### Lakes On Eldridge Annual Meeting

On November 7th, the Annual Meeting of the Lakes on Eldridge Homeowner Association was held at Kirk Elementary. Carlon Thorpe, President of the HOA, opened the meeting with a discussion of the 2012 achievements. Below is the list of discussed accomplishments.

- Re- plastered Pool and installed new coping
- Hired irrigation consultant and made extensive modifications to the irrigation system including the installation of 8200 feet of drip line
- Installed new technology (cycle stops) on our main irrigation pumps to improve reliability
- Installed 247 new holly bushes along perimeter walls
- Purchased new furniture for the pool area
- Extensively modified restroom plumbing at the pool and redecorated the restroom areas
- Trimmed all trees along major boulevards and entrances
- Modified gate controllers for higher reliability and durability
- Repaired street and curb damages
- Implemented all new state regulations for homeowner associations implemented by last legislative session including open board meetings
- Adopted new rules for the staining of fencing and installation of wrought iron fences
- Implemented new procedures for use of common area amenities including the pool and tennis courts
- Improved communication with residents. Held 1st ever Town Hall. Expanded use of Email Blasts for communication to residents

Also discussed was the effect of this work on home values. LOE has seen a significant increase in demand and resale values in the last year. In 2011 Days on Market were 61; in 2012 DOM are 49 – almost a 20% reduction. Average home prices have increased over 8% since 2011 to an average of \$116.17/sq. foot. There is also a high rental demand in the community; currently approximately 58 homes are rented. Rental values are up over 9% since 2011 to an average of \$1.19/sq. foot/month.

Carlon Thorpe also recognized the numerous volunteers who serve on a committee or chair an activity within the community.

Bob Wegner gave an access control report. He and his committee analyzed crime statistics for the previous 5 years, investigated other HOA systems and presented the following summary conclusions:

- We are safer than surrounding, un-gated neighborhoods
- An apparent crime trend downturn occurred in 2010, possibly associated with new Guard Patrol implementation
- Juveniles are perhaps a major contributor to crime since crime spikes during summer months and December
- Tailgating is not a likely crime diagnostic
- We should distinguish between crime types when discussing enhancements:
- Gates and guards address crime by outsiders
- Guard patrols address crimes of opportunity and juveniles

The residents were reminded that they can plan a big role in crime prevention by displaying an LOE window sticker and by locking their home and car. A neighborhood watch program was also discussed and any resident desiring to participate should contact AMI. Bob, Carl and Eric were recognized for their outstanding work in developing this information.

The financial status of the Association was also reviewed. The association is over \$8,000 under budget as of September 2012 and has collected over 98% of outstanding assessments. The 2013 Assessment will increase by \$100 to \$1460. That is the first increase in 3 years and is necessary for the following reasons:

- Fund the Reserve \$130,000 in 2013 to bring it to mid-range of the Reserve Study recommendations. Over \$150,000 was spent in 2012 in capital improvements.
- Add additional patrols in the summer months and December to address higher incidents of crime and vandalism.
- Address Inflationary pressures in major contracts such as landscaping.
- Pay for the 14% increase in pumpage fees associated with water.

An election was held to fill the open position on the Board. Douglas Ray was elected by a majority. The Board recognized and thanked David King for his service to the Board the last 5 years.



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### Think twice before you buy that puppy for Christmas...

First of all, are you really sure you want that puppy, or are you just giving into your child's pleas? Keep in mind that kids will always promise to take care of the dog, but very few keep that promise. That means that you will most likely end up as the main caregiver for the dog. If you are not prepared for that, you should probably consider a pet that will be easier to care for, for example a hamster.

Never give a dog as a gift to someone unless you are absolutely certain that person wants it and knows what is involved in having a dog!

If you are absolutely certain you want a dog, and feel that Christmas is a great time to bring the dog into the family, there are some things you should do first. If you have little or no experience with dogs,

do lots of research, to make sure you know what you're getting into. Decide where you want to get the puppy. Avoid pet stores; good places are shelters and breeders. Or maybe you know someone whose dog has had a litter and they are looking for homes (though don't get purebreds this way). Know what you are looking for in a dog before you choose. With mixed breeds, it can be difficult to tell how big they will grow up to be, especially if the breed of the father is unknown. The feet are a good indicator of how big the puppy will get: big feet equals big dog.

Before you adopt, have you considered what you will feed the dog? Can you afford to feed the puppy a good quality food? If not, forget it. If you

can't afford to feed the dog properly, how will you pay the vet bills? You don't have to buy the dog food from your veterinarian to provide a proper diet. Just research what should be in a dog food, and remember that a higher price does not always indicate a higher quality. Look at the ingredients: you want to see a named meat source (i.e., "chicken meal" rather than "animal meal") as the first ingredient. You will also feed less of the high quality food since there is less filler, so the price evens out quite nicely in the end. There is also less clean up this way!

Research what you should expect to pay in vet bills over the first year. It might scare you. Puppies need at least two rounds of shots, and your pet will have to be spayed or neutered. The prices for these procedures can vary greatly among veterinarians, so research different ones first. It's a good idea to have a vet in mind before you get the puppy. After the first year, vet bills aren't so scary, at about \$50/ year for shots (which also can vary a lot). Consider though that it is possible that your dog could have a health problem that requires a lot of medical attention (more likely when you get your puppy from questionable sources). Are you prepared to pay for this?

What will you do when the puppy pees on the floor? When he chews your best shoes? When he keeps biting your fingers? How will you prevent him from developing behavior problems? Do you know what it means to socialize the dog, and are you prepared to do it? Again, do research: start with a good book, such as "Good Owners, Great Dogs".

So, you've done all your research, and you're ready for a puppy and prepared for a long commitment. And you want to get someone you love a puppy for Christmas. That might sound like a great idea,

> but it's not, and here's why: think about how hectic you are during Christmas. Are you sure that's the best time to introduce a puppy that will need a lot of attention, and most likely will not yet be housebroken? Incidentally, this is why many shelters will not adopt out pets right before Christmas. If you absolutely must give a dog as a Christmas gift, try this instead. After you have made the arrangements to adopt the puppy, buy the crate, the dishes, the collar, and anything else your puppy will need and wrap it up and put it under the Christmas tree. When your kid(s) open it up and wonder where the puppy is, explain to them that right now is not the best time for the puppy to come into the house, but once things settle down a bit they can go with you

to pick the puppy up. What a great lesson in responsibility for your kids! Don't worry about the puppy not being held for you: anyone who is responsible will be delighted that you are holding off until you are ready. Shelters and breeders may even insist on it. If the person you are getting the puppy from insists that you take him right away, reconsider adopting from that person.

A dog is a lifetime commitment, and you owe it to your pet to be prepared for whatever problems may come up. If you raise your puppy properly, he will bring you years of enjoyment, and may even be the best gift you ever give someone. If you don't, it can be a huge mistake, you may have to give the dog away or have the dog put down: is that really a lesson you want to teach your kids?






### **Book Club**



December 3 - The Silent Girl by Tess Gerritson. This is one of the more recent Rizzoli & Isles mysteries by author Tess Gerritson. In the murky shadows of Boston's Chinatown lies a severed hand.
