Timely Tips for April Gardeners

Swans Can Be Dangerous!

This time of the year, Mother Nature provides our LOE swans with some common sense. It is for them mating, nesting, then egglaying season, and they feel the need to protect their territory against predators including humans, dogs, and other waterfowl. Most of the swans in our neighborhood are not old enough to mate but some will go through the motions of even building a nest. The pairs of swans that are old enough to produce young (cygnets) are normally gentle and can be fed while posing no threat. However, the males (cobs) will become aggressive and territorial in trying to protect their mate and their nest. This is usually temporary until mating season is over. If you are walking past a lake and a swan swims to your side and follows you, BEWARE! If you see a swan with his neck back and feathers up such as the one in the picture, please do not attempt to feed him but stay away. In fact, walk to the other side of the street as he is in ATTACK position! Please warn your nannies and sitters not to stroll babies around the swans. We must try to remember that the swans are protecting their territory and readying it for their young. To antagonize, tease, throw objects at, or injure the swans is a felony and we need to be as cautious of them as they are to us. Thank you for your cooperation!



LOE Residents are World Class Sport Fishing Celebrities

Jerry and Deborah Dunaway, 12 year residents of LOE, are known worldwide for their accomplishments in deep sea fishing and, in particular, catching world records for "Big Fish" on light and ultralight fishing tackle. All of their world records were awarded to them by the International Game Fish Association.

From 1985 through 2001, the Dunaways visited 18 different countries in their quest for world record fish. During that time frame they captured 48 world records: 18 for Jerry and an amazing 30 for Deborah. Most of these record catches were for Marlin, Sailfish and Swordfish – some of the largest fish in the oceans. Their record catches were made on Jerry's 48 ft. sport fishing yacht and for their home away from home, Jerry also owned a 110 ft. mother ship. The mother ship stocked up to 6 months in food and provisions and 48,000 gallons of diesel. This combination allowed visits to very remote locations.

Over 55 feature articles about the Dunaways have been published in various fishing and boating magazines and in 2005, each received IGFA World Record Lifetime Achievement awards. In 2006, Jerry and Deborah were both inducted into the Texas Salt Water Fishing Hall of Fame.

The IGFA has a very special club known as the "Billfish Royal Slam Club". This club is for any angler/fisherman that catches all nine species of billfish in the oceans. These species are Atlantic and Pacific



Sailfish, Atlantic and Pacific Blue Marlin, Black Marlin, White Marlin, Striped Marlin, Swordfish and Spearfish. At present, only 23 anglers have qualified for this special club. Deborah is one of these anglers, but with a very special difference: She is the "only person in the world" to catch a world record in every one of the 9 species!

UPCOMING MEETINGS

March 26 - Year of Wonders by Geraldine Brooks

This has been a national best seller and NY Times and Washington Post Notable Book. It tells the story of one small village in England dealing with the plague. When an infected bolt of cloth carries plague from London to an isolated village, a housemaid named Anna Frith emerges as an unlikely heroine and healer. Through Anna's eyes we follow the story of the fateful year of 1666, as she and her fellow villagers confront the spread of disease and superstition.

April 23 - Up Country by Nelson DeMille

The last thing Paul Brenner wanted to do was return to work for the Army's Criminal Investigative Division, an organization that thanked him for his many years of dedicated service by forcing him into early retirement. But when his former boss calls in a career's worth of favors, Paul finds himself investigating a murder that took place back in Vietnam thirty years before. Now, returning to a time and place that still haunts him, Paul is swept up in the battle of his life as he struggles to find justice.

May 23 - The Cat's Table by Michael Ondaatje

In Ondaatje's best novel since his Booker Prize—winning The English Patient, this richly charactered new novel begins at "the cat's table" of the Oronsay, where 11-year narrator Michael and his divorced mother share meals and the company of others as they journey from Sri Lanka to England. As the ship cuts its path on the high seas, young Michael and his youthful mealtime friends plot freewheeling adventures onboard. In quieter moments, he seeks the counsel and company of his warm-hearted older cousin Emily. Only later, when he jolts forward into adulthood do all the implications of this adolescent journey play out on his personality.

June 25 - A Tale of Two Cities by Charles Dickens

We celebrate the 200th birthday of Charles Dickens by adding a classic to our reading list. Perhaps one of Dickens' best novels, the book is set in London and Paris before and during the French Revolution. The novel depicts the plight of the French peasantry demoralized by the French aristocracy in the years leading up to the revolution, the corresponding brutality demonstrated by the revolutionaries toward the former aristocrats in the early years of the revolution, and many unflattering social parallels with life in London during the same time period.

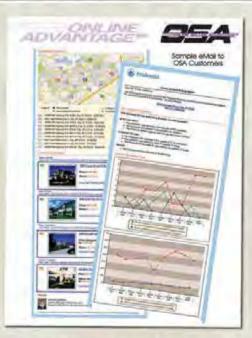

The track project at Adam has been in the works for eight years, but had stalled due to lack of funding.

Travel the World without Leaving Your Hometown by Hosting a Foreign Exchange Student

Who hasn't dreamed about walking among the Egyptian pyramids, or soaking in the sun on a beach in Spain, or wandering along the Great Wall of China? Every parent wants to give their children a taste of the world, but the economic reality of international air travel for a family, not to mention hotels, passports and food, makes it tough for most of us to consider except in our daydreams. There is a way to give your children the world – without leaving your living room. How? Host a foreign exchange student from a country you've always admired! Fascinated by France? Curious about China? Intrigued by India? By welcoming an international student from one of these countries into your home, you instantly open a portal to a far off land.

Foreign exchange students come from all over the world. Ayusa matches host families with students from more than 60 different countries including Argentina, China, Ecuador, Egypt, France, Germany, Japan, Lebanon, Norway, Pakistan, Sweden, Thailand, Tunisia and Turkey. All high school foreign exchange students are fully insured, bring their own spending money, and are proficient in English – and all high school exchange programs are regulated by the U.S. Department of State. Volunteer host families provide foreign exchange students a nurturing environment, three meals a day and a bedroom (either private or shared with a host sibling of the same gender). Each host family and student is supported by a professionally trained community representative who works with the family and student for the entire program. All interested host families must pass a criminal background check and a home visit by an exchange organization.

Interested host families are required to fill out an application, pass a background check and interview with a local exchange program representative in their homes. Once accepted to a program, host families can view profiles of students to find the right match for their family. Ayusa is currently accepting applications for families to host an exchange student for the [20XX-20XX] school year. 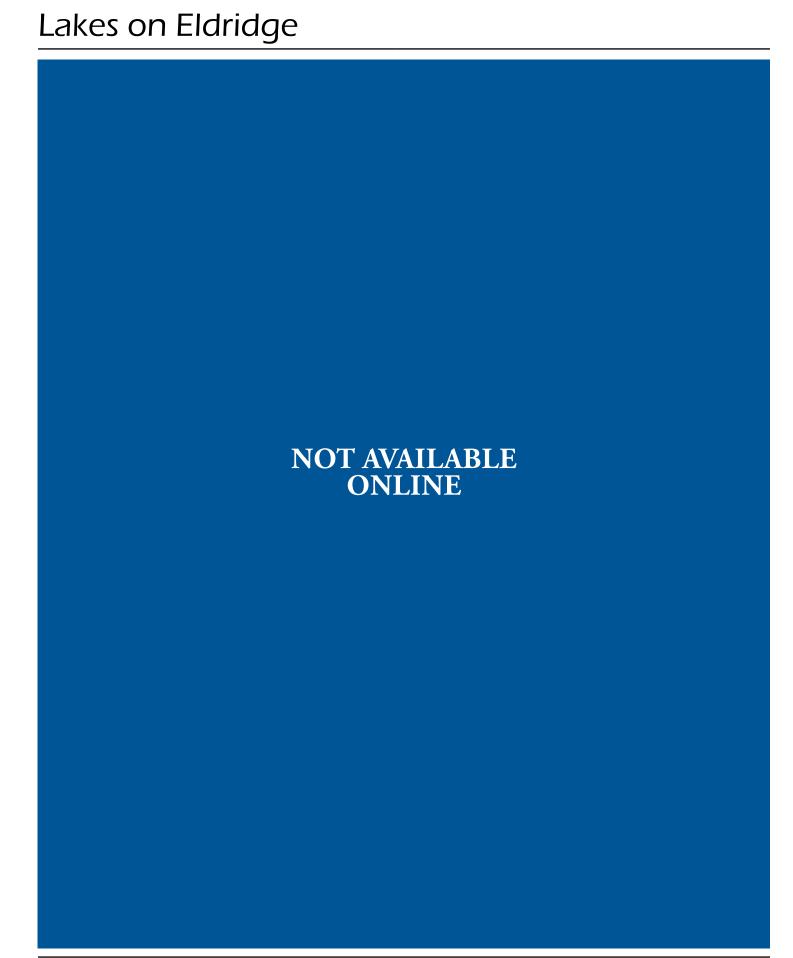

Tips for a Diet that promotes Healthy Teeth

Of course we all know that a healthy diet is good for our bodies, but did you know that what you eat affects your teeth as well? Here is a list of simple ways you can improve your oral health by paying close attention to your diet. Brushing and flossing are vital to keeping your teeth healthy, but what you eat and drink in between your daily cleaning rituals also plays an important role in your oral health.

Plaque – an invisible, sticky layer of bacteria – regularly coats your teeth. When the starches and sugars present in many foods come into contact with this bacteria, acid is produced. This acid breaks down the enamel that protects the outside of your teeth, and over time can cause tooth decay. If you choose your foods wisely, you can decrease the amount of acid that attacks your teeth. Here are some diet tips for keeping your teeth healthy:

Limit foods and drinks that are high in sugar, like cookies, candies and sodas — remember even unsweetened fruit juices are high in sugar. Read packaging labels to find out how much sugar is included, and make educated choices in the products you purchase. Limit dried fruits, which are sticky and cling to the teeth — instead, eat fresh fruit, especially apples, which serve as natural tooth cleaners.

Avoid snacks between meals – but if you must snack, replace sugary treats with crackers, cheese, yogurt, nuts, and celery or carrot sticks, which produce less acid. If you do drink sugary liquids (soda, sports drinks, juices), **avoid sipping slowly** over a long period of time as this extends the period that acid attacks your teeth.

If you're a regular coffee or tea drinker, **reduce or eliminate added sugar**. If your children snack at school, be sure they have **access to healthy snacks** (veggies, fresh fruits, cheese) instead of packaged foods that are high in sugar. If you occasionally treat yourself to a sugary snack, **brush your teeth afterwards** to reduce the acid effect – if you aren't near a toothbrush, **rinse with water or chew a piece of sugarless gum** to stimulate saliva, which helps clean your teeth.

Your diet also affects your overall health, which helps determine how well your body can fight off infection. If you aren't getting certain nutrients, the tissues in your mouth may not be as resistant, leaving you more prone to periodontal (gum) disease.

Early Packing List: When to Get Travel Vaccinations

PLANNING AHEAD IS THE KEY TO SAFE, HEALTHY GLOBE-TROTTING

There are just a few days to go before your big trip overseas. You've triple checked your itinerary, memorized important maps, and maybe even practiced speaking a bit of the local language. But unless you have taken the proper vaccination measures well in advance, your health may be at risk.

One of the most overlooked to-dos on a busy pre-travel itinerary checklist is the need to get vaccines and other medical preparations taken care of weeks, sometimes even months, before a trip, says Laura Guerrero, M.D., an internal medicine physician and medical director of the Travel Clinic at The Austin Diagnostic Clinic (ADC).

"Depending on where in the world you are going, you may be exposed to diseases and other pathogens that your body just hasn't had to cope with here in the United States. Often, vaccines are the best preventative measure to protect your health," says Dr. Guerrero. "But what people sometimes forget is that many vaccines have to be taken over an extended period of time before they can effectively prevent an illness."

ROUTINE, RECOMMENDED, & REQUIRED VACCINATIONS

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) divides travel vaccines into three categories: routine, recommended, and required. Dr. Guerrero says the number and type of vaccines you should receive will vary depending on what part of the world you are traveling to.

"Your particular vaccination and health needs can be as different as the Amazon jungle is to the Sahara desert," says Dr. Guerrero. "The only way to know what vaccinations are recommended for you is by consulting with your doctor at least one month before you plan on traveling abroad."



THE RIGHT VACCINE AT THE RIGHT TIME

Routine vaccinations are designed to protect you from diseases that rarely occur in the United States, but are still common in many parts of the world. According to the CDC, routine vaccinations should be administered for things such as influenza, tetanus, hepatitis A and B, measles, chickenpox, and zoster (shingles).

Exactly what routine vaccinations travelers should get will also depend mainly on your age and gender. And if you are traveling with children, they will likely require different vaccinations than an adult. Infants may need to have their vaccines administered over a period of several days or weeks, explains Dr. Guerrero. Recommended vaccinations will also depend on where you are traveling. The CDC lists vaccine information about specific destinations around the world on its website, http://wwwnc.cdc.gov/travel/destinations/list.htm. The site includes detailed health information about specific countries.

"We will update your shot record so we know what vaccines you should be receiving," says Dr. Guerrero. "And we will also counsel you about what diseases may be present in your destination, and how you can avoid exposure." As far as required vaccinations go, international health regulations currently only require a vaccination for yellow fever for travelers visiting certain countries in sub-Saharan Africa and tropical South America. Meningococcal vaccination is also required by the government of Saudi Arabia for annual travel during the Hajj—the term for the annual pilgrimage to Mecca, Saudi Arabia, which occurs sometime between November and January.

"Even if you do not get your travel vaccines in time, it's always a good idea to see your doctor before you travel abroad because you can still benefit from medications and other information about how to protect yourself from illness and injury while on vacation in another country," adds Dr. Guerrero.

HEALTHY TIPS WHILE ABROAD

Once you have followed the vaccination schedule exactly, there are many other health considerations to take into account, Dr. Guerrero says. If you are taking prescription medications, for example, make sure you bring enough to last your entire trip and that you keep them stowed in their original containers. It's also a good idea to bring medicine for diarrhea, and to be cautious about drinking from local water supplies or eating things like raw seafood or other uncooked items.

"Part of ensuring a memorable travel experience abroad is making sure you are prepared for any potential health situations," explains Dr. Guerrero. "For example, if you have a preexisting health condition, it's always a good idea to know what your emergency care options are if something were to happen abroad. By taking the proper health planning measures, your trip of a lifetime can be filled with good memories instead of bad ones."



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RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Carrots au Gratin

Ingredients

- 2 lbs. carrot, sliced
- 1/8 tsp. pepper
- ½ Cup chopped onions
- 1½ C milk
- 1/4 Cup oleo, divided
- 4 oz. processed
- 3 T. flour
- American cheese, cubed
- ½ tsp. salt
- 1 T. dried parsley

Cook carrots until tender crisp. Drain. In saucepan saute onions in 3 T butter. Stir in flour, salt, & pepper. Gradually add milk and bring to boil. Cook for 1 minute or until thickened. Stir in cheese until melted. Add carrots and parsley. Pour in greased 2 quart baking dish. Melt remaining butter and pour over carrots. Bake at 350° 20-25 minutes or until bubbly. (8-10 servings)
