## **BARBERSHOP MUSIC FLOURISHES IN LAKEWAY**

Did you know barbershop music is alive and well in Lakeway? It is, and you can hear it from the 'Wildflowers', a local women's barbershop chorus.

If you would like to enjoy a thoroughly entertaining evening of music featuring the Lakeway Wildflowers singing in their best barbershop style at the Lakeway Activity Center, be sure to circle Nov. 1 on your calendar now. The event is open to the public and is free of charge. Look for more information to follow in your local newspapers, magazines and on the Lakeway websites.

Their performance was well received with an standing ovation.

The 'Wildflowers' began in 2002 under the leadership of Martha Kubala and Ernie Clay, two sisters-in law, both experienced barbershoppers who missed singing those lovely harmonies when they moved to Lakeway. They gathered a small group of 8 ladies interested in learning the barbershop style and began practicing at each other's homes until the group grew too large and had to move to the Activity Center. This group of 30 plus female singers has evolved into a proficient group of barbershop performers, having fun entertaining all over Lakeway. They owe their success to a couple of dynamic leaders; David Beussman for almost 7 years, and new director Adam Poyner who has been with them for about one year. Poyner earned a Master of Music in choral conducting from Hardin-Simmons University and has conducted musicals for various theatre productions all over Texas, such as "The Producers", "Jekyll & Hyde", "Sweeny Todd", "Little Women", "Godspell Jr." and more. He currently teaches music at Chapa Middle School in Kyle, Texas. He loves working with the Wildflowers, and often expresses it saying, "I am so pleased to be able to work with the Wildflowers because although it takes a lot of practice and hard work, these ladies are so committed to the barbershop style that it makes it fun for all of us." And the Wildflowers are so grateful to have Poyner as their music director.

So what exactly is barbershop music? Barbershop vocal harmony is a style of a cappella, or unaccompanied, vocal music characterized by tight, rich-sounding harmony. There are four voice parts and each of them has its own role: generally, the lead sings the melody; the tenor harmonizes above the melody; the bass sings the lowest harmonizing notes; and the baritone completes the cord, usually below the lead. A barbershop quartet or chorus is an ensemble of four people or sections who sing a cappella in the exacting barbershop style. Singing a cappella music, and especially barbershop, is a challenging and absorbing hobby enjoyed by men and women worldwide.

When did barbershop begin? In the last half of the 19th century, U.S. barbershops often served as community centers—a place where most men would gather. Barbershop quartets originated with African American men socializing in barbershops; they would harmonize while waiting their turn, vocalizing in spirituals, folk songs and popular songs. This generated a

new style, uniquely American, consisting of unaccompanied, four-part, close-harmony singing. Later, white minstrel singers adopted the style, and in the early days of the recording industry, their performances were recorded and sold. Early standards included songs such as "Shine On, Harvest Moon", "Hello, My Baby", and "Sweet Adeline".

Barbershop music was very popular between 1900 and 1919, but gradually faded into obscurity in the 1920s. The revival of a cappella singing all started with 26 men on a roof! Owen Clifton

Cash, a tax lawyer and barbershop fan, decided that if the art died it would be a shame. He and acquaintance Rupert Hall, an investment banker, who had met by chance in Kansas City several weeks before, discussed forming a songfest. On his return to Tulsa, Hall, a member of the exclusive Tulsa Club, managed to arrange for a location and Cash put an ad in the paper and drafted an invitation to 14 singers he knew might show up and encouraged them to bring guests to sing on April 11, 1938 at 6:30 in the evening. The management of the Tulsa Club decided to place the singers on the roof so as not to disturb the high-toned clientele. Cash said that he had invited 14 men and 26 "crashed the party". They sang and harmonized to some old songs for several hours with several breaking off into quartets as well. Apparently some Tulsa club members on the floors below complained of the "noise" so the next week they met at the Hotel Tulsa. Seventy men showed up at this second meeting.

By the end of May, the newly formed group began meeting at the Alvin Plaza Hotel with 75 to 150 men each week. Without a grand plan or scheme to do so, Cash and Hall found they had started a renewal of interest in barbershop that continues to grow today. What would later be known as the Tulsa #1 Chapter would continue to meet at the Alvin for 37 years.

The joy of singing barbershop harmony was demonstrated in the 1962 musical, The Music Man, when the lying instrument salesman, Howard Hill, deflects the inquiries of the town officials (played by then reigning male quartet, the Buffalo Bills) by showing them how well their voices blended. In the movie, he tells the ladies that they will never see one of those men again without the others!

If you think you might enjoy singing barbershop please visit the 'Wildflowers' at one of their rehearsals on Tuesday afternoons from 4 to 6 p.m. in the Lakeway Activity Center. They will help you decide which part suits your voice. For some unique entertainment, call Margaret Reese, 512-261-3916, to book the 'Wildflowers' for your next special occasion.

Viewpoints will launch its 14th year of the Distinguished Speaker-Dinner series October 20 at Lakeway Activity Center. The series will run the third Sunday night of October and November, and the third Sunday night of January, February and March 2014.

"This is a great lineup of speakers," said Jean Hennagin who chaired the speakers committee this year. "We are offering a variety of topics to present an interesting and informative evening, and the catered dinners promise to be outstanding."

Leading off October 20 will be Fred Burton, vice president of intelligence for Stratfor, an Austin-based global, geopolitical intelligence firm. Burton will speak to the Topic "Under Fire: The Untold Story of the attack in Benghazi." Burton will discuss his new book, which is described as the definitive book on the Benghazi attack, which resulted in the killing of U.S. Ambassador Chris Stephens.

On November 17, Jo Karr Tedder will speak to the topic "Water: Pray for Rain, but plan for Drought." Tedder is president of the Central Texas Water Coalition, Inc. and former representative of Lake interests on the LCRA Water Management Plan stakeholders advisory committee. Tedder comments that water is the lifeblood of Central Texas, and the Highland Lakes are the anchor for communities, businesses and the economy.

Evan Smith will speak January 19, 2014 to the topic "Where We Are and Where We're Going." As a political and policy expert and former editor of Texas Monthly, Smith will discuss what is happening today and where Texas goes from here on the more important issues facing our state.

On February 16, 2014 Scott McMahon will speak to the topic "The Convention and Texian War for Independence." McMahon says "while fighting raged across the Western Settlements of Texas, a group of men and women were fighting a different kind of battle in a small town on the Brazos River. Hear their story."

Dr. Jeffrey Silverman will speak March 16, 2014 on "Exploding Stars, Dark Energy And the Runaway Universe." Silverman is National Science Foundation Astronomy and Astrophysics Fellow at the University of Texas. He will talk about how we find and study supernovae and why you should care about them (aside from the simple fact that big explosions are awesome!)

## **BRINGING GOOGLE FIBER TO LAKE TRAVIS COMMUNITIES**

In April, Google announced Austin would become the second fiber city in the U.S. The company plans to have the first "fiberhood" connected to its ultra-fast broadband by mid-2014. Though few details are available on how the tech company will select the first neighborhood to get the gigabit-speed Internet and TV package, one thing is certain – neighborhoods and homeowner associations are a vital key to how the areas will be chosen.

Those neighborhoods or areas that have the most people signed up means they will probably be get fiber first. Kansas City was Google's first fiber city and the company will likely follow their lead on how to choose the areas they serve in Austin. Google based their service on what they call "build by demand model." Google picked the first neighborhood solely based on which neighborhood had the highest rate of registrants on a similar site. One of the many traits of the Lake Travis communities is the number of small businesses and professionals who work from home. Ultra-fast broadband would be a plus for many who are not supported by large company broadband systems. Additionally, the Lake Travis communities would become more attractive for businesses and companies to make this area their home.

A grass roots effort is underway to get the communities of Lake Travis (Bee Cave, Lakeway, out to Hamilton Pool Road and 71 to Spicewood) signed up. To register your desire to have ultra-fast broadband in our area, register your zip code at https://fiber.google. com/cities/austin/.
