How Long WILL IT TAKE TO SELL MY HOME?

Anyone contemplating selling their home has two BIG questions. How much is my home worth and how long will it take to sell? While a home's value is worth only what someone is willing to pay for it, an estimate can be obtained by a professional who knows the market. It is not an exact science. Time on the market, however, can be measured empirically.

By looking back at the past two years, we can see that homes over and under \$1.0 million in the HPWBANA area have very different sales times. In January through September of 2016, homes under \$1.0 million sold in an average of 61 days, while homes over \$1.0 million dollars where on the market for an average of 85 days before selling. In January through September of 2017, homes under \$1.0 million sold in an average of 60 days, while homes over \$1.0 million dollars where on the market for an average of 126 days before selling.





It's interesting to note that right after May, sales times generally increase. The average time to sell homes under \$1.0 were very similar in 2016 and 2017, 61 days and 60 days respectively. There was, however, a striking increase in the time to sell homes over a million dollars, comparing 85 days in 2016 versus 126 days in 2017. Prices are still increasing, albeit at a much slower rate, but it is taking much longer

to sell these homes. The best course of action to sell a home quickly, especially those over \$1.0 million, is to get your home on the market in very early spring when there is less inventory, therefore, less competition.

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LETTUCE RECYCLE!

18 MONTHS OF QUESTIONS FROM OUR NEIGHBORHOOD READERS PART 2



Here is part 2 of the fabulous recycling questions I have received from the readers of "Lettuce Recycle".

HOW DO I RECYCLE MAILING ENVELOPES WITH A BUBBLE WRAP LINING?

These are not recyclable because there are two layers of materials that cannot be separated. Bubble wrap by itself can be recycled in the plastic collection bins located at most grocery stores.

CAN I PUT CELLOPHANE IN MY RECYCLING BIN? No. Cellophane must be placed in your trash bin. Cellophane is also not accepted in the plastic collection bins at the grocery stores. The way you can tell cellophane from plastic is that cellophane is mostly clear and crinkly. It is used as packaging to display the items inside.

ARE BABY FOOD POUCHES RECYCLABLE? The squeezable pouches that toddler baby food and some other products like tuna come in are not recyclable. These pouches are made of layers of materials that do not allow them to be separated to be recycled. They must be thrown into your trash bin.

HOW DO I RECYCLE AEROSOL CANS? Aerosol cans (full or partially full) are accepted at the City of Austin Recycle & Reuse Drop-Off Center. The material in them is considered hazardous and cannot be put in the blue recycling bin. Totally empty aerosol cans may be put into the blue curbside bin.

WHAT HAPPENS TO THE STUFF COLLECTED BY THE CITY DURING BULK COLLECTION WEEK? IS IT RECYCLED? Anything set out for bulk collection that is collected by City trucks goes to the landfill. These items are not recycled. The

only recycling or reuse that occurs is when the drive-by entrepreneurs pick up these items first.

WHAT DO I DO WITH THE PLASTIC BAGS FROM MY BARK MULCH, COMPOST AND GARDEN SOIL? These bags cannot be placed in the plastic bag collection bins at the grocery stores. Because they have to support weight, they are treated with a special polymer that makes them unrecyclable at these locations. They can however, be taken to the Recycle & Reuse Drop-Off Center. PLEASE DO NOT PUT THESE IN YOUR BLUE CURBSIDE BIN!

WHAT DO I DO WITH ALL THE 45 RPM RECORDS I HAVE SAVED SINCE I WAS A KID? Vinyl records are making a comeback, but if you don't want to sell them, the Creative Use and Recycling Center will happily take them. Customers buy them to make craft projects. You can have your 45 record of "favorite lullabies" turned into a serving tray. Please visit their website for more information http://austincreativereuse.org/>.

WILL THE CITY PICK UP BAMBOO WITH THE WEEKLY YARD TRIMMINGS COLLECTION? Yes, provided it is cut into 5-foot lengths or less. The City prefers that bamboo be bundled with string because it is easier to handle. You can also cut it into smaller pieces and put it into the large yard waste bags available at Lowes, Home Depot, and other hardware stores. The City also requests that thorny plants, like rose bushes, be put into bags rather than cans. It is safer for the workers handling them.

INSTEAD OF THROWING IT INTO MY TRASH CAN, WHAT CAN I DO WITH A PERFECTLY GOOD GARDEN HOSE THAT I NO LONGER USE? I just got rid of one by posting it on the Next Door website as FREE! As they say, one man's trash is another man's treasure. It was picked up within minutes. Best way to recycle! Please remember, do not put garden hoses into your recycling can. They must go into your trashcan if you cannot give it away.

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I JUST STAINED AND OILED MY DECK AND HAVE LOTS OF EMPTY GALLON CANS AND LOTS AND LOTS OF OILY RAGS AND BRUSHES. WHAT DO I DO WITH THESE? Rags with oil on them can be a serious fire hazard. Put the oily rags and brushes in the empty cans. Fill the cans with water and put the lids on securely. You can then take them to the Recycle & Reuse Drop-Off Center for safe disposal.

HOW DO I RECYCLE THE PILLOW PACKS THAT COME IN PACKAGES? PAK MAIL on Balcones will accept and reuse them if they still have air. PAK MAIL also takes clean bubble wrap, Styrofoam, and cornstarch peanuts. You can also put the air pillows and bubble wrap into the plastic recycling collection bins at the grocery stores.

CURBSIDE COMPOSTABLE UPDATE

By now, those of you who will be getting curbside composting pick-up should have received your green carts and the weekly pick-ups should have started. 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
A NEW QUESTION - AND THE ANSWER!

WITH CURBSIDE COMPOST COLLECTION, WILL THE CITY CONTINUE PICKING UP YARD WASTE WEEKLY IN THE BROWN BAGS AND OUR OWN STICK CANS? The answer is YES. The City prefers leaves and sticks be placed in your new green composting cart. When that is full, use the brown bags or your own cans for anything else. Brown material like leaves and sticks are an important component of compost.

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ATEXAS A&M CENTIPEDES EXTENSION



Centipedes have a single pair of antennae on their head and a long, worm-like body. They have one pair of legs per body segment with the first pair of legs modified to function as claws and are used to capture prey. These claws are sometimes called fangs since they are connected to poison glands that can inject venom to subdue captured prey.

Most centipedes found in Texas are relatively small, but the red headed centipede, Scolopendra heros, can reach over nine inches when full grown. The bite of larger species of centipedes may cause extreme discomfort and pain.

Centipedes can live from one to six years. They prefer moist, protected habitats such as under stones, rotted logs, leaves or bark. Winter is spent as an adult and eggs are laid in soil during warm months and are covered by a sticky substance.

Centipedes are predaceous with many species feeding on other arthropods, such as insects. Their modified pair of legs, or claws, is directly under the head, allowing prey to be injected with venom.

Most centipedes can only bite with their poison claws located directly under the head resulting in a bee-like sting; however, Scolopendra can harm a person with the sharp claws of its many walking legs. Each walking leg is tipped with a sharp claw capable of making tiny cuts in human skin. A poison produced from the attachment point of each leg may be dropped into the wounds resulting in an inflamed and irritated condition. The best rule of thumb is to never handle large centipedes.

With cooler weather, centipedes may move inside homes to avoid extreme temperatures. Tips to prevent centipedes from sharing your home:

- move objects providing harborage away from the structure such as compost piles, firewood and stones
- create a band of gravel, or similar material between the

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foundation of the home and any landscape beds that touch the structure

- occasionally turn mulch near structures to allow it to dry out
- seal cracks, crevices, and pipe penetrations with sealant that will expand with our temperature extremes
- repair weather stripping around doors and windows as needed
- properly ventilate crawl spaces or areas under the home to allow for air flow through the area
- use perimeter sprays around a building's foundation

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
