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

#### **SUMMER CAMPS**

We have so many great kids' camps scheduled at the Circle C Community Center for this summer. This will bring up our calendar of different events scheduled at the Community Center that are open to residents. #### **SNAKES AND OTHER WILDLIFE**

We wanted to remind everyone that it's that time of year when the weather is getting warmer, so snakes and other wildlife are starting to show up in the community. Be careful when you are walking the trails or in the greenbelts.

#### **COA WATERING SCHEDULE**

Please remember that we are still in Stage 2 watering restrictions.

• Your assigned watering day is determined by property type, type of irrigation used, and whether the street address ends in an even or odd number.

• Hose-end irrigation may take place between midnight and 10 a.m. and between 7 p.m. and midnight on your assigned watering day.

• Automatic irrigation systems may operate between midnight and 5 a.m. and between 7 p.m. and midnight on your watering day.

- Please reduce system run times to fit within this schedule.
- Please ensure that your system has a working rain sensor, or operate the system manually when rain is forecasted.

• Watering with a hand-held hose or a refillable watering vessel, such as a bucket or a Treegator<sup>®</sup>, is allowed at any time on any day of the week.

• Drip irrigation is exempt from the schedule, due to increased efficiency.

• To water trees, soaker hoses may be used under the drip-line of the tree canopy or you may use automatic tree bubblers. Irrigating trees in this manner is exempt from the watering schedule

• Watering a vegetable garden with a soaker hose is exempt from the watering schedule.

• Washing vehicles at home is prohibited. If you need to wash a vehicle, you may do so at a commercial carwash facility.

- Charity car washes are prohibited
- Fountains with either a fall or spray of water greater than four inches are prohibited unless necessary to preserve aquatic life.
  - Restaurants may not serve water unless requested by a customer

• Commercial properties (including restaurants and bars) may only operate patio misters between 4 p.m. and midnight.

#### **CITY OF AUSTIN CODE ON LITTER**

A little known City of Austin Code (10-5-43) addresses litter removal. Litter is defined as garbage, trash, rubbish, ashes, manure, waste, cloth or rags, paper or cardboard, leaves, grass cuttings, or refuse. This code requires property owners to remove litter from one-half of the street adjacent to the owner or occupant's property. For our neighborhood, this means that yard debris must be disposed of properly; it is a violation of City of Austin Code to leave it in the street. Please be sure to keep the street and curb line in front of your home swept clean. Do your part to keep Circle C beautiful.

Further, City of Austin Watershed Protection addresses this same issue if leaves and clippings are left in the street, swept or blown into the street or sewer system. This debris eventually ends up in the sewer system and pollutes our waterways. Do not sweep or blow your leaves and lawn clippings into the street or sewer system.

#### **SCOOP THE POOP**

We have received recent reports of residents that are not picking up after their dogs. We also receive reports of residents bagging pet's poop then tossing the bag into the common area shrubbery. Please do your part as a responsible pet owner and also as a Circle C resident by picking up after your dog AND disposing of the waste back at home in your personal trash container. It is not only the responsible thing to do but also the sanitary thing to do.

#### HAVE YOU RECEIVED A DEED RESTRICTION?

As reported in each month's newsletter, the HOA staff drives at least two sections of the neighborhood per month to note violations of the Declaration of Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions. These commonly include: front yard landscape maintenance (mowing, edging, free of weeds), home maintenance (paint, screens, siding) and recreational vehicles (boats, RV's, trailers) parked in the driveway. The HOA is required by state law to notify owners in writing via certified mail and allow for the homeowner to request a hearing before the board of directors. If you receive a letter, please contact us at the HOA office and let us know your individual situation. We would like to work with you to bring your home into compliance. If you would like to report a violation, you can do so via our website at www.circlecranch.info.

## WATERWISE LANDSCAPE

What is it? WaterWise Landscape refers to landscaping and gardening that reduces the need for supplemental water from irrigation. Because major water savings can be made by converting healthy turf grass to native plant beds and permeable hardscape, WaterWise landscape is becoming increasingly popular in the Austin area.

Good news! As a Circle C Homeowner, you are able to change your front yard landscaping to a WaterWise landscape by following the procedure and guidelines set forth by the Architectural Control Committee. Before any work can begin you are required to submit your project for approval. The full list of guidelines and submission materials can be found under the ACC section of the Circle C website. Please note that there is a \$30 review fee associated with WaterWise landscaping projects.

We would also like to note that the majority of homes in the neighborhood that have made this conversion to WaterWise landscaping have used professional landscape design companies and, while not a requirement, we do highly encourage it. A list of professionals that have completed a series of training classes emphasizing earth-wise landscaping principles is available online. More good news! There is a rebate program in place for individuals wishing to install WaterWise landscaping. From the City of Austin website: "Residential properties may receive \$25 for every 100 sq.ft. converted from healthy turf grass to native plant beds with a maximum rebate amount of \$1,250." ## **BASTARD CABBAGE, AN INVASIVE PLANT AND A THREAT TO OUR WILDFLOWERS**

If you've taken a drive along any of our Central Texas Highways recently, then surely you've noticed that we are in the middle of a beautiful wildflower season. Bluebonnets, Indian Paintbrush, Firewheels and Verbena to name a few, are flourishing along our roadsides and signal that Spring is in full bloom around here.

However, there is one plant to look out for that is common along roadways, disturbed lands and natural areas- Bastard Cabbage. Unfortunately yes, that is its name, and it's an invasive plant and is killing Central Texas native wildflowers. Bastard Cabbage is an aggressive weed that quickly colonizes sunny, disturbed soils along roads, fields, and waterways. In Texas, Bastard Cabbage is classified as a "terrestrial noxious weed" because of its ability to outcompete the native wildflowers during their winter growth season. Masses of bastard cabbage can be several feet tall and typically flower



from early spring into summer, bearing clusters of small, showy yellow flowers at the tips of its branches. According to the Lady (Continued on Page 10)

Bird Johnson Wildflower Center, "the great weather has allowed these unwanted species to flower profusely and to produce lots of seed to potentially be a much larger problem next year. Because they compete for space and for resources with native plants, they could reduce next season's wildflower displays." We do have a lot of Bastard Cabbage up and down South Loop 1 and SH 45 where recent construction has left bare soils where this weed likes to congregate and spread.

Invasives such as Bastard Cabbage are best dealt with by eradicating them in the fall or winter when the plants have just started to grow and then re-sowing the area with seeds from native species. Chemical control of Bastard Cabbage may be difficult because of its ability to attain resistance to several selective herbicides- which can also kill off wanted native species. For fully formed plants, mowing will remove some flowers, but not all seed. Physically pulling them- root and all- before the flowers go to seed is a more effective strategy, as is the case with any weed.

Bastard Cabbage is also known as turnip-weed, common giant mustard, ball mustard, wild turnip, wild rape and tall mustard-weed. So, if you see any Bastard Cabbage around you, pull it up! You will be doing the wildflowers a favor.



### The Modern Game: The Top Spin Forehand

In previous newsletters, I offered tips on how to execute the basic strokes for players who are starting to play tennis or who want to get back into the game.

From this newsletter on, I will be offering suggestions on how to play the "modern" game mostly geared towards players who are happy with hitting the ball over the net and controlling the point with consistency. These players may be already playing for leagues or tournaments and are looking for more "weapons" on the court.

In this issue, I will offer instructions on how to execute the Top Spin Forehand. This shot is used when a player is now hitting the ball long and out. The ball will be aimed high over the net and hit with power. The ball will have a "top spin" so that when the ball hits the court, it will take a big hop, forcing the opponent to fall back close to the fence, or to hit the ball on the rise.

In the illustrations, Danny Rodriguez, Director of the Pre-Advanced Tennis Program at the Grey Rock Tennis Club, shows the proper technique to execute this stroke. This shot can also be executed from the service line as an "approach shot" to the net.

Step 1: The Ready Position: When Danny prepares to hit

a forehand top spin, he will change his grip toward the "semiwestern" or "full western grip" (The palm of the hand is flat on the handle). His knees are slightly flexed and his eyes are focused on the oncoming ball.

Step 2: The Back Swing: Danny is now ready to perform the shot. The head of the racket is now above is head, his shoulders are turned, the left hand is in front to help him keep the center of gravity in front, and he has loaded his weight to the back foot. His grip is relaxed and his wrist is "laid back" to allow maximum point of contact.

Step 3: The Point of Contact: The success of a top spin shot is keeping the ball on the strings going from low to high in a 30 degree angle. Danny started the swing high and "looped" it to allow the head of the racket ti drop down. He will be brushing the ball as he makes contact with it. His left shoulder is almost opening and his weight has now been shifted toward the front.

Step 4: The Follow Through: Notice Danny's finish above his left ear and his elbow pointing toward his target. He has now shifted his weight on his right foot and is ready to shuffle back to his home base.










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### NEWS FROM THE PARK WEST HOA BOARD

Spring is here! Evidence of new growth, new plantings and lots and lots of oak leaves are everywhere to be seen.

therefore after filing an accident report with the police, a claim was filed with our insurance carrier for the cost of the repairs.

#### WEST ENTRANCE GATE

As most of you know, the entrance gate at the west entrance to the community was damaged by a late night/early morning collision several weeks ago. The first attempt to repair it was unsuccessful. The mobile unit from the gate company that was dispatched to Park West determined there was more damage than could be repaired by the mobile unit. Next, the damaged gate panel was removed and taken to their repair shop where the gate company successfully repaired the gate panel and then reinstalled it. Unfortunately the operational unit also sustained damage and is now being repaired. For safety reasons, both gates at the west entrance have been programmed to the open position to minimize confusion and possible accidents that might result from two way traffic on the one (exit) gate. It has been a slow process and we appreciate everyone's cooperation. At this time, no one has been identified as having caused the damage,

#### LOT 103

We have not received a decision from the Watershed Protection Department of the City of Austin regarding the filtration pond located on Lot 103. In late 2006, this department decided that this was PWHOA's responsibility and we must assume the maintenance/remediation of this pond. After much research and collaboration with Susan Hoover and Karen Hibpshman of Circle C HOA, we presented our case to the Watershed Protection Department stating that they should actually be responsible for the Lot 103 pond. It has moved along and they are doing their own research now. Maintenance costs are significant, so a decision in our favor would be most welcome.

#### **ESCARPMENT DISREPAIR**

Escarpment Blvd., in particular from Slaughter Lane to LaCrosse, is in disrepair. As you know from driving your vehicle on that section of Escarpment Blvd., the road is uneven and bumpy, the pavement is worn and missing in some areas, and cracks and potholes have developed. Complaints from citizens requesting street repair may result in Escarpment Blvd. being considered for repair sooner rather than later. If you would be willing to help move this process along, please call 311 and politely complain about the condition of this section of Escarpment. Thank you.

#### UPDATE - COMMERCIAL IRRIGATION ASSESSMEMT:

PWHOA passed the recent inspection by the City of Austin of our irrigation system. (Water audits are new requirements by the city).

#### WHO YA GONNA CALL??

Not sure who to contact on a building project, exterior paint color, front yard. etc.? Remember that substantial changes to your yard or home require submission of a request to the Circle C HOA Architectural Committee. Except for the front yard, they have the last word. PWHOA requires additional approval on front lawn changes. If you are only repainting with the same color, replanting dead plants from the approved list, re-sodding with an approved grass type etc. you may proceed without contacting CCHOA or PWHOA. If you still are not sure, contact our property manager, Marilyn Childress at 512-750-2883.

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

## News You Can Use





Rover ants are tiny (~1/16" long) and brownish-black. They have 9 antennal segments which differentiates them from many other ants, but you'll need a good hand lens or microscope to count antennal segments. The abdomen of rover ants is pudgy and the ants have a "humpbacked" appearance.

Colonies, or nests, are small and have a single queen. They can occur inside structures in places such as wall voids usually in areas of moisture- kitchen, bathrooms and near plumbing leaks. Outdoors, people often find the ants nesting under and/or inside flower pots, under stones and landscape timbers or running quickly up and down patio furniture or other vertical surfaces.

Worker ants will often be seen foraging on plants, and are often mistakenly identified as damaging the plant. The workers are tending honeydew excreted by insects such as aphids, mealybugs, whiteflies and scale insects. Controlling the honeydew-producing insects in the landscape can help cut down on ant problems.

The ants can be somewhat difficult to manage since they don't respond well to most solid baits. They do appear to take liquid baits fairly well. Sprays should not be used to treat for rover ants since this can split the colony up and make the ants more difficult to manage.

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
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
