CLUBHOUSE UPDATE

The clubhouse continues to move toward completion; however, the unusually cold weather coupled with the freezing rain, did slow down progress. Our contractor is striving to make up lost time, but we are approximately 10 days behind schedule. The primary focus for the next few weeks will be the completion of the exterior, specifically the roof, brick and stucco. The interior focus will be completion of the electrical and security wiring. The HVAC has been completed as well as all interior framing. The windows and the majority of the new security fence have also been completed. The main room clubhouse furniture and the workout room furniture have been ordered. Landscaping bids are being acquired for the area around the clubhouse. Outdoor furniture is currently being evaluated for repair or replacement.

We will be doing modifications in the next few months to the guard house to match the new clubhouse and to give the gate attendants a division between the kitchen and restroom area. The call box will also be relocated to provide better visibility for the attendants and cars coming in the visitor gate.

PUTTING GREEN IN LOE? YOUR COMMENTS REQUESTED.

The Board has spent a lot of time working on the clubhouse to make it as functional and beautiful as possible while staying within our budget. As the clubhouse continues to take shape, we are looking at improving the landscaping adjacent to the clubhouse. As part of this effort, we noticed the volleyball beach area behind the tennis courts badly needs maintenance. As we priced the maintenance cost, we began to discuss how that area could be used more effectively. Our understanding is the volleyball area is rarely used. We considered just sodding the area and removing the volleyball court, but we also thought how nice it would be to convert the area into something more usable by the residents. We considered a basketball court, but believe the noise would be disruptive to the neighboring homes. We then began to discuss installing a putting green. A putting green would have several distinct advantages:

- Many people play golf in our subdivision and a putting green would likely be highly used.
- A putting green could be enjoyed by all ages and could be used for community social events.
- None of the surrounding subdivisions have a putting green, so it would be a community amenity unlike our neighbors. This addition coupled with the new clubhouse, would make us extremely attractive to buyers.
- The putting green would be a high quality synthetic grass to ensure durability and keep future maintenance costs low.

So what's the downside? Our preliminary cost estimates for a putting green are approximately \$40,000. Before we proceed with additional estimates and a lot more work on this issue, the Board would like to solicit homeowner comments. Specifically, we would like to know the following:

Would you be in favor of having a putting green?

If the answer is yes, how do you think we should pay for it? The HOA does have over \$320,000 in our reserve account, so it could be purchased out of that account. Alternatively, we could have some sort of a fundraiser specifically for the putting green. If you favor doing a fund raiser, would YOU be willing to contribute to the putting green? The Board would be willing to identify any major contributor.

If the answer is no, would you prefer we keep the area as a volleyball court or just grass in the area. Please remember both of these options also involve cost.

Swans Can Be Dangerous

This time of the year, Mother Nature provides our LOE swans with some common sense. It is mating, nesting, and egg-laying season and they feel the need to protect their territory against predators including humans, dogs, and waterfowl. Most of the swans in our neighborhood are not old enough to mate but some will go through the motions of even building a nest. The pairs of swans that are old enough to produce young (cygnets) are normally gentle and can be hand fed while posing no threat. However, our cobs (males) will become aggressive and territorial in trying to protect his pen (female) and nest. This is usually temporary until mating season is over. If you are walking past a lake and a swan swims to your side and follows you, BEWARE! If you see a swan with his neck back and feathers up such as the one in the accompanying picture, please stay away, do not attempt to feed him, and walk on the other side of the street as he is in his ATTACK position. Please warn your nannies and sitters not to stroll babies around the swans. We must try to remember that the swans are merely protecting their territory and readying the area for their young. We need to be as cautious of them as they are of us. Thank you for your cooperation!





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STRESSING NEIGHBORHOOD SAFETY

Many residents enjoy our beautiful streets and sidewalks for walking, jogging, bike riding, and other activities. While enjoying these activities, please consider taking proper precautions to protect yourselves and your families from accidents or mishaps. It is especially difficult at dawn and dusk for motorists to see pedestrians and vice versa. Consider following these procedures and precautions:

- Use the sidewalks for walking, jogging, pushing strollers, roller blading, skate boarding, and other pedestrian activities.
- Use the protection offered by obeying traffic signs and laws; ask your visitors to do the same.
- Bicycles should be ridden in streets and not on sidewalks; bicyclists should use the same protection offered by obeying traffic signs that also applies to authorized motorized vehicles.
- Wear reflective clothing and/or shoes especially at dawn and dusk.
- Non-licensed drivers and non-licensed motorized vehicles are not allowed in Lakes on Eldridge.



DELIVERY, CONTRACTOR & VISITOR VEHICLES

Key Maps, Bing, and other search engines do not show the two LOE entrances on Tanner Road as gated. This results in visitors, delivery, and service vehicles arriving at the entrances and discovering access is restricted. These vehicles cause traffic disruptions by either turning around or blocking the gate by waiting for a LOE resident to enter or exit. Residents can control unregistered and unwanted vehicles entering our community by providing specific information to visitors and vendors for appropriate access at the Eldridge Parkway entrance. Your cooperation to direct all non-resident vehicles to the front gate is appreciated.

March 24 – *Funny in Farsi* by Firoozeh Dumas. When seven-yearold Firoozeh Dumas's family moved to Whittier, California, from Iran in 1972, they didn't plan to stay. A former graduate student in Texas, Dumas's father had strong memories of America and wanted his children to spend some time growing up in the land of spotless freeway rest stops and grocery store sample trays laden with pigs-inblanket. After several years, they returned to their homeland, only to be swept up in the Iranian Revolution. With so much uncertainty about life in Iran, the family moved back to Southern California for good, and aunts, uncles, and cousins soon followed. Dumas depicts her and her relatives' encounters with American culture in comic vignettes that reveal a wonderful storytelling talent.

April 28 – Sycamore Row by John Grisham. Often named an alltime favorite by John Grisham's legions of fans, the book that started it all gets a brand-new chapter. America's favorite storyteller returns to Ford County, Mississippi, where defense attorney Jake Brigance will have to fight for justice in a trial that could tear the small town of Clanton apart.

May 19 – *Americanah* by Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie. One of The New York Times's Ten Best Books of the Year and an NBCC Award Finalist. An NPR «Great Reads» Book, a Chicago Tribune Best Book, a Washington Post Notable Book, a Seattle Times Best Book, an Entertainment Weekly Top Fiction Book, a Newsday Top 10 Book, and a Goodreads Best of the Year pick. A powerful, tender story of race and identity by Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie, the award-winning author of Half of a Yellow Sun.

June 23 – Me Before You by Jojo Moyes. They had nothing in common until love gave them everything to lose . . . Louisa Clark is an ordinary girl living an exceedingly ordinary life—steady boyfriend, close family—who has barely been farther afield than their tiny village. She takes a badly needed job working for ex Master of the Universe Will Traynor, who is wheelchair bound after an accident. Will has always lived a huge life—big deals, extreme sports, worldwide travel—and now he's pretty sure he cannot live the way he is.

July 28 – The Boy on the Wooden Box by Leon Leyson. Even in the darkest of times—especially in the darkest of times—there is room for strength and bravery. A remarkable memoir from Leon Leyson, one of the youngest children to survive the Holocaust on Oskar Schindler's list.
