Two masterpieces created by Katy ISD students will be part of the Texas Youth Art Month Exhibit, soon-to-be on display at the Texas Capitol. The annual tradition compiles the artwork of students from all over the state. This year, out of the hundreds of pieces participating in the

event, two paintings created by Katy ISD students were chosen by Governor Greg Abbott's wife, First Lady Cecilia Abbott.

Wolman Elementary (RJWE) Benjamin Hervey's art piece entitled "Owl Eyes" and Seven Lakes High School Yanran Wang's "Western Trinkets" will be shown at Governor Abbott's Business Office. This yearly tradition was established in the 1990s and is coordinated by the Texas Art Education Association. Each year, students from across Texas seek to be part of this prestigious recognition. During the distinguished 2018 Governor's Gallery reception, school children in grades pre-k through high school had the opportunity to unveil their masterpieces.

WATCH FOR THESE APPS ON YOUR CHILD'S DEVICE

Even If Your Child Doesn't Have A Cell Phone Yet...

It is important to be aware of the apps available for children, tweens, and teens can download.



Did vou know that 22% of kids between the ages of 6 and 9 own cell phones? When they become tweens (9-12) it rises to 60%! This means even if your child doesn't have a cell phone, some of their friends probably already have them. It's important that our kids are educated in case they encounter questionable apps on friends devices.

Some ways to protect your children and make sure they are using their phones responsibly is to have them sign a cell phone contract or establish family media rules, such as having to check with a parent before downloading a new app or game. Another idea is having a common charging area so you can easily check phones could also be a good system for your family. Consider taking time to explain to them (at an age-appropriate level) why you are asking them questions and checking their phone and privacy settings. Many children do not realize just how much information they are putting out there and how dangerous it can be.

If you have an older teen, and find some questionable apps on their phone, it may be a good opportunity for discussion. Here are a few conversation starter ideas:

- What kind of things would a person want to post anonymously?
- How would you personally use this app?
- Would you be okay with anyone seeing that pic?
- Why would you tell your secrets to strangers? Do you think it would be safe to accept their help/friendship?
- Are you being safe with that app?
- Are you encouraging others or criticizing them?

Want to make sure your kids can't download ANY apps without your approval.....

1. On an iPhone go into SETTINGS, GENERAL,

RESTRICTIONS. You'll be prompted to create a code and then you can select any phone functions that you don't want your child to have free access to without your okay.

On an Android go into SETTINGS, USERS. Select ADD USER /RESTRICTED PROFILE. You will be prompted to set-up a passcode and then you can choose what they can access on their own and what they'll need you to enter the passcode to access. Or setup freeandroidspy.com ... shows nearly ALL activity even photos taken, apps downloaded, calls, texts, chats, websites visited, etc..

BACK-TO-SCHOOL TIPS FOR PARENTS

Starting the new school year can be a time of great excitement... and anxiety. Help calm your child's fears (and your own) with these teacher-approved tips.

MEET THE NEW TEACHER.

For kids, one of the biggest back-to-school fears is "Will I like my new teacher?" Breaking the ice early on is one of the best ways to calm

everyone's fears. Take advantage of your school's open house or back-to-school night. Some teachers welcome phone calls or e-mails — another great opportunity to get to know each other before the year begins.

If personal contact with the teacher isn't possible, try locating the teacher's picture on a school website or in a yearbook, so your child can put a name with a face. If your child's teacher sends a welcome letter, be sure to read the letter together.

TOUR THE SCHOOL.

If your school hosts an open house, be sure to go. Familiarizing your child with her environment will help her avoid a nervous stomach on the first day. Together you can meet her teacher, find her desk, or explore the playground.

With an older child, you might ask him to give you a tour of the school. This will help refresh his memory and yours.

CONNECT WITH FRIENDS.

A familiar friend can make all the difference when heading back to school. You might try calling parents from last year's class and finding out which children are in your child's class this year. Refresh these relationships before school starts by scheduling a play date or a school carpool.

TOOL UP.

Obtain the class supply list and take a special shopping trip with your child. Having the right tools will help him feel prepared. While keeping basic needs in mind, allow for a couple of splurges like a cool notebook or a favorite-colored pen. These simple pleasures make going back to school a lot more fun.

School supply lists also provide great insight into the schoolwork ahead. Get your child excited about upcoming projects by explaining how new supplies might be used. Let him practice using supplies that he's not used before — such as colored pencils or a protractor — so

he will be comfortable using them in class.

AVOID LAST-MINUTE DRILLING.

When it's almost time to stop playing, give a five-minute warning. Giving clear messages to your child is very important.

CHAT ABOUT TODAY'S EVENTS AND TOMORROW'S PLANS.

While it is important to support learning throughout the summer, don't spend the last weeks of summer vacation reviewing last year's curriculum. All kids need some down time before the rigors of school begin. For some kids, last-minute drills can heighten anxiety, reminding them of what they've forgotten instead of what they remember.

EASE INTO THE ROUTINE.

Switching from a summer to a school schedule can be stressful to everyone in the household. Avoid first-day-of-school mayhem by practicing your routine a few days in advance. Set the alarm clock, go through your morning rituals, and get in the car or to the bus stop on time. Routines help children feel comfortable, and establishing a solid school routine will make the first day of school go much smoother.



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BACK TO SCHOOL

School starts in August, so now is the time for drivers to pay closer attention to the school zones in the neighborhood. We want to remind you that the speed limit in a school zone is 20mph and traffic fines double!

Other changes to be aware of include;


- Children behaving unpredictably

FEDERAL LEVEL

We are working hand-in-hand with Congressman McCaul to expend \$65+ million from federal funds to build a third reservoir to capture the Cypress Creek watershed.

REGIONAL LEVEL

We are working with the Brookshire Katy Drainage District and surrounding counties for large scale regional improvements, channel improvements and regional detention.

LOCAL LEVEL


Voters approved a \$19.5 million bond to fix local drainage issues within the City Limits. \$14.5 million will be spent on streets and drainage improvements, and \$5 million will be spent on an expansion to our sewer plant. The City is also applying for multiple grants for funding for additional drainage improvements city-wide.

We have a current Continuity of Operations (COOP) Plan. All departments are prepared and capable of responding quickly, at all levels, to continue essential departmental functions in the event of an emergency, threat or disruptive event.

We have an operational Emergency Operations Center (EOC) at our Police Station. It is activated for small and large-scale emergencies. During disasters, it is the central location where we work to coordinate response efforts, make decisions, and gather and disseminate information.

We have several interlocal agreements in place in case we are in need of aid, and we are prepared with a debris and monitoring contract.

- Graded 23,500 linear feet (4.45 miles) of ditches
- · Replaced 41 culverts
- Installed 297 tons of road material

We are actively working on open channel restoration, grading, culvert and outfall projects city-wide.



Staying informed during emergencies is important.

Along with telecommunication improvements for our first responders, the City has worked hard on better communication. Keep up-to-date with information on the City's website, social media pages and City Council meetings.

For Emergency Alerts, the City utilizes Reverse 9-1-1. We alert individuals and businesses to the risk of danger by sending a recorded voice message to landline telephones and registered cellphones. If you have a traditional landline telephone, you're already opted in. If you only use a mobile phone or digital voice service, you must opt-in to receive these alerts.
