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Deja Vu

On Monday, April 18, many Meyerland residents awoke to find themselves in a familiar and unwelcome situation - feeling afraid that their house would flood... again! A slow moving and powerful storm system moved into Harris County in the evening hours of April 17. By the early morning of April 18, torrential rainfall hit Southwest Houston. The "Tax Day" Flood had arrived.

According to the Harris County Flood Control District's second report released on May 10, rainfall over upper Brays Bayou averaged 7.5 to 9.5 inches in 12 hours and 6.0 to 6.5 inches in 2 hours. An average of 7.75 inches of rainfall occurred across Harris County equating to over 240 billion gallons of water. Eighty billion gallons more water fell across Harris County with the April 2016 event compared to the Memorial Day Flood of 2015.

For many Meyerland homeowners, this second flood in less than 12 months was devastating.

According to the MCIA office, approximately 250 previously flooded home sites in Meyerland received water during the Tax Day Flood. At least 100 homeowners had recently returned to their homes, only to get water again. Some homeowners were still putting their homes back together when the waters came in and destroyed their progress.

A mixture of despair, anger, grim resolve, and even gallows humor permeate Meyerland as affected homeowners navigate FEMA, the City of Houston, insurance companies, banks, remediation companies, and contractors to decide if they should, and how to put their homes back together. Residents are becoming more active politically as they demand solutions from the mayor, City Council, and other governmental agencies involved with Houston's development and drainage systems. Some have joined social media support groups and the nonprofit group, Residents Against Flooding, to support change.

If there is any bright spot, it appears that the City of Houston reacted more quickly this time, at least in the Meyerland area. Visible police presence was placed in the area and the Waste Management Department added additional heavy trash pick up days to collect the piles of flooded debris. The City is proactively clearing the larger city storm drains in hopes that when we have another rain event, the systems will be working more efficiently. Harris County and the state are also clearing the bayous of debris. Even though Meyerland has suffered two devastating flood events in less than 12 months, the spirit of Meyerland remains intact as neighbors reach out to affected neighbors to lend a helping hand. With grit and determination Meyerland residents have shown that it will take more than water to defeat them.





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Procedure Changes for Application Requests

Recent events (i.e., a little rain) have impacted the MCIA's architectural and plan review processes. One-third of Meyerland homes were affected by the Memorial Day 2015 or Tax Day 2016 floods, but the three office staff and six volunteers who are tasked to move projects along swiftly has not changed. Due to the current 102 active new home projects (with many more expected on the horizon), in addition to approximately 30 new applications received monthly, the turnaround time has been impacted.

In order to accommodate the higher workflow and ensure the same quality and excellent service fairly to all residents, the MCIA office has modified some procedures. Firstly, a simple application (e.g., roof, fence, sidewalk, accessory building, paint, etc.) will now take a minimum of three days to approve. Secondly, plan review meetings with Randi Cahill, our Review and Control Committee/

Architectural Control Committee liaison, will now require a scheduled appointment. Walk-in appointments will not be accepted. It is extremely important that all application rules are followed and that your architect/builder/contractor reads the Deed Restrictions carefully. Multiple reviews of plans by the office staff before the formal presentation to the RCC or ACC is no longer possible due to the high volume of applications. Appointment scheduling has been streamlined by moving the process online. You may schedule an appointment for architectural applications by visiting the calendar found at https://mciaplanreview.youcanbook.me/ and choosing an available date and time.

MCIA Deed Restriction Rules: Weekly - Put garbage and recycling containers, as well as yard trimmings, etc., on the curb no earlier than 6:00 p.m. the evening before pickup. Remove containers no later than 10 p.m. on trash pickup day. Monthly - Put heavy junk/tree waste at the curb no earlier than Friday 6 p.m. before the 2nd Wednesday heavy junk/tree waste collection.



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Deed Restrictions Are Ready for Your Signature

After nine months of hard work and dedication by Section Directors, Deed Restriction Renewal Committee members and the homeowners of the 7-C and 8-I sections, revised Deed Restrictions are ready for approval by homeowners. The new Deed Restrictions have been mailed via USPS to homeowners in Sections 7-C and 8-I. They have also been emailed to those residents whose contact information is on file.

Within one week of mailing, notification to the residents of the request for re-statement of the Restrictions, 27 homeowners in Section 7-C and 14 homeowners in Section 8-I have signed the new Deed Restrictions. The Association anticipates that by the time this article is published, the required number of signatures necessary to pass the new sets of deed restrictions will be met. For both Sections, 50% plus 1 of the homeowners' signatures is required for the new Deed Restrictions to be active.

If you are not sure whether you live in one of these two sections, please use our "Find Your Section" tool found on our website at http://www.meyerland.net/en/tx/index.php/general-information/ find-your-section.

The new Deed Restrictions contain a signature page in the back

which must be signed in front of a notary by all legal owners of a property and returned to the MCIA office. If you prefer to have your document notarized elsewhere and mail the signature page to the office, please note that the original document must be returned. Photocopied, faxed or emailed signature pages will not be valid. You can take advantage of free notary services at the MCIA office during regular office hours of 9:00 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Monday through Thursday, or 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon on Friday.






Ayusa works with diverse families who are interested in hosting an international student of high school age. Families without children, empty nesters, military families, retirees, and single people are all welcome. Ayusa families come from all over the country and reside

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in rural, suburban and urban communities.

"Houston is a popular destination for Ayusa exchange students in the U.S.," says Heather Wells, Ayusa Regional Manager for the Southwest. Host families provide the exchange student with three meals a day and a bedroom (private or shared). Ayusa's exchange students are 15-18 years old and come from more than 60 countries around the world. Students are fully insured, bring their own spending money, and are proficient in English.

How to Host an International Student

The process to apply is simple. Families complete the online application, which includes questions about themselves and local high school, references, and a background check. The local Ayusa Community Representative conducts an in-home interview. They can also help each family with any questions they may have about the application or process.

After families are fully approved, they can select the Ayusa student they would like to host.

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
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
