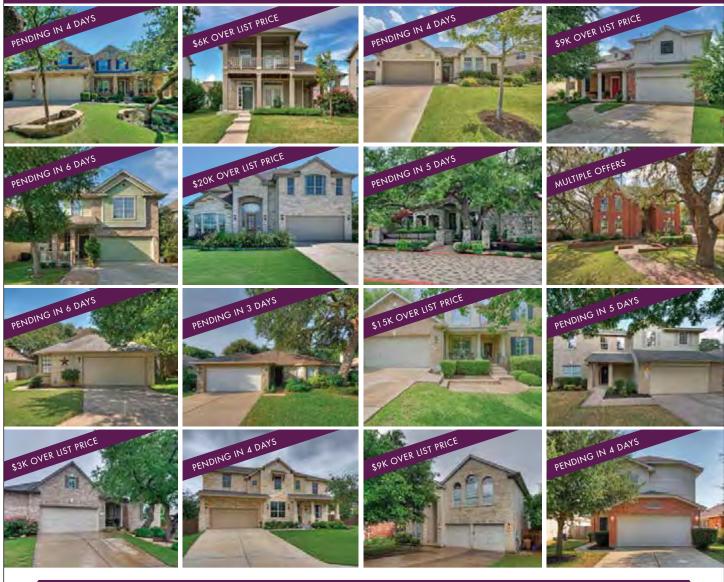

#### FALL IS UPON US!

There are sure to be a few who have noticed and enjoyed the slightly cooler air and crisp but brief, breezes. With the season changing, the sun setting sooner, and kiddos back to school there are a few things changing around the community!

#### **DEED RESTRICTION LETTERS & VIOLATION DRIVES**

As reported in each month's newsletter, the HOA staff drives at least two sections of the neighborhood per month to note violations of the Declaration of Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions. These commonly include: front yard landscape maintenance (mowing, edging, free of weeds), home maintenance (paint, screens, siding) and recreational vehicles (boats, RV's, trailers) parked in the driveway. The HOA is required by state law to notify owners in writing via certified mail and allow for the homeowner to request a hearing before the board of directors.

If you receive a letter, please contact us at the HOA office and let us know your individual situation. We would like to work with you to bring your home into compliance. #### **TREE STAKES**

The HOA has noticed many properties with tree stakes still installed when they are no longer necessary. All tree stakes and supporting wires and cables should be removed 10-12 months after trees are planted. Left in place any longer, these can damage the tree trunk and limbs, weaken the establishment of the root system, and are unattractive in the appearance of your home.

#### WINDOW SCREENS

If your window screens are worn, torn or frayed, they should be replaced. If you choose not to replace your screens, you have the option of removing ALL screens on the front of your home.

#### **CITY STREET LIGHT MAINTENANCE**

If a street light near you is out, call 311 to report the closest street intersection or address and provide the 6 digit pole number located on the light pole.

# Turf Talk: Fertilizing & Top Dressing

Let's all breathe a sigh of relief that we have gotten through another Texas summer. Phew! One of the things we look forward to with the cooler temperatures is fall fertilization. This is an item that pays off in early spring when the turf starts to wake up. Often at the end of summer, the turf is worn down and tired from endless heat, and lack of natural rainwater. While you don't want to over-fertilize, the fall fertilization will boost up your lawn to help it avoid winter weeds, and give it some good nutrients that will carry over into spring. If you are inclined to, you may want to get a soil test to figure out the amount of phosphorus, potassium and other minerals your soil may need. You can go to the Travis County Extension Bureau for complete instructions on how to do a soil test and information on what the results mean. The tests do not include nitrogen in the analysis—it is the one element that is primary in fertilizer and is the prime purpose of fertilization.

For fertilizing in Central Texas, most lawns already have sufficient phosphorus, and it is not recommend that you add any without a soil test. Most of our soils have plenty of phosphorus and the excess runoff into creeks and lakes causes unhealthy fish habitat and problems with algae bloom. So look for a big ZERO as the middle number on the fertilizer bag.

When you go to purchase the fertilizer, you will be looking at three numbers on the bag—Nitrogen (N) Phosphorus (PO), and Potassium (KO). This will tell you the amount by weight of each (Continued on Page 5)

element. For residential lawns, we highly recommend an organic fertilizer (like Lady Bug) applied at a low rate (1 lb. or less per 1000 square feet). If you are going to fertilize for the fall, it is recommended that you do so no later than October 15-30. That will allow the fertilizer to be absorbed by the turf while it is still growing. Once the first frost comes and the grass goes dormant, the fertilizer won't be absorbed.

Another option to help boost your lawn's vitality is to apply a top dressing. Thick, healthy lawns begin with healthy soil but here in central Texas, our soil is shallow. Top dressing is simply a way of adding organic material & restoring balance to already-established home lawns. It will soak in slowly and even out the lawn, and refresh a tired soil. You can also do an aeration of the lawn prior to the top dressing which will assist in the restoration process.

Whichever option you choose, avoid doing either right before a heavy rain because doing so will result in all that work going (literally) down the drain!

In Circle C, we will be fertilizing in the month of October. After the long hot summer, our expansive commons areas are really ready for cooler weather and hopefully refreshing rain. They say our El Nino pattern will build and continue through the winter, so at least the forecast is good! For fall improvements we will be installing some trees in Circle C North, Wildflower Park, and along Escarpment. We are working on a long term improvement to Spruce Canyon from SH 45 to La Crosse, which involves converting that area to drip irrigation, installing rockwork, and replacing turf areas in the side strip. Additionally, look for bed upgrades at entries. We continue with the mission of converting as many areas as possible to drip irrigation as that is the most efficient and conservation oriented way that we can save water and vegetation simultaneously.

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# Around Circle C Nature Nights in Circle C: Wonder Experienced by All



Kids, adults, and families flooded into the Lady Bird Johnson Wildflower Center during six Thursday evenings this summer for Nature Nights. Beyond the beautiful amenities that the Wildflower Center offers throughout the year, these nights were extra special because of the free, theme-based activities offered each week. Stationed at a table under the Pavilion by

the Family Garden, our Kairos Academy of Austin team had a great view of kids

playing in the water and running around to complete a scavenger hunt. I had the privilege of meeting many families from around Austin. Our team helped children of all ages through hands-on learning activities. The themes and activities were Plants (identifying/ playing with edible plants), Pollinators (identifying pollinators and flower features in pollination process), Snakes (building a model snake jaw to compare to human's jaw in swallowing food), Springs/ Streams/Ponds Ecology (moving runoff through it's path; identifying the circle of life for pond animals), Harnessing Fire (identifying household fire hazards and practicing how to put fires out), and Birds of Prey (testing the ability of different beaks to pick up various birds' food). 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# CLOTHES MOTHS

Clothes moths can cause considerable damage to materials containing wool, fur or other animal-derived products. There are two common clothes moths, case making clothes moths and webbing clothes moths. The names describe the larval (caterpillar) stage of the moth. Case-making clothes moths spin silken cases that they drag along with them while they feed. Webbing clothes moths feed within silken burrows that they spin over the surface of fabric.

Adults are small, tan moths about 3/8 an inch long. They are weak fliers and avoid light. Larvae like to feed in protected areas, such as folded clothing, and rarely leave their food source.

To reduce or avoid clothes moth problems, the following tips may be helpful:

Locate & remove any infested items

Look in drawers & closets; on the floor; on or under furniture; on or in walls, ceilings & attics

Launder or dry clean clothing

Periodically shake & air out items such as rugs & clothing

Use heat and/ or cold to kill insects in infested items

Thoroughly clean storage areas

Store clothing in tightly sealed containers

Cedar is not that effective in repelling clothes moths

Cedar must be freshly cut or chipped for vapors to be effective & vapors lose potency quickly

Mothballs (naphthalene or paradichlorobenzene) can be used to repel insects

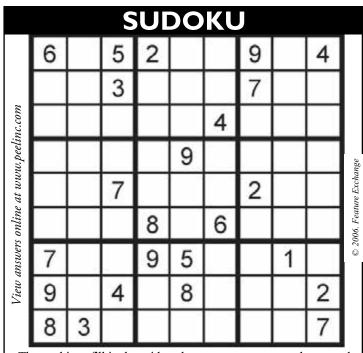
Read & follow all label instructions

Use only in sealed areas or closed containers

Note that the fumes from these products may soften or melt some plastics

Insecticide sprays can be used to supplement sanitation techniques Remove all items from the area before treating with an insecticide Allow area to completely dry before returning items

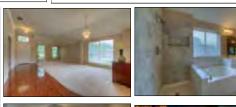

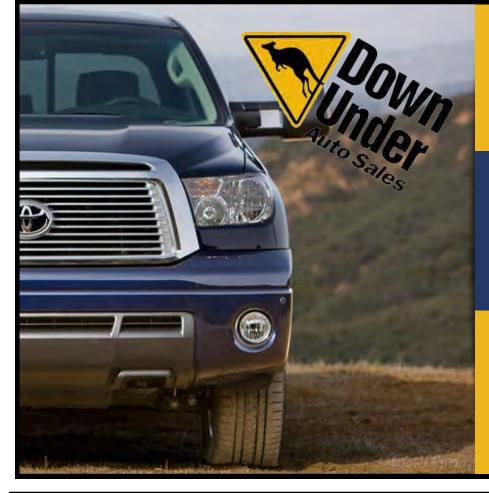

6) Bring the phone.

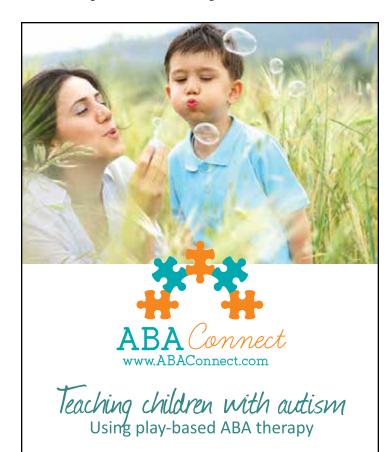

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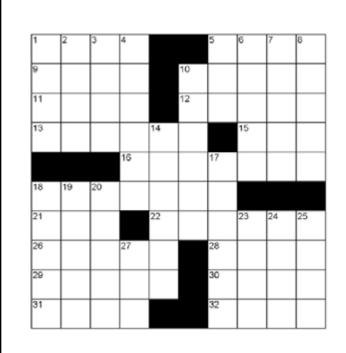

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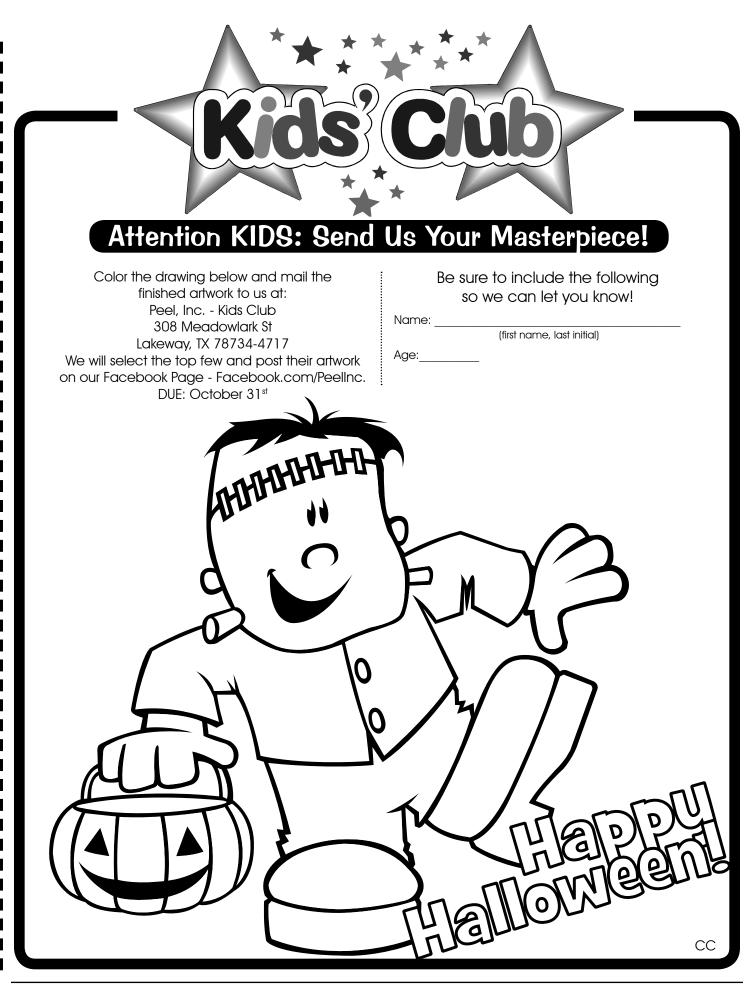

### How to Hit a Two-Handed Backhand Groundstroke



#### How to Hit a Two-Handed Backhand Groundstroke

In last month's newsletter, I gave tips on how to execute a Forehand Groundstroke. In this issue, I will offer instructions on how to execute a two-handed backhand for a right hander. Kim Cousins, Member at the Grey Rock Tennis Club in Austin, is showing the proper stroke.

Step 1: Ready position: Kim's body is facing the net and both of her hands are on the handle of the racket. Her left hand is not overlapping the right hand and it is gripping the racket slightly tighter than the right hand. Her feet are shoulder width apart and her body is in good balance.

Step 2: Back swing: Once Kim makes the decision to hit on the left side, her shoulders are taking the racket back before the ball bounces. Notice the slight change of her grip on the right hand toward the top of the handle (continental grip). Her upper body has turned and is ready to take the right foot forward. Her eyes are still focused on the incoming ball.

Step 3: Point of Contact: Kim's eyes now shift toward the point of contact which should be in front of her right foot. Her right hand is still slightly relaxed, but her left hand is doing most of the work

at the point of impact. Her racket has made contact with the ball and her weight has shifted toward the point of contact. Her focus is to keep her right shoulder turned and not to open her left hip too early. Her right knee is slightly bent with will allow for more flexibility and power on the ball.

Step 4: Follow Through: Once her racket has made contact with the ball, her arms are extend out toward the target selected. Her elbows now are bent and the head of the racket is wrapping around her left shoulder.

Question: I stared to play tennis again and my arm and elbow are hurting. Can you give me some advice?

Response: The first thing I suggest is checking your racket. Strings may be dead, and/or racket be too old, especially if it was stored in the garage or an attic. "Dead" strings and frames are the first cause of arm and elbow pain. Many local tennis centers have demo rackets available for you to try. The new and more advanced rackets are larger and lighter that previous models.

Second, I suggest starting slowly to retrain your strokes. Try to just drop and hit balls without much pace to get the confidence and consistency of getting the balls over the net by creating a nice arch on top of the net and land before the baseline.

Third, I suggest joining some group lessons and seek the advice of a certified tennis professional. They will give you tips on how to get you into playing tennis again without pain.



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
