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## The Minimalist Gardener

Vegetables: Warm weather has arrived, so get those warm weather plants in the ground as soon as possible. Plant okra. It is a star performer here. Include sweet potatoes (which also grow

well and provide excellent color to the garden). Add some fertilizer for most plants this month.

Perennials and Annuals: Divide clumps and remove old growth now. Plant warm season perennials and annuals. Plant bulbs. Unless you are looking for a showy yard, minimize annuals and maximize perennials to save money.

Trees, Shrubs, and Vines: Those trees, shrubs, and vines that have been dormant have awakened for

their spring, summer, and fall show. Lightly prune if required. Oaks probably shouldn't be pruned this month because of the potential for disease transmission.


sulfate. Water deeply after fertilizing: 1 inch of water to drive the nitrogen down to the roots. Don't forget that trees in lawns compete with the grass. Professionals use separate bubblers for


trees. Give them a bit more water.

April is the peak season for roses. When the rose flowers fade, do a light pruning (deadheading) to remove the old blooms. Add 1/4 cup fertilizer to each plant soon after to encourage new growth.

Lawns: Healthy grass is your best defense against weeds. Apply lawn fertilizer after the second mowing and monthly after that during the growing season. Consider using straight nitrogen (such as 12-0-0)

lawn fertilizer now. Make sure you are getting sufficient water to those areas which tend to grow weeds rather than grass. If it doesn't rain, you will need to irrigate your lawn, trees, and other plants.







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## The Voice Cooks up some Vittles

### CHICKEN TETRAZZINI

(Makes five or six servings)

#### **Cooking Directions**

In a slow cooker, combine chicken, broth, wine, onion, salt, thyme, pepper and parsley. Cover and cook on LOW 4 to 5 hours. Turn control to HIGH. Add mushrooms. In a small bowl, dissolve cornstarch in water; stir into slow cooker. Cover and cook on HIGH 20 minutes. Stir in half-and-half, cooked spaghetti, and half the cheese. Cover and heat on HIGH 5 to 10 minutes. Spoon into serving dish; sprinkle with remaining cheese.

Brown meat in oil, stir in soup, water, tomato paste, basil, salt, and pepper. Simmer covered 1-1/2 hours. Add all vegetables, reheat to boiling, simmer covered 30 minutes or until vegetables are tender. Stir in cheese. Serves eight.

#### **Ingredients**

4 boneless skinless chicken breast halves,

cut into 2 x ½-inch strips.

1 cup chicken broth

½ cup dry white wine

1 onion, finely chopped

½ teaspoon salt (Cook's option: add more salt)

¼ teaspoon dried thyme

¼ teaspoon pepper

2 tablespoons minced fresh parsley

6 to 8 mushrooms, sliced

3 tablespoons cornstarch

¼ cup water

1/4 cup half-and-half

(Cook's option: Land of Lakes fat free ½ x ½)

8oz. spaghetti, broken into 2 in. pieces, cooked & drained

½ cup grated Parmesan cheese

116 oz. can green beans or wax beans (drained)

½ c. parmesan cheese



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## **New Landscaping at Spring Cypress Front Entrance**

The new landscaping at the Spring Cypress Entrance, costing \$40,000, was installed by Land Crafters. There was one other bidder, HouScape, the company that currently holds Village Creek's landscaping contract. The care and irrigation of the new plants will be by our current contractor, HouScape. The one year warranty is by Land Crafters. A Board Member volunteered that they didn't get a third bidder because not many contractors do this sort of work.

Editor's note: More than one bid, particularly with a landscaping under the care of a trusted contractor, is neither standard nor required.
