If you would like a visit from APD, AFD, EMS, or Code Compliance, you will need to register your party with the Austin Police Department Office of Community Liaison before September 13, 2013.

We recommend you also register your party with the National Office at www.natw.org to help us show the number of participants in Texas. Texas has held 1st place position for the past 18 years and Austin is 4th place. Let's keep our place in the nation. By registering with the National Association you will also be eligible to compete in a new category #10 Neighborhood/Community.

HAVE YOU RECEIVED A VIOLATION LETTER?

The CCHOA typically drives at least two sections of the neighborhood a month. Lately, we have been stepping it up and driving even more to ensure that our neighborhood looks the best that it possibly can. To give you a heads up, here at the things that we are focusing on:

Landscaping - We understand that keeping your lawn green and alive is difficult right now due to the extreme heat and watering restrictions. However, there are many things you can still do to make your front yard landscaping looking great. Keep your grass mowed and edged. This should be done every two weeks. Keep your bedding areas free of weeds and grasses. Add new mulch. Create a well-defined edge around your bedding areas and tree wells using a shovel or weed eater. Remove any dead vegetation from your yard. Keep tree limbs trimmed to the City of Austin's recommended 14 feet. All shrubbery should be trimmed to reveal at least 2/3 of your first floor windows. Tree stakes should be removed after 9-12 months. If they are left longer than 9-12 Join us every Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday from 9:00am - 10:00am for this exciting water exercise class! months, they actually start to damage the tree.

Window Screens - If your window screens are worn, torn, or frayed, they should be replaced. If you choose not to replace them, you are more than welcome to remove them all together.

Fencing - Please replace your fence if it is in disrepair. If you simply have a few broken or damaged fence pickets, those should be replaced. If your fence has been stained, the new pickets will need to be stained to match.

Clutter/Debris - Please remove all clutter and debris from the front lawn, driveway, side yards, front walkways, and front porches. These items should be removed and stored out of public views at all times. This includes your trash carts, which should only be visible on your City of Austin collection day.

These are just a few things that we are focusing on right now. Thanks for keeping Circle C a beautiful place to live!

DEED RESTRICTIONS

As reported in each month's newsletter, the HOA staff drives at least two sections of the neighborhood per month to note violations of the Declaration of Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions. These commonly include: front yard landscape maintenance (mowing, edging, free of weeds), home maintenance (paint, screens, siding) and recreational vehicles (boats, RV's, trailers) parked in the driveway. The HOA is required by state law to notify owners in writing via certified mail and allow for the homeowner to request a hearing before the board of directors. If you receive a letter, please contact us at the HOA office and let us know your individual situation. We would like to work with you to bring your home into compliance. If you would like to report a violation, you can do so via our website at www.circlecranch.info.

The drought continues in Texas and especially Central Texas and everyone may want to watch for the City of Austin to move forward to Stage Three Water Conservation rules if we do not receive sufficient rainfall to fill Lake Travis and Buchanan to a more manageable level. Despite our rain in July, the lakes still remain quite low, with the combined storage the first week of August at 35%, or 735,000 acre feet.

Our water conservation stages are in direct response to various levels/triggers set by the LCRA. For complete details, you can access the LCRA website at www.lcra.org. The City of Austin has been under Stage Two Water Conservation since September, 2012. If the lakes fall to less than 600,000 acre feet of water, or if the LCRA declares a drought worse than the drought of record, the City would be forced to implement Stage Three restrictions according to our drought management plan. Stage Three is similar to Stage Two, however, now the water hours are restricted to only six hours per week. For automatic sprinkler systems, watering could occur only between midnight and 6:00 a.m. one day per week on the assigned day. For hose-end watering (manual sprinklers), watering would be limited to one day per week, 7:00a.m. to 10:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m.

Some of the current Stage Two restrictions to keep in mind are that you are not allowed to wash a car in your driveway, you must use a commercial car wash facility. These are required by the City to have water recycling, so that is the reasoning behind this rule. There are a few other rules that affect homeowners, but in order to put off going to Stage Three as long as possible, we hope everyone is complying with the Stage Two water restrictions. For the Circle C Commons areas, we continue to convert various areas to drip irrigation. After September 15 when the weather starts to be more manageable, we will be implementing replacement plantings up in Circle C North. We will be able to convert all of the commons areas to drip irrigation, and all areas along fences and walls will be landscaped. Later in the fall, we have a special project planned for LaCrosse, from Park West Pass to Fox Creek, where replacement landscaping and drip irrigation will be installed. We will also be planting replacement plantings throughout the neighborhood. These are limited to where we can install drip irrigation.

For maintenance in September, we will be completing our standard mowing rotations, light trimming on perennials and shrubs, continued mulch touch up, irrigation review, and standard weeding. We are anticipating a hot September, so hand watering of trees and trying to keep everything alive will be paramount to our efforts. If you are making plans for your own yard, fall is a great time for planting trees and shrubs. We usually wait until the temperature is about 10-15 degrees lower than the heat of summer (around 90 degrees). You will have to water with a hand held hose to establish the plants, but the evenings in late September work well for this.

How To Execute The Two-Handed High Backhand Volley Approach Shot

In previous newsletters, I offered tips on how to hit a forehand groundstroke, a two-handed backhand, one-handed backhand, forehand volley, the two handed backhand volley, the serve, the forehand half-volley, the one-handed backhand volley, the overhead "smash", the forehand service return, the backhand service return, and the forehand high volley approach shot.

In this issue, I will offer you instructions on how to execute the two-handed backhand high approach shot. This shot is used when a player is caught in "no-person's land" (around the service line area) and receives a high ball to volley. The important part of this shot is to be able to hit a deep volley to the feet of the opponents and/or to hit a deep volley close to the baseline, so the opponent is put in a defensive mode and hits a softer ball so the player can now move closer to the net for the "killer or placement volley". In the illustrations, Linda Henson, a player at the Grey Rock Tennis Club, shows the proper technique to execute this stroke.

Step 1: The Ready Position and Split Step: When Linda realizes that she is caught in "no-person's land", she takes the split step by bending the knees and staying on her toes. Her racket is in the volley position and her feet are angled toward the path of the incoming ball.

Step 2: The Back Swing: Once Linda realizes that the ball has been directed to her backhand, she will turn her upper body and will take the racket slightly back. Notice that the left hand next to the right

hand to allow her to keep her center of gravity in the center. She has loaded her weight on her left foot and will be ready to step forward to meet the ball. She will make a slight change toward the continental grip on both hands.

Step 3: The Point of Contact: Linda now is ready to step into the ball. She has kept her eye on the ball and her center of gravity now is shifted toward the point of contact. Notice the right toe pointing to the ball meeting the racket. The face of the racket is open to allow her to hit behind the ball and allow maximum net height and allow her to hit the ball deep. The control of the ball will be made with the left hand, which is holding the racket tighter. The right hand is more relaxed and helps keep the face of the racket in a 45 degree angle at the point of contact.

Step 4: The Follow Through: Once Linda has made contact with the ball, she finishes the follow through with her wrist laid back. Her right arm is next to her body and her eyes have shifted toward her target.

Step 5: The Move for the Kill Volley: As the ball is headed toward her opponent and Linda realizes that her shot it deep, now she moves close to the net for the put away volley. If her shot was not deep, Linda will decide to stay close to the service line to protect the lob over her head. By the look in her eyes and her smile, she is ready to go for the "kill volley".

SPIDER MITES

Spider mites are common plant pests that are found on the underside of leaves. Their feeding can cause leaves to discolor, causing a speckled appearance. With severe infestations, the plant leaves discolor to a silver or bronze color which may result in the leaves dropping from the plant.

Spider mites are arachnids, closely related to spiders and ticks. Similar to spiders, spider mites can produce silk and often cover leaves with webbing, especially when there are large populations. The webbing helps to protect the mites and their eggs from natural enemies and harsh environmental conditions.

Spider mites lay their eggs along the leaf vein during the growing season. Eggs are round and large in size when compared to the adult mite. Some species of spider mites peak during warmer months of the year while others become more active in the cooler months of the year. The mites are able to develop more quickly when temperatures are warmer, so populations can grow very quickly. Spider mites thrive in dry conditions. Their natural enemies require more humid conditions, so dry conditions allow spider mite populations to grow with little predation or parasitism that would keep the population at an acceptable level. There are many predatory arthropods that feed on spider mites. Some of these include predatory mites, spider mite destroyers (a type of ladybug), minute pirate bugs, big-eyed bugs and predatory thrips. Proper watering of plants may also help to reduce spider mite outbreaks as watering plants can help reduce stress brought on by drought. Using strong jets of water to hose plants can also help to dislodge spider mites on infested plants. Miticides or acaricides can be used to manage spider mite outbreaks. Look for active ingredients such as horticultural oils, insecticidal soaps, abamectin, bifenthrin, dimethoate or acephate.

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BE LICE-FREE FOR BACK-TO-SCHOOL

Back-to-school means lots of new things: new clothes, new backpacks and new supplies. It's a time to navigate a new class schedule and meet new teachers. Yet, it needn't be a time to worry about head lice. We often hear about lice during back-to-school season because kids return to a tighter environment after a summer of being outdoors. Lice are transmitted via direct head-to-head contact 95% of the time. The ideal scenario for lice transmission is when kids talk, hug or sit with heads touching. Keep in mind that lice don't jump or fly. They also die relatively quickly (24-36 hours) if they're not directly on your scalp. Lice are easier to avoid and get rid of than you might imagine. Since lice do not carry or spread disease, there is no formal exclusion policy in Texas schools. Head lice doesn't mean a child is dirty or should be shunned. Mostly, lice are inconvenient due to the time necessary to eliminate them. Here are some easy tips to stay lice-free this school year:

1. Each child should have his/her own set of brushes and combs. Store them in separate drawers or baskets at home. Label them accordingly and make sure each child knows whose is whose and keep your own separate.

2. Use lice deterrent spray every day. There are a few varieties of combination detangler/lice repellent sprays on the market. These sprays contain scents that lice find offensive, such as mint or tea tree oil. When used daily, these scents repel a louse and cause it to nest elsewhere (in another scalp). It can be most effective when applied every day, including before

sleepovers, play dates and school.

3. This is a biggie: teach your kids to avoid direct head-to-head contact when playing with friends. Show your little ones a photo of children using the iPad or reading books in very close proximity. Help them learn how to play with other kids elbow-to-elbow, not head-to-head!

4. If school reports a lice outbreak – though they are not required to – or you suspect your child has lice, do not panic! Instead, make sure you have a good quality nit comb (normal combs do not trap lice or nits). Most parents say that it is hard to see evidence of lice. Use the comb as your eyes via daily comb-outs. Catching lice early can often prevent a household contraction. If you're not sure how to do a proper comb-out, look online where many 'how to' videos exist.

5. Finally remember the rule of "once a week, take a peek." While your kids are de-compressing after a long day of learning, run your nit comb through their hair at the base of their necks and behind their ears. Nits can be many colors from a cream color to amber. They glisten in dry hair and are the shape of a sesame seed that clings to one side of the hair shaft, often close to the scalp.

If you think you see lice and want to outsource removal, there are several options who will come to your home for treatment. At the end of the (school) day, you'll be happy to have these tips in your back pocket.
