THE MINIMALIST GARDENER

Vegetables: This is a great month to plant eggplant, cantaloupe, okra, southern peas, sweet potato, pumpkin, and watermelon. If you have not tried battered, deep-fried okra at home, you haven't tried okra. I even like it raw and crunchy right off the plant or on a salad.

Trees and Bushes: Trees and bushes,

particularly young ones, will need some water. Do not over-water, but allow the roots to be moist (neither wet nor dry). If it does not rain during the week, give them a deep watering. Dig down a few inches in the root area to check the moisture. For trees, it is desirable to have the soil damp (not wet) 12" below the surface. Fertilize new plants with a lawn fertilizer (about 1 to 2 cups per inch of trunk diameter). Water it in well! A berm around young trees will help you provide sufficient water to their young roots.

Lawns: We get a lot of rain in Tomball, but often not regularly. You will need to make up the deficiency using your irrigation system. Strive to irrigate weekly with deep watering. Deep watering encourages deep roots. Most people water too little too often. Note that irrigation timers can be set to water several times during one day to allow time for the water to absorb into the soil. For those areas having sparse grass, it is possible they are not getting enough water. Add or adjust sprinkler heads accordingly.

Reminder: Most experts advise keeping lawn clippings on the lawn. They are the same as adding fertilizer plus they enhance the soil over time. Cut lawns about 3" high.

Personal Health: Garden in the early morning if possible. Drink lots of water. Wear a hat and sunscreen. Use repellant. Consider kneeling on foam pads or kneepads. They protect the knees and also give you a bit of protection from fire ants. Wear gloves for the same reasons.

When bitten by fire ants, I recently discovered that the pain went away in about the same time by not doing anything rather than doing something. It is essential to brush the pesky critters away as quickly as possible, though.



A HOUSE DETECTIVE MYSTERY

The Case of the New Fence

We recently had our fence replaced. We have four neighbors, and all of them agreed it was time. We can say that the fences lasted about sixteen years, which is not too bad. I do not enjoy putting up fences. Digging by hand, even with a posthole digger, is not much fun. It also is not easy to keep things level and plumb. I do like to stain fences to prevent the wood from deteriorating, and I do want to do the work myself. I stained the last fence we had built two years ago using a roller. The fence was about 100 long, and I think it took three or four days. Even then, the results were not very good because I missed several places. This time, our neighbor offered to loan me his paint sprayer, but I do not like to borrow things that can break. My theory is that if I borrow it and it breaks, I will have to buy him a new one. I might as well have bought a new one for myself in the first place. It seems like a win-win situation.

Anyway, to make a short story long, my secretary suggested that I buy a sprayer. The last time I bought a sprayer, I had to refill it every few minutes. It was a slow process that wasn't much fun. However, this time I found a Harbor Freight airless sprayer (#62915) which allowed drawing the stain right out of a five-gallon bucket. These cost about \$215, but I think I got it on sale with a 20% off coupon. A similar one at a hardware store cost almost \$300. Interestingly, the five-gallon container of stain costs about the same as Harbor Freight's sprayer.

Because I had a lot of fence to spray, I temporarily repurposed our garden wagon as a way to move the sprayer and paint around (without spilling paint). I actually could not believe how much fun it was to use this sprayer. It took me about four hours to stain over 300 feet of fence. I had enough left over to repaint a water feature cover as well (plus a quart for future touch-up).

I should add that it is imperative to follow the manufacturer's instructions for cleaning and long-term storage. These things do not tolerate dry paint in their mechanism.



VILLAGE CREEK BOARD AND COMMITTEE NEWS

Many ungainly and poorly pruned wax myrtles planted when Village Creek was new were removed and the otherwise empty beds were filled with sod. The plan of the HOA Landscape Committee is to replace these plants with other plants in different locations.

New Gold Lantana plants on Village Creek Trail killed by the winter freeze have been replaced and will be blooming yellow flowers all summer and fall long.

A proposal has been submitted to the Board to remove several invasive Tallow trees and other poorly growing trees around the bridge area. These will eventually be replaced with Bald Cypress which will match the other trees along the canal area.

The Landscape Committee Chairperson has notified her contact at MUD 5 about several areas of corrosion in the metal railing at the outflow area of the lake. They have also been asked to look at the outflow area to make sure that mud and silt are not hampering the outflow level. MUD 5 has reported that the lake is currently in good condition.

The Pool house had minor drywall damage in the two restrooms from last winter's freeze. This damage was repaired and repainted. The pool equipment is in good condition and ready for this year's pool and splash pad fun.

The basketball courts have been improved with signs added which should discourage unauthorized use.

THE HOUSE DETECTIVE The Cool Condensate Caper

Have you ever wondered how much water the average Village Creek home's air conditioner produces during a summer day? I recently had an opportunity to (roughly) measure it during a recent repair project. We have two a/c units, and this study includes only one. The other a/c unit serves only one upstairs room separated with a closed door. This study is not yet ready for publication in Scientific American.

It turns out that the number at our home is about 13 gallons per day (extrapolated from three different days using a three-hour snapshot each day). If we assume that the air conditioner runs for six months, our house creates 2,340 gallons each year. If I multiply that number times the number of homes in Village Creek (747), our community produces 1,747,948 gallons per year. That is a big chunk of water 61 feet high x 61 feet wide x 61 feet deep. That amounts to about 4% of our sewage.

Where does this water go? In most cases, it flows by gravity from our attic's a/c unit, down a pipe in the wall, to a pipe under a bathroom sink, to the sanitary sewer. Some States do not allow air conditioning condensate to go to the sanitary sewer because the water is so clean that it does not need treatment and requires expensive processing costs and plant expansion. Those cities usually send it to the storm drain (commercial) or French drain (residential).

STRONG HURRICANE SEASON

A slightly above average hurricane season is expected (from CNN.com).

The 2018 Atlantic hurricane season runs from June 1 to November 30.

The Colorado State University Tropical Meteorology Project team predicts a slightly above average Atlantic hurricane season. The team forecasts seven Atlantic hurricanes and three major Atlantic hurricanes.

Basic Emergency Kit (go to https://www.ready.gov/kit for many more suggestions):

- Water, one gallon of water per person per day for at least three days for drinking and sanitation
- Food, at least a three-day supply of non-perishable food
- Battery-powered or hand-crank radio and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert and extra batteries for both
- Flashlight and extra batteries
- Dust mask to help filter contaminated air and plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter-in-place
- Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation
- Wrench to turn off water and natural gas
- Manual can opener for food
- Cell phone with chargers, inverter or solar charger



GUESTS IN YOUR ATTIC

Who doesn't enjoy seeing squirrels scamper from tree to tree? Everyone loves seeing birds at their feeders. Who doesn't love seeing the does with their fawns? We live side by side with wildlife. Is it any wonder that conflicts arise between humans and the animals?

This is baby season for raccoons. You may find that a mama raccoon has taken up residence in your attic or garage. The best advice we can offer you is to leave her alone. Within a couple of weeks, she will lead her babies out of your attic or garage to live in the wild. If you just can't wait, here are a couple of things you can try. Put a bright light in the area at night and play some LOUD music. Some say talk radio is best. You can throw some moth balls in the area or ammonia-soaked cotton balls. She will probably choose to move the babies to a darker, quieter place outside. When she moves out, it's your responsibility to find out how she got in and block the entrance or your attic will always look like an apartment for rent to wildlife.

We often receive calls from homeowners asking for advice on how to stop raccoons that are getting into trash cans. Solution: try using some bungee cords to secure the top. Another issue we hear about is that raccoons are eating food that is being put out for feral cats. Since raccoons are nocturnal, simply removing the cat food at night will fix the problem except in the spring when mama raccoons can be seen looking for food during the day. No, they are not rabid! They are just hungry. Some homeowners ask about trapping and relocating. While removal may seem like a solution, it usually only creates an enticing vacancy for another animal in search of a meal. Remove raccoons from an area and it's only a matter of time before others move in to take their place. Additionally, the survival rate of relocated raccoons is very low. Raccoons are territorial and putting a lone raccoon into an area already populated with other raccoons can often result in death as the other raccoons will consider him/ her as an intruder.

There are products available that may help not only with raccoons but other animals as well. One such product is the motion-activated sprinkler. When an animal gets close to the food source, the sprinkler goes off and scares them away. Just do an internet search and I'm certain you'll find other products that may work as well.

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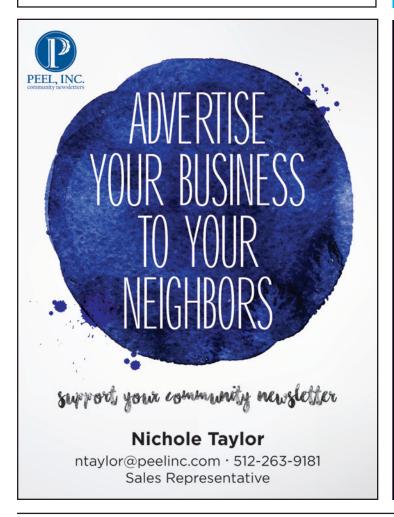
