The 2020 Annual Report to the membership from the Board of Directors will be printed in the March 2021 newsletter. A copy will also be posted on our website and available at the HOA office during the month of March 2021.

Circle C Amendment of Proposals Explained

For many years now, Circle C residents have questioned the original Covenants, Conditions, and Restrictions (CC&Rs). Questions like: "Why can't we leave a basketball net outside for our kids?" or "Why are our dues based on our house taxes?" or "Why do the larger homes in Circle C get more votes?" are repeatedly posed to the board and the management team.

Your questions are reasonable. Many of our original CC&Rs are no longer relevant to today's standards. Rules like not working from home (hello 2020) or allowing trash bins on the front street twice a week (we've had weekly pickups now for over eighteen years) are significantly outdated.

So, we took the questions asked the most, and constructed amendments written to adjust our rules to better serve the community. Our lawyers then checked our wording, made some slight adjustments, and here we are, with nine amendments for you – our homeowners – to vote upon. You get to decide if you want to have play equipment in your front yard or want to be able to work from home, etcetera.

The problem now is that people are not voting. Or at least, not enough people are voting. For any of these proposed amendments to pass, per state law, we need at a minimum of 67% of eligible homeowners to vote yes. With over 5600 homes in Circle C, that is approximately 3,752 'yes' votes.

Why are people not voting? Some residents have posted questions inquiring why these proposed amendments are grouped together. Some are not sure about the wording. We will do our best to explain answers to some of your questions and concerns below.

First, convenience is an issue. Grouping the nine proposals into

three voting items helps to make the process easier and faster. It is also why online voting is now accessible via the www.circlecranch.com website. If you have not yet registered, you may do so at https://circlecranch.ivotehoa.com/register. You will need a registration code unique to

your address. This code can be found by calling our finance office at 512-451-9901 or by checking your assessment statement.

Second, below is a quick explanation for the proposals. For a more comprehensive explanation, please refer to the June edition of the Circle C Newsletter or visit the CircleCRanch.com website and search for "download voting pamphlet".

Item 1: The below proposals relate to voting and assessments.

Article I. Section 1: Adds the term "development lot" to distinguish between our current homeowners and developers for both voting purposes and for collecting dues. For unfinished homes that sit longer than six months after the certificate of occupancy for residence is issued, we would like to collect 25% of normal assessment dues from the developers.

Article I. Section 3: Allows the Board to add up to 200 lots within a 12-month period. Speaking of developers, there is a section in Avana (called the Rowell) where homeowners purchased their houses but are not actually part of Circle C HOA. Those neighbors have to pay a complete separate HOA now and would like to officially join our community.

Article II. Section 2: Changes our voting to one vote per lot for homeowners. Currently the voting process allows larger homes to have more voting points than others. One vote per lot gives every homeowner an equal vote.

Article III. Section 3: Sets a uniform assessment rate. Having one uniform rate for every homeowner simplifies the process rather than paying dues based on tax appraisals. Also, under this proposal, developers holding development lots would have to pay 25% of the rate.

<u>Item 2:</u> The below proposals relate to Circle C houses and lots. **Article V. Section 3 (k):** Changes the number of times per week

homeowners may leave trash bins out to only one time per week, Before Circle C was annexed, our trash was picked up twice a week. Now, it's only once a week.

Article V. Section 1: Defines "residential purposes" as using the house as "a place of abode". This proposal allows for approval of storage sheds and greenhouses.

Article V. Section 3 (b): Did you know that under the old CC&Rs, you are technically not allowed to work from home? This proposal seeks to change this.

Article V. Section 3 (m): Allows recreational equipment (i.e., basketball nets) to be placed in front yards. (Permanent ones would require approval by the Architectural Committee.)

<u>Item 3:</u> Discusses future changes to the CC&Rs.

Article VIII. Section 2: Allows future amendments to be made by one of 2 ways: (1) by a fifty percent plus 1 of total eligible votes), and (2) by the Board of Directors as necessary to conform to current U.S., state, or local laws.

WILDFLOWER NOTES

Here's what's likely to be blooming, fruiting or setting seed in Central Texas this time of year. Look for these native plants around town and perhaps in your own backyard!



YAUPON HOLLY (ILEX VOMITORIA)

If there's one thing most of us could use more of during the holidays, it's caffeine. How else to keep up with the demands of this notoriously busy, stressful time? Though it could justifiably be famous, many are unfamiliar with yaupon holly, the only North American native plant containing caffeine. Native Americans throughout the Southeast consumed tea made from its leaves and twigs; in certain purification ceremonies, it was drunk in large quantities and then vomited, lending the plant its specific epithet, vomitoria. But don't let that dissuade you; it's actually quite enjoyable (it's related to the South American yerba mate, which is made from I. paraguariensis). In fact, its earthy flavor and homegrown appeal have caught on as of late, with several local producers and a growing fanbase. Try it warm, iced or in baked goods. Because, let's face it, we could all use a boost to finish out the year.

MISTLETOE (PHORADENDRON TOMENTOSUM)

Though oak mistletoe (Phoradendron leucarpum) is a more wideranging mistletoe species in the United States, P. tomentosum, also known as "Christmas mistletoe," is more common to Central Texas. A southern beauty, it's also native to Louisiana and Oklahoma and likes to hang out in hackberry and cedar elm trees. As a parasite, it needs them (and other host trees) to survive. Once you first notice P. tomentosum's "witches' brooms" — green bunches of evergreen leaves — you'll start seeing them everywhere. In fact, they're

leaves — you'll start seeing them everywhere. In fact, they're especially conspicuous this time of year due to their appearance in deciduous trees. Mistletoe brings out complex feelings in plant lovers (read more on that at wildflower.org/magazine/native-plants/plant-a-kiss), but it's also associated with human lovers. Hang its glossy white berries overhead this holiday season, and you might find a kiss planted on your face. 'Tis the season for foliage-inspired romance!

Widow Spiders

Four species of widow spiders can be found in various parts of Texas. Southern widows, western widows, and northern widows look remarkably similar to each other while the brown widow is easy to discern from the other widows in the state. Brown widow spiders are not native to Texas and originate in Africa. The have naturalized and can be found in various parts of the state.



Female brown widows can vary in color from light brown to gray with a reddish-orange hourglass on the underside of the abdomen. Lighter colored females may also have white markings on the upper side of the abdomen. Legs are alternating bands of black/ dark brown and light brown.



Southern widows, western widows, and northern widows tend to be dark grey to black in color. Northern widows may completely lack an hourglass or may have two red lines in place of an hourglass. Southern and western widows have an hourglass or two triangles on the underside of the abdomen. Western widows may have the back triangle somewhat larger than the front. All three of these widows may have a reddish-orange spot on top of the abdomen just above the spinnerets. Nevertheless, widow spider coloration can vary wildly.

Widow spiders do not like being in the open. They can often be found outside in protected areas such as rainspouts, shrubbery, firewood piles or unused grills or BBQ pits. It is also possible to find them in garages, cellars, crawl spaces, attics, furniture, or electric or water meter boxes. Widows are shy creatures and often people are bitten when they accidentally disturb a web.

The bite of a black widow sometimes is not noticed, but when it is, it often feels like a pin prick.

The bite location will have two red marks surrounded by redness and swelling. The bite reaction is systemic and intense pain usually occurs within 1-3 hours and continues for around 24 hours. Other symptoms include tremors, nausea, vomiting, leg cramps, abdominal pain, profuse perspiration and rise in blood pressure. It is also possible for breathing difficulties and unconsciousness to occur. If bitten by a black widow, immediately seek medical attention.

When working around the house or in the yard, it is best to wear leather gloves to avoid being bitten by venomous arthropods. The easiest way to remove widow spiders is with a vacuum. Make sure to shake out shoes, clothing and linens that have been in storage.


