

GARAGE SALE (aka Spring Cleaning)

Our Semi-Annual HOA approved Garage Sale will be held Saturday, April 14th from 8:00 am to 4:00 pm. Whether you're a participant, a buyer or "just looking", bargains abound. Please remove all of your personal yard signs and store all leftovers out of sight by 5:00 pm.

1. You may place a sign in your yard on the day of the sale only.

2. Your customers must not block neighbor's driveways and/or sidewalks. It is your responsibility to manage this.

3. No loud music or other noise nuisance is to be allowed during the sale.

4. Personal signs MAY NOT be placed on the West Rd. esplanades or on easements (grass) between the Willowbridge/Stonebridge fence and West Rd. (these are technically considered to be "bandit" signs and are ILLEGAL in Harris County).

5. Community Garage Sales signs will be placed at all (3) entrances: Willowbridge Park Blvd., Wheatland Dr., and Stone Villa Ln.

6. Residents **are not allowed** to leave any unsold items or trash on lawns, driveways, sidewalks or curbs. Please pick up any litter left by customers from gutters and street. Leftover items may be taken to a donation site such as Goodwill 9215 West Rd.(77064) open Saturday 9 am – 7 pm or 12352 Jones Rd. (77065) open Saturday 9 am – 9 pm or Goodwill in Fiesta Center at Willowbrook open Saturday 9 am – 9 pm; The Mission of The Yahweh 10247 Algiers Rd. (77041, between Tanner and Clay), serving homeless women and their children since 1961; or The Hope Chest 12015 Barker Cypress Rd. – Cypress 77433 (South side of Hwy. 290) open Saturday 10

am - 3 pm. Sales benefit Cy-Hope whose Mission is to make life better for kids in Cy-Fair. Cy-Hope brings HOPE to all students so that they will grow up to be well educated and productive citizens, making a lasting and positive impact on the community.

As a reminder, Harris County has had a Bandit Sign Law since 2008. The law was passed to reduce the so-called bandit signs that you typically see fastened to street signs, telephone poles and/or planted in the right-of-ways (medians and a designated number of feet to the side of the street curbs) of busy streets. Violators may be fined \$500 - \$1,000 for EACH offense.

Samples of Bandit Signs include, but are not limited to:

*Lawn Services	*Handyman Services
*Tax Preparation Services	*Maid Services
*Home Buyers and/or Open House Signs	*Campaign Signs
*Carpet Cleaning Services	*After School Child Care
*Physical Fitness/Workout Clubs	*After School Activities
*Garage/Estate/Yard Sale Signs	*Weight Loss Programs/Pills

Almost any sign in one of these locations can be considered a Bandit Sign, unless it is an official county, municipality or traffic direction sign. And, attaching a sign to these authorized signs is a violation of the Bandit Sign Law.

HOW BEING A SPORTS FAN MAKES YOU HEALTHIER AND HAPPIER

It's easy to be cynical about professional sports — especially the NFL. But despite the disturbing headlines the league earned this year, ranging from lax penalties for domestic violence to a growing awareness of the impact of traumatic brain injuries, there will always be at least one silver lining for professional football.

That would be the undisputed, research-supported evidence that there are very real mental health advantages to claiming a sports team as your own. Yes, there are studies that show blood pressure rises during games or testosterone plummets after a loss. But epic fandom is also linked to higher levels of well-being and general happiness with one's social life, as well as lower levels of loneliness and alienation, according to research by sports psychology professor Daniel Wann of Murray State University.

Wann, author of the book Sport Fans: The Psychology And Social Impact Of Spectators, explains that there are two routes to feeling good through sports fandom.

"One would be following a successful team, and the second

would simply be identifying with them," Wann told The Huffington Post. "You can get these well-being benefits even if your team doesn't do well; we've found this with historically unsuccessful teams as well," he added.

In the end, said Wann, it all comes down to how community lifts our spirits. Sports fandom is simply another kind of community, much like the community fostered among costumed Star Wars fans or opera season tickets holders.

"You have no idea who's going to win the Super Bowl, and you won't know who's going to win next year's Super Bowl," said Wann. "But if you go see the new Star Wars movie, and then you go to see it twice, I'm pretty sure it's going to be the same ending."

So the next time anyone gives you flack about your epic fandom, just let them know that all the face paint, fantasy leagues, tailgating and game-day viewing parties are crucial to your mental health. Read on to learn more about the benefits of being a diehard (or even fair-weather) fan.

THE SCHOOL ZONE Bullying Law Passed

"David's Law" was passed and signed into law during the 85th Texas Legislature (SB179), effective September 1, 2017. The newly enacted law relates to harassment, bullying and cyberbullying of a public or charter school student or a minor. It encourages certain mental health programs for public school students, increasing the criminal penalty and providing a civil remedy.

The Texas School Safety Center has developed a bullying checklist for schools to assist in determining if an action(s) constitutes bullying or cyberbullying under the Texas Education Code. The checklist facilitates a step by step decision process that is mapped to the various components of the law

<u>WHAT IS BULLYING?</u> Bullying is a significant act (s) by one or more students directed at exploiting another student or involves any verbal or written statement, electronic communication or physical act that results in:

- physical harm to a student
- damaging a student's property
- causing a student reasonable fear of harm

Bullying also occurs when there is ongoing severe and persistent statements or physical acts that create an intimidating, threatening or abusive educational environment for a student. WHAT IS CYBERBULLYING? Cyberbullying includes conduct that substantially interferes with a student's education, substantially disrupts school or infringes on the rights of the victim at school. It occurs when a person uses any electronic communication device to engage in any type of bullying described above. Relevant communications include, for example, statements made through social media outlets, text messages or email.

Under "David's Law" bullying or cyberbullying applies to bullying that takes place on school property, during any school sponsored or school related activity or in a vehicle operated by the school district (i.e. a school bus). Additionally, the law includes cyberbullying that occurs off campus and outside of a school sponsored or school related activity. The school's responsibilities for preventions include:

- Must install a way/system for students to report bullying/ cyberbullying anonymously
- Upon receiving a report, school officials must report the incident to the alleged victim's parents within 3 business days and to the alleged bully's parents within a reasonable time

In addition, a new law allows a victim to take their case to court to seek injunctive relief under Civil Practices & Remedies Code 129A.002, via the parent or parental relation, if under 18 years of age. According to this law's author, the law is designed to empower school administrators and law enforcement to go after and reprimand <u>bullies, while focusing on rehabilitation</u>.

TIPS FOR TRANSPORTING WASTE

Place chemicals in a box to prevent spills. Do not mix chemicals! Label containers that are not marked.

Secure the items and place them in your trunk or bed of your vehicle. Once you enter the facility, drive slowly between the orange cones and follow instructions on the posted signs. Drive slowly over the speed bumps and stop at the stop sign for further instructions. You will be advised when to drive under the awning for offloading. For safety reasons, you must put your vehicle in park, turn off your ignition and remain in your vehicle while being offloaded. Also for your safety, no one may smoke while on facility property and cell phone use by the driver is prohibited.
