It is time to plant that spring garden! You can plant a variety of vegetables and fruits in April.


It's time to feed your lawn, trees, shrubs, and other plants. Organic fertilizers are recommended since they don't pollute run-off water, and a recent study found they produce greener grass and healthier root systems.

If you haven't already done so, now is the time to top dress your lawn, flower beds, and gardens with compost. You should do this at least once a year to replace organic matter that get used by plants and washed away by watering. Compost adds nutrients and beneficial microorganisms to improve your soil, allowing it to hold moisture.

Be sure and pull those weeds before they go to seed. If you've got a lot of weeds, you can get them under control by mowing them very close to the ground, then placing at least 10 layers of newspaper over them, overlapping the edges and dampening each layer. Then cover with at least three inches of compost. This will build up the soil and get rid of most weeds.

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
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
