We invite you to join us at a future group meeting of people who are caring for individuals with various forms of cognitive decline. The "neurocognitive disorders" that disrupt these individuals' lives and the lives of those who care for them are complex. Caring for these people in ways that maintain their dignity

and sustain the abilities they have are foremost in our group.

Who are the people attending this meeting? The caregivers or care partners are spouses, children, parents, siblings, friends and a former caregivers who remain with the group to offer ideas and fellowship. Some of caregivers are living with or near the person with cognitive decline. Some have care plans that involve travelling to help or communicating frequently with caregivers in other cities and states. We are a "fluid group." Situations shift, caregiving ceases, schedules change....we are always delighted to see new faces. Each meeting brings the people who most need to be with one another on that day.

What's in it for me? Each person brings unique aspects to the caregiving as well as being able to "get" the general common concerns, griefs, disappointments, fatigue, frustrations and even humorous elements. We collaboratively share strategies, suggestions, resources and encouragement with one another. Laughter and fellowship are re-energizing pieces of our time with one another.

We routinely have informational handouts and a library of books, local resources and national publications that may be beneficial to you. A segment of a poem by Maya Angelou is a good glimpse of our perspectives, "We do best with what we know. When we know better, we do better..." Sometimes this learning can be disheartening or sad. Still, having grounded information on this walk helps sustain our efforts.

If the timing of our meetings is good for your schedule, please come meet us and share your situation confidentially with us. We hope you will share this information about the group with anyone whom you think may be interested. We look forward to seeing you!

With Four Million People and Climate Change, Where Will Austin's Water Come From? Robert E. Mace

The drought of 2008 through 2016 was a wake-up call for Austin. As levels in the Highland Lakes—Austin's sole source of water dwindled to near-record lows, the city enacted drought restrictions that threatened landscapes and businesses. As lake levels continued to decline, Austinites worried that the city would run out of water. Fortunately, the rains returned; however, the ever-present threat of drought remains for our growing city.

In response to the drought, the city council formed the Water Forward Task Force to work with city staff and the community to develop a 100-year water plan for Austin. This planning effort focused on increasing the sustainability, reliability, and diversity of Austin's water supplies with an emphasis on (1) water conservation and reuse; (2) projects that are technically, socially, and economically feasible; and (3) environmental protection. Unlike state planning efforts, which only extend 50 years into the future, Austin's plan also considers the potential effects of climate change on our water resources.

The challenges to meet Austin's future water needs are sobering. There are currently about 1 million Austinites. Demographers expect our population to grow to 2 million by 2065 and 4 million by 2115. On top of a rapidly increasing population are the anticipated effects of climate change—including increased temperatures and lower rainfall, both of which will result in less water flowing to our reservoirs. If Austin does nothing to shore up its water resources, the Highland Lakes may go completely dry for years at a time.

The good news is that Austin's Water Forward Integrated Water Resource Plan identifies solutions to Austin's growing water resource challenges. These solutions include both water efficiency and watersupply projects. Water efficiency includes installing smart water meters that will inform you when you have a leak, reducing leaks in the city's water pipes, and requiring water-efficient landscaping in new construction. Eventually, new buildings will be required to use rainwater, stormwater, greywater (from sinks and showers), air conditioning condensate, and treated wastewater to meet nonpotable needs. Water-supply projects include storing excess river water in (1) an aquifer for use during a drought, something San Antonio has done with great success and (2) an off-channel reservoir (essentially a ring dike located away from the river).

In the coming months and years, you will hear more about these solutions as the city implements them. Similar to the development of the Water Forward plan, there will be opportunities for the community to voice opinions on implementation. With a changing climate, a growing community, evolving regulations, and developing technology, Austin will revisit and revise the plan every five years.

The Water Forward Integrated Water Resource Plan established Austin as a water leader in the state and the country. Working together, we can ensure that we meet our water needs while enhancing Austin's quality of life and the protection of the environment.

Fall Baiting for Fire Ants

The month of September celebrates Fire Ant Awareness Week, so get involved! While you may not be seeing too many mounds yet, fall is a great time to bait for fire ants. Baiting in fall can help reduce the number of mounds appearing in spring. Baits take time for results to be seen, so be patient and schedule a regular baiting program for every spring and fall. If you need fire ants killed quickly, you may want to use an individual mound treatment.

Tips on using fire ant baits:

• Make sure you have a bait, not a granular

o Baits are either broadcasted over an entire property or sprinkled AROUND individual mounds for fire ants to pick up as food. Baits should NOT get wet.

o Granulars are sprinkled on TOP of a mound and watered in to carry the pesticide into the mound to come into contact with the ants.

o Read the product label BEFORE YOU BUY to figure out if it is a bait or granular.

• Broadcasting baits using a handheld spreader saves time and reduces the amount of chemical applied to the environment.

• Use the proper amount of bait and application equipment for your yard size

o Read the label; it will tell you the rate of application and equipment required for application.

o Many baits are placed at a rate of 1-1 ½ pounds per acre.

o Many people do not follow the label and put out more bait than is needed.

• Check that fire ants are foraging before putting out bait.

o Place a hotdog slice or potato chip near a mound, leave for 10 minutes, then check for fire ant activity.

• Do not use stale or old bait.

o Smell bait to make sure it is not spoiled; spoiled bait smells rancid (if you are using spinosad fire ant bait, it smells somewhat funky normally so do not be alarmed).

o Store bait sealed in the original container out of reach of children and animals.

• Get your neighbors to bait the same time as you do; this will push reinvasion boundaries of fire ants further away from your property.





o Even better, organize a community-wide fire ant management program; they can help reduce the amount of fire ants within your community & save money on chemical costs for everyone in the neighborhood.

WILDFLOWER NOTES

Here's what's likely to be blooming, fruiting or setting seed in Central Texas this time of year. Look for these native plants around town, at the Wildflower Center and perhaps in your own backyard!

INDIANGRASS (SORGHASTRUM NUTANS)

Talk about a gold rush! Indiangrass positively shimmers in tallgrass prairies thanks to its beautiful, metallic blooms. And those golden tops are all the more stunning on their blue-green stems — which are a favorite snack of livestock. Birds and small mammals eat the seeds, as well, and the plant is a larval host to pepper-and-salt skipper butterflies. Who knew grass could do so much? Well, lots of people, including our own ecologists. Like many native grasses, this droughthardy perennial lives harmoniously with wildflowers, resists weeds and prevents erosion. And it can handle various soil types, sun exposure and moisture levels. This is not a fickle plant. Its fall color ranges from deep amber to purple and paints landscapes across Texas and well beyond. A wide-ranging native, Sorghastrum nutans goes for the gold in nearly every contiguous state.

PRAIRIE GOLDENROD (SOLIDAGO NEMORALIS)

Detect a theme here? Our September picks are basking in a favorite fall color: gold. It's fitting that low-angle sun and plants beginning to go dormant are accompanied by grasses and wildflowers blooming in burnished tones. And prairie goldenrod is most definitely a symbol of fall at the Wildflower Center. Its yellow plumes attract butterflies, bees and birds (the big three b's!) and complement purple Texas gayfeather and crimson-colored autumn sage in our gardens — a look you should definitely consider replicating. Perennial Solidago nemoralis is an underappreciated, slightly shorter species of goldenrod that is less aggressive than common tall goldenrod — and its blooms keep on giving. Because individual plants bloom at various times, a stand of prairie goldenrod can have an extended flowering season. Plant some in a sunny place and let the golden days begin.

How to Plan for Traveling with Kids

Families that travel with kids typically know tablets and other gadgets and activities can make the journey easier, and vacation rentals can make the stay more relaxing and affordable.

These tips from the experts at Vrbo can help make it easier to hit the road with kids, whether it's exploring exciting new places, visiting relatives or relaxing during an annual trip to the beach.

Start packing early. Begin a week or two before the trip by helping kids write a list of what to take. typically reserved for special occasions so you have the added benefit of excitement to distract from an unfamiliar eating schedule.

Bring favorite toys. A sentimental and familiar item from home can help a child feel more secure in new surroundings. In fact, a survey from Vrbo revealed just how popular teddy travel is, with more than half of those surveyed (55%) citing stuffed animals as the most important thing their child brings on vacation.

However, 69% of those surveyed said their child has left a toy or stuffed animal behind while away from home. In the event a toy does get left behind, look into resources like Vrbo's Teddy Bear Service. Any traveler staying in one of the company's vacation rental homes can call 1-774-VRBOTDY or email TeddyBearHotline@vrbo.com to report a lost teddy bear or other item of sentimental value, and the company will help track it down and expedite its return home.

Plan for nap time. Whether you're racing to put miles behind you or scurrying to catch a connecting flight, it's easy to get off track and miss nap time completely. If you're likely to miss a nap, try to at least plan for some quiet time to let kids rest and rejuvenate. Also remember that travel can be tiring for kids who have outgrown naps on a regular basis and encourage them to grab some shut-eye before signs of exhaustion emerge.
