February 2021 Steiner Ranch Residential Landscaping Tips

As we all know, winter is almost over, and we had a few winter cold snaps. This may mean a few different things for a homeowner and their landscaping. As many residents inspect their landscaping, you might notice that certain plant material and trees lose their leaves or start to turn brown, especially after the first freeze or two. This is known as the dormant period for a perennial plant such as Lantana, several types of Salvias, Esperanza, Turks Cap, Crape Myrtles, etc., and especially Native Grasses. This is only normal, and this is the perfect time to begin to prune and cut plant material back if you have not already done so. Most perennial plant material commonly used around the central Texas area, such as Lantana and Salvias, can be cut back anywhere from 3" to 6" from the ground. For larger plants, such as Esperanza, it is recommended that they be cut 1' to 2' from the ground. Do not worry if you have cut yours lower, as most perennial plants are fairly hardy and should come out of dormancy as long as there are a few inches left.

You will notice fresh growth as soil temperatures rise in early Spring. With that being said, there are a few perennials that are not recommended to be cut back quite yet, such as Roses. The rule of thumb for Roses would be to cut them back around Valentine's day or when you start to see signs of new growth. These can be cut back approximately halfway to 16" depending on how big the original plant size is. Another tip to help not only the look but the health of the plant is to make all cuts at a 45-degree angle. This is important, especially for Roses at any time of the year. You want to cut 1/4" above a leaf set at the desired height. Another great tip corresponding with perennial cutbacks is to apply 2"-3" of mulch after you cut back most of your dormant plant material. Do not be afraid to apply a few inches of mulch over the cut plant. This not only helps create a clean look while your beds may feel empty but helps insulate dormant plants providing them with a higher success rate of coming back in the Spring.

While temperatures are milder in the winter months, irrigation is still an important part of maintaining a beautiful landscape. Generally, irrigation can be turned off in the winter, but it is important to continue to monitor soil moisture levels. If it has not rained in a few weeks, it is good to irrigate the landscape to maintain plant health.

When in doubt about lawn care, it is always best to consult with a professional who is familiar with each type of plant and the key components they require to grow, bloom and thrive in the landscaping of your home.

Making Exterior Changes? Don't Forget To Obtain Architectural Approval First

Thinking about modifying your deck, adding a pool, or changing the color of your exterior trim? Steiner Ranch governing documents require the submission of plans and specifications for review and approval by the Architectural Committee (AC) *before* construction or installation begins. Improvements requiring approval include, but are not limited to, playscapes, pools, decks, patios, ponds, new siding or trim colors, planter boxes, arbors, walkways and sheds. Before making exterior changes to your home, please submit a Modification Application, which is now available through the CiraNet portal. In addition, the SRMA Board of Directors have approved the removal of the \$500 deposit policy from the application process.

How to submit a Modification Application in CiraNet portal:

- 1. Log in to your CiraNet account.
- 2. Click on Architectural Application tab
- 3. Download and complete out appropriate applications (please make sure to only fill out the appropriate addendums/variance if needed).
 - 4. Click on Add New Improvement Request
 - 5. Select Category
 - 6. Enter in description of requested modification
 - 7. Attach all necessary documents for full review.
 - 8. Check box that you have read and understand the agreements.
 - 9. Click submit once all items are attached and filled out.

Please note:

- The Architectural Committee has up to 30 days to review a completed application. This committee is made up of resident volunteers from Steiner Ranch
- If additional items are requested for review, the 30 days starts over again once those items are received.
- You can monitor the status of your application in your CiraNet account. Please refrain from emailing or calling the HOA staff for an update on the status of your application before your 30 days is up.

The application can be filled out using tools in Adobe Reader or by printing the application out to fill it by hand.

Prevent Oak Wilt - Don't Prune Oaks Feb 1st - June 30th

From February through June, avoid all pruning or cutting of oaks – this is the high season for oak wilt transmission. Any wounds that occur from construction, vehicles, wind, etc., should be painted as soon as they're discovered – ideally within ½ hour of being cut – with commercial tree wound dressing or latex paint. That includes freshly cut stumps and surface roots.

Pruning is least risky during the coldest winter days and extended hot periods in mid to late summer. Any time you prune though, the Texas Forest Service recommends painting all wounds and sanitizing pruning equipment between trees using denatured methyl alcohol (shellac thinner), isopropyl alcohol, or a general-purpose household disinfectant such as Lysol, Listerine or Pine-Sol. Household bleach is not recommended.

Red oaks, including Spanish (now Buckley) oak, Shumard oak and blackjack oak, are very susceptible to oak wilt and play a key role in the disease's transmission. Oak wilt is caused by the fungus *Ceratocystis fagacearum*, which spreads its spores from "fungal mats" that form under the tree's bark. These mats have a sweet, fruity smell that attracts insects, especially the sap-sucking nitidulid beetle. After feeding and breeding on the fungal mats, these beetles fly away covered in fungal spores. As they visit other oaks, they spread the fungus through open wounds in the bark. The nitidulid beetle is only about the size of a pinhead, but is capable of flying as far as a mile away. While red oaks are the most susceptible to oak wilt, all oaks can become infected.

Fungal mats usually form on standing trees, but can also develop on logs, stumps and fresh firewood cut from infected oaks. Make sure to remove and either burn or bury infected oaks to prevent mats from forming, and never store unseasoned wood from infected trees near healthy oaks.

The second way oak wilt can be transmitted is through the roots. Live oaks tend to grow together in dense mottes with interconnected roots, so the fungus can be transmitted easily among them.





Oak wilt is occasionally transmitted through red oak roots as well, but the movement is slower and occurs over shorter distances than with live oaks. Root transmission can be prevented by cutting trenches four feet deep between infected and healthy trees, but by far the best option is to prevent infection in the first place.

So make sure

NOT to prune oaks
between February 1

and July 1, and ALWAYS paint wounds on oaks no matter what time of year it is. For more information on preventing and treating oak wilt, please visit texasoakwilt.org.

Firewise Focus – How to Prepare for a Wildfire

VEGETATION MANAGEMENT

1. HOME IGNITION ZONES

Limiting the amount of flammable vegetation, choosing fire-resistant building materials and construction techniques, along with periodic exterior maintenance in the three home ignition zones - increases the chances your home will survive a wildfire when exposed to embers and/or a surface fire. The zones include the Immediate Zone: 0 to 5' around the home; Intermediate Zone: 5 to 30' and the Extended Zone 30 - 100'. Visit www.nfpa.org for more details on the Home Ignition Zones.

2. LANDSCAPING AND MAINTENANCE

To reduce ember ignitions and fire spread, trim branches that overhang the home, porch and deck and prune branches of large trees up to (depending on their height) 6 to 10 feet from the ground. Remove plants containing resins, oils and waxes and replace mulch in the Immediate Zone of 0 to 5 feet with non-combustible mulch products like crushed stone and gravel. Maintain vegetation annually.

■ FIRE RESISTIVE CONSTRUCTION

3. ROOFING AND VENTS

Class A fire-rated roofing products offer the best protection. Examples include: Composite shingles, metal, concrete and clay tiles. Inspect shingles or roof tiles and replace or repair those that are loose or missing to prevent ember penetration. Box-in eaves, but provide ventilation to prevent condensation and mildew. Roof and attic vents should be screened to prevent ember entry.

4. DECKS AND PORCHES

Never store flammable materials underneath decks or porches. Remove dead vegetation and debris from under decks/porches and between deck board joints.

TIEMPORT TO A STATE OF THE STAT

5. SIDING AND WINDOWS

Embers can collect in small nooks and crannies and ignite combustible materials; radiant heat from flames can crack windows. Use fire-resistant siding such as brick, fiber-cement, plaster or stucco and dual-pane tempered glass windows.

■ BE PREPARED

6. EMERGENCY RESPONDER ACCESS

Ensure your home and neighborhood has legible and clearly marked street names and numbers. Driveways should be at least 12' wide with a vertical clearance of 15' for emergency vehicle access.

7. DISASTER PLAN

Develop, discuss and practice an emergency action plan with everyone in your home. Include details for pets, large animals and livestock. Know two ways out of your neighborhood and have a pre-designated meeting place. Always evacuate if you feel it's unsafe to stay - don't wait to receive an emergency notification if you feel threatened from the fire.

8. ANNUAL INSURANCE CHECK-UP

Conduct an annual insurance policy check-up to adjust for local building costs, codes and new renovations. Create/update a home inventory to help settle claims faster.

The Smart family is dressing up in traditional Chinese clothing for the 2021 Chinese New Year.

Chinese New Year, also known as the Lunar New Year or Spring Festival, is China's most important festival, marking the end of winter. It's a time for families to get together and celebrate for two weeks.

Chinese New Year falls on February 12 this year, inaugurating the Year of the Metal Ox, which lasts until January 31, 2022. Individuals born in 2021 and 12 year increments prior (i.e., 2009, 1997, 1985, 1973, etc.) will be an Ox. There are 12 Chinese zodiac animals in a 12 year cycle.

Oxen are believed to be faithful, obliging, persistent and sympathetic as well as loyal, honest, hard-working, less-talkative and conservative. Those Metal Oxen born in 2021 especially represent the characteristics "Busy and active, with good interpersonal relations." This year's lucky colors are red, blue and purple.


The origins of the Chinese New Year festival can be traced back to about 3500 years ago. The most popular story told about its origins says that the mythical beast Nian would eat livestock, crops and even people on the eve of a new year. To prevent Nian from attacking people and causing destruction, people put food at their doors, scared it away with loud noises (firecrackers) and put red lanterns and red couplets on the doorframes to stop Nian from entering.

at making sure the year ahead is lucky and prosperous. The holiday starts with cleaning your home until it shines: Sweep, mop, scrub...do everything to make sure your home is spotless BEFORE the midnight of New Year's Eve. The aim here is to get rid of any bad luck that's accumulated over the past year. Cleaning of any kind is then forbidden on the first

Putting up decorations for the Chinese New Year is comparable to putting up Christmas decorations in western countries. Almost all decorations involve the color red and lucky images, such as lanterns, door couplets, paper cutouts, the "happiness" character hung upside down, etc.

The reunion dinner is the biggest part of any New Year's Eve.

Dishes made of special meats are served as a main course for dinner and as an offering for the New Year.

Dumplings are the most well-known food, and they are meant to symbolize wealth because their shape resembles a Chinese sycee (a type of gold and silver currency used in imperial China).

Whole Fish is eaten or merely displayed on the eve, because the pronunciation of fish makes it a homophone in Chinese for "surpluses."

Other traditional foods are:

- Chicken feet or front pork feet: Symbolizes grabbing money.
- Rice cake/NianGao: Pronunciation is a homophone for "A more prosperous year".
- Spring rolls: the shape of the rolls resembles gold bars.
- Noodles: These noodles are left uncut and are meant to be slurped all in one go, rather than chewed. The longer the noodle, the longer your life.


Watching the Spring Festival Gala on China Central Television (CCTV) is the most common family activity after dinner on New Year's Eve. It is broadcast annually on the eve, and typically has the largest audience of any entertainment show in the world with over a billion viewers.

On New Year's Day, setting off firecrackers and fireworks has long been a Chinese tradition from the first minute of the New Year. The first day is a time to honor one's elders and visit the oldest and most senior members of their extended families.

People exchange gifts, much like westerners do at Christmas. Older people give red envelopes containing cash (the most common gift and tradition) to single younger people and children as a form of a blessing.

Lion or dragon dances are performed in the streets or at events as a symbolic ritual to usher in the New Year.

People typically visit relatives and friends during days 2-7. In traditional Chinese culture, married women spend New Year's Eve and



Day with their husbands' familes, and bring their husband and children to the wife's family on day two.

After another dinner is held to celebrate the eve of the birth of the Jade Emperor, the ruler of heaven, on day 8, after which most people return to work on day 9. But the festival atmosphere is still in the air—employers will host a lunch or dinner with their employees or give them red envelopes, thanking them for the work they have done all year.


The 15th day of the New Year is the Lantern Festival, and it marks the final day of the celebration. On this day, children go out at night carrying lanterns and solve riddles printed on them.

The special food for this day is Tangyuan, a glutinous rice ball typically filled with red bean or sesame paste. People believe that the round

shape of the balls symbolize family togetherness and that eating it may bring the family harmony, happiness and luck in the New Year.

These are the Chinese New Year traditions in a nutshell. There are a lot of interesting details about this holiday. (To learn more, visit ChineseNewYear.net/ calendar.)

Spring is Calling

We're right around the corner from the beautiful Central Texas springtime. Before the wildflowers and migratory songbirds arrive, some of the first true signs of spring are the mating calls of frogs and toads as they emerge from winter hibernation. You can usually hear them in the evening when the temperature is above freezing, especially after rain. So next time you are out enjoying an evening walk, take a moment to listen for all the frogs and toads looking for love.

Many people think you need to be near a pond, stream, or marsh to hear and see amphibians, but areas with rocks, decaying logs, and leaf litter are great places to find them too. You also don't need to be very close to hear them since frogs and toads make a huge amount of noise for such small creatures.

There are more than 15 different types of frogs and toads found in the Balcones Canyonlands, but we're focusing today on the top 5 that you're likely to hear at Steiner Ranch. The Blanchard's cricket frog is one of the more common species and its call is very easy to recognize. It sounds like two rocks being

clicked together with increasing speed. You can find this frog almost anywhere there is water, like a pond or creek. They are

very small, with adults being approximately one inch long, so you will have to look carefully to see one. They are much easier to find by listening.

Next up are our two chirping frogs. The cliff chirping frog and Rio Grande chirping frog make a "chirping" sound as their name implies, and they also make a short "trill." They

are often mistaken for crickets or birds. Unlike most other frogs, they don't need water to breed and do surprisingly well in suburban yards. Frogs and toads are great to have around because they help naturally control garden pests, including many bugs, snails, and slugs.

Another staple resident of Central Texas is the Gulf Coast toad. You can hear its long trill at night after rains in the spring and summer. This toad is fairly easy to identify with bumpy skin and a large light-colored stripe down its back.


Last but not least is the Rio Grande leopard frog, which can be found in ponds and other permanent water sources. Its call is often described as sounding like a snore. They are active both night and day and are commonly seen at the edge of ponds, often floating in the water.

Amphibians have existed on earth for over 300 million years and they are a very important part of the food web. They eat insects and worms, helping to keep those populations stable, and they are eaten by a wide range of animals from turtles to birds. They also help our economy by eating lots of agricultural pests, and they benefit our health by helping to keep mosquitoes at bay. Their tadpoles even help keep waterways clean by eating algae. Despite their importance, nearly one-third of the world's amphibian species are threatened with extinction, and almost 200 species have gone extinct since 1980.

The good news is, you can help by welcoming frogs and toads into your yard. The best way to make your yard more hospitable is by not using chemical fertilizers and pesticides. Amphibian skin is permeable and easily absorbs chemicals. Fortunately, since frogs and toads are great natural pest controllers, they'll do much of the chemicals' work for free.

Another way to roll out the red carpet for amphibians is to leave leaves under bushes and other plants, which they can use for shelter and reproduction. If you have space for it, a small pond or water feature is a great way to attract frogs. Or you can make a toad home out of an overturned plant pot – just remove part of the rim to make a door.

You can also help by supporting landscape-scale conservation like the Balcones Canyonlands Preserve. The preserve is home to the threatened Jollyville Plateau salamander (a close relative of the better-known Barton Springs salamander) and many other amphibians. 
