National Night Out 2016

Save the Date for this year's National Night Out Against Crime on Tuesday, October 4, from 6:00-8:30 pm. This is the major event for crime prevention efforts for the Plum Creek community in Kyle. People who communicate regularly with their neighbors will care more about each other and be more willing to keep an eye out and report suspicious behavior to the police department. There will be events at Decker, McNaughton, Haupt, and Kirby/Hellman greenspace Parks that evening. Each event will be hosted by Block Captains from nearby streets with visits from KPD, KFD, and EMS. So plan to leave your porch light on and head over with your family to the park of your choice that evening to show your support.

Block Captains are key persons in the Plum Creek Neighborhood Watch group. Officer Plant is our Kyle PD advisor and advises that block captains should encourage crime victims to contact the police. While a block captain does not have any law enforcement authority, he/she can facilitate unity, information distribution, and coordinate activities among residents on their street and is appreciated by the Kyle Police Department. Always remember to observe or report a crime or suspicious activity from a place of safety by calling 911 or 512-268-3232 (non-emergency).

The Kyle PD Animal Control Officer reminds all pet owners to register their pets with the City of Kyle. Kyle Police Officers now have an alert on their computer that tells them the name, breed, and color of each pet in a residence whenever they are called to respond to a home alarm, open door call, or any other emergency. If you want your pets to be added to this system, please mail or drop off the application with a copy of the pet's rabies certificate and a small fee. You will receive a registration tag to help law enforcement if the pet is missing or with rabies control.

The next Safety Committee National Night Out planning meeting will be August 18 at 6:30 pm at the Plum Creek Community Center. All interested residents are welcome to attend and bring your concerns and solutions for discussion. We look forward to seeing you.

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TIPS FOR A SAFE HALLOWEEN!

- Swords, knives, and similar costume accessories should be short, soft, and flexible.
- Avoid trick-or-treating alone. Walk in groups or with a trusted adult.
- Fasten reflective tape to costumes and bags to help drivers see you.
- Examine treats for choking hazards and tampering before eating. Limit the amount of treats you eat.
- Hold a flashlight while trick-or-treating to help you see and others see you.
- Always test make-up in a small area first. Remove it before bedtime to prevent skin and eye irritation.
- Look both ways before crossing the street. Use established crosswalks wherever possible.
- Lower your risk for serious eye injury by not wearing decorative contact lenses.
- Only walk on sidewalks or on the far edge of the road facing traffic to stay safe.
- Wear well-fitting masks, costumes, and shoes to avoid blocked vision, trips, and falls.
- Eat only factory-wrapped treats. Avoid eating homemade treats unless you know the cook well.

- Enter homes only if you're with a trusted adult. Otherwise, stay outside.
- Never walk near lit candles or luminaries. Be sure to wear flameresistant costumes.

Expecting trick-or-treaters or party guests?

- Provide healthier treats for trick-or-treaters, such as individual packs of raisins, trail mix, or pretzels. For party guests, offer a variety of fruits, vegetables, and cheeses.
- Use party games and trick-or-treat time as an opportunity for kids to get their daily dose of 60 minutes of physical activity.
- Be sure walking areas and stairs are well-lit and free of obstacles that could result in falls.
- Keep candle-lit jack-o'-lanterns and luminaries away from doorsteps, walkways, landings, and curtains. Place them on sturdy tables, keep them out of the reach of pets and small children, and never leave them unattended.

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Street Addresses Needed in Alleys

Did you know that our alleys act as alternative routes for emergency services like police and ambulances?

However, many of our homes, especially in the older section, are not numbered in the alley. Over the years, house numbers have been painted on lot driveways, but sadly, the painted numbers wear away quickly and must be repainted every few years. However, mounted numbers offer a more sustainable and permanent solution.

Have you considered purchasing and placing your street numbers by your garage door for safety's sake?

In the newest sections of Plum Creek, residents are actually required to have their street number by their garage door, as indicated below:

From the Plum Creek Landscape Templates, Page 9 of 17 Home Numbers - Alley Side of Home

On alley lots, in addition to the numbering system on the front of a home, the street number will be required on the face of the garage structure adjacent to the garage door. The numbers should be located 5' above the ground plane and should be 4" matte black metal letter form. It is preferred that the numbers be located just below a wall mounted sconce light to make the numbers visible at night.

However, the HOA wants to encourage everyone in Plum Creek to place their street address by their garage. These numbers help with violation notices and especially, emergency personnel locate your home with ease. So, if your home has an alley, please consider placing your address on the alley side, too.

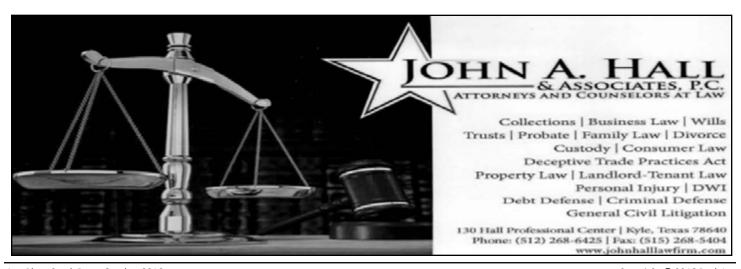

Plum Creek Irrigation Leaks

Plum Creek has many acres of common area property that needs to be watered regularly to keep it looking great. The irrigation system runs on battery or electrical powered zone controllers. The timers are used to set the irrigations systems to run automatically to reduce the manual labor involved of having a person activate each zone. At times, leaks occur or zones do not turn off as scheduled. There are many factors which irrigations systems to fail and cause unwanted run off. Here are a few reasons:

- The timers that run the zone are electrical or run on batteries.
 The timers fail to activate properly and need to be reset.
 Several causes are excessive heat, extreme cold, power outages, ground shifts, and age of the timer. Timers are replaced on an as needed basis.
- The valves in a zone controller can get stuck open. This is caused by soil intrusion into the controller valve or the age of the controller. These are replaced on an as needed basis.
- Changes in moisture levels in the soil cause the ground to shift and pull. This can cause an underground pvc line to break.
 We call these lateral line breaks. These are repaired when they are reported.
- A sprinkler head is broken off. Basically, it boils downs to: being run over or water pressure unscrews the sprinkler head. The irrigation company checks the sprinklers and zones monthly in phases. Since many hazards can happen to an irrigation system in a 30 day period like kids with sticks, runners, bicyclists, lawn mowers, golf carts, cars, it is hard to know exactly what is going on in each zone on a daily basis. We need help from owners and residents to keep us informed about irrigation leaks.

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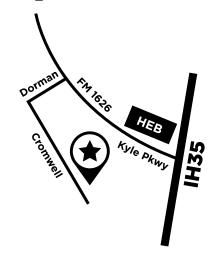
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Lake/Park Committee

Lake improvements-We have now installed 3 benches around the lake, and will soon be placing 2 more trash cans. We will also soon be treating the lake for excessive vegetation. We have approval for restocking the lake with grass carp this fall, and bluegill in the spring.

Kirby Park improvements-We will soon be installing a new bench, picnic table and trash can in Kirby Park. We have also gotten budget approval for a toddler playground early next year.

Eagle Scout Projects-We are working with Eagle Scouts to build and locate nesting boxes for owls, ducks and bats around the lake, and perhaps in some of the parks. Owls are very useful in controlling varmints such as field mice, and bats can be useful in reducing mosquito

Replacement of the playground structure in Decker Park- We quickly replaced the structure when we realized that the old one had become hazardous. Though the new one is also wood, this one has a lifetime guarantee. (Reserve funds had already been set aside for this purpose a while back.)

Greene/Kirby pocket park- Residents around the pocket park have expressed interest in making improvements to that pocket park. The Lake/Park Committee is currently creating guidelines for such development. October meeting will be Tuesday October 25th at 1401 Kirby.

Remove Tree Stakes

Periodically check guy wires and stakes on newly planted trees to ensure the tree is well supported. Protect the tree trunk from guy wire damage with nibber hoses. Remove guy wires and stakes one to two growing seasons after the tree roots have become established. All tree and shrub species are susceptible to deer browsing. Trees may need to be caged with mesh wire until the canopy is taller than deer can reach.

No Parking on Road Neck Downs

No parking is allowed if the road narrows, or creates a neck down affect. The neck down or narrowing of the road prohibits two cars from passing each other when a vehicle is parked in the neck down area. This is intentional to slow traffic throughout the community

There are locations marked with red brick in new sections of Plum Creek. There is no parking on the red brick. A vehicle parked in this area prohibits two cars from passing each other.

This concept can be applied to round-abouts. The road is only one car width wide. Vehicles parked in a round-about would prohibit passing of vehicles.

CENTER STREET CATTLE BRANDS

The Center Street Bridge has a set of six cattle brands representations to pay tribute to Kyle's ranching heritage.

The Nance Family: Came to the area west of Kyle in the 1850's, establishing a cotton gin, various mills and meat packing plant. The late Robert Nance used this brand.

Hill Brothers Farm was one of the largest business enterprises in Kyle for over 60 years. The farm began in the early 1900's by Will & Ida Hill, second generation German immigrants.

The G.H. Moore brand dates back to the early 1900's.

Cecil Hughson was a Kyle area cattleman and family members continue to ranch west of IH35. Cecil's son "Tex" was a major league pitching star in the 1940s for the Boston Red Sox.

The Groos Family settled in Kyle in the early years. Johann Groos was in charge of surveying the right of way for the I&GN Railroad. This was the brand of Will Groos, who once ran the Kyle bank.

The Smith Family- Kirby Smith was one of the first African-American business owners in Kyle. Kirby owned and operated the Smith store in the early 1900s.



Please Trim Those Trees!

Due to safety concerns, the HOA is evaluating street and yard trees that encroach on the sidewalk and streets. Since these trees belong to the homeowner, we want to provide residents with the opportunity to prune their own trees. The HOA requests that you prune your trees seven (7) feet above the sidewalk to prevent injury and fourteen (14) feet to prevent damage to emergency vehicles. Corner lots and round about lots need to clear limbs for sight distance of traffic signs and oncoming vehicular traffic at intersections.

City of Kyle and Hays CISD regularly drive through Plum Creek to inspect for drivability for large fire trucks and schools buses.

When raising your tree's canopy, follow proper pruning techniques, including cleaning tools between trees and wound spraying any cuts on all OAK trees to prevent Oak Wilt.

Plum Creek is a great community. While you should have received a copy of the Plum Creek Declaration and Bylaws at closing, we thought the following basic information would be helpful.

- The Plum Creek HOA office is located at 4100 Everett Suite 150, near the Hays Performing Arts center and Plum Fit. The office number is 512-262-1140. The office hours are Monday Friday 9 AM to 5 PM. The property manager is Adriane Carbajal: plumcreekmanager@goodwintx.com.
- Plum Creek HOA has a resident website: www.plumcreektxhoa.
 com. Request a resident login in to access pertinent documents in the Documents Library and other important information.
- The Welcome Committee delivers welcome bags to new owners.
 This comes the month after your closing date. If you have not received a welcome bag within two months after the closing, you can email welcome@plumcreektxhoa.com.
- Parking in the back alley ways is prohibited. The alleys are for ingress and egress only. You can park in driveway or in your garage. The front streets have limited street parking and are usually public streets. Try not to block your neighbor's house.
- Garbage pickup is on Tuesdays. The trash and recycling cans need to be stored out of view by the following day to prevent getting a violation notice. The recycling schedule is located on the City of Kyle website under http://www.cityofkyle.com/ utilitybilling/city-kyle-solid-waste-collection-information
- Xeriscaping is allowed in Plum Creek. To add xeriscaping you
 must submit an Architectural Review Committee Approval
 Application (ARC form) with an installation plan and the
 survey. This form is located in the Documents Library on the
 Plum Creek HOA resident website.
- Any permanent exterior improvements to the house may require approval from the Architectural Review Committee. Review information in the Architectural Changes menu link on the website: www.plumcreektxhoa.com.
- Whether you are a renter or buyer, your yard is important so you'll need to keep it maintained.
- Enjoy the pool! If you do not have a pool key or recreational ID or your pool key does not work, contact the Plum Creek HOA office.
- Annual coupons are issued to all residents who are not set up for the ACH draft. Owners will receive a payment statement which will provide a payment history for the new homeowner account. You can set up an automatic draft at www.goodwintx. com with the account number on the coupons. Call Goodwin Customer Service with questions about the ACH draft: 512-502-7515. Haven't received your welcome letter from Goodwin Management? Call the Plum Creek HOA office and verify that

we have received your correct mailing address.

Pumpkin Spice Chex Mix

- 1/4cup brown sugar
- · 1tablespoon pumpkin pie spice
- 1/4cup butter
- 2teaspoons vanilla
- 2cups Cinnamon Chex™ cereal
- 2cups Wheat Chex™ cereal
- 2cups Honey Nut Chex™ cereal
- 8oz pecans

-In small bowl, mix brown sugar and pumpkin pie spice; set aside. In small microwave-safe dish, microwave butter on High about 30 seconds or until melted. Stir in vanilla. In large microwavable bowl, mix all cereals and pecans. Pour butter mixture over cereal mixture, stirring until evenly distributed. Add sugar and spice mixture and stir until coated.

-Microwave uncovered on High 5 minutes or until mixture begins to brown, stirring every minute. Spread on wax paper or a cookie sheet to cool. Store in airtight container.
