# SPLINTERS FROM THE BOARD - AUGUST, 2012

Renovation is once again the theme of this article in that this seems like it has taken forever but there is a lot of skilled craft work being done and this will look great when completed.

We had a few kinks and it's all getting worked out, everyone came out and flagged the utilities with the exception of AT&T so when they were pulling electrical wires they cut phone lines to 700 homes in the neighborhood which were promptly repaired.

Next we had the sign on N. Eldridge side put in incorrectly by our vendor and we decided on taking advantage of the error to relocate the sign to where the original sign was and it will face into the neighborhood and not N. Eldridge which is where it was mistakenly placed.

The weather has been hot in June and I wouldn't want to work labor in that heat but the guys did their job well but I'm sure that had to slow them down a bit. Now in July it has rained (no complaints from me as I recall last year's draught) and that has served to slow us down as well. The signs were covered in plastic since the July 4th holiday to help keep the plaster dry and ready for sandblasting our name on it. Hopefully, by the time you read this it will have been done. Then we will place the 'W' on the top square, lights are in and done!

As stated in last month's article we will be adding and upgrading all of our 'greenery' with new bushes, flowers and all that entails to include trees in front of the bridges so they will be concealed. The spot on Wortham Blvd at Azalea Creek that so many have complained about due to the sight obstruction of oncoming traffic will be trimmed down to solve this problem with the sign having been removed as well. Plus all of the trees will be professionally trimmed in the fall as that is what is recommended to us by the folks who do this work.

We have teamed with our friends in the M.U.D. to plant shrubs around the hike/bike trail and along the fence lines as you enter our portion of the neighborhood (when you cross the bridge) to hide the fences. We also put in a fence alongside the new structure to cover the utilities on the right side to keep this consistent look. We are having to do work in front of our clubhouse with standing water and raised sidewalks to drain and repair as necessary and spruce that up a bit as well.

You can see the double sided sign on Wortham finished with the plant bed being put in front of it and the sign is now 'hot' but we want to finish both signs and have the manufacturer of the signs agree that we're ready to go and then we will have the necessary program installed on two computers we purchased and train our folks and then get the signs going.

Another thing we're doing is to have M.U.D. along with us to look at our sidewalks as many are raised or dropped and this can happen in several situations being water leaks, more commonly tree roots, etc. The rule is that the homeowner is responsible for their sidewalks on their property so our first step is to try to determine what is going on. Once we get a

handle on what is causing so many sidewalks to 'move' I will advise in a future newsletter.

Folks have asked me from time

to time about deed restrictions and past due fees on the homeowner's dues. We treat everyone the same and we have planned notices and letters to inform the homeowner of a past due fee or deed restriction. We send a series of letters with the 3rd notice the most serious where we have to send to an attorney for collection or correction depending on the situation. We hate to do any of this but this is an agreement we have with our management company, Crest Management and the purpose is consistency and to treat each and every homeowner the same way. I do know that once we use an attorney the fees mount up quickly and the dollar amounts change drastically so I urge everyone to correct whatever it is to avoid that situation. We have a great community and are very fortunate to keep this to a minimum as compared to other communities but you are all our neighbors and friends! A function of a management company is to be the liaison between homeowners and board members. All of this is designed to protect all homeowners and just as a reminder, all of the board members are also your neighbors, we all live in Wortham!



### **Immunizations: Not Just for Kids**

Although most toddlers in the United States have received all recommended vaccines, many adults and adolescents have not. These missed vaccinations increase their risk for infection, hospitalization, death, and disease spread, and they contribute to the estimated \$10 billion that is spent annually on vaccine preventable diseases in the United States.

Evidence shows that currently approved vaccines are safe and effective. However, coverage rates for persons of all ages vary nationwide. Reasons cited include lack of health insurance, unfamiliarity with vaccine recommendations, limited access at physicians' offices, or the perceived cost of vaccines.

What you need to know is that obtaining recommended vaccines in a timely manner can prevent disease. The Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) recommends the immunization schedule to the right for generally healthy adults and adolescents.

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### **IMMUNIZATION SCHEDULE RECOMMENDATIONS**

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MENINGOCOCCAL:

One dose, age 11-12 or 13-18 if not previously immunized

TETANUS-DIPHTHERIA/TETANUS

One dose, age 11-12, then booster

**DIPHTHERIA-PERTUSSIS:** every 10 years

HUMAN PAPILLOMA VIRUS

Three doses, age 11-26 (females only):

MEASLES - MUMPS - RUBELLA:

If born after 1956, one or two doses if never immunized up to age 65

PNEUMOCOCCAL:

One dose, at or after age 65

VARICELLA (CHICKEN POX):

Two doses if no prior infection orimmunization received

**Z**OSTER (SHINGLES):

One dose, at or after age 60



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
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
