A NEW CHAPTER FOR TARRYTOWN AUTHOR JODY FERGUSON




After nearly thirty years and thousands of miles traveled away from his Austin home, author Jody Ferguson is happy to be back in Texas. A former Pentagon senior advisor, Jody Ferguson first left home when he was a high school student. Later in college, he packed his suitcase and headed to France, where he studied for a year at the University of Paris. During his time there he traveled to the Middle East and North Africa. He was next launched to Asia, working in Japan for three years. After graduate school in Washington, D.C. he was named a

Fulbright Scholar and headed for Moscow, where he lived for two years. As a policy analyst, he was able to continue traveling between Russia and Asia while being based in Washington DC. He speaks Russian, French and Japanese, and has 20-plus years experience as a political-military affairs expert.

Five years ago Ferguson left his position as a Senior advisor at the Pentagon when he came home to Tarrytown to be nearer to his extended family. Jody, a fifth generation Austinite, comes from a family with deep roots in Texas. His great grandfather came to Austin in 1849.

Jody's homecoming was also motivated by his desire to write historical fiction. Jody has become the present tender of the family stories, having been handed down a treasure trove of family photos, records and memorabilia from his great aunt and uncle. The stories told on hunting trips, shared around holiday tables, and mixed with his own experience have been woven into Jody's newly-released novel.

This past September Jody published his debut novel, *Above the Water*. Although he has been published



numerous times in the political and academic press, *Above the Water* is his first work of fiction. It is set in Shanghai, Texas, and the Pacific Theater during World War II, and weaves the paths of two young lovers separated by war and their attempts to come together again.

"Above the Water is a story for lovers of romance and WWII stories. It is loosely based on several of my family members," Ferguson said. *"This book, as well as several of the fiction novels I plan on writing will one day provide my children and their children a semi-record of our ancestors."*

Q&A

Q: What is Above the Water about?

A: Drawing from family stories and my own experiences in East Asia, the title is a play on the Chinese characters for 'Shanghai,' which literally mean 'above the sea.' The calligraphy for Shanghai denotes the city's location at the confluence of the Yangtze River and the East China Sea. *Above the Water* is an allegory about the compromises people are forced to make in difficult circumstances. Two lovers, Harry and Viktoria, have been cast apart by war and are making individual sacrifices in their respective journeys to find one another again. It's a story of love, family, moral ambiguity, and perseverance.

Q: What draws you to write historical fiction?

A: My experience in Asia and Russia has given me plenty of grist, which I hope to mill into various creative writing projects. What is of particular interest to me is the examination of peoples adrift in times of international transformation. An understanding and an attempt to gain compassion for such groups is timely in that we are witnessing an epochal change of global proportions in an era we call globalization. Although the meaning of this term is viewed differently by different groups of people, there is little doubt that these changes have affected vast numbers of peoples, and there are numerous societies in transition—including our own. Understanding earlier periods of people swept up in the tide of momentous global changes is in this respect quite timely.

For example, the large community of Russian émigrés scattered across Northeast Asia after the 1917 revolution is a topic that I have become quite familiar with. Many people know of the displaced nobility and the wealthy groups of Russians who ended up in Europe and North America in the 1920s, primarily because they had money and connections. Less well known is the fate of the merchants, artisans, farmers, soldiers, and other groups that made up the lower and middle classes of Tsarist Russia. Many of them ended up in China or Japan, mainly because it was easier and cheaper to escape there, and also because they wanted to be nearby when the Bolsheviks collapsed, which they felt was inevitable. There they lived for decades and built thriving communities before being pushed out again after the Second World War. The second exodus took them further afield to Australia, Canada, and the U.S. It is stirring to be walking in China or Japan and come across an old Russian Orthodox Cathedral, as I have done unexpectedly on several occasions.

Yet another fascinating topic is that of the thousands of Japanese war orphans left behind in China, and the children of some whom I got to know while living in Japan. There is also the story of the groups of American deserters, who left their posts during the 1918-20 Siberian intervention, and formed roving gangs, moving about the Russian Far Eastern provinces for years afterwards. Or, the Chicago police officers who engaged in exchange programs with their Shanghai brethren in the 1920s and 1930s, and often found themselves in tense situations in a country about which they knew nothing. Or, about Arab and Jewish merchants scattered about East Asia, finding themselves suddenly under Japanese occupation, and oftentimes treated compassionately.

There are a plethora of fascinating topics that are often passed over in history books or are given a mere sentence. When I come upon references to details like these, seemingly just thrown down on the page, I find the craving to know more about these anecdotes of history. These mere footnotes are to me fascinating vignettes that portray various social issues during those momentous times. I hope to write historical fiction stories based loosely on the tragic – and yet sometimes comical and farcical – situations that peoples often find themselves during times of transition or war, when they are tossed about like foam on an ocean wave, all events and circumstances completely beyond their control.



LETTUCE RECYCLE! by Dena Houston

MANY NEW QUESTIONS!

Over the last few months, I have received more recycling questions than usual. I will focus this edition of "Lettuce Recycle" on those questions. As a Recycling Block Leader and author of this column, I am committed to recycling education. Please continue to send your questions and recycling ideas to: recycling@hpwbana.org. Thank you!

• CASH REGISTER RECEIPTS - CAN CASH REGISTER RECEIPTS GO INTO THE GREEN OR BLUE BIN? No. Most of today's cash register receipts are printed on thermal paper. This paper is treated with BPA, making the paper neither recyclable nor compostable. Please place these receipts in the trash can.

ARE CARBONLESS PAPER RECEIPTS ALSO TREATED WITH BPA? Yes, they are. These are the duplicate receipts and invoices often given by people who do work at your home. The typical carbonless paper contains a high concentration of BPA. These receipts have to go into the trash can.

• FOIL TOPS - ARE THE FOIL TOPS ON YOGURT, SOUR CREAM AND CREAM CHEESE RECYCLABLE? If the tops are aluminum foil, they are recyclable providing they are clean and dry. Please be sure to have at least a 2-inch ball of foil before placing it in your blue bin.

• HARD PLASTIC HOLDERS - ARE THE HARD PLASTIC HOLDERS ON BEER CANS RECYCLABLE? Yes, they are.

• LABELS AND TAPE ON CARBOARD BOXES - DO I NEED TO REMOVE TAPE AND LABELS FROM CARDBOARD BOXES BEFORE THEY ARE RECYCLED? No, tape and labels do not need to be removed before cardboard boxes go into the blue recycling bin. However, boxes do need to be emptied of all Styrofoam and other packing material.

• PLASTIC RECYCLING SYMBOL - WHAT IF PLASTIC HAS NO RECYCLING SYMBOL? If a plastic container or bottle has no recycling symbol, please throw it into your trash can. Without a recycling symbol, it is impossible for the recycling center to sort and recycle it.

• RECYCLE & REUSE DROP-OFF CENTER - IS THE RECYCLE & REUSE DROP-OFF CENTER REALLY OPEN? The center was open, by appointment only, until December 23, 2020. It closed at that time when Austin went to COVID Stage 5. Please check the following website for the most current information: https://www.austintexas.gov/ department/recycle-reuse-drop-center

• STYROFOAM - WHY CAN'T STYROFOAM BE PICKED UP CURBSIDE? Styrofoam is very lightweight and takes up a lot of space. It can easily break into tiny pieces and scatter in the wind. Picking it up curbside would cause more litter pollution that is impossible to clean up. Please take your Styrofoam to the Recycle & Reuse Drop-Off Center. However, they do not take Styrofoam peanuts.

• WHAT OTHER TYPES OF FOAM ARE RECYLABLE? Foam packaging, such as foam rolls, foam cushioning, foam packing sheets, and foam pouches, is also recyclable at the Recycle & Reuse Drop-Off Center.


This month I'm providing a final summary on how things went in 2020, with the last couple of weeks' transactions (there was a flurry of activity in the final days of the year).

And to give you a sense of the shifts in price points and where the activity is, the graph nearby shows 2018-2020 transactions by price band in the Tarrytown neighborhood. Here are a few observations:

- Sales of sub-\$1M price point homes have dropped from ~42% of total transactions in 2018 down to ~22% in 2020
- Sales of \$2M+ price point homes have increased from ~11% of total transactions in 2018 to ~21% in 2020
- 25% of all transactions in Tarrytown in 2020 were in the \$1.25M-1.49M price range, up from around 15% in both 2019 and 2018

As you think about your plans for 2021, keep in mind the continued inflow of luxury buyers into the Austin market, and the limited inventory that is available. 
