Swans Can Be Dangerous

This time of the year, Mother Nature provides our LOE swans with some common sense. It is mating, nesting, and egg-laying season and they feel the need to protect their territory against predators including humans, dogs, and waterfowl. Most of the swans in our neighborhood are not old enough to mate but some will go through the motions of even building a nest. The pairs of swans that are old enough to produce young (cygnets) are normally gentle and can be hand fed while posing no threat. However, our cobs (males) will become aggressive and territorial in trying to protect his pen (female) and nest. This is usually temporary until mating season is over. If you are walking past a lake and a swan swims to your side and follows you, BEWARE! If you see a swan with his neck back and feathers up such as the one in the accompanying picture, please stay away, do not attempt to feed him, and walk on the other side of the street as he is in his ATTACK position. Please warn your nannies and sitters not to stroll babies around the swans. We must try to remember that the swans are merely protecting their territory and readying the area for their young. We need to be as cautious of them as they are of us. Thank you for your cooperation!


CLUBHOUSE GRAND RE-OPENING



Construction and Insurance Update as of 3-16-18

Construction continues to progress. Since the gate house reopened on February 8, we have turned our attention to the main clubhouse facility. Currently all painting is complete in the clubhouse, the storage areas and the workout facility. The tile is complete in the pool bath and painting has begun. Following painting and some electrical in the pool baths a new non-skid floor will be installed. The pool baths, like the gate house, are undergoing an extensive upgrade. The workout facility's new floor is now complete. It is a better quality floor than before and has a light pattern, so it won't show as much dirt. The office painting started this week. The kitchen cabinets are approximately 80% complete. We know everyone is anxious to re-open and we feel comfortable that everything will be complete around May 1. Discussions are in progress about the plan for the Grand Re-opening. Watch your email for more information.

Around the community, the landscape renovation has begun. In the upcoming weeks we will be doing a lot of power washing where we removed dead bushes. In some areas, we will be replanting holly bushes. In other areas where the hollies have never grown well, we are looking at alternative plants or leaving clean bare walls. Most of the new planting will be done in early April.

The insurance claim discussions are still in progress. We have submitted either estimates or invoices for all the necessary repairs. On February 13th, we were informed they had agreed to fund us an additional \$150,000 which would make our total receipts \$250,000. Unfortunately, the funds weren't sent until March 16th. We've also been promised that they will present a new Statement of Loss the week of 3/19 reflecting their proposal for the costs associated with the items located near the Special Hazard Flood Areas. We've had extensive discussions about these areas, but until we see their proposal in writing, we cannot finalize the full impact to our community. As mentioned earlier, the resolution of the claim has been severely impacted because the insurance is through Lloyds of London and underwritten by 3 different underwriters. Lloyd's has refused to give us contact information for these 3 underwriters, so we have to work through intermediaries. This has created multiple delays. Be assured that we will continue to press for funding and a favorable resolution. Our community is very fortunate that our financial position is strong and we can pay for the necessary repairs while we await reimbursement.

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RECYCLING DAY!

Saturday, June 2nd 9:00 am - 12:00 pm at the Clubhouse

Do you have old electronics or tons of paper that you need to safely dispose of or destroy? Texas Security Shredding and RPC Global E-Waste Management Solutions will help residents prevent identity theft and protect the environment by offering paper shredding and electronic recycling on Saturday, June 2, 2018 from 9 a.m. to noon at the Lakes on Eldridge Clubhouse parking lot.

Texas Security Shredding will provide onsite shredding for your private documents. No need to remove staples, paper clips or binder clips! Documents that contain personal and confidential information will be securely destroyed on-site into confetti-sized pieces. If possible, bring papers to be shredded in paper grocery or shopping bags, which can also be shredded on site and recycled with other paper products. If papers to be shredded are brought in plastic bags or cardboard boxes, the bags or cardboard boxes will be returned to the resident.


RPC Global will accept computer electronics, such as personal computers, servers & peripherals, keyboards, mice & speakers, switches and routers, cords & cables, computer monitors, laptops,

hard drives, memory chips, projectors, hubs & routers, tape drives, printers, copiers & plotters, fax machines, UPS batteries, and power supplies. For an additional cost of \$4.50, RPC offers documented hard drive media shredding and will issue a certificate when payment clears.

Consumer electronic goods will also be accepted. Acceptable items are small kitchen appliances, PDAs, game consoles and controllers, laptop & rechargeable batteries, telephones, cell phones, toner cartridges, DVD/CD/VCR players, stereo equipment, CDs, floppy drives, VHS tapes, alarm clocks, radios, electric fans, and televisions. For safety reasons, all items dropped off should be easily carried by one person. They do not accept televisions or monitors with broken glass, large appliances or hazardous materials.

Items to be recycled need to be separated into paper shredding or electronics categories. This will help facilitate faster drop off for our residents. Volunteers will be there to help direct traffic and unload vehicles. Enjoy this one stop recycling opportunity





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

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TACO DELIGHT

1 lb. ground beef1 tsp. oregano1 large onion, chopped1 tsp. cumin1 clove garlic½ tsp. brown sugar1 can tomato sauce½ tsp. salt1 can tomato paste (plus 3 cans water)½ tsp. pepper1 tsp. chili powder1 pkg. taco mix½ small pkg. cooked Minute Rice
