# PRESIDENT'S CORNER

The Jester Homeowner's Annual meeting was held on Tuesday, February 20th. We had approximately 45 people in attendance and appreciate everyone's efforts to participate.

The Safety Committee update included the subjects of the Beauford hump installation, maintaining speed compliance, removing the white pylons, and the park crosswalk. The Beauford hump installation has since been cancelled. Measured data from our radar signs showed that speeds have been well maintained at 3 of the 4 signs but a 1mph speed reduction is needed at the Clove Cove sign, near the old humps. We will pursue removal of the pylons there with ATD if speeds are well maintained at that location 6-9 months from now. ATD is currently evaluating options for a crosswalk at our park and has concluded that a center median will be needed. See another article in this Warbler for a more detailed Safety Committee update.

Two Board positions were up for election. Congratulations goes to Edward Mokarzel and Chris Holland who were nominated and elected to continue serving on the Jester HOA board. We would also like to thank Wayne Hicks for his service on the board thru January of this year. We have elected Susanne Paul to complete his term.

The Board wants to become more seamless and plans to use the Jester website as a vehicle for interesting articles and notices that pertain to our neighborhood.

# **HOA Safety Committee Update**

The HOA Safety Committee began a neighborhood-wide speed awareness campaign last fall and, thanks to the efforts of our residents, speeds in Jester dropped significantly. Along Jester Blvd 85th-percentile speeds of 39 and 40mph in the past dropped to 32-34mph. In response to this success our HOA requested that ATD do an updated speed test on Beauford. Provided that speeds there are found to be compliant, our request was that ATD cancel the planned installation of 4 speed humps on Beauford, install radar signs instead, and allow us to remain hump-free for as long as speeds remain compliant. Initially ATD was unwilling but when the Safety Committee spoke at City Council Alison Alter expressed support for our approach and she intervened with ATD. Shortly thereafter ATD conducted a secret speed test over 2 days on Beauford using unmarked cars at 4 locations. Measured 85th percentile speeds were *(Continued on Page 2)*

# NATURE WATCH

Spanish for 'little armored one', the armadillo is one of the most interesting mammals in North America. All but one of the 20 different species of armadillo live in Latin America, but the Nine-banded Armadillo (Dasypus novemcinctus) makes its home as far north as Texas

(except for the western Trans-Pecos), Oklahoma, and Louisiana. In fact, this armadillo is the official state small mammal of Texas!

A cat-sized, insect—eating mammal, armadillos have bony plates that cover their back, head, legs, and tail, protecting them from predators. No other living mammal wears such a shell, but contrary to popular belief, the Nine-banded Armadillo cannot roll into a ball and encase itself with its shell. Only the Three-banded Armadillo can accomplish this, by curling its head and back feet inward and contorting its shell as protection. No amount of armor can protect them from the cold, however, and because of their low metabolic rate and lack of fur and body fat stores, cold weather can wipe out whole populations of these little creatures.

Armadillos have a pointy snout and small eyes, and are prolific diggers. They dig for food and dig many burrows, mostly along creekbeds in Central Texas, and they do not survive in areas where the soil is too hard to dig. Armadillos spend up to 16 hours a day digging, mainly active in the dawn and dusk hours, looking for beetles, ants, termites, and other insects. Their eyesight is quite poor, but they use their keen sense of smell to locate food, and utilize their long, sticky tongues to grasp berries, caterpillars, grubs, fungi, and sometimes even carrion.

Armadillos are quite fond of water, visiting water holes and streams to drink, feed, and even take mud baths. Their specific gravity is high, which means they normally ride low in the water when swimming. For short water crossings, they often just walk underwater across the bottom, but for deeper and longer crossings they voluntarily ingest air to inflate themselves and increase their *(Continued on Page 6)*

31-32mph. Based on this result, Robert Spillar, director of ATD, granted our request for cancellation of the Beauford humps and installation of radar signs instead.

Jester is privileged to remain one of the few hump-free neighborhoods in Austin. But along with that privilege comes the responsibility to maintain good speed compliance. The HOA Safety Committee continues to be committed to this on all of our streets. We will monitor data from the radar signs and adjust our speed awareness activities to the measured speeding levels. The less speeding, the less residents will need to hear about speed awareness and the less invasive measures will be. We will reach out to Beauford residents to see if there are other solutions to their safety concerns and to find the best locations for radar signs there. We will repeat our speed awareness event as needed. We would like to see a 1 mph reduction in speeds at Clove Cove (by the old speed humps) and if that is achieved we will pursue having the white pylons, the last vestige of the humps, there removed too.

If we all chip in we can do this together. Here are some things that you can do to help:

1. Forget views from the past that driving 33-35mph in a 30mph zone is acceptable

2. Maintain your speeds at or below 30mph

3. Be especially vigilant at the location of the old speed humps

4. Ask your visitors and contractors not to speed and tell them that means 30mph – not 33mph

5. Don't pull over to let speeders pass

6. Leave a bad rating for Uber/Lyft drivers who speed here and tell them you will

7. Spread the word about the importance of speed compliance

There is one more subject for update. Our residents broadly requested a crosswalk at the Jester park and we are working with ATD to make that happen. The location would be at the Nutmeg Cove intersection, near the tennis courts. ATD has determined that a center median is necessary due to the excessive road width. Normally ATD would build that with pylons and premanufactured curb but a financial contribution from our residents could allow that to be concrete and landscaped instead.

The Safety Committee invites residents to raise specific safety complaints with us anywhere in the neighborhood and is open to continued discussion about how to best maintain a safe and happy neighborhood.





buoyancy by retaining the air in their digestive tract!

Armadillos are thought to be a pair during the breeding season, sharing the same burrow. Due to their bony shells and the underside location of their genitalia, copulation occurs with the female lying on her back. While breeding occurs in July, the embryo remains in a dormant state until November. Always of the same sex, identical quadruplets develop from the single egg, and four young are born in a grass-lined burrow in March.

While the Nine-banded Armadillo is a unique mammal whose range is expanding northward, there is reason to be concerned about their conservation status in Texas. Encroaching human civilization, overgrazing, and progressive climatic change may be keeping them on the move, and many mammalogists agree that armadillos are rare at best when compared to populations of a few years ago. This decline also appears to be correlated with increasing populations of feral hogs, as well as the propensity for people to make trinkets from armadillo shells. Perhaps our state motto should read 'Don't Mess with Texas Armadillos!'




