COURTYARD FIRE SAFETY

A Courtyard Unnecessary Wildfire Risk

Shuffling around Courtyard on my irregular jogs, I can't help but notice the wildfire home risk on many properties from tree limbs touching or laying on roofs and of roof gutters stuffed to overflowing with oak leaves and juniper needles. If the gutter catch fire, the fire gets into the attic, and the house is gone.

Realizing my own property was severely at

risk with clogged gutters that could be ignited by wildfire embers, I put off raising the alarm to homeowners until I cleaned my own gutters!

Our home wildfire ignition risks may endanger neighbor homes and families as well as our own. Consequently, it is each homeowner's responsibility to reduce the hazard. In the case of rooftop tree limbs and overflowing gutters, this means the following.

Leaves falling directly onto your roof usually end in your gutter, providing lodgment and fuel for those dreaded wildfire embers that can destroy your home.

• Combustible oak leaves and Juniper needles debris accumulate in gutters the from nearby or overhanging trees. (I had a ton of both!)

There are telltale signs of a clogged gutter when it rains.

- Water spills over the edge of a gutter.
- Water sprays like a fountain from gutter seams and elbow joints.
- Water doesn't flow out the bottom of downspouts.

Trim your overhanging trees as necessary annually (using a professional arborist) and clean your roof gutters at least twice a year. Otherwise, flammable debris will clog up your gutter system, causing unnecessary Wildfire risk exposure.
