CLUBHOUSE FUNDING AND CONSTRUCTION UPDATE

After months of work, the Board is pleased to share an exciting update to the Clubhouse Rebuilding Project. The insurance settlement was finalized July 11, 2013. The clubhouse construction bids have been received and the contract to build a new, enlarged and more functional LOE clubhouse has been awarded to Crossmark Development and Construction. Construction will begin September 3, 2013 and is anticipated to be completed by May 15, 2014. Crossmark was chosen after an extensive search and evaluation process. Crossmark's owner, Jeff Anderson, has over 30 years of relevant construction experience including actually building a clubhouse for the Avalon Community in Sugarland that is quite similar to the planned new clubhouse. With all of Crossmark's experience, relevant skills and commitment to quality construction, it is fortunate that they were also the low-bidder on the project.

Project funding will be primarily from the insurance settlement. Anticipated additional funding sources include a one year assessment increase of \$146 for each family in 2014, money saved by being very frugal with the 2013 Operating Budget and the re-direction of the normal 2014 Reserve Account allocation to the clubhouse construction instead of the Reserve Account. A Town Hall is scheduled for 7:00 PM on July 23rd at Kirk Elementary to discuss the contract award and funding specifics. As a reminder, the new clubhouse is significantly larger than the previous clubhouse (1935 sq. feet to 3506 sq. feet) and incorporates numerous new features requested by residents. The new clubhouse will include a workout room, a catering kitchen, a flex room for classes or small functions, a much larger main room, a security system, greater shaded areas near the pool, an office for future on-site management, and heating/air conditioning in the restrooms. This is a significant step forward for our community. The Board wishes to thank all the residents who have participated in sharing ideas and developing the plans for our new facility.

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Dash Tag Update New Resident Stickers Still Available

Since the roll out in May, almost 20,000 one-day dash tags have been issued. That is about 25 visitors per home in our community. While the one day tags seem to be working well, it would be preferable to issue long term tags to our frequent visitors. The application forms for longer term tags are available on the LOE website and at the front gate. But, the application MUST be submitted to AMI (now First Service Residential). If you haven't already requested your new blue LOE sticker, please complete and return the form below. The goal is for every vehicle in LOE to have either a windshield sticker or one of the appropriate dash tags. Once this goal is met, any unregistered vehicle will be easily identified by the patrol. Even if the attendants "know your vehicle", please complete the form and place the sticker on your windshield.

The new stickers are blue; the previous red stickers will no longer be issued. All residents should have a new sticker on their car or apply for the new resident hang tag. Cars without identification in LOE are subject to being stopped by the patrol officers and the gate attendants. BOY SCOUT GIVES BACK TO THE ENVIRONMENT AND HIS COMMUNITY



These boxes have been installed in and around the vegetation on some of the smaller ponds.

An Eagle Scout service project is the opportunity for a Boy Scout to demonstrate leadership of others while performing a project for the benefit of any religious institution, school, or community. This is the culmination of the Eagle Scout candidate's leadership training, and it requires a significant effort on his part. 
