### The Drought & LOE Landscaping

This year Texas has experienced the most severe drought in the recorded history of the state. The combination of lack of rainfall coupled with record setting temperatures in excess of 100 degrees has had a severe impact on the community's landscaping and water costs. The challenges of trying to preserve the beauty of our trees, shrubs and flowers have been numerous. The two major issues are:

Inadequate irrigation system. The initial design of the system does not provide coverage to many areas of the community, including around the lakes and to the shrubs directly in front of the brick walls. In the areas where we do have coverage, the design failed to take into consideration the eventual growth of trees impacting rotor coverage. Also the pumps that provide water to the system have experienced numerous outages. We have also struggled with piping leaks, all despite continual efforts to enhance the reliability of the system.

Cost of watering. With the temperatures soaring, we elected to water only during the evening, night and early morning hours. Watering during the day is not efficient because of severe evaporative loss. Also our water is not free. We do water out of the lakes, but evaporative loss in the lakes has been significant. In order to irrigate while maintaining the lakes at a reasonable level, we must fill the lakes from underground reservoirs. Our cost for this "pumpage" has exceeded \$10,000 per month. As of August we had overspent our annual budget for this line item by over \$30,000.

In order to address those issues while maintaining an attractive community, the Board of Directors is implementing the following actions:

Evaluating the irrigation system. We are working with the MUD district on a zone by zone review of the irrigation system. Ultimately we want to determine which areas are best kept green, and which areas may benefit from alternative landscaping ideas that require significantly less water. We will also consider implementing new irrigation technology that enables water more efficient watering, by electronically sensing air temperatures, previous rainfall and expected weather events.

This is a major undertaking and we are very conscious of the potential costs to improve our system, but new rules from the state of Texas are going to eventually demand that we use less water overall or switch to alternative sources of water that could cost several times the current charges.

Removing dead plants and trees. Over the last two years we have installed more than 250 shrubs, but due to our current irrigation system shortcomings aggravated by the severe heat and drought, we have unfortunately lost many of the plants. Rather than continue to spend community dollars we will wait to reinstall material until we have an adequate watering mechanism. Not all trees and plants will be replaced; the Landscaping Committee and LOE Board will evaluate whether replacement makes sense and prioritize within the budget.

Concentrating watering on the most visible areas. We will continue to install flowers at the entrance, major lakes, and the clubhouse. We will concentrate our watering in those areas and the current grass areas.

Implementing alternatives where grass does not grow well. In the last few years we have installed several mulch beds where the turf was not growing well. We will continue to evaluate the property for mulch and ground cover installations.

Despite the recent very welcome rains, the long term forecasts are predicting drought conditions to persist for quite a while. Should the drought indeed continue into next year or beyond, we will have as a community some tough decisions to make regarding landscaping, water use, and their impact on our costs and annual assessment Your Landscape Committee and Board of Directors are striving to maintain a beautiful community. Thank you for your patience and understanding during this challenging season.



# Timely Tips for November Gardeners

From Cornelius Nursery

Transform your landscape with the addition of fresh, colorful blooms. Pansies are by far the most popular winter color. The 'Matrix' Pansy has been outstanding for our Texas weather. It will not "stretch" during bouts of warm temperatures and is bred to grow out, not up. This compact grower offers shorter, sturdier stems to support large, colorful blooms. Dianthus (also known as "Pinks"), Snapdragons, Cyclamen, Violas and the fragrant Alyssum are also good choices for cold tolerant annuals. Ornamental Cabbage and Kale provide interesting texture in the landscape as well as color. For best effect, limit your planting to two or three colors per bed.

The key to growing beautiful annual flowers is soil preparation. Select a well drained flower bed and add plenty of organic matter. Use a Flower Bed Mix that contains compost plus a boost of fertilizer, water-management crystals and a wetting agent. Adding a good Flower Food to the soil at the time of planting will provide the extra nutrients for growth and blooms. Remember to add 2 to 3 inches of mulch to all beds to reduce moisture loss, prevent weeds from germinating and to insulate the soil from the cold.

These same annuals can be used in patio containers. Fill your containers with fresh potting soil and plant food. Keep them watered as necessary and remove faded flowers to encourage repeat blooming.

Drop by any of our garden centers and visit with a Texas Certified Nursery Professional. These individuals are experts in their field and continuously receive training to keep their certification current. Or, email The PlantMaster with questions at www.calloways.com/plantmaster.

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### NOTES FROM THE SEPTEMBER BOARD MEETING

### DIRECTORS PRESENT

### IN ATTENDANCE

### HOMEOWNER FORUM

Two homeowners attended the homeowner forum and addressed the Board of Directors regarding the following issues:

### ISSUE 1: Ongoing problems with gates

Board responded by stating that the first priority is to get the gates in proper working order and once this is achieved then the cosmetic aspects would be addressed. Stated that new system has just been placed on Ginger Pond Entrance

### ISSUE 2: Concerns about drought and recommendations for saving water

Board stated that Architectural Review Committee is currently reviewing restrictions and will be amending some of the current guidelines.

### ISSUE 3: Maintenance of pool area

Board stated that association spends approximately 4-6K annually on furniture replacement. Stated that swim team contributes to wear and tear and future funding may be requested from the team to supplement replacement cost.

### **ISSUE 4: Speeding** throughout the property

Board stated that security patrol has assisted in deterring speeding however repeat offenders continue to violate and receive citations.

### **ISSUE 5: Cell Phone Tower** at Kirk Elementary

R. Lowstetter stated that Lakes on Eldridge has been unsuccessful in negotiating removal of cell tower.

### **COMMITTEE REPORTS**

Due to time constraints, committee reports were not discussed at the Sept. meeting.

### FINANCIAL REPORT

### **Financial Statements:**

The Board reviewed the financial statements for the month ending August 31, 2011. The Association had a balance of \$318,492.72 in the Operating Fund and \$396,723.15 in the Replacement Fund. The Fund Balance for the year showed that income had exceeded expenses by \$21,279.98. The financials were accepted.

### Accounts Receivable:

The Accounts Receivable Report for the month ending August 31, 2011 indicates a total delinquency balance of \$ 47,854.39 which decreased by approximately \$ 5,400.00 from the month of July 2011. R. Lowstetter also provided the Board of Directors with an attorney collection status report dated September 15, 2011. The Accounts Receivable Report was accepted.

### **Cash Flow Report**

The Managing Agent advised the board that as of September 19, 2011 the association had \$255,622.66 in the operating account and \$396,723.15 in the Reserve Account, giving a total of \$652,345.81.

### **ADMINISTRATION**

### 2012 Budget

On a motion duly made, the Board approved the 2012 Budget for Lakes on Eldridge prepared by R. Lowstetter. The approved budget leaves the assessment at the current rate of \$ 1,360.00.

### **Annual Meeting**

Board of Directors requested that managing agent prepare power point presentation for 2011 Annual Meeting. Gate issues should be mentioned in detail so that membership has an understanding of the obstacles faced by the board over the last several months as they have been working to rectify the ongoing problems.

### Water Usage

The Board reviewed the water usage report provided by the West Harris County Regional Water Authority; the usage and cost in August 2011 has almost tripled from 2010.

### **Artificial Turf**

This item was tabled for future discussion.

### Maintenance

On a motion duly made, the Board approved the sanding and painting of the wrought iron fence and gate.

### The following requests were made by the Board regarding maintenance related items:

- Estimate on curb repairs throughout the community
- · Quote for annual filter at clubhouse (size 12x36)
- Cost to replace entire table in clubhouse versus replacing broken glass table top
- Follow up with Slater regarding price quote of \$ 600.00 as Board believes this is a misprint; verbal quote given by Slater was \$ 10.00/per foot
- Cost for cutting down all dead trees within the common areas

### Miscellaneous

C. Thorpe indicated that she has been in communication with an independent consultant who is troubleshooting the current irrigation system.

The Board was given the one-liner report for September showing a total of 92 open service requests.

### Citations Report

The managing agent gave the Board a copy of the latest Citation Report for their review. The report indicates (38) citations were issued between August 23rd and September 19th.



# HEALTH BRIEFS NOVEMBER

### POSTMENOPAUSAL BLEEDING COULD BE SIGN OF ENDOMETRIAL CANCER

After a woman goes through menopause, it is not normal for her to start bleeding again, said a gynecologic oncologist at Baylor College of Medicine. Most postmenopausal bleeding is caused by the thinning of the cervix; however, in some cases bleeding is a sign of endometrial cancer and should not be ignored, said Dr. Concepcion R. Diaz-Arrastia, professor of obstetrics and gynecology at BCM. When caught in the early stages, endometrial cancer can be cured, Diaz-Arrastia said. However, there are few symptoms and no screening methods and often isn't found until later stages. That's why it is so important for women to be conscious of things that may be associated with the disease, like bleeding.

Endometrial cancer is the most common uterine cancer. It occurs in the endometrium or the lining of the uterus. More than 40,000 women are diagnosed with endometrial cancer every year in the United States. Women who are obese and/or have a history of irregular menstrual cycles have an increased chance of developing endometrial cancer, Diaz-Arrastia said. If you notice postmenopausal bleeding, contact your gynecologist and set up an appointment as soon as possible.

### **SYMPTOMS POINT TO DIABETES**

Maintaining a healthy weight, eating a low-fat diet and exercising regularly can help prevent the onset of diabetes and the many side affects of the disease, according to doctors at Baylor College of Medicine. Those with a higher risk of diabetes should also have their blood glucose levels screened regularly.

### **RISK FACTORS FOR DIABETES INCLUDE:**

- Obesity
- Sedentary lifestyle
- Unhealthy eating habits
- Family history and genetics
- Increased age
- High blood pressure and high cholesterol

A fasting glucose level of 70 to 100 mg/dL is considered normal, 100-125 mg/dL is considered pre-diabetes condition and 126 mg/dL or above indicates type 2 diabetes.

### **SYMPTOMS OF DIABETES INCLUDE:**

- Frequent urination
- Excessive thirst
- Increased hunger
- Weight loss
- Fatigue
- Lack of interest and concentration
- Blurred vision
- Vomiting and stomach pain


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### **Bunco Junkies**



### TAKING CONTROL OF YOUR DIABETES

### **IMPROVING SELF-MANAGEMENT**
