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#### **Bee Cave Public Library to** Host Writers' Workshop

Bee Cave Public Library is one of five libraries invited to participate in the Texas Writes grant by hosting a workshop featuring published authors speaking and teaching on topics of interest to new writers. On Saturday, February 16 from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m., Texas Writes at Bee Cave will feature authors Suzy Spencer, Joe Nick Patoski, and Carol Dawson each speaking for an hour, and meeting with attendees to answer questions or offer critique. The event is sponsored by the Writers' League of Texas, and funded by the Tocker Foundation. Registration for a ten-minute session with an author will be available on a first-come, first-served basis at the event.

Suzy Spencer is the author of four true crime books – Wasted, which was a New York Times bestseller and Violet Crown Award finalist; Wages of Sin, which will be featured in the 2013 season of Investigation Discovery's Deadly Sins; Breaking Point, the story of Houston mother Andrea Yates, which was a Book of the Month Club, Doubleday Book Club, Literary Guild, and Mystery Guild selection; and The Fortune Hunter, which was called "riveting" and "blockbuster" by Globe magazine.

Joe Nick Patoski is in his fourth decade writing about Texas and Texans. He has authored and co-authored biographies of Selena and Stevie Ray Vaughan. His 2008 book Willie Nelson: An Epic Life, published by Little, Brown, was recognized by The Friends of the TCU Library in 2009 with the Texas Book Award for the best book about Texas written in 2007-8. His most recent book for Little, Brown is The Dallas Cowboys: The Outrageous History of the Biggest, Loudest, Most Hated, Best Loved Football Team in America.

Carol Dawson is the novelist and nonfiction author of The Waking Spell, Body of Knowledge, Meeting the Minotaur, The Mother-in-Law Diaries, and House of Plenty: The Rise, Fall, and Revival of Luby's Cafeterias. Carol has taught a number of different aspects of writing, both in fiction and in non-fiction, including self-editing, novel and story development, voice, dialogue and character development.

"We were delighted to be asked to host a Texas Writes session," stated Library Director Barbara Hathaway. "There are many new and accomplished writers in our community, as evidenced by the popularity of the newly-formed Lake Travis Fiction Writers, an informal support group established by writer Pat Dunlap Evans last year that is sponsored by the library and will be helping with the event. We welcome anyone interested in writing to come out and take advantage of the opportunity to hear these authors speak." According to Ben Rodriguez, a board member of the Writers' League of Texas and coordinator for the Texas Writes grant, the group hopes to expand the program to more libraries throughout Texas with the support of Tocker Foundation. The Writers' League of Texas, a non-profit organization, is the largest writers' organization in Texas and provides resources for new writers. The Tocker Foundation distributes funds principally for the support, encouragement, and assistance of small and rural libraries in Texas.

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#### **Barton Creek Farmers Market Starts 2013**

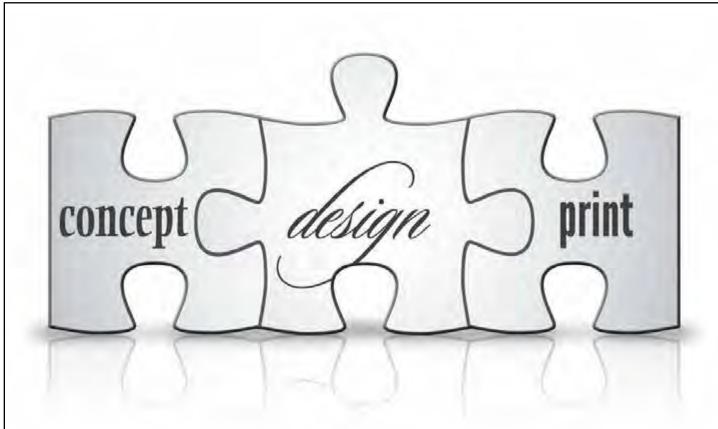

She encourages anyone dealing with cancer, either it be themselves or a family member, to get involved in a support group with others who have had similar struggles. From my experience, Overly says "Sisters leaning on sisters is a great concept and is not only a receiving relationship but also a giving one."

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#### DISTRICT'S BOND PROGRAM ON TRACK AND UNDER BUDGET

#### **KEY EXPENDITURES BENEFITTING STUDENTS**

While the expansion of Hudson Bend Middle School progresses as planned—and with more construction to come in 2013 as part of the voter-approved Lake Travis Independent School District bond referendum last November, it's the 'softer' side of the multi-million dollar program that already has had a substantial impact on student programs and services. The \$158.5 million bond—the District's largest issue to date—also includes construction of a new Lake Travis Middle School and Elementary School No. 6; expansion of Lake Travis High School into the current Lake Travis Middle School campus; upgrades for existing facilities; and improvements districtwide. Additionally, comprising the package is the purchase of instructional resources and materials, including technology. "People tend to relate best to the bricks-and-mortar portion of bond packages," said Dr. Brad Lancaster, LTISD Superintendent. "And rightly so. The majority of funds in most bonds are set aside for construction. However, while the (bond) money may not be used to fund daily operating costs such as teacher salaries, utilities and fuel, it is becoming more and more common to buy things like buses, technology, and instructional materials with bond dollars." As of August 31, 2012, proceeds from the District's current bond have purchased more than \$2.2 million in technology devices for students, instructional computers, interactive SMART boards and document cameras for classrooms, and servers and cabling across the District. Expenses also include more than \$150,000 in library books, band and orchestra instruments, and uniforms for various band and athletics programs at Hudson Bend and Lake Travis middle schools and at Lake Travis High School. "It certainly helps parent fund-raising morale," said Kenny Vise, Lake Travis High School band director. "We know the school district and community are taking care of our need for instruments, so we can focus on things like travel and props and extra things to enrich the kids' performance opportunities." District officials have also purchased seven regular route buses and one special needs bus at a cost of approximately \$820,000. "While it's been a year since the bond was approved and things are moving forward as planned, we're still relatively early in the process," added Dr. Lancaster. "Additional purchases for instructional materials, including technology, will continue to be made, while the bulk of construction will take place in 2013. Overall, the bond money is going to where the voters wanted it to be allotted."

#### **HUDSON BEND MIDDLE SCHOOL**

Shortly after the bond referendum received approval, LTISD trustees awarded a contract for architectural and engineering services to Austin-based Fields & Associates for the design of the Hudson Bend Middle School expansion. In Jan. 2012, trustees selected the firm of Baird/Williams Construction, Ltd. from Temple to serve as the project's Construction Manager At-Risk, a method that requires a commitment by the construction manager to deliver the project within a guaranteed maximum price. To meet the proposed schedule for increasing the school's capacity from 900 to 1,200 students, the HBMS project will be constructed in two phases. The classroom addition phase, which broke ground in June 2012, will add 26 teaching stations to the overall site and is expected to be completed in the summer of 2013. The second phase of construction will include the expansion of core facilities and is scheduled for completion in early 2014. Overall, the two phases will add 79,000 square feet to the school's total footprint. According to bond documents, the total budget for the HBMS Expansion project is estimated at \$22.2 million.







#### **NEW LAKETRAVIS MIDDLE SCHOOL**

Last November, trustees selected Fields and Associates Architects to design the \$53.7 million New Lake Travis Middle School which will be located on Bee Creek Road just off Highway 71. Trustees are expected to award a construction contract for the project at their regular school board meeting in December. Construction is scheduled to begin in Jan. 2013.

#### **ELEMENTARY SCHOOL NO. 6**

Additionally, last November trustees awarded a contract to Austin-based Pfluger Associates Architects for the design of Elementary School No. 6. The new school will be located on Cypress Ranch Boulevard inside the West Cypress Hills subdivision off Highway 71. Trustees are expected to award a construction contract for the \$25 million project in Feb. 2013, with work commencing in March.

#### **LAKETRAVIS HIGH SCHOOL**

Earlier this month, trustees awarded a construction contract to Austinbased AG Construction Management for site improvement work at Lake Travis High School. The \$1.4 million project includes resurfacing the main LTHS parking lots and Cavalier Drive, from the main stadium up to the top of the hill. Also included is a new concrete sidewalk from the Cavalier Activity Center to the top of the hill. Additional work includes the terracing of erosion areas at the Cavalier Activity Center, the baseball field and the tennis courts, as well as the installation of an irrigation well and irrigation systems at Lake Travis High School and the LTISD administration building. All work, which began Nov. 27, will be done in phases and is expected to be substantially complete by Spring Break 2013. Additionally, once the new Lake Travis Middle School opens in the fall of 2014, expansion of Lake Travis High School into the current Lake Travis Middle School site at Ranch Road 620 and Cavalier Drive will begin. Fort Worth-based Huckabee Architects will design the project. (Continued on Page 11)

#### **EXISTING ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS**

Earlier this year, trustees selected Austin-based O'Connell Robertson Architects to plan improvements to the District's existing elementary schools, including the replacement of air conditioning systems and the renovation of the kitchen at Lakeway Elementary School, the District's oldest elementary school. Trustees are expected to award a construction contract for the project in March 2013, with work commencing in April. "Approval of this bond was critical to the long-term vitality of our exemplary Lake Travis community," said Jason Buddin, LTISD Board President. "We thank the members of our citizens' bond advisory committee for their due diligence and commitment to this referendum, and ultimately, we applaud our voters for their support."

A demographic report commissioned by the District and released in February 2011 indicates enrollment is increasing by approximately 300 to 400 students—roughly 6 to 7 percent—annually. Considering a high growth rate scenario, demographers estimate the District will be built out, or at full capacity, by 2025 with a projected enrollment of 18,000 students. In November 2012, Lake Travis schools recorded a total enrollment of 7,780 students. "This bond allows us to accommodate the continued increase in student enrollment in our District, and we are committed to ensuring that all projects are well-built and completed in a timely and fiscally responsible manner," concluded Dr. Lancaster.

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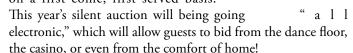

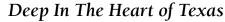

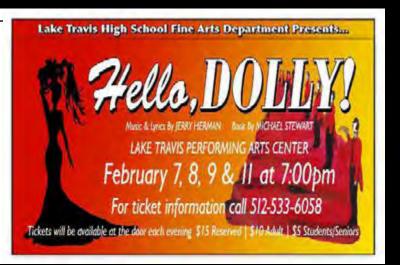

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#### SchoolMessenger: District Information DirectTo Your Phone

#### **Dear LTISD Parents and Guardians:**

We are excited to announce the full implementation of SchoolMessenger with a new service: delivering important information to you via SMS text messages to your mobile phone, if you choose. District and campus officials will use the service to provide parents with timely and relevant information regarding emergencies, news, events and activities. Please know however, this service is not intended to replace our existing means of communication rather it will enhance them.

The contact information you provided during your child¹s registration process earlier this year will automatically be used for notifications as part of the SchoolMessenger system. However, you must indicate your willingness to receive text messages to your mobile phone. The process is simple and only takes a few seconds to complete:

- 1. Send a text message to 68453
- 2. In the body of the message, type: yes
- 3. Send the message.

You'll know you were successful if you receive the following reply message: "You are registered to receive aprox 3 msgs/mo. Txt STOP to quit, HELP for help."

You may repeat the opt-in process for any wireless numbers



that you wish to include.

In addition to performing the opt-in process above, you¹ll want to insure that we have your wireless number in our student information database. If you haven¹t already provided that information·or should it need to be updated, please contact us via email at portalhelpdesk@ltisdschools.org or call us at 512-533-6029.

The District will officially launch the new service on Monday, December 3, so until then you won¹t receive any further text messages.

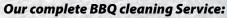

#### WRESTLING TO BECOME OFFICIAL UIL PROGRAM

at Lake Travis High School

Come this fall, wrestling will no longer be considered a club sport at Lake Travis High School. Thanks in large part to Lake Travis Youth Wrestling Club parents, the Lake Travis Independent School District Administration will seek to add wrestling as an official extracurricular program under University Interscholastic League Class 5A rules beginning with the 2013-2014 school year.

"This is a done deal," announced Dr. Brad Lancaster, LTISD Superintendent, at a school board meeting held December 18. "We applaud our wrestling parents for their vision and continued support for this program."

"There was a need and desire from within our community to make wrestling an official, UIL-sanctioned sport at the high school," said Gary Briley, Lake Travis ISD Director of Extracurricular Programs. "We're already talking to representatives from the UIL about the process for getting this done. Beginning this spring, we will work towards finding a certified teacher who can also serve as our wrestling coach."

The University Interscholastic League was created in 1910 by The University of Texas at Austin to provide leadership and guidance to public school debate and athletic teachers.

"This is a great day for Lake Travis athletes," said Tom Tierney, head coach of the Lake Travis youth wrestling team and former collegiate wrestler. "When my wife Annette and I—together with Paul and Jeanne Beavers—started the youth wrestling program six years ago, we had hoped one day to see this day come to fruition."

According to Ms. Tierney, the goal of the current not-for-profit youth wrestling club is to train and teach local kids—within the guidelines of the USA Wrestling Association—the benefits of physical development, nutritional awareness, self-confidence, and if they choose, to prepare them for competition in high school and at the collegiate level.

"Although many folks may associate the sport of wrestling with the wild and crazy kind that is seen on TV, wrestling is considered by many as one of the purest forms of athletic competition known to organized sports," said Mr. Tierney. "There are no balls, bats, pucks, sticks, nets or other equipment, only the wrestler and an opponent of equal size, weight and age."

In accordance with USA Wrestling Association criteria, students-athletes participating in LT club wrestling may remain competitive through the age of 15.

"After that, our wrestlers have nowhere to go, until now that is," said Mr. Beavers. "Our youth wrestling coaches and

student-athletes are excited about being able to compete with established programs like Westlake and Bowie in the very near future," continued Ms. Tierney. "We all agree this is just an awesome opportunity for our students and the LT community."

Last July, after having completed one of the most successful academic and athletic campaigns in school history, Lake Travis High School earned the UIL Lone Star Cup for team performance in district and state championships during the 2011-2012 school year. The prestigious honor is bestowed annually to five high schools in the state, one in each of the five UIL classifications (1A, 2A, 3A, 4A and 5A) based on points awarded for team performance in the following sanctioned UIL academic/athletic programs in Marching Band, Team Tennis, Cross Country, Volleyball, Football, Swimming and Diving, Basketball, Soccer, Golf, Track and Field, Academics, One Act Play, Softball, and Baseball. Even without a UIL wrestling program in place, LTHS received the highest point total of any school in all classifications.

"Interest in wrestling is reaching new highs in our area," added Mr. Briley. "We anticipate a big turnout at Lake Travis High School when it's time to hit the mats later this fall."

### Section for Kids with news, puzzles, games and more! WHY EXERCISE IS COOL

Kids exercise all the time without even thinking of it. Just being active, like when you run around outside or play kickball at school, is a kind of exercise. What else counts as exercise? Playing sports, dancing, doing push-ups, and even reaching down to touch your toes.

When you exercise, you're helping build a strong body that will be able to move around and do all the stuff you need it to do. Try to be active every day and your body will thank you later!

#### EXERCISE MAKES YOUR HEART HAPPY

You may know that your heart is a muscle. It works hard, pumping blood every day of your life. You can help this important muscle get stronger by doing aerobic (say: airo-bik) exercise.

Aerobic means "with air," so aerobic exercise is a kind of activity that requires oxygen. When you breathe, you take in oxygen, and, if you're doing aerobic exercise, you may notice you're breathing faster than normal. Aerobic activity can get your heart pumping, make you sweaty, and quicken your breathing.

When you give your heart this kind of workout on a regular basis, your heart will get even better at its main job — delivering oxygen (in the form of oxygen-carrying blood cells) to all parts of your body. So you want to do some aerobic exercise right now? Try swimming, basketball, ice or roller hockey, jogging (or walking quickly), inline skating, soccer, cross-country skiing, biking, or rowing. And don't forget

that skipping, jumping rope, and playing hopscotch are aerobic activities, too!

#### EXERCISE STRENGTHENS MUSCLES

Another kind of exercise can help make your muscles stronger. Did you ever do a push-up or swing across the monkey bars at the playground? Those are exercises that can build strength. By using your muscles to do powerful things, you can make them stronger. For older teens and adults, this kind of workout can make muscles bigger, too.

Here are some exercises and activities to build strong muscles:

- push-ups
- pull-ups
- tug-of-war
- · rowing
- running
- · inline skating
- bike riding

#### EXERCISE MAKES YOU FLEXIBLE

Can you touch your toes easily without yelling ouch? Most kids are pretty flexible, which means that they can bend and stretch their bodies without much trouble. This kind of exercise often feels really good, like when you take a big stretch in the morning after waking up. Being flexible is having "full range of motion," which means you can move your arms and legs freely without feeling tightness or pain.

It's easy to find things to do for good flexibility:

· tumbling and gymnastics

- voga
- · dancing, especially ballet
- · martial arts
- simple stretches, such as touching your toes or side stretches

#### EXERCISE KEEPS THE BALANCE

Food gives your body fuel in the form of calories, which are a kind of energy. Your body needs a certain amount of calories every day just to function, breathe, walk around, and do all the basic stuff. But if you're active, your body needs an extra measure of calories or energy. If you're not very active, your body won't need as many calories.

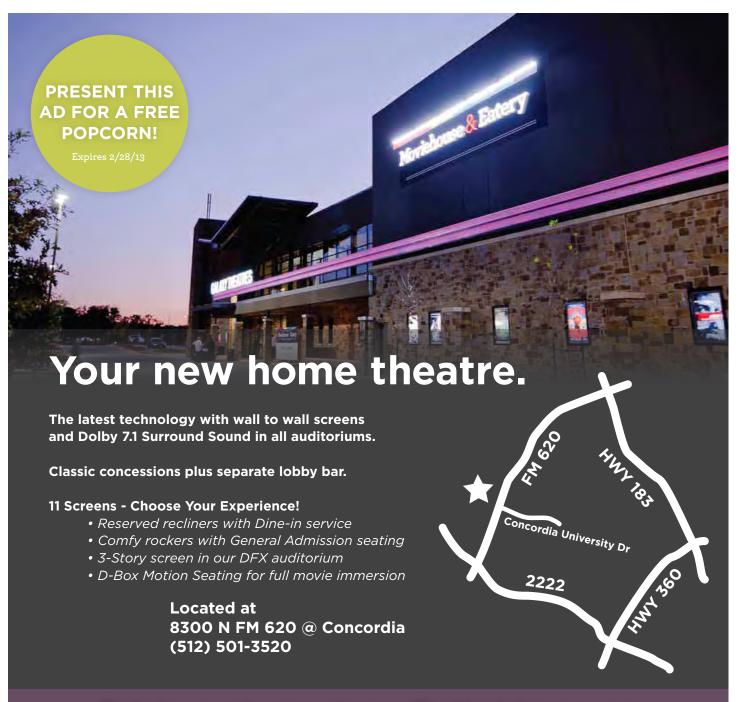
Whatever your calorie need is, if you eat enough to meet that need, your body weight will stay about the same. If you eat more calories than your body needs, it may be stored as excess fat.

#### EXERCISE MAKES YOU FEEL GOOD

It feels good to have a strong, flexible body that can do all the activities you enjoy — like running, jumping, and playing with your friends. It's also fun to be good at something, like scoring a basket, hitting a home run, or perfecting a dive.

But you may not know that exercising can actually put you in a better mood. When you exercise, your brain releases a chemical called endorphins (say: en-dor-funz), which may make you feel happier.
