



Good Shepard United Methodist Boy Scouts Troop 533

The Good Shepard United Methodist Boy Scouts Troop 533 attended summer camp the first week of June at Camp Alexander which is located in the beautiful Eleven mile Canyon in the Pike National Forest approximately 45 miles west of Colorado Springs, and two miles south of Lake George, in Park County, Colorado. Camp Alexander is between 8200 and 8600 feet elevation. The camp area consists of hills, low mountains, and valleys covered by a mix of Ponderosa pine forests, high-altitude grasslands, and wetland vegetation along the lake and stream. There is abundant wildlife including black bears, raccoons, skunks, rabbits, squirrels, deer, elk, coyotes, snakes, and bald eagles.

Summer Camp is a weeklong adventure in which the scouts spend the week away from home and partake in a whole range of activities including water sports, outdoor activities, handicrafts, shooting sports, white water rafting, and more. Summer camp is one of the primary places that scouts can work on both rank advancement and merit badges, but this experience served to be much more than that, it served as a journey of self-learning and character building along with leadership. Summer Camp is not a requirement, but most of the scouts look forward to it, and they work really hard throughout the year to raise funds to cover the cost and expenses associated with the travel and equipment for the trip. For some scouts, this journey was a first time away from home. That being said, the experience itself propelled the scouts into becoming more independent and developing

as individuals.

The High Adventure scout group was able to tour the mountains on an adventure hike taking them up to an altitude of 14,111 ft high. They night repelled off of a 100 ft cliff, and along with the whole troop were able to go on a white water rafting trip that tagged the Arkansas river.

Most of the scouts returned home from camp having completed the requirements to move up in rank, and others came home with various merit badges, but the most important take away was the experience.





TYLER QUIGLEY

EAGLE SCOUT PROJECT

Most runners in the community go out and hit the trails with their headphone, iPod, iPhone, water and of course their GPS app or Garmin, but what happens when you are out and about just enjoying the trails with no other technology or fancy apps. Tyler Quigley, a cross country runner at Cy-Ranch High School, and life scout member of the Good Shepard Methodist boy scouts troop 533, saw a need for the postings of the trails in Fairfield. He recently undertook the task to measure and post the distance to several trails in Fairfield as part of his Eagle Scout Project.

He first met with his scout leader, Brian Roberts, to discuss options for his project, and when Mr. Roberts mentioned marking the trail, it was a natural fit for Tyler. He obtained maps of the lakes and went out with a GPS unit to measure the distances around each lake. He chose to start each lake's loop with a map and using 4x4 posts the Scouts put in a marker every 1/4 mile. The first step was to build and paint the posts to hold the markers, 8 foot 4x4s were cut in half with a 45 degree angle cut. 5 inch squares were cut from 1X6 boards as backing to the metal markers and screwed on the 45 degree cut. The posts were then painted Ivy green to match the existing wooden signs. At the lakes, they started by making the holes, this was the first loop around both lakes. The next loop was setting the posts and pouring the cement making sure the post was level and square; this was the second loop around both lakes. The third and final loop was to return the dirt and sod around the hardened cement, such that the leave no trace rule was followed. After all that work, alas, 3 loops down, just under 7 miles covered, along with digging, hauling cement, wood, etc. During the installation several people out for walks and runs commented on what a great idea this was. It helped to motivate Tyler and his crew. Tyler was pleased to find some comments in a previous newsletter in which the posts had been acknowledged by some runners. Hopefully Tyler's example will motive other young boys to go out and take an active role in their community.

Philmont offers a unique High-Adventure Expedition opportunity to scouts who are fortunate enough to have their troop name drawn in a lottery TWO years before a trek actually takes place. A troop can only register once every two years so, not all scouts get to hike at Philmont. Needless to say, it is truly an honor to be chosen.



This year, nine scouts from Good Shepherd's Troop 533 had the privilege of hiking at Philmont. During their trek, Boy Scout Troop 533/Crew 726J chose Strenuous Expedition #28, which ended up (including side trips) taking them on a 93 mile, 12 day trek through the Sangre de Cristo Mountains. Philmont covers 214 square miles of vast wilderness with trails that climb from 6,500 feet to as high

as 12,441 feet.


Along the trek, Scouts endured tough challenges including backpacking in bear and mountain lion territory, steep climbs, and often-inclement weather. They participated in backcountry programs along the way including a challenge course, black powder shooting and spar pole climbing. The trek also included a conservation project where the Scouts learned and participated in the upkeep of Philmont's ecosystem.





TENNIS TIPS

How To Execute The Two-Handed High Backhand Volley Approach Shot

In previous newsletters, I offered tips on how to hit a forehand groundstroke, a two-handed backhand, one-handed backhand, forehand volley, the two handed backhand volley, the serve, the forehand half-volley, the one-handed backhand volley, the overhead "smash", the forehand service return, the backhand service return, and the forehand high volley approach shot.

In this issue, I will offer you instructions on how to execute the two-handed backhand high approach shot. This shot is used when a player is caught in "no-person's land" (around the service line area) and receives a high ball to volley. The important part of this shot is to be able to hit a deep volley to the feet of the opponents and/or to hit a deep volley close to the baseline, so the opponent is put in a defensive mode and hits a softer ball so the player can now move closer to the net for the "killer or placement volley". In the illustrations, Linda Henson, a player at the Grey Rock Tennis Club, shows the proper technique to execute this stroke.

Step 1: The Ready Position and Split Step: When Linda realizes that she is caught in "no-person's land", she takes the split step by bending the knees and staying on her toes. Her racket is in the volley position and her feet are angled toward the path of the incoming ball.

Step 2: The Back Swing: Once Linda realizes that the ball has been directed to her backhand, she will turn her upper body and will take the racket slightly back. Notice that the left hand next to the right

hand to allow her to keep her center of gravity in the center. She has loaded her weight on her left foot and will be ready to step forward to meet the ball. She will make a slight change toward the continental grip on both hands.

Step 3: The Point of Contact: Linda now is ready to step into the ball. She has kept her eye on the ball and her center of gravity now is shifted toward the point of contact. Notice the right toe pointing to the ball meeting the racket. The face of the racket is open to allow her to hit behind the ball and allow maximum net height and allow her to hit the ball deep. The control of the ball will be made with the left hand, which is holding the racket tighter. The right hand is more relaxed and helps keep the face of the racket in a 45 degree angle at the point of contact.

Step 4: The Follow Through: Once Linda has made contact with the ball, she finishes the follow through with her wrist laid back. Her right arm is next to her body and her eyes have shifted toward her target.

Step 5: The Move for the Kill Volley: As the ball is headed toward her opponent and Linda realizes that her shot it deep, now she moves close to the net for the put away volley. If her shot was not deep, Linda will decide to stay close to the service line to protect the lob over her head. By the look in her eyes and her smile, she is ready to go for the "kill volley".

SOCIAL MEDIA ENHANCES FAMILY HISTORY RESEARCH

Local Family History Center offers Cypress-area residents instruction on how to use new sharable photo and story options at FamilySearch.org

New advancements in digital technologies are transforming genealogy research by making it easier, more accessible and increasingly more personal. A case in point is the incorporation of social media features in the recent redesign of FamilySearch.org, a free family history website produced by FamilySearch International. FamilySearch is the world's largest genealogy organization and a nonprofit sponsored by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

The website's new social-media-compatible features include photo and story sharing capabilities, which encourage collaboration between individuals in building family trees and sharing personal and family histories.

Utilizing social media platforms to disseminate genealogical data and pictures speeds up the research process while encouraging real time family connections.

Judy Frazier, director of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints' Family History Center in Tomball, said, "The new Photo and Stories feature adds a fresh dimension to typical genealogy research. When I investigated a new photo of one of my ancestors posted online at FamilySearch.org, I discovered three stories I had never heard." Excited by the discovery, she quickly copied them over into her personal files. "These new stories invigorated my desire to upload my own collection of family photos and mementos," said Frazier.

Also new to FamilySearch.org is Family Tree, a simple, online application where users begin with their own personal information, building outwards through searchable records of 900 million existing entries to create and expand their family tree. Alongside Family Tree, the new Photos and Stories application allows for photos and stories to be uploaded and tagged, allotting up to 5,000 photos per user. These images and text can then be shared through social media sites and can be made available to other FamilySearch users.

"FamilySearch.org is a great tool for collaboration with others who may be working on the same family lines," said Jeff Kirk, a Northwest Houston resident who used the new application to find a photo of the two-room house where his mother grew up. The image had been posted by a distant relative who located Kirk through the FamilySearch website.

While FamilySearch boasts LiveHelp, a service providing product help, research assistance by phone and web chat 24/7, there is also face-to-face help available locally. FamilySearch has 4,600 facilities in 126 countries where anyone can access genealogical records and receive personal assistance with

their family history. These facilities include the world-famous Family History Library in Salt Lake City, which houses the largest collection of genealogical information in the world. In addition, there are smaller Family History Centers that are usually found inside Latter-day Saint meetinghouses, including one in Tomball serving the Cypress, Waller and Tomball areas.

Family History Centers are free, open to the public, staffed by knowledgeable volunteers and offer both beginners and experienced researchers the tools and resources they need to learn about their ancestors. At the Tomball location, visitors can receive training in how to use the latest FamilySearch online resources, as well as gain free access to subscription genealogical websites. For a small fee, patrons can also access the vast circulating collection of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, which includes 2.5 million microfilms from over 100 countries.

The Tomball Family History Center is located at 12310 New Hampton Drive, Tomball, Texas. Hours of operation are Tuesday, 9-1; Wednesday 6-9; Thursday 9-1; Saturday 9-1; and by appointment. Contact Judy Frazier at 281-635-0325 or at Tx_Tomball@ldsmail.net for more information.

A FOCUS ON BACKPACK SAFETY TIPS

WEAR BOTH STRAPS

The use of one strap causes one side of the body to bear the weight of the backpack. By using two shoulder straps, the weight of the backpack MITH is evenly distributed.

WEAR OVER STRONGEST MID-**BACK MUSCLES**

Pay close attention to the way the backpack is positioned on the back. It should rest evenly in the middle of the back. Shoulder straps should be adjusted to allow the child to put on and take off the backpack without difficulty and allow free movement of the arms. Straps should not be too loose, and the backpack should not extend below the low back.

LIGHTENTHE LOAD

Keep the load at 10%-15% or less of the child's body weight. Carry only those items that are required for the day. Organize the contents of the backpack by placing the heaviest items closest to the back. Some students have two sets of books, so as not to have to carry the heavy books to and from school.

PROPER BACKPACK USAGE

While a backpack is still one of the best ways to tote homework, an overloaded or improperly worn backpack gets a failing grade, according to the American Physical Therapy Association (APTA). Improper backpack use can cause injury, especially to children with young, growing muscles and joints. Injury can occur when a child, in trying to adapt to a heavy load, uses harmful postures such as arching the back, leaning forward or, if only one strap is used, leaning to one side. According to physical therapists, these postural adaptations can cause spinal compression and/or improper alignment, and may hamper the proper functioning of the disks between the vertebrae that provide a shock absorption. A too-heavy load also causes muscles and soft tissues of the back to work harder, leading to strain and fatigue. This leaves the back more vulnerable to injury. A heavy load may also cause stress or compression to the shoulders and arms. When nerves are compressed, the child may experience tingling or numbness in the arms.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN A BACKPACK

Physical therapists recommend the following features when selecting a backpack:

- A padded back to reduce pressure on the back and prevent the pack's contents from digging into the child's back
- A waist belt to help distribute some of the load to the pelvis
 - Compression straps on the sides or bottom of the backpack that, when tightened, compress the contents of the backpack and stabilize the articles
- Reflective material so that the child is visible to drivers at night

THE RESULTS

Worn correctly and not overloaded, a backpack is supported by some of the strongest muscles in the body: the back and abdominal muscles. These muscle groups work together to stabilize the trunk and hold the body in proper postural alignment.

HOW A PHYSICAL THERAPIST CAN HELP

A physical therapist can help you choose a proper backpack and fit it specifically to your child. Children come in all shapes and sizes, and some have physical limitations that require special adaptations. Additionally, a physical therapist can help improve posture problems, correct muscle imbalances, and treat pain that can result from improper backpack use. Physical therapists can also design individualized fitness programs to help children get strong and stay strong – and carry their own loads.

BE LICE-FREE FOR BACK-TO-SCHOOL

Back-to-school means lots of new things: new clothes, new backpacks and new supplies. It's a time to navigate a new class schedule and meet new teachers. Yet, it needn't be a time to worry about head lice. We often hear about lice during back-to-school season because kids return to a tighter environment after a summer of being outdoors. Lice are transmitted via direct head-to-head contact 95% of the time. The ideal scenario for lice transmission is when kids talk, hug or sit with heads touching. Keep in mind that lice don't jump or fly. They also die relatively quickly (24-36 hours) if they're not directly on your scalp. Lice are easier to avoid and get rid of than you might imagine. Since lice do not carry or spread disease, there is no formal exclusion policy in Texas schools. Head lice doesn't mean a child is dirty or should be shunned. Mostly, lice are inconvenient due to the time necessary to eliminate them. Here are some easy tips to stay lice-free this school year:

- 1. Each child should have his/her own set of brushes and combs. Store them in separate drawers or baskets at home. Label them accordingly and make sure each child knows whose is whose and keep your own separate.
- 2. Use lice deterrent spray every day. There are a few varieties of combination detangler/lice repellent sprays on the market. These sprays contain scents that lice find offensive, such as mint or tea tree oil. When used daily, these scents repel a louse and cause it to nest elsewhere (in another scalp). It can be most effective when applied every day, including before

sleepovers, play dates and school.

- 3. This is a biggie: teach your kids to avoid direct head-to-head contact when playing with friends. Show your little ones a photo of children using the iPad or reading books in very close proximity. Help them learn how to play with other kids elbow-to-elbow, not head-to-head!
- 4. If school reports a lice outbreak though they are not required to or you suspect your child has lice, do not panic! Instead,make sure you have a good quality nit comb (normal combs do not trap lice or nits). Most parents say that it is hard to see evidence of lice. Use the comb as your eyes via daily comb-outs. Catching lice early can often prevent a household contraction. If you're not sure how to do a proper comb-out, look online where many 'how to' videos exist.
- 5. Finally remember the rule of "once a week, take a peek." While your kids are de-compressing after a long day of learning, run your nit comb through their hair at the base of their necks and behind their ears. Nits can be many colors from a cream color to amber. They glisten in dry hair and are the shape of a sesame seed that clings to one side of the hair shaft, often close to the scalp.

If you think you see lice and want to outsource removal, there are several options in Austin who will come to your home for treatment. At the end of the (school) day, you'll be happy to have these tips in your back pocket.







Do you have a favorite playground? Maybe it's a new wooden one that has lots of tall towers and passageways. Or maybe your favorite is an old-fashioned playground with swings and a seesaw. Playgrounds are fun places for kids because there's so much to do and other kids to have fun with. But sometimes kids get hurt at playgrounds. That's no fun, so here are 10 ways to keep safe:

Take a grown-up. As kids get bigger, they like doing things on their own. Going to the playground shouldn't be one of them, though. Grown-ups come in handy because they might spot problems at the playground, they can help you down if you get in a tight spot, and they can help if you happen to get hurt.

Take a good look around. If the playground has lots of trash, doing this, he or she will probably say, "Knock it off. Someone's such as broken glass, or the equipment looks broken, don't play going to get hurt." It's true, so try to use the playground equipment there

equipment that's for little kids (like 2- to 5-year-olds) and other equipment that's meant for older kids. Use the equipment that's on stuff), a broken swing, or find any other problems while you're right for your age. If you squeeze yourself onto a swing for toddlers, playing, tell your grown-up. He or she can report the problem so you might get stuck. Look out below. The best playgrounds put down special

surfacing material, such as mulch, wood chips, sand, gravel, or rubber matting. These surfaces can help soften a fall, but that doesn't mean you won't get hurt, especially if you tumble from a high spot.

Swing safely. Kids often get hurt at the playground because they get hit by someone on a swing. If you're swinging, watch out for people who might be getting too close. And if you're walking around the playground, don't get too close to the swingers.

Use your head. Sometimes you'll see kids going headfirst down the slide or maybe two or three kids will get on a piece of equipment that's only meant for one. Or some kids might start goofing around and trying to push each other off a swing or off of a high spot. If your grown-up sees you
