# Ryan Lew Initiates Firewise Project at Perry Park

After the long dry summer of 2011, Ryan Lew decided there was an opportunity to help his community by kick starting a Firewise program as part of his Boy Scout Eagle service project. Firewise (www.firewise. org) is a program supported by the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), the USDA Forest Service, the US Department of the Interior, and the National Association of State Foresters. The program encourages community involvement to protect people and property from wildfire and teaches us how to adapt to living with fire risks and drought conditions by working together and taking action now to prevent losses. It is important to remember that everyone in the

community service day on January 21 at Perry Park. He organized volunteers from the neighborhood and Boy Scout Troop 49, directed the activities to clear 'dead and down' brush and trees that could be a fuel source for wild fires, and managed the overall project (established the work day schedule, assigned tasks, communicated needed supplies, tools, protective clothing, and safety procedures, and clean up). Fox News 7 was on site to report on the Firewise efforts and interviewed Lt. Portie and Ryan. West Austin News was also there to provide coverage for their Jan 26 issue.

A total of 29 volunteers contributed 128 hours of work for this service project

community has a role to play in reducing the risk of wildfire.

To kick-start his project, Ryan contacted Lt. Josh Portie (Austin Fire Department), Park Ranger Michael Sledd (Austin Parks and Recreation Dept.) and Juliee Beyt (Friends of Perry Park) to propose his service project and to get an assessment of what needed to be done. This resulted in creating neighborhood awareness in Firewise and leading a and provided follow up to previous HPWBANA and Beverly Hood neighborhood discussions with the Austin Fire Department to make our homes and the area safer from the impact of wildfires. Thanks in part to Ryan's efforts, there are on-going activities with AFD and HPWBANA to continue progress in establishing Firewise communities in the Beverly Hood and Perry Park neighborhoods.

## Highland Park West Balcones Area West Point Society Gains PARD Support For Mt Bonnell Improvements

The West Point Society of Central Texas has announced major progress in their continuing efforts to gain city approval for the renovation and enhancement of visitor amenities atop Mount Bonnell. West Point graduate Stan Bacon, Project Manager, says the proposal to replace the nearly demolished Frank Covert, Sr. limestone marker with a permanent granite one and make improvements to the surrounding landscaping on the peak's summit has finally won the endorsement of Sara Hensley, Director of the Austin Parks and Recreation Department. According to Bacon, "We made our initial proposal to PARD in January 2011, with a \$100K+ plan built on a generous gift from the Covert family and an anticipated grant from the Austin Parks Foundation." Getting approval from the department proved to be quite a challenge. As Bacon explained, "Since Mount Bonnell is officially classified as a historic site, PARD referred the proposal to the city's Historic Landmark Commission. We presented the plan to an informal review by the Commission's Certificate of Appropriateness Committee in November - and ran into a buzz saw!"

The Chair of the Committee, Laurie Limbacher, who is also the Chair of the Landmark Commission, had major objections to the plan. She took the position that the fragile and nearly demolished limestone marker should be restored and remain in place, and that no changes should be made to the landscaping around the marker. "She called it 'historic creep'" said Bacon, "so with the support of former Mayor Bruce Todd we took the

matter to Mayor Leffingwell, who applauded our proposal to use private funds to improve the park, and endorsed our plan to install a permanent granite replica of the original marker with enhanced landscaping around the marker. We also met with Council Member Chris Riley, who had appointed Ms. Limbacher, and explained that without a granite marker there would be no funding for the project."

Last month Jason Andrus of O'Connell Robertson and Fred Bothwell, of the West Point Society met with PARD to finish hammering out the details on a simplified landscape design, subsequently approved by PARD Director Sara Hensley. The existing large garden wall will be lowered to eliminate the need for additional steps, distinctive stone will be used for the dais surfacing and steps, and two long limestone benches will stretch between the pillars at the far edge of the garden. Hand rails will be placed on the outside edges of the flanking steps.

The next step in the process is for PARD to present the plan to the Certificate of Appropriateness Committee for formal approval. The COA Committee will meet July 16, 2012 at 4:00pm in Room 500 at One Texas Center, 505 Barton Springs Road. The public is invited to attend this meeting to demonstrate support for this generous gift to the people of Austin and visitors to Mount Bonnell.
