City Of Austin Code on Litter

A little known City of Austin Code (10-5-43) addresses litter removal. Litter is defined as garbage, trash, rubbish, ashes, manure, waste, cloth or rags, paper or cardboard, leaves, grass cuttings, or refuse. This code requires property owners to remove litter from one-half of the street adjacent to the owner or occupant's property.

For our neighborhood, this means that yard debris must be disposed of properly; it is a violation of City of Austin Code to leave it in the street. Please be sure to keep the street and curb line in front of your home swept clean.

Further, City of Austin Watershed Protection addresses this same issue if leaves and clippings are left in the street, swept or blown into the street or sewer system. This debris eventually ends up in the sewer system and pollutes our waterways.

Do your part to keep Circle C beautiful!

Who to call? City of Austin or Circle C HOA?

We get calls all the time for various issues throughout the neighborhood that are actually issues that are handled by the City of Austin. Here is a breakdown of when to call the City and when to call the HOA:

City of Austin:

- Emergencies, vandalism, burglaries, suspicious activity
- Based on the incident, either call 911 or 311 first; you may then report it to the HOA so we can inform other residents of the activity.
- Call 911 if the incident requires a police officer's immediate response, call 311 if after the fact and no officer is required.
- Anything that occurs on the street
- The City owns the streets in Circle C, so anything that occurs on the street must be reported to the City. The HOA has no jurisdiction over the street or any activity that occurs there. This would include illegally parked cars (read the Vehicles and Parking in Circle C article below for more details), solicitors, driving/traffic/safety concerns, road conditions, street lights, etc.
- · Illegal activity
- Fireworks in the neighborhood, people in the "no trespassing" areas, airsoft guns, etc.
- Watering restrictions
- Wild animals
- City of Austin Right of Way
- The City of Austin right of way is 10 feet back from the face of the

curb. This is typically the area up to the first seam in the driveway. Any issues that happen within this area (basketball hoops, obstruction of sidewalks, etc.) should be called into 311.

- · Backvard activity
- The HOA can only regulate what can be viewed from the street. If there are issues with a neighbor's backyard, you may call 311 to see if they are able to assist you.

Circle C HOA:

- Anything that ties directly back to the Governing Documents
- Maintenance of the home: exterior paint, shutters, window screens, etc.
- Maintenance of the lawn: keeping the yard mowed and edged, trimming trees and shrubbery, removing dead vegetation, maintaining bedding areas, etc.
- Clutter and debris
- Trash carts left out outside of trash pickup days
- Barking dogs
- Fences
- The HOA can only regulate what we can see from the street view. The HOA does not get involved when the back fences and fences shared with neighbors are not visible from the street.
- Any activity in the driveway: clutter and debris in the driveway; disabled cars in the driveway; jet skis, boats, trailers parked in the driveway



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

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

The City of Austin Honors a Former Circle C Resident -

On February 26, 2015, the Austin City Council approved a resolution renaming the City's Park and Recreation Department (PARD) Main Office the "Jack W. Robinson Parks and Recreation Department Main Office" in honor of former Park West resident Jack Robinson.

The honor goes to a man who started out as manager of Austin's beloved and historic Zilker Park. A man who -- like his father and

family did -- lived in the Park's tiny, stone caretaker's cottage and who would eventually become Director of Austin's sprawling Parks and Recreation Department and move into the building that now bears his name.

It goes to a man who enjoyed the personal trust and friendship

of Lady Bird Johnson and who shared with the former First Lady a deep love of the outdoors and a passion for protecting and beautifying the Austin and Texas landscape. A man who, as the First Lady's right hand man, was instrumental in the beautification of the Austin Town Lake (now the Lady Bird Lake) Hike and Bike Trail and the founding of the famous Wildflower Center right next to Circle C.

More than thirty letters from the former First Lady to Jack Robinson, some handwritten, reflect the growing sense of reliance, respect and friendship between Lady Bird and Jack Robinson -- a close official and personal relationship that started in 1972 and that would continue for more than a dozen years.

In a December 14, 1982, letter to Robinson, Lady Bird thanks Robinson for agreeing to join the Board of the nascent National Wildflower Research Center -- today the Wildflower Center -- and tells Robinson how "full of excitement," she plans

to announce the news on her birthday, the following week. And oh, by the way, "...you will be here for my birthday party the night of Dec. 22. Right?" she pens at the bottom of the letter.

Today, 32 years later, the daughter of President Lyndon B. Johnson and Lady Bird Johnson echoes similar fond sentiments and admiration for the late Jack Robinson.

In a letter supporting the naming of the Austin PARD main office for Jack Robinson, Luci Baines Johnson recalls her mother's fondness for Robinson and her gratitude for his efforts

to beautify the Texas capital. Johnson writes how proud Lady Bird

was when her friend Jack agreed to serve on her "next love," the Lady Bird Johnson Wildflower Center's board. "She leaned on his experience and valued it as none other," Luci Baines Johnson writes.

Luci Baines Johnson also remembers her mother saying, "I was just a part of a merry band of citizens committed to making [the Hike and Bike Trail] a place we can all enjoy for generations." Luci Baines Johnson playfully adds, "Well, if Mother was in the band with [former Austin] Mayor and Mrs. Butler, Jack was the drum major."

And so it goes. Letter after letter praises the accomplishments and the legacy of a distinguished Texan, a superb public servant, an outstanding manager, a loyal colleague, a loving family man, a good friend.

Warren Struss, former Austin PARD Director, refers to the Parks and Recreation Department as "The House that Jack Built."

Now, finally, the building that houses that institution will bear the name of its builder.

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"Tennis Tips for Children 8 years old and under"

In previous newsletters, I offered tips on how to execute the basic strokes for players who are just beginning to play tennis or who want to resume playing. In later issues, I offered suggestions on how to play the "modern" game mostly geared towards players who are happy with hitting the ball over the net and controlling the point with consistency. These players may already be playing for leagues or in tournaments and are looking for more "weapons" on the court.

Beginning with this issue, I will offer advice on how to involve children of all ages to learn to play tennis and offer tips to the parents on how to help at home. This issue will address tips for children 8 years old and under.

Caption 1: Tennis Racket and balls: The children should be using rackets ranging in length from 19" to 23" long and the red foam ball. These short, lighter rackets and lower-bouncing balls will make it easier for the child to control the swing and the point of contact. The racket to use will depend on the height of the child and the age.

Caption 2: Tennis Court: Most clubs have added lines to allow as many as 16 players to be playing on one regular tennis court. Special smaller nets are placed at the dividing center line of the court, thus making the courts only 36' long and 20' wide

Caption 3: Helping the Player: I suggest tossing the ball as close to the child as possible and let him/her become adjusted to the point of contact. To teach them the eye-hand-ball coordination, I suggest trying to let them hit the ball on the fly first, and later after the ball has bounced.

Caption 4: Join a Group: Tennis, just like other sports, is learned better in a group. Children like to imitate other children and learn from their good hits and also avoid their missed shots. I believe in allowing them to "shadow" the person executing the shot, so they become used to the swing and timing of the point of contact.

Caption 5: Ready to Play: Future star? They are never too young to get started!!

Tips to parents:

- Have child tap the red ball or soft inflated balloon up and down on the ground in a safe area, like a garage
- Do the same with ball being hit on the fly without bouncing
- Encourage them to hit in a safe area with them dropping the ball and hitting it against a wall or a garage door. Always be there to supervise

GET MORE FROM YOUR GARDEN

Raspberries require little care to grow, but can cost a lot at the store. You can even freeze them.

Mixed salad greens, like baby lettuce and arugula are tough and quick growing, even after cutting.

If you cut them correctly they will grow again. Start at one end of your garden and cut plants about an inch from the ground. The plant could grow back 3-4 times in a season.

Flat gardening was popular years ago, but now raised beds are much better. They prevent weeds from taking over, let water drain more efficiently and plants thrive in aerated soil.

A very common error in gardening is over watering and drowning plants. If it rains at least one inch per week, you can probably skip heavy watering. Purchase a rain gauge (under \$10) at garden stores to keep track of how much or how little water your plant is getting and add or subtract from there.



Portable Fire Extinguishers



Use a portable fire extinguisher when the fire is confined to a small area, such as a wastebasket, and is not growing; everyone has exited the building; the fire department has been called or is being called; and the room is not filled with smoke.

To operate a fire extinguisher, remember the word PASS:

- PULL the pin. Hold the extinguisher with the nozzle pointing away from you, and release the locking mechanism.
- **AIM** low. Point the extinguisher at the base of the fire.
- **SQUEEZE** the lever slowly and evenly.
- **SWEEP** the nozzle from side-to-side.

For the home, select a multi-purpose extinguisher (can be used on all types of home fires) that is large enough to put out a small fire, but not so heavy as to be difficult to handle.

Choose a fire extinguisher that carries the label of an independent testing laboratory.

Read the instructions that come with the fire extinguisher and become familiar with its parts and operation before a fire breaks out.


Install fire extinguishers close to an exit and keep your back to a clear exit when you use the device so you can make an easy escape if the fire cannot be controlled. If the room fills with smoke, leave immediately.

Know when to go. Fire extinguishers are one element of a fire response plan, but the primary element is safe escape. Every household should have a home fire escape plan and working smoke alarms.

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Pet Place Reasons to "Scoop the Poop"


Dogs are a very popular pet and are found in many households. There are 70 million pet dogs in the United States alone. Opening up your home to a dog also means accepting responsibility for that pet, including cleaning up their waste.

Most people have heard the term "scoop the poop" but some people may not have heard the reasons why this is so important. Some people view dog feces (or what most people call dog poop) as a good fertilizer, but this is actually a myth. Dog diets mostly contain animal products such as chicken and turkey. Thus, a dog's waste contains substances created by the breakdown of the animal products. It does not enrich the soil for plants such as grass. If not picked up, dog feces can enter waterways via storm drains after it rains. Nitrogen in the feces depletes the oxygen from the water, and the water is made harmful to fish and other aquatics. It is often listed as the third leading cause of water pollution. Dog feces are also considered an environmental pollutant as it contains harmful organisms. One gram of dog feces may contain as much as 23 million bacteria. Harmful bacteria such as Salmonella and E. coli can be found in dog feces. Parasites such as Giardia, Cryptosporidium,

roundworms, hookworms and whipworms may also be found. Many of the parasites (usually in a resistant egg form) linger in the environment for years, even if the rest of the dog feces breaks down over time. Both bacteria and parasites are health hazards for both humans and animals that come in contact with them.

Besides the "ick" factor of stepping in dog poop and the unpleasant odor of it, dog feces can serve to attract pests (such as flies) and rodents (such as rats). Being a responsible pet owner and scooping your dog's poop is important for the community health of

both humans and animals. It helps Improve local water quality. Scooping your dog's poop also promotes favorable views towards dogs by others in the community.



ARE YOU SMARTER THAN A BURGLAR?

According to a recent Washington Post article, Anatomy of a Burglar, a home burglary takes place every 14.6 seconds in the U.S. The upside, if there is one, to such an alarming statistic is that plenty of data has been collected to help us understand how these criminals operate. Since knowing your enemy is half the battle, let's take a moment to get to know our average residential burglar, shall we?

- The typical house burglar is a male under the age of 25 who lives or works in the area.
 - He does most of his work between 10 am and 3 pm.
 - He spends an average of 8 to 12 minutes inside your home.
- He wants to spend no more than 60 seconds breaking into your home
 - Of course, he'll take longer if he has a nice place to hide.
- He is particularly attracted to homes that look neglected, hidden or unoccupied.
- His first stop is usually the master bedroom where most people keep their valuables.
 - He rarely goes in the kitchen or in kids' rooms.
- He looks for cash, jewelry, electronics, silver, guns and other items that are easy to transport and sell.
 - His average take per burglary is \$1,725.

- His most common mode of entry is through the front door (34%), followed by a front window (23%) and backdoor (22%).
- Sometimes, he'll carry a clipboard. Or, he might dress like a lawn guy carrying a rake. He does his best to NOT look like a crook.
- Many times he will knock on the door or ring the doorbell to see if you're home before entering. If you answer the door, he'll just say he got the wrong address and move on to the next house.
- The two things a burglar hates most are loud dogs and nosy friendly neighbors.

Now that we've become better acquainted with our would-be burglar, we can use this knowledge to arm ourselves by implementing ways to make his job harder. Some tips to consider:

- Get to know your neighbors. Watchful eyes and ears are your best defense against unwanted intruders.
- Keep trees and shrubs around your home trimmed for visibility.
- Install motion sensor lights near front and rear entry doors
- Keep your doorbell in working order. You don't want to be surprised by an intruder who thinks he's entering an empty house.
- Keep up the appearance of a normal routine while away on vacation. Ask a neighbor or friend to put out your garbage bins, and

pick up newspapers, mail, flyers or anything that would indicate you're not at home.

- Don't announce your vacation plans on social media sites or to strangers in public.
- If you have an attached garage, secure the door by disabling the automatic opener and locking the door before you go away on a trip.
 - Secure sliding glass doors with a dowel or metal rod.
 - If you keep valuables in a home safe, considering keeping the safe in your kitchen where



valuables in an outdoor storage shed, secure the doors and windows with a deadbolt if possible.

- Keep valuables out of sight from anyone looking in your windows.
- Perform an assessment of your home's security. Consider how you would break in to your own home if you locked your keys inside. Secure those weak spots.
- A loud dog, regardless of size, can serve as a formidable alarm system.
- Consider investing in a home security system and post plenty of warning signs and window decals, which serve as highly effective deterrents on their own.

When it comes to home security it's important to implement a variety of protective measures rather than relying on just one. Taking multiple precautions works cumulatively to slow down a burglar's progress while exposing him to ever increasing risk and ultimately deterring or thwarting his efforts.

Ridiculously Clever Household Hints

- The simplest way to slice a bunch of cherry tomatoes is to sandwich them between two plastic lids and run a long knife through all of them at once!
 - Keep brown sugar soft by storing with a couple of marshmallows
- Install a regular coat rack low down the wall to store shoes safely off the floor
- Organize jewelry on a corkboard for easy viewing when deciding how to accessorize an outfit
- Fill an old wooden box with skewers to make an all-purpose knife block
 - Remove pet hair from furniture and carpets with a squeegee.
- Cover paint trays with aluminum foil to make cleaning up afterwards a breeze.
 - Flip the toaster on its side to make grilled cheese.
- Use a large muffin tin to cook stuffed peppers in the oven it will help keep them upright.
 - To prevent potatoes from budding, add an apple to the bag.
- Add half a teaspoon of baking soda to the water when hardboiling eggs to make the shells incredibly easy to peel off.
- Use non-stick cooking spray in votive holders to prevent wax from sticking to the sides

- WD-40 can be used to remove crayon marks from any surface!
- When hanging a picture frame, put a dab of toothpaste on the frame where you need the nails to be. Then simply press against the wall to leave marks (which can later be wiped) as guides for hammering in the nails.
- Sprinkle salt in the spaces between patio slabs and at the bottom of walls to get rid of pesky weeds(but be careful NOT to get salt near plants you want to keep as salt will kill them!)
- To clean a wooden chopping board, sprinkle on a handful of Kosher salt and rub with half a lemon. Rinse with clean water and dry to ensure it is clean and germ-free. You can use the same lemon and salt to clean brass.
- Use ice-cubes to lift out indentations made by furniture on your carpets.
- Prevent soil from escaping through the holes in the base of flowerpots by lining them with coffee filters
 - To sharpen scissors, simply cut through sandpaper.
 - Rub a walnut on damaged wood furniture to cover up dings.
- To prevent your eyes watering while chopping onions, wipe the chopping board with white vinegar (which won't affect the taste of the onions.)

LOVELY LUPINES NATUREWATCH by Jim and Lynne Weber

Bluebonnets are often thought of as the 'floral trademark of Texas', akin to the shamrocks of Ireland, the cherry blossoms of Japan, the roses of England, and the tulips of Holland. Loved for centuries, bluebonnets were described by early explorers as they roamed the vast prairies of Texas, planting them around the Spanish missions by early-day priests, and making them the subject of several Native American folk tales. Technically known as 'lupines' or 'lupins', bluebonnets received their present-day common name due to the shape of the flower petals, which resembled the bonnets worn by pioneer women to shield their faces from the sun.

Bluebonnets are part of the legume or bean family, and like other members of this family they offer nitrogen-fixation through their

root system's symbiotic relationship with Rhizobia bacteria. This gives them the useful ability to grow in poor, disturbed soils, and bring much-needed nitrogen back to these soils as they decompose. Ironically, bluebonnets are all in the genus Lupinus, which is Latin for 'wolf-like', from the original but erroneous belief that these plants ravenously exhausted the soil.

In our area, bluebonnets normally bloom between March and April, but the timing and extent of the blooms depends on the amount of rain received the previous fall and

winter. The flower is purple to blue in color, about half an inch long, with a white spot on the upper petal or banner. This banner spot acts as a target to attract the bumblebees and honeybees that pollinate the flower. When the pollen is fresh and sticky, the banner spot is white, and is seen by the bees as reflected ultraviolet light and appears to them as a good landing spot. But as the flower and its pollen age, the banner spot turns yellow and then reddish-magenta, and is ignored by the bees, whose vision cannot see red. The decline in bee populations has a direct effect on how many seeds a bluebonnet can produce, because bluebonnets cannot self-fertilize. Each plant has the potential to produce hundreds of seeds, but often only a small number result, due to the recent decline in the number of bee pollinators.

Infrequently, both white, and more rarely, pink bluebonnets can occur naturally. In fact, there is a legend associated with how the pink bluebonnet came to be. Many years ago, in a spring wildflower field near San Antonio, children came across a pink bluebonnet on their way to Lenten devotion at the mission church. Their grandmother told them the story of Texas, when it was a remote province of Mexico. After their Constitution was overthrown by a terrible Mexican dictator, a war broke out between the brave new Texans and the Mexican troops. The troops eventually overwhelmed the Texans, and much blood was shed and lives lost. Several years later, the grandmother saw her mother place a pink bluebonnet in a vase by the statue of the Virgin Mary. She said she found it by the river, where "it had once been white, but so much blood had been shed, it had taken a tint of it." Interestingly, the only place in the state where the original native pink bluebonnets were found was along the side of a San Antonio road not far from the original mission.

Texas has 6 state flowers, more or less, and they are all bluebonnets. In the spring of 1901, the Texas Legislature selected a state floral

> emblem after much debate and bluebonnets. They wanted the

> consternation. Both the cotton boll and prickly pear cactus were hardy contenders, but the National Society of Colonial Dames of America won the day, and the Sandyland Bluebonnet (Lupinus subcarnosus) was selected and passed into law on March 7th. And that's when the bluebonnet war started. The Sandyland Bluebonnet is a dainty little plant growing in the sandy hills of coastal and southern Texas, and many thought it was the least attractive of all the

Texas Bluebonnet (Lupinus texensis), which was a showier, bolder bloomer. For the next 70 years, the Legislature was encouraged to correct its oversight, not wanting to get caught in another botanical trap or offend any supporters. As politicians often do, they solved the problem with clever maneuvering by creating an umbrella clause, and in 1971 added the two species together, plus "any other variety of bluebonnet not heretofore recorded" (including potential species not yet discovered), and lumped them all into one state flower.

Long before the bluebonnet became the Texas state flower, many stories existed about its origins. Some believed it was a gift from the Great Spirit, and that it arrived with rain after a young, orphaned girl sacrificed her precious doll in the hopes of bringing a terrible drought to an end. Whatever you believe, look for these lovely lupines during our central Texas spring!

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FORMOSAN TERMITES



There are three main types of termites that can cause problems for homeowners in Central Texas- native subterranean termites, formosan subterranean termites and drywood termites. This article will focus of formosan termites.

Formosan termites are a more voracious type of subterranean termite. These termites have been spread throughout Texas through transport of infested material or soil. Formosan termites build carton nests that allow them to survive above ground without contact with the soil. Nests are often located in hollow spaces, such as wall voids.

Formosan subterranean termite workers and soldiers.

Formosan termites feed on a wider variety of cellulose than other subterranean termites, including live plants, consuming both spring and summer growth wood whereas native subterranean termites feed only on spring growth. Formosan termites have also been known to chew through non-cellulose materials such as soft metals, plaster or plastic.


The type of termite is determined by using soldiers (the group that defends the colony) or alates (winged reproductives) for identification. Formosan termite soldiers have a hardened head capsule that is tear-drop shaped. The alates have two heavy veins on the leading edge of the front wing along with hairs on the wings. If you suspect termites, you can submit sample insects to me for identification. Treatment would need to be carried out by a profession pest management company.

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

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
