Manager's Corner Summervoor/Attants

Most residents know that Summerwood has many areas throughout the community that are designated as wetlands. The purpose of the wetland areas is to help mitigate the impacts that may result from the development of Summerwood. But what are these areas, and how do they affect the community? While the full answer is a long and complicated one, the short answer is that these protected areas serve to provide water flow through the community. The water flow plays an important part in the health of Carpenter's Bayou and provides a great variety of birds and wildlife with a place to live. All of the wetlands throughout Summerwood are managed by the Army Corps of Engineers.

While there is a wetland area bordered by Yaupon Holly Lane, Eastern Redbud Lane, and Red Mulberry Lane, the majority of the wetland areas are to the west of Deussen Parkway. The area most resident are most familiar with is along West Lake Houston, between Woodson Park and Hunters Lake Way; however, that is just a small, visible portion. Much of the areas are tucked away behind homes.

How does this impact you as a resident? The most important thing to remember is that nothing can be done by residents or the HOA to change or impede the flow of water through these areas. That includes clearing or removing trees, building dams or berms, dredging or digging, installing any sort of building, or otherwise using these protected areas in any way. Special care should be taken to ensure no trash or lawn clippings are disposed of in the wetlands. No vehicles, including off-road or all-terrain, should ever be used on any reserve or wetland or along the drainage channels in Summerwood.

Why You Should Never Feed Bread to Ducks



It seems harmless enough, feeding bread to the ducks in your local park: We enjoy it, the ducks get some food, and everyone's happy. Millions of loaves of bread are fed to ducks in lakes like ours every year, but this does them more harm than good. Most bread is essentially junk food to

them (with white being the worst) and can cause a range of problems, including a debilitating disease called Angel Wing.

White bread has essentially no nutritional value—it's packed full of calories and has little else to offer. Continuously feeding it to birds causes them to rely on us for a food source rather than on their natural diet. It's the equivalent of only feeding your children unhealthy foods: They'll eventually get addicted to it and will find it very difficult eating, or wanting to eat, anything else. So, at the very least, feeding ducks bread is giving them a readily accessible unhealthy diet, leaving them ultimately malnourished.

At the far end of the spectrum, there's Angel Wing. This is a disturbing condition that causes a bird's wings to point out laterally, rather than resting against the body, rendering the bird unable to fly in many cases. It's an incurable condition brought about as a result of a highcalorie diet, one extremely high in protein and carbohydrates and low in vitamins D, E, and manganese—the exact diet a bird would get if it primarily ate white bread.

Home Maintenance Corner: A/C Drain Drip

At some point during home ownership, you may have noticed rust on the siding or water dripping from a white PVC pipe on the side of your home. If so, be concerned, as this dripping is a sign that the condensate draining of your air conditioning unit has made it to its backup drain pan and is now dripping outside. The rust can be cleaned from your siding; however, the damage can become very expensive if the water finds its way into a room's ceiling from the attic. An air conditioner's drainpipes require yearly maintenance (approximately \$150 to \$300), so please make sure to have it inspected.

Last year twelve students were





North East Houston Refugee Festival Unites Community with Refugee Service Organizations



On September 17, 2016, the North East Houston Refugee Festival was held at the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints' Summerwood building. The event, hosted by local churches and area refugee aid organizations, was a huge success, with more than 215 people in attendance.

Many people in the area found themselves wanting to help aid the refugee effort in some way, but they didn't know how to go about it. Others feared that helping with refugees would be time consuming or expensive. The festival was organized to address these issues and assist people with finding opportunities. It also provided refugee aid on a level for them to feel comfortable with.

The festival consisted of two parts: an interactive fair and a speaking symposium. At the fair, individuals could visit the booths of local churches and organizations. These organizations distributed handouts, explained the services they offer, and welcomed those interested in becoming volunteers.

The second half of the festival was the speaking symposium. Attendees had the opportunity to listen to speakers talk more specifically about refugee aid. Haley Smith spoke of Lifting Hands International, about her time spent volunteering in the Greek refugee camps. Joe Saceric, from YMCA International, outlined ways that his organization helps incoming refugees. Finally, Steve Quach, a local resident, shared his personal refugee experience.

Lorie Comacho, co-organizer of the event, said that they encountered many obstacles while preparing for this event but that "every time a solution would . . . present itself, even at the last minute, a divine hand was definitely guiding our path." They were also very grateful to have the support of the Harris County Sherriff's Office, with Sargent Hamlet providing uniformed security for the event.
