TALKING TRASH - "You've Been Served!"

Many of us have heard the term "You've Been Served!" either on television or possibly in person. It usually involves a process server handing over a piece of paper requiring an appearance in a courtroom. In this case, it's serving notice that we have a new trash/recycle company. Royal Waste & Recycle was sold late last year. The former owner had always wanted a waste company and to grow it. He did and then he had the opportunity to sell it. Royal was bought by Waste Corporation of America (WCA). Nothing really changes for us at this time except in the Recycling arena. According to WCA's web site they do not accept plastic bags (we will have to take them to the grocery stores), any numbered Styrofoam or wax-board containers (milk & juice cartons). WCA retained all of the employees of Royal with the exception of one none essential and also kept the pink trucks. If you have not already, you may see a blue, white or blue & white truck, in addition to the pink. The new contact phone number is: (281) 368-8397. Office hours are Monday - Thursday 8am to 5pm and Friday 8am to 4pm. If you feel like your trash was missed and it is outside business hours you may email our account rep, Randy Morgan at: rmorgan@wcamerica.com. If the trucks are still in the neighborhood, he will redirect them to your address. However, if you just missed putting it out before your street was serviced, please put it out on the next regularly scheduled pick up day.

WCA's motto is: WCA C.A.R.E.S. (Conserving and Renewing: Environmental Sustainability). WCA is a vertically integrated nonhazardous solid waste management company providing waste collection, transfer, material processing and disposal services. Commencing business in 2000 in Houston, the company has expanded under the guidance of a veteran management team to cover twelve states. They provide services to over half a million residential and commercial/residential customers. WCA strives to be a leader in the solid waste industry and holds itself to the highest environmental and ethical standards.

LANDFILLS

Landfill gas is a mix of different gases created by the decomposition of waste within a landfill. WCA is committed to converting landfill gases into alternative beneficial uses. A portion of the gas is flared off, while another share is used to produce electricity and heat or upgraded to pipeline grade gas. While several of their landfills already have such processes in place, the Fort Bend Landfill (FBL) is working with Enerdyne on a

project to take the methane gas produced and clean it up into a high BTU standard and pipe it into a high pressure pipeline. WCA owns/ maintains the FBL, located in Needville in Fort Bend County, which produces bio natural gas for injection into natural gas pipelines. This site encompasses 1200 acres that exists on the south portion of Davis Estate Road and includes WCA's Wetlands Project which encompasses 31 acres of mitigated wetlands (this property has not had any excavation performed on it and also includes two beautiful lakes).

RECYCLING

WCA believes recycling is an integral part of the sustainability movement across America. In order to ensure that WCA has an impact in maintaining a greener planet, they have in place residential recycling programs generating over 500 TONS of recyclables per week, as well as landfill recycling programs which focus on recycling scrap metals. WCA also recycles other useful materials received from customers for roads and alternative uses. With the recycling program they are jointly able to save energy, conserve natural resources such as water, timber, and other raw materials, reduce pollution caused by the need to produce new material and help sustain the environment for future generations. Like Royal, WCA is committed to being involved within the communities they serve. The Fort Bend Landfill, donates annually to the George Ranch. The money goes to a 501(c)(3) charitable fund which enables thousands of under privileged children to tour the George Ranch and learn more about 150+ years of Texas history.

WCA is also a supporter of Breast Cancer Research. On January 27th of this year, the WCA 2nd Annual Charity Golf Tournament was held at the Wildcat Golf Club in Houston. Players from 40 different companies along with WCA, totaling nearly 100 golfers, raised \$39,000 for Breast Cancer Research.

To report street or curb damage, missing/damaged street signs and street flooding: (281) 353-8424 or www.hcp4.net.

If a resident wants to request a new sign or replace a damaged one, they have to go online and fill out a request.

STREET LIGHT OUT?

If you notice a street light out PLEASE report it to CenterPoint Energy. We pay for all of the street lights in our subdivision... every month...regardless if they are illuminated or not!! This is also a serious safety issue. To report an outage, follow these steps:

- 1. Dial (713) 207-2222.
- 2. Choose a language preference.
- 3. Select option "4" (for street light outages).
- 4. Provide the 6 digit number (located approximately 5 feet up the pole), street name and closest address.

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CARDBOARD: Corrugated Cardboard Boxes, Paperboard Boxes (cereal, soda/beer, egg, shoe boxes).

CONTAINERS: Aluminum Cans, Tin Cans, Steel Cans, Glass Bottles/Jars, Empty Aerosol Cans, Aluminum Foil (CLEAN), Plastics #1 - #7 (milk, soda, water, juice shampoo, detergent, pool supplies, pet food/litter), Metal Pots & Pans, Copper, Scrap Metal (nails, screws, gutters).

UNACCEPTABLE MATERIALS: PLASTIC BAGS, STYROFOAM, Wrapping Paper, USED Pizza Boxes, Coat Hangers, Paint & Solvent Containers, Light Bulbs, Mirrors, Windows, Dishes & Cups, Pyrex Pans, WET* or Soiled Paper, Paper Towels, Facial & Toilet Tissue, Disposable Plates & Cups, Milk & Juice Cartons (waxboard containers).

*This means if Paper and/or Cardboard items get wet, they will be trashed - not recycled!!

If you know it is going to rain, please consider protecting these items with a plastic bag.

HEAVY TRASH DAYS - Friday only. If your trash item (king mattress, large screen television, etc.) requires more than one person to handle, you will need to call for a special pick up and in some instances, you may have to pay additional to have the items disposed of.

According to their website, Nextdoor is a private social network for you, your neighbors and your community. Thousands of neighborhoods are already using Nextdoor to build happier, safer places to call home.

Willowbridge/Stonebridge had 275+ (next goal: 300) members when we went to press. Some days you may have a single posting, others you may have 30 members from various neighborhoods chiming in! Some postings will be of interest to you, some may bore you to tears. Julie Dubois, our Security Liason has started posting alerts to the site. - Finally call that nice man down the street by his first name



Reasons to "Scoop the Poop"

Dogs are a very popular pet and are found in many households. There are 70 million pet dogs in the United States alone. Opening up your home to a dog also means accepting responsibility for that pet, including cleaning up their waste.

Most people have heard the term "scoop the poop" but some people may not have heard the reasons why this is so important. Some people view dog feces (or what most people call dog poop) as a good fertilizer, but this is actually a myth. Dog diets mostly contain animal products such as chicken and turkey. Thus, a dog's waste contains substances created by the breakdown of the animal products. It does not enrich the soil for plants such as grass.

If not picked up, dog feces can enter waterways via storm drains after it rains. Nitrogen in the feces depletes the oxygen from the water, and the water is made harmful to fish and other aquatics. It is often listed as the third leading cause of water pollution.

Dog feces are also considered an environmental pollutant as it contains harmful organisms. One gram of dog feces may contain as much as 23 million bacteria. Harmful bacteria such as Salmonella and E. coli can be found in dog feces. Parasites such as Giardia, Cryptosporidium, roundworms, hookworms and whipworms may also be found. Many of the parasites (usually in a resistant egg form) linger in the environment for years, even if the rest of the dog feces breaks down over time. Both bacteria and parasites are health hazards for both humans and animals that come in contact with them.

Besides the "ick" factor of stepping in dog poop and the unpleasant odor of it, dog feces can serve to attract pests (such as flies) and rodents (such as rats). Being a responsible pet owner and scooping your dog's poop is important for the community health of both humans and animals. It helps Improve local water quality. Scooping your dog's poop also promotes favorable views towards dogs by others in the community.

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
