"Coach Martin taught me the importance of a strong work ethic. He's always told me that I have to have a great work ethic to succeed in life," said London. My whole four years of high school I have worked hard, and now it's paying off."

"One of the worse things someone can say about you is that you have a poor work ethic," Martin said. This is something that he tells all of his four kids, which includes London.

London will report to Texas State University in June to begin practicing with his new team. He plans to become a veterinarian. "I was told that I wasn't ever going to be good enough. Coach Martin taught me how to work at it and how to succeed in life, and I thank him for that."



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

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Alvin ISD School Board Approves Resolution to Repeal New State Accountability System

At the January 2017 Alvin ISD school board meeting, trustees unanimously voted to pass a resolution, which calls on state legislators to repeal the Texas Education Agency's A-F accountability system for the Texas public schools.

The A-F accountability system maintains that districts and campuses receive a letter grade for each of five domains: 1) Student Performance, 2) Student Progress, 3) Closing Performance Gaps, 4) Postsecondary Readiness, and 5) Community and Student Engagement. The system is slated to go into effect at the start of the 2017-18 school year, however districts across the State of Texas are voting to repeal the system, due to what are viewed as convoluted calculations and questionable methodologies.

"The A-F rating system was declared as a way to provide parents and community members with a simple system that provides increased clarity regarding campus and student performance. Unfortunately, as the system has been designed, it does not provide clarity and is anything but simple," said Dr. Buck Gilcrease, Alvin ISD superintendent of schools.

As an example of the current limitations, an Alvin ISD

elementary school received numerous distinctions from the State including recognition as: "Top 25 Percent: Closing Performance Gaps." Again, the school was commended by the State; however, the State's A-F ratings system now assigns the campus a grade of "C" for "closing performance gaps." The same school, with the same year's data received accolades from the State and now receives a "C".

The resolution's language proclaimed that the new system is highly based on the State of Texas Assessment of Academic Readiness (STAAR), which provides little meaningful information to guide student learning, and is a high-stakes standardized test that does not accurately measure the success of a student. The majority (55%) of the assigned A-F grades are based on STAAR.

The resolution also made mention that "at least 16 states have implemented a similar rating system utilizing A-F grades for schools and districts, and to date there is no definitive research that suggests that these rating have improved student or school performance."

"High-stakes testing creates a false impression about students,

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ignores the unique strengths of each school, and unfairly reduces each student's worth to the school's assigned grade," mentioned Daniel Combs, Alvin ISD assistant superintendent.

"We're not afraid of accountability. We're never afraid of accountability," proclaimed Gilcrease. "It's just that as it is right now the A-F system has been created with false and questionable statistics, which do nothing but hurt our students. When you start to hurt the children by implementing systems that lack data to prove its efficacy, then the idea behind it has lost it's meaning.

The goal of passing the resolution in hopes that the system will be repealed, is for the State to implement a new valid system that will encompass multiple assessments, reduce the use of high-stakes/standardized testing, and more accurately reflects what students know and can do in terms of rigorous standards.

"We truly believe that the current A-F system as it is right now is more harmful than it is helpful," added Gilcrease.

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



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
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
