Swans Can Be Dangerous

This time of the year, Mother Nature provides our LOE swans with some common sense. It is mating, nesting, and egg-laying season and they feel the need to protect their territory against predators including humans, dogs, and waterfowl. Most of the swans in our neighborhood are not old enough to mate but some will go through the motions of even building a nest. The pairs of swans that are old enough to produce young (cygnets) are normally gentle and can be hand fed while posing no threat. However, our cobs (males) will become aggressive and territorial in trying to protect his pen (female) and nest. This is usually temporary until mating season is over. If you are walking past a lake and a swan swims to your side and follows you, BEWARE! If you see a swan with his neck back and feathers up such as the one in the accompanying picture, please stay away, do not attempt to feed him, and walk on the other side of the street as he is in his ATTACK position. Please warn your nannies and sitters not to stroll babies around the swans. We must try to remember that the swans are merely protecting their territory and readying the area for their young. We need to be as cautious of them as they are of us. Thank you for your cooperation!





Pool Reminders

As Summer approaches and you look forward to using the pool at LOE, please remember these important rules:

• Animals are not allowed in the building or pool area, except guide dogs. Guide dogs are allowed on the deck, but not in the water.

Harvey Upstream Trial Update

The court has selected 13 test cases that represent all categories of the upstream flooding victims. LOE is the test case for HOAs. After attending several days of the trial it has been demonstrated that the Government had long planned to store reservoir water on private property. Studies were done every decade since the dams were built in the 1940s indicating a number of options to avoid flooding private property. The Government consistently chose to "take no action at this time" and was willing to take the chance that a significant rain event would not occur despite studies and scientific support that a significant rain event was predicted and inevitable.

The witnesses have included hydrologists, meteorologists, an Army Corp of Engineering representative, a Harris County Flood Control representative, damage experts, and of course test case flood victims. The federal judge and all the attorneys toured the test case properties to have a clear understanding of properties involved. At this writing the trial is half over and the case appears to be going positively for the plaintiffs. The ruling is expected a month or two following the trial.

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Cooking substitutions aid in calorie reduction

When looking to make permanent changes to a diet, consider using ingredient substitutions, said Roberta Anding, registered dietitian at BCM and Texas Children's Hospital.

Modifying the fat content in recipes gives the biggest calorie reduction, said Anding. Many times, applesauce can replace butter and oil in baking recipes, and Greek yogurt can replace sour cream.

Learning what substitutions work best does take some time and experimentation with cooking time and temperature, but reducing a diet by 100 calories per day can result in a 10-pound weight loss in one year, said Anding.

Other substitution options include switching to a low-fat cheese rather than a whole-fat cheese and switching from white bread and rice to wheat bread and brown rice. Not only is there a benefit in amounts of fiber, but also in magnesium, which can decrease the risk of type 2 diabetes.

"Don't look for extreme changes to your diet. Look for the common sense changes that you can make permanent," said Anding.
