms and require minimal pruning as long as light pruning following the natural shape is performed regularly. If you have an overgrown or irregular shrub, wait until April or until after the first bloom and cut back as needed. Spring is the best time of the year to perform a severe pruning as the plant is able to recover quickly with a spring flush of new growth.
- <u>Mulching:</u> The benefit of mulch in preventing growth of weeds has already been discussed. The most important role of mulch, however, is to keep moisture in the soil. Beds should have a minimum 2-inch layer of mulch.

ANT CONTROL

There are many chemical ant treatments on the market that can be broadcast over the lawn to prevent ants from establishing a colony in your yard and can be spread over mounds to kill existing colonies. There are some organic approaches to killing ants if you prefer not to use chemicals. Perhaps the most effective of these is to place a capful of orange oil (such as Orange Guard Fire Ant Killer) on the mound.

TREES

- <u>Fertilization:</u> January and February are the best times to deep root fertilize with tree spikes or liquid feed. The easiest time to perform this task is when the soil is saturated after a rainfall. Either type of application should be made around the drip line of the tree (where the tips of the outer most branches are located). A general rule is to use 1 fertilizer spike for each inch of trunk diameter. Tree spikes from typically come in a pack of 12 or 15.
- <u>Suckers and deadwood:</u> If your trees are producing suckers along the trunk, remove them. This is a sign of stress! Limb up your trees to expose their trunk, so people can walk under them and cars can drive by without hitting them. Always remove deadwood when the trees are small by making the cut in the healthy wood above the branch that has died.

Avoiding Pesticides in Fruits and Vegetables

The Environmental Working Group (EWG), a non-profit organization specializing in research and advocacy related to public health and the environment, has released its 2011 updated "Dirty Dozen" list of the 12 fruits and vegetables containing the most pesticides. Topping this year's list? Apples. This begs the question, "Can eating an apple a day really keep the doctor away?"


The answer may lie in where you get your apples. Although the EWG's ranking was cited as an overestimate of the risk by the Alliance for Food & Farming, a non-profit organization with the stated mission of providing a voice for farmers to communicate their commitment to food safety, consuming organically grown products can reduce the amount of pesticides that enter your body. According to the World Health Organization (WHO), long-term exposure to pesticides can lead to death or serious illness, including developmental and reproductive disorders, impaired nervous system function, and certain cancers. Further, the WHO has found children to be at higher risk from exposure than adults.

However, organically grown products are typically more expensive than conventionally grown products, and some organic products may be difficult to find in some areas. If growing your own fruits and vegetables is not an option, and purchasing 100 percent of your produce in organic form is monetarily unfeasible, the EWG's list offers a good starting point for consumers.

According to the EWG's 2011 report, which is based on its analysis of tests conducted by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) and the federal Food and Drug Administration (FDA), the following 12 fruits and vegetables (the "Dirty Dozen") consistently contained the highest amount of pesticides when conventionally grown, and should be consumed in organic form when possible:

- Apples
 Celery
 Strawberries
 Peaches
 Spinach
- 6. Nectarines (imported)
- 7. Grapes (imported)8. Sweet bell peppers9. Potatoes10. Blueberries (domestic)11. Larman
- 11. Lettuce
- 12. Kale/collard greens

Alternatively, according to the EWG, the following 15 fruits and vegetables (the "Clean 15") consistently contained the least amount of pesticides, and by adhering to this list, individuals can get their recommended daily allowance of fruits and vegetables without incurring the expense of buying organic products in order to limit their exposure to pesticides:

1. Onions	6. Sweet peas
2. Sweet Corn	7. Mangoes
3. Pineapples	8. Eggplant
4. Avocado	9. Cantaloupe (domestic)
5. Asparagus	10. Kiwi

Underscoring the importance of the consumption of fruits and vegetables was the release of MyPlate, also in June, replacing the classic food pyramid. The USDA's new food icon is a simple, visual cue that advises individuals to "make half your plate fruits and vegetables," graphically shrinking the role of meats and dairy products in the national diet.

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NOTES FROM THE JUNE BOARD MEETING

DIRECTORS PRESENT

Bronson Clay, President Carlon Thorpe, Vice President Cory Hammond, Treasurer David King, Director Heather Von Sternberg, Secretary

IN ATTENDANCE

One homeowner, Paul Marks with Water Logic, and Richard Lowstetter representing the managing agent, Association Management, Inc.

HOMEOWNER FORUM

The Board met in Executive Session with the homeowner, who was appealing a Board decision requesting the removal of the artificial turf on his lawn.

FINANCIAL REPORT

Financial Statements:

The Board reviewed the financial statements for the month ending May 31, 2011. The Association had a balance of \$555,480.29 in the Operating Fund and \$416,901.95 in the Replacement Fund. The Fund Balance for the year showed that income had exceeded expenses by \$51,745.71. The financials were accepted.

Accounts Receivable:

The Board reviewed the Accounts Receivable report and instructed the managing agent to proceed with the collection of the outstanding monies in accordance with the established policy. The Accounts Receivable report was accepted. As of June 21, 2011 there were 39 homes that owed the association money.

Cash Flow Report:

The Managing Agent advised the board that as of June 21, 2011 the association had \$531.859.04 in the operating account and \$416,901.95 in the Reserve Account, giving a total of \$948,760.99.

ADMINISTRATION

Swim Team:

The Board held a lengthy discussion on the proposal made by the Swim Team to use the pool. On a motion duly made and seconded the Board voted to accept this proposal.

PHYSICAL PROPERTY

One-Liner Report:

The Board was given the one-liner report for June.

Citations Report:

The managing agent gave the Board a copy of the latest Citation Report for their review.

<u>Sprinklers:</u>

Paul Marks with Water Logic reviewed with the Board their analysis of the sprinkler system. Their report showed what rotors needed to be replaced and where electrical work needed to be done. The Board voted to allow Water Logic to repair the system at a cost of \$4,700.00. Paul Marks also reviewed with the Board their satellite controlled system. After a long question and answer Period, the Board asked Paul to make arrangements to discuss this proposal with the MUD district, and tabled any further discussion to a future meeting.

Trees:

The Board held a long discussion on the condition of the trees on HOA property. It was decided to have a tree company give a proposal for removal of all sick or dead trees, and then a decision would be made as to what to do.

Artificial Turf

The Board came out of Executive Session and voted to allow the homeowner to keep the Artificial Turf in the back yard, but to have it replaced with St Augustine grass in the front and side yards. Realizing that Houston is in a severe drought condition, the Board voted to give the homeowner until October 31, 2011 to have this completed.

ADDITIONAL BUSINESS

There was no additional business.

SCHEDULE NEXT MEETING

The next regular meeting of the Board of Directors is to be held on July 19, 2011 at 6:30p.m.
